Approval of Shelter and Housing Projects Plan & Board Engagement Strategy

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:**

On January 25, 2022, and March 2, 2022, the Administrator's Housing Task Force, along with Health, Housing and Human Services (H3S) and Transportation and Development (DTD), brought policy questions to the Board regarding shelter options and legislation. In response, the Board directed staff to pursue Project Turnkey 2.0 funding, implement House Bill (HB) 2006 legislation with county-specific process points for shelter siting, and issue a Request for Information (RFI) to solicit proposals for additional safety off the streets programming. The Board has also identified a number of community needs related to the ongoing crisis of unsheltered street homelessness, including neighborhood livability, public safety (and impact on public safety resources), unmet behavioral health needs, and insufficient shelter/transitional housing infrastructure. Staff are seeking the Board's approval of a plan to move forward with identified projects that will grow the county's shelter and housing infrastructure and increase its ability to address unmet community needs related to homelessness.

**PUBLIC/GOVERNMENTAL PARTICIPATION:** On January 25, 2022, and March 2, 2022, the Administrator's Housing Task Force, along with Health, Housing and Human Services (H3S) and Transportation and Development (DTD), brought policy questions to the Board regarding shelter options and legislation. H3S issued an RFI to solicit proposals for additional safety off the streets programming on May 11, 2022, and brief the Board on submitted proposals on September 27, 2022.

The majority of the funding associated with the proposed shelter and housing projects comes to the County through contracts or intergovernmental agreements with partner agencies or other government entities, including Metro and the State of Oregon. The strategy for public participation in shelter and housing development projects, including community engagement, is developed for each individual project.

Re: Shelter and Housing Projects Plan & Board Engagement Strategy

On January 25, 2022, and March 2, 2022, the Administrator's Housing Task Force along with Health, Housing and Human Services (H3S) and Transportation and Development (DTD) brought policy questions to the Board regarding shelter options and legislation. In these three sessions the Board directed staff to:

- 1) Pursue Project Turnkey 2.0 funding;
- 2) Implement HB 2006 legislation with county specific process points for shelter siting; and
- 3) Issue a Request for Information (RFI) to solicit proposals for additional Safety off the Street programming.

#### Current Status on these Board directed initiatives

- **Project Turnkey:** The County is currently in Phase 2 of Project Turnkey. The Board has issued letters of intent on a number of properties and is working towards a purchase and sale agreement and due diligence.
- **HB 2006:** The process is in place to site emergency shelters with Planning and Zoning staff reviewing applications and public noticing.
- Safety off the Streets Request for Information: The RFI proposals, which were presented to the Board on September 27, 2022, demonstrated interest/capacity from the service provider community in further utilization/expansion of transitional villages (similar to Veteran's Village) and facility-based non-congregate shelter, primarily through the use of hotels and/or motels. There was a notable lack of interest/capacity from the provider community for safe rest areas, safe parking sites, and facility-based congregate shelter.
- Veterans Village Adjacent Property: The Board has approved an interim lease for the Veterans Village Adjacent Property and staff are preparing an Urban Renewal District Plan amendment to allow for the permanent purchase/transfer of the Veterans Village to H3S.

#### **Ongoing System Needs/Opportunities**

The Board has identified a number of community needs related to the ongoing crisis of unsheltered street homelessness, including neighborhood livability, public safety (and impact on public safety resources), unmet behavioral health needs, and insufficient shelter/transitional housing infrastructure. In order to effectively meet community needs and offer a range of paths to exiting homelessness, H3S is also exploring opportunities for new or expanded programming in the areas listed below. Program planning in these areas can and should be incorporated into available opportunities to invest in critical safety off the streets infrastructure.

- **23 Hour Stabilization Center & Shelter:** A program being considered in partnership with the Sheriff's Office, this would provide alternative to jail for people in crisis, including, but not limited to, people experiencing homelessness. Programming would include a drop-off day center with behavioral health services, resource navigation, and other service coordination supports, plus a short-term shelter for individuals looking for immediate safety off the streets. The Behavioral Health Division is working to obtain ongoing funding and conversations are happening internally regarding the program model, populations served, and location.
- Behavioral Health Supportive Shelter and Housing: Programming that would include a clinical behavioral health component to address the needs of people experiencing homelessness with highly acute behavioral health issues, including the Aid & Assist population.
- **Recuperative Care Shelter/Transitional Housing:** Programming that would include a clinical physical health component to support people experiencing homelessness with physical health needs requiring on-site medical supports. (This can/should be part of program planning for Project Turnkey site)
- Alternative Shelter: Safety off the streets programming to meet the needs of populations not otherwise served in existing programs, such as emergency housing for youth, safe parking programming for people living in vehicles, and additional transitional village programming.

### **Available Funding**

Critically needed resources, some of which are time-limited, are available for the County to acquire shelter and meet community need related to unsheltered homelessness and livability concerns. Time is of the essence in identifying, selecting, and acquiring suitable sites to maximize the opportunity to further the County's goals. A summary of the resources available now for disbursement is listed below:
