WHAT ACTION ARE YOU REQUESTING FROM THE BOARD?

Staff requests approval of the 2022 Small Grants recommendation.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

The Clackamas County Board of Commissioners approved \$250,000 in the 2022/23 FY budget to fund the 2022 Small Grants Program. This is the 14th year of the program. The goal is to support agencies that are making an effort to develop and implement innovative projects that would help the County's most vulnerable families, seniors, and others meet their basic needs such as food assistance and abuse prevention.

We continue to make efforts to improve the program. For the 2022 cycle, we switched from an online application, to a fillable PDF to increase accessibility for the applicants. Additionally, we worked to increase awareness of the program to attract new applicants and offered an application workshop that was very well attended (56 viewers). Public and Government Affairs (PGA) assisted us in creating videos starring a couple of Commissioners to invite organizations to apply, and to remind them that the deadline was approaching. Lastly, PGA worked hard to increase our social media push.

We received 64 applications for a total request of \$831,233.72. Of the 64 applications, 21 were new applicants. Over the 13 years of the Small Grants program, the BCC has awarded 446 grants for a total of \$3,000,000. If the BCC approves our recommendation this year, the totals will become 472 grants for a total of \$3,250,000.
