Approval of a Federal Subrecipient Grant with Clackamas Fire District #1 for the Community Paramedic Program. Grant value is \$1,002,563 for 2 years. Funding is through the America Rescue Plan Act State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (ARPA SLFRF). No County General Funds are involved.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: In June 2023, the BCC awarded Clackamas Fire \$1,002,563.00 in ARPA funding to enhance their community paramedic program to provide services county-wide.

Clackamas County needs Community Paramedics (CP's) as they provide critical medical and case management services to the community, in the community. It's a resource that is skilled, knowledgeable, mobile, and, most importantly, versatile. CP's routinely increase access to care and resources to the County's most vulnerable and underserved populations, but their unique skillset also allows them to be redeployed in times of crisis. They respond to the changing needs of the community, from the increasing epidemic of opioid and poly-pharma overdoses, pandemic viruses, and mental/medical non-emergency repetitive calls for assistance to catastrophic environmental events. CPs can enhance the County's response to the needs of the community and meet many of the goals described in the blueprint for a healthy Clackamas County, which is the required community health improvement plan for the County. It also supports Performance Clackamas goals of building public trust through good government and ensuring safe, healthy, and secure communities. The focus areas of the CP are categorized into four pillars: access to care, opioid/polysubstance misuse, community outreach, and vaccinations.

Clackamas Fire District #1 (CFD1) will hire 1 full-time CP, 2 full-time Community EMTs, and one part-time case manager who will serve across Clackamas County. Community Paramedics and EMTs have the unique ability to reach community members where they are to help meet their needs. Each community in Clackamas County is unique and has unique needs. These positions are available to address local needs by traveling to each area and providing services there. They will provide services for emergencies related

to communicable diseases, the increasing epidemic of opioid and poly-pharma abuse, medical and mental health crisis, non-emergency calls for assistance, frequent 911 users, catastrophic environmental events, and connecting individuals in need with services through community outreach. By hiring these positions,

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Clackamas Fire District can deliver Community Medicine as a mobile service to vulnerable populations at their location throughout the County.

This program will provide the critical services needed to our communities and fill existing gaps in healthcare services.

RECOMMENDATION: The staff respectfully requests that the Board of County Commissioners approve this Agreement (11440) and authorize Chair Smith to sign on behalf of Clackamas County.

RECITALS

1. Clackamas County Public Health Division (CCPHD) is actively implementing Public Health Modernization in line with House Bill 3100 passed by the Oregon legislature in 2015. This law set forth a path to modernize Oregon's public health system so that it can more proactively meet the needs of Oregonians. One key component of this law is to Improve the public health system's capacity to provide foundational public health programs, including application of a health equity and cultural responsiveness lens through all phases of implementation. Community paramedics routinely increase access to care and resources to the county's most vulnerable and underserved populations. Clackamas County needs community paramedic services to identify barriers to equal access to healthcare and to connect identified community members to needed services.

- 2. Clackamas Fire District #1 has provided community paramedic services to their fire district since 2017. Clackamas County has utilized these services in the past for Covid vaccinations, houseless outreach, opioid abuse prevention, and community outreach.
- 3. Clackamas County is requiring Clackamas Fire to utilize community paramedics and EMTs to respond to frequent 911 callers, identify and engage those surviving an opioid overdose, increase access to healthcare in all health equity zones, and provide community outreach to provide opportunities to increase health equity to populations that traditionally go underserved and have poor health outcomes. Clackamas Fire will provide County with regular reporting on the eligibility or needs assessment per individual served, demographics, number of households served, and the number of individuals served.
- 4. In compliance with expenditure category 3.4 public sector capacity effective service delivery: Clackamas Fire will provide community paramedic services to Clackamas County with the goal of increasing access to healthcare and to improve the health of the communities we serve. The program will focus on identifying and reducing barriers to access to care, addressing opioid/polysubstance misuse, assisting with vaccinations when appropriate and necessary, and providing community outreach to provide medical direction, referrals, barrier identification, and assistance to access resources.
- 5. The community paramedic program targets underserved communities that were disproportionately affected by the immediate and lasting effects of the COVID-19 pandemic. By increasing access to care for these vulnerable populations, community paramedics can reduce the health disparities that initially left these populations more susceptible to COVID-19.

