2018 REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION PLAN UPDATE Finalizing Our Shared Plan for the Region

Regional Leadership Forum 4 summary

The region is looking ahead to how our transportation system will accommodate future growth and change – and what investments we should make over the next 25 years to build a safe, reliable, healthy and affordable transportation system with travel options.

On March 2, 2018, the Metro Council hosted Regional Leadership Forum 4, at the Oregon Convention Center. More than 100 city, county, and regional policymakers and business and community leaders from across the greater Portland area joined in bringing the perspectives of their constituents and communities to the conversation.

These leaders offered their views on:

- **priorities to address** in the next 10 years and beyond
- opportunities for aligning investments with priorities as draft project lists are refined by jurisdictions
- building a shared path forward.

What did leaders say?

Let's be bold.

Economic prosperity should not be at the expense of underserved communities.

We need to build public trust and be accountable.

It's time to pivot from information to action and leadership.

Report on community priorities

Several community leaders reported on priorities that emerged from the January 19 Community Leaders' Forum and other community transportation conversations.

Priorities include:

- Lead with equity.
- Address housing and transportation affordability and displacement in an integrated manner.
- Prioritize safety, biking, walking, and transit projects in historically marginalized communities, with a focus on people of color and households of modest means.

Overview

As the region continues discussing the potential 2018 Regional Housing Bond, Clackamas County wants to ensure there is a united voice amongst its communities, stakeholders, and jurisdictions to ensure a successful bond effort adequately serves the various needs of Clackamas County communities within Metro's urban growth boundary. Affordable housing is an essential need throughout our cities and urban unincorporated areas, impacting impoverished peoples facing barriers such as racial disparity, disabilities, gentrification and historically low available housing. By establishing a united voice now, Clackamas County and its jurisdictions will be poised to ensure that any funds raised in a successful bonding effort can strategically address the diverse needs of Clackamas County.

- What values/priorities should Clackamas communities prioritize to best serve its residents if a housing bond passes?
- What is the preferred approach for identifying how bonded funds are used wisely to address agreed upon values/priorities without restricting use of funds to meet a wide range of need?

- What is the preferred approach for making these decisions known to the public, to Metro, and others interested in the efforts of Clackamas County?

Background on Clackamas County's Housing Initiatives

- Joint city-county effort for a county-wide Housing Needs Analysis to understand housing gaps
- 545 units of Public Housing , with a goal to add 1000 units by 2027
- 1,531 families in Clackamas County receiving voucher program assistance
- 212 new units coming at Rosewood Terrace (near Town Center)
- 24 new units coming to the Vets Village
- 30 new units coming to the veteran's homeless shelters
- 7,500 Clackamas County households at or below 80% area median income paying more than 30% on housing, with an additional 9,000 households are paying more than 50% of income on housing.
- The majority of residents served by the Housing Authority of Clackamas County, (HACC) are extremely low income households earning 30% or less of area median income. The HACC is currently serving a more diverse population (based upon race and ethnicity) than the makeup of County residents. HACC is committed to providing equitable service to all and engages in targeted outreach to ensure all residents have access to housing resources.



Homes for greater Portland

Regional housing measure: Where we stand, where we could go

WHAT WE KNOW

- Housing affordability is a top-tier concern for residents throughout the region – across city and county lines and demographic groups.
- 75 people move to the greater Portland region every day, straining our supply of affordable homes.
- Only 1 in 3 low-income families in the region can find an affordable rental home. Middle-income families struggle too.
- Regional voters believe this is a crisis that can be solved and they want to be a part of the solution.

GOALS

- Create more permanently affordable homes throughout the region through new construction and acquisition
- Increase housing stability and opportunity for working families, seniors, communities of color, veterans and people experiencing homelessness
- Collaborate with community stakeholders and local government partners to structure programs based in best practices, innovation and equitable outcomes

POSSIBLE FRAMEWORK

- Land for homes: Acquiring land for building affordable homes with good access to transit and amenities
- Affordable homes: Funding for local governments, housing authorities and private/non-profit builders*:
 - Fill financing gaps and build new affordable homes
 - Acquisition and rehabilitation of at-risk affordable homes

*A potential amendment to the Oregon Constitution would allow bond funds to be granted to private and non-profit entities and leverage other funding sources, such as low-income housing tax credits.



NEXT STEPS

- Convene stakeholder and technical advisory committees to assist with measure development and make a recommendation to Metro COO
- Engage with partners to maximize equitable outcomes in the measure
- Collaborate with partners exploring an Oregon constitutional amendment to help funding create more homes*
- Continue research, engagement and analysis to shape measure
- Metro Council consideration of referral in late spring for the November ballot
