CLACKAMAS COUNTY PUBLIC HEALTH DIVISION WEEKLY REPORT ON COVID-19 FOR 7/14/2022

Coronavirus update

Clackamas County, along with 23 other counties in Oregon, have entered high risk for community spread of COVID-19 according to the <u>Centers for Disease Control and Prevention</u>. The CDC recommends that people who reside or visit high-risk counties:

- Wear a mask in indoor public spaces
- Stay up-to-date on vaccines
- Get tested if you have symptoms
- Take additional precautions if you are at risk for severe illness

Cases in Clackamas County increased again, at 1,024 total reported cases this past week, marking a 14.6 percent increase from the previous week. The percentage of positive test results increased slightly over the past two weeks, from 13.0 percent to 13.6 percent.

Case numbers in Oregon are the highest they've been since early March. Still, the decision to mask or use other mitigation strategies is left up to individuals. During this surge, Clackamas County Public Health urges all individuals to mask while indoors and get boosted at a <u>vaccine clinic</u> to strengthen your protection against COVID-19.

Cases in Oregon have decreased 8 percent in the last two weeks. The state recorded 3,374 new cases over the last 7 days and test positivity increased to 14.6 percent. Test positivity is still an important metric for tracking the spread of the virus. While this metric can provide important context about case totals and trends, it is NOT a measure of how prevalent the virus is in communities. Many at-home test go unreported/uncounted in official reports, so the true percent positivity and number of cases in Oregon is grossly underestimated.

Test positivity is just one metric used to track and measure COVID-19. Daily cases, hospitalizations, deaths, and <u>wastewater surveillance</u> are all important metrics than can be used separately to track community spread there is and hospital capacity. Driven by the Omicron subvariants BA.4 and BA.5, the most transmissible of the COVID-19 variants thus far in the pandemic, Oregon Health & Science University data scientists expect that Oregon will continue to see a rise in COVID-19 cases and hospitalizations. The most recent <u>OHSU forecast</u> predicts that infection levels will soon be similar to those seen with the first Omicron wave in January.

The number of known cases announced in the U.S. each day remains relatively stable, but rising test positivity rates and the emerging dominance of the BA.4 and BA.5 have led to new outbreaks of infections. The number of new cases reported each day has always been an undercount. Despite these depressed figures, more than half the states are seeing higher daily cases today than two weeks ago. Even New York and New Jersey, where conditions had been improving throughout June, are now in the midst of modest increases. Hospitalizations have increased steadily in recent weeks, and our regional hospitals are feeling the strain of increased numbers and staffing shortages. On average, there are more than 33,000 people in American hospitals with coronavirus on a given day — the highest national average since early March.

Testing Response

No-Cost COVID-19 Testing

<u>Curative</u> testing site at Harmony Campus in Milwaukie operates 6 days a week with expanded afternoon hours on weekdays. The site also offers **free** rapid molecular testing with results available in about an hour. Appointments are not required.

<u>PCR Testing</u> (Results usually within 48-72 hours) Monday - Friday, 8:00a - 5:00p Saturday - 8:00a - 3:00p

Rapid Molecular Testing (Results usually within an hour) Monday - Friday, 9:00a - 4:30p Saturday 8:30a – 2:30p

At-Home Tests Available at No Cost to Medicare Part B Recipients

Medicare Part B recipients, including those enrolled in a Medicare Advantage plan, can receive up to eight at-home tests per calendar month at no cost. Recipients can request tests at any participating pharmacy or healthcare provider. For more information visit <u>cms.gov/newsroom</u>.

COVID-19 Test to Treat Locator Available Online

Test to Treat, a federal initiative launched in March, offers a new opportunity for testing and treating COVID-19. At select locations across the country, individuals can get tested and, if they are positive and treatments are appropriate for them, can get a prescription and have their medication filled all at one location.

In Oregon, the test to treat sites are currently located at five Walgreens and two HRSA-supported Health Centers. This includes the Walgreens on Sunnyside in Happy Valley for the general public, and Neighborhood Health Centers and Clackamas County Health Centers for established patients.

A tool to find Test to Treat locations as well as more information on the program is available at <u>aspr.hhs.gov/TestToTreat</u>. Prescriptions are currently being offered to those that are at high risk of becoming very sick. New Test to Treat locations will be added as the program expands.

Raising Awareness of Counterfeit COVID-19 At-Home Test Kits

Community members should be aware of counterfeit COVID-19 at-home test kits that have made their way into the U.S. market. The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has identified that counterfeit versions of Flowflex COVID-19 Test Kits and iHealth COVID-19 Antigen Rapid Test Kits are being circulated. The FDA has provided information <u>on its website</u> on how to identify counterfeit test kits. As the iHealth test kits received by Public Health were distributed directly by the manufacturer (via an arrangement with the Oregon Health Authority), there is no reason to believe that the division has received any counterfeit tests. Public Health will update its COVID-19 testing webpage to provide information on how community members can identify counterfeit test kits.





Statewide Numbers from July 11, 2022




COVID-19 Positive Patients in Oregon Hospitals