NOW THEREFORE, according to the terms of this Subrecipient Grant Agreement (this "Agreement") the COUNTY and SUBRECIPIENT agree as follows:

AGREEMENT

- Term and Effective Date. This Agreement shall become effective on the date it is fully executed and will terminate on June 30, 2026, unless sooner terminated or extended pursuant to the terms hereof. Eligible expenses for this Agreement may be charged during the period beginning April 1, 2024 and expiring June 30, 2026, subject to additional restrictions set forth below and to the exhibits attached hereto, and unless this Agreement is sooner terminated or extended pursuant to the terms hereof. No grant funds are available for expenditures after the expiration date of this Agreement.
- Program. The Program is described in attached Exhibit A, Subrecipient Statement of Program Objectives & Performance Reporting. SUBRECIPIENT agrees to carry out the Program in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement and according to SUBRECIPIENT scope of work in Exhibit A.
- 3. Standards of Performance. SUBRECIPIENT shall perform all activities and programs in accordance with the requirements set forth in this Agreement and all applicable laws and regulations. Furthermore, SUBRECIPIENT shall perform all activities and programs in compliance with the requirements of the American Rescue Plan State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds, that is the source of the grant funding and other required information in Exhibits A-J, which are attached to and made a part of this Agreement by this reference. SUBRECIPIENT shall further comply with any and all terms, conditions, and other obligations as may be required by the applicable local, State or Federal agencies providing funding for performance under this Agreement, whether or not specifically referenced herein. SUBRECIPIENT agrees to take all necessary steps, and execute and deliver any and all necessary written instruments, to perform under this Agreement including, but not limited to, executing all additional documentation necessary to comply with applicable State and Federal funding requirements.

- 4. Grant Funds. COUNTY's funding for this Agreement is the America Rescue Plan Act State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (ARPA SLFRF Assistance Listing Number ["ALN"] #: 21.027), passed through to COUNTY by the U.S. Department of the Treasury. The maximum, not to exceed, grant amount COUNTY will pay is \$1,002,563. This is a cost reimbursement grant. The award is conditional upon compliance with the terms herein and disbursements will be made in accordance with the schedule and requirements contained in Exhibit D: Reimbursement Request. Failure to comply with the terms of this Agreement may result in withholding of payment. Funds advanced and unspent must be returned to COUNTY within 30 days of the end of termination period in Section 1 if award conditions are not met.
 - 4.1. ARPA State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (ALN: 21.027)
 - Amount passed to SUBRECIPIENT: \$1,002,563
- 5. Amendments. The terms of this Agreement shall not be waived, altered, modified, supplemented, or amended, in any manner whatsoever, except by written instrument signed by both parties. SUBRECIPIENT must submit a written request including a justification for any amendment to COUNTY in writing at least forty-five (45) calendar days before this Agreement expires. No payment will be made for any services performed before the beginning date or after the expiration date of this Agreement. If the maximum compensation amount is increased by amendment, the amendment must be fully executed before SUBRECIPIENT performs work subject to the amendment.
- 6. **Termination.** This Agreement may be suspended or terminated prior to the expiration of its term as follows:
 - a. At COUNTY's discretion, upon thirty (30) days' written notice to SUBRECIPIENT;
 - b. Upon SUBRECIPIENT's default under this Agreement, following thirty (30) days' written notice with an opportunity to cure;
 - c. Upon mutual agreement by COUNTY and SUBRECIPIENT;
 - d. Immediately upon written notice provided by COUNTY that County has determined ARPA funds are no longer available for this purpose; or
 - e. Immediately upon written notice provided by COUNTY that it lacks sufficient funds, as determined by COUNTY in its sole discretion, to continue to perform under this Agreement.

Upon completion of improvements or upon termination of this Agreement, any unexpended balances shall remain with COUNTY.

- 7. **Effect of Termination**. The expiration or termination of this Agreement, for any reason, shall not release SUBRECIPIENT from any obligation or liability to COUNTY, or any requirement or obligation that:
 - a. Has already accrued hereunder;
 - b. Comes into effect due to the expiration or termination of the Agreement; or
 - c. Otherwise survives the expiration or termination of this Agreement.

Following the termination of this Agreement, SUBRECIPIENT shall promptly identify all unexpended funds and return all unexpended funds to COUNTY. Unexpended funds are those funds received by SUBRECIPIENT under this Agreement that (i) have not been spent or expended in accordance with the terms of this Agreement; and (ii) are not required to pay allowable costs or expenses that will become due and payable as a result of the termination of this Agreement.

- 8. **Funds Available and Authorized.** COUNTY certifies that it has received an award sufficient to fund this Agreement. SUBRECIPIENT understands and agrees that payment of amounts under this Agreement is contingent on COUNTY receiving appropriations or other expenditure authority sufficient to allow COUNTY, in the exercise of its sole administrative discretion, to continue to make payments under this Agreement.
- 9. **Future Support.** COUNTY makes no commitment of future support and assumes no obligation for future support for the activity contracted herein except as set forth in Section 8.

10. Federal and State Procurement Standards

- a) All procurement transactions, whether negotiated or competitively bid and without regard to dollar value, shall be conducted in a manner so as to provide maximum open and free competition. All sole-source procurements must receive prior written approval from COUNTY in addition to any other approvals required by law applicable to SUBRECIPIENT. Justification for sole-source procurement should include a description of the program and what is being contracted for, an explanation of why it is necessary to contract noncompetitively, time constraints and any other pertinent information. Interagency agreements between units of government are excluded from this provision.
- b) COUNTY's performance under the Agreement is conditioned upon SUBRECIPIENT's compliance with, and SUBRECIPIENT shall comply with, the obligations applicable to public contracts under the Oregon Public Contracting Code and applicable Local Contract Review Board rules, which are incorporated by reference herein.
- c) SUBRECIPIENT must maintain written standards of conduct covering conflicts of interest and governing the performance of its employees engaged in the selection, award and administration of contracts. If SUBRECIPIENT has a parent, affiliate, or subsidiary organization that is not a state, local government, or Indian tribe, SUBRECIPIENT must also maintain written standards of conduct covering organizational conflicts of interest. SUBRECIPIENT shall be alert to organizational conflicts of interest or non-competitive practices among contractors that may restrict or eliminate competition or otherwise restrain trade. Contractors that develop or draft specifications, requirements, statements of work, and/or Requests for Proposals ("RFP") for a proposal to compete for the award of such procurement. Any request for exemption must be submitted in writing to COUNTY.
- d) Contracting with Small and Minority Businesses, Women's Business Enterprises, and Labor Surplus Area Firms. SUBRECIPIENT shall take all necessary affirmative steps to assure that small & minority businesses, women's business enterprises, and labor surplus area firms are used when possible when contracting for services or soliciting for potential resources, per 2 CFR 200.321.

