WHAT ACTION ARE YOU REQUESTING FROM THE BOARD?

This is an informational session for Clackamas County Forestry and the Association of O & C Counties to brief the Board on the impacts from the Labor Day 2020 wildfires, and answer any questions the Board may have.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

On September 7, 2020 the Riverside fire started east in the county on US Forest service land and was escalated due to 60 -70 mph east winds. On the same day in Marion County, a wilderness fire escalated due to the same dry and windy conditions the Riverside fire experienced. The southern fire, known as the Beachie fire, moved aggressively towards southern Clackamas County.

The Labor Day 2020 wildfires caused extensive damage to forestlands in Clackamas County.

The Clackamas County Forestry program currently owns and manages 3,200 acres of forestlands. The lands are managed with the goal of having healthy forests that produce timber on a sustainable level, protect natural resources and contribute to jobs in rural communities. The net revenue generated from timber sales supports the County Parks Program operations and also contributes to capital reserves for the repair and replacement of capital assets.

In the September fires, Clackamas County forestlands experienced losses in the Clackamas Quarry, Hoops, Hillockburn, Elwood and Family Camp parcels. All totaled, 473 of Clackamas County's 3,200 acres were burned, resulting in close to \$400,000 in total plantation/timber loss. The cost to reforest is just over \$74,000.

The AOCC presentation will review all four of the major Labor Day fires describing the acreage, volume, and value of the timber that was impacted. This presentation focuses on the O&C Timberlands and the BLM plans for potential salvage, salvage that is precluded by the Resource

Management Plans, and the magnitude of the reforestation challenge. Salvage harvest is time sensitive and will have an impact on the O&C counties given the shared receipts formula for years to come. This is an evolving story which AOCC will track and provide updates on how the BLM responds to these historically large fires.

Clackamas County Forest 2020 Fires Damage Report

May 18, 2021

On September 7, 2020 the Riverside fire started way east in the county on US Forest service land due to an abandoned illegal campfire and extreme dry conditions, and was escalated due to 60 -70mph east winds. On the same day in Marion County a wilderness fire, which was being monitored by the USFS for almost two weeks, escalated due to the same dry and windy conditions the Riverside fire was experienced. The southern fire, known as the Beachie fire, moved aggressively towards southern Clackamas County.

Starting from the north and moving south:

- <u>Clackamas Quarry</u>: this parcel is north of HWY 224 and the Clackamas River's North Fork Reservoir and is east of Estacada. This plantation was a complete loss. With the exception of three acres which still need to be salvaged the rest of the parcel has since been replanted in March.
- <u>Hoops</u>: small parcel isolated a couple miles east and south of Estacada. The fire did a light to moderate under burn killing only the hemlock and a few smaller Douglas-fir trees.
- <u>Hillockburn</u>: this parcel is east of Metzler Park and is nestled up against USFS land. Six years ago, the 36-Pit fire stopped just a quarter mile from this parcel. This property was a mosaic of total burned to under burn and even places where the fire skipped over the trees. Plan to salvage high grade cedar and larger fir and hemlock this summer and fall.
- <u>Elwood</u>: the Elwood parcel is in the community of Colton and the fire raced through it on the third day of the wind/fire storm resulting of a total loss. This has since been replanted in March of this year.
- <u>Family Camp</u>: this parcel is southeast of the City of Molalla. The Beachie fire burned through our Family camp parcel which we had logged 52 acres of this unit earlier in 2020. The fire actually burned up all of the logging slash piles we had planned to burn this fall/winter, and it created plenty of good planting spots which we replanted in March. The fire did jump the road and killed at least 18 acres of merchantable timber with a mix of torching and underburns that will have spotty patches of mortality over the next two to three years. Plans are to salvage in the fall/winter of 2021.










Post Fire Volume – O&C Timber Lands

By Sustained Yield Unit – Million Board Feet




Post Fire Volume and ASQ – Harvest Land Base

By Sustained Yield Unit – Million Board Feet




2021 HLB Salvage - With Total HLB Salvage Potential