11. General Agreement Provisions.

- a) Non-appropriation Clause. If payment for activities and programs under this Agreement extends into COUNTY's next fiscal year, COUNTY's obligation to pay for such work is subject to approval of future appropriations to fund the Agreement by the Board of County Commissioners.
- b) Indemnification. SUBRECIPIENT agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold COUNTY, and its elected officials, officers, employees, and agents, harmless with respect to any claim, cause, damage, action, penalty or other cost (including attorney's and expert fees) arising from or related to (1) SUBRECIPIENT's negligent or willful acts or those of its employees, agents, or those under SUBRECIPIENT's control; or (2) SUBRECIPIENT's acts or omissions in performing under this Agreement including, but not limited to, any claim by State or Federal funding sources that SUBRECIPIENT used funds for an ineligible purpose. SUBRECIPIENT is responsible for the actions of its own agents and employees, and COUNTY assumes no liability or responsibility with respect to SUBRECIPIENT's actions, employees, agents or otherwise with respect to those under its control.
- c) **Assignment.** This Agreement may not be assigned in whole or in part without the prior express written approval of COUNTY.
- d) **Independent Status.** SUBRECIPIENT is independent of COUNTY and will be responsible for any federal, state, or local taxes and fees applicable to payments hereunder. SUBRECIPIENT is not an agent of COUNTY and undertakes this work independent from the control and direction of

COUNTY excepting as set forth herein. SUBRECIPIENT shall not seek or have the power to bind COUNTY in any transaction or activity.

- e) Notices. Any notice provided for under this Agreement shall be effective if in writing and (1) delivered personally to the addressee or deposited in the United States mail, postage paid, certified mail, return receipt requested, (2) sent by overnight or commercial air courier (such as Federal Express), (3) sent by electronic mail with confirming record of delivery confirmation through electronic mail return-receipt, or by confirmation that the electronic mail was accessed, downloaded, or printed. Notice will be deemed to have been adequately given three days following the date of mailing, or immediately if personally served. For service by facsimile or by electronic mail, service will be deemed effective at the beginning of the next working day.
- f) Governing Law. This Agreement, and all rights, obligations, and disputes arising out of it, shall be governed and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Oregon and the ordinances of Clackamas County without regard to principles of conflicts of law. Any claim, action, or suit between COUNTY and SUBRECIPIENT that arises out of or relates to the performance of this Agreement shall be brought and conducted solely and exclusively within the Circuit Court for Clackamas County, for the State of Oregon. Provided, however, that if any such claim, action, or suit may be brought in a federal forum, it shall be brought and conducted solely and exclusively within the United States District Court for the District of Oregon. In no event shall this section be construed as a waiver by the COUNTY of any form of defense or immunity, whether sovereign immunity, governmental immunity, immunity based on the Eleventh Amendment to the Constitution of the United States or otherwise, from any claim or from the jurisdiction of any court. SUBRECIPIENT, by execution of this Agreement, hereby consents to the personal jurisdiction of the courts referenced in this section.
- g) **Severability**. If any provision of this Agreement is found to be illegal or unenforceable, this Agreement nevertheless shall remain in full force and effect and the provision shall be stricken.
- h) Counterparts. This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, all of which together will constitute one and the same Agreement. Facsimile copy or electronic signatures shall be valid as original signatures.
- i) **Third Party Beneficiaries**. Except as expressly provided in this Agreement, there are no thirdparty beneficiaries to this Agreement. The terms and conditions of this Agreement may only be enforced by the parties.
- j) **Binding Effect.** This Agreement shall be binding on all parties hereto, their heirs, administrators, executors, successors and assigns.
- k) **Integration**. This Agreement contains the entire Agreement between COUNTY and SUBRECIPIENT and supersedes all prior written or oral discussions or Agreements.
- No Attorney Fees. In the event any arbitration, action or proceeding, including any bankruptcy proceeding, is instituted to enforce any term of this Agreement, each party shall be responsible for its own attorneys' fees and expenses.
- m) **Debt Limitation**. This Agreement is expressly subject to the limitations of the Oregon Constitution and Oregon Tort Claims Act and is contingent upon appropriation of funds. Any provisions herein that conflict with the above referenced laws are deemed inoperative to that extent.
- n) **Survival**. All rights and obligations shall cease upon termination or expiration of this Agreement, except for the rights and obligations set forth in Sections 3, 7, 11 (a), (b), (d), (f), (g), (i), (j), (k), (l), and (m), and all other rights and obligations which by their context are intended to survive.



 - d. A petition, proceeding, or case is filed by or against SUBRECIPIENT under federal or state bankruptcy, insolvency, receivership, or other law.
- b) **County's Default**. COUNTY will be in default under this Agreement if, after thirty (30) days' notice and opportunity to cure, COUNTY fails to perform a material obligation under this Agreement provided, however, that failure to disburse grant funds due to lack of appropriation shall not constitute a default of COUNTY.

4. Remedies

a) **County's Remedies.** In the event of SUBRECIPIENT's default, COUNTY may, at is option, pursue any or all remedies available to it under this Agreement, at law, or in equity including, but not limited to: (1) withholding SUBRECIPIENT grant funds until compliance is met; (2) reclaiming grant funds in the case of omissions or misrepresentations in financial or programmatic reporting; (3) requiring repayment of any funds used by SUBRECIPIENT in violation of this Agreement; (4) termination of

b) Subrecipient's Remedies: In the event COUNTY is in default, and whether or not SUBRECIPIENT elects to terminate this Agreement, SUBRECIPIENT's sole remedy for COUNTY's default, subject to the limits of applicable law or in this Agreement, is reimbursement for eligible costs incurred in accordance with this Agreement, less any claims COUNTY may have against SUBRECIPIENT. In no event will COUNTY be liable to SUBRECIPIENT for expenses related to termination of this.

5. Compliance with Applicable Laws

- a) Public Policy. - b) Rights to Inventions Made Under a Contract or Agreement. SUBRECIPIENT agrees that contracts or agreements for the performance of experimental, developmental, or research work shall provide for the rights of the Federal Government and the recipient in any resulting invention in accordance with 37 CFR part 401, "Rights to Inventions Made by Nonprofit Organizations and Small Business Firms Under Government Grants, Contracts and Cooperative Agreements," and any further implementing regulations issued by the U.S. Treasury Department.

SUBRECIPIENT shall remain obligated to independently comply with all applicable laws and no action by COUNTY shall be deemed a guarantee, waiver, or indemnity for non-compliance with any law.
- f) Disclosure of Information. Any confidential or personally identifiable information (2 CFR 200.1) acquired by SUBRECIPIENT during the execution of the project should not be disclosed during or upon termination or expiration of this Agreement for any reason or purpose without the prior written consent of COUNTY. SUBRECIPIENT further agrees to take reasonable measures to safeguard such information (including those set forth in 2 CFR 200.303(e)) and to follow all applicable federal, state and local regulations regarding privacy and obligations of confidentiality.

- 6) Additional Insured Provisions. - 8) Insurance Carrier Rating. Coverage provided by SUBRECIPIENT must be underwritten by an insurance company deemed acceptable by COUNTY. Insurance coverage shall be provided by companies admitted to do business in Oregon or, in the alternative, rated A- or better by Best's Insurance Rating. COUNTY reserves the right to reject all or any insurance carrier(s) with an unacceptable financial rating.
- 9) Certificates of Insurance. As evidence of the insurance coverage required by this Agreement, SUBRECIPIENT shall furnish a Certificate of Insurance to COUNTY. The COUNTY and its, elected officials, employees and officers must be named as an additional insured on the Certificate of Insurance. No Agreement shall be in effect until the required certificates have been received, approved, and accepted by COUNTY. A renewal certificate will be sent to COUNTY 10 days prior to coverage expiration.
- 10) **Primary Coverage Clarification**. SUBRECIPIENT coverage will be primary in the event of a loss and will not seek contribution from any insurance or self-insurance maintained by, or provided to, the additional insureds listed above.
- 11) **Cross-Liability Clause**. A cross-liability clause or separation of insured's condition will be included in all general liability, professional liability, and errors and omissions policies required by the Agreement.
- 12) **Waiver of Subrogation**. SUBRECIPIENT agrees to waive their rights of subrogation arising from the work performed under this Agreement.
