Your voted ballot must be received in the Elections Office, 825 Portland Avenue, Gladstone, OR, by 8:00 PM on election night to be counted. **Postmark does not count!** If you prefer, instead of mailing your ballot, you may take it to the Elections Office or to one of the Drop Site Locations listed on page 59 of this pamphlet. Drop boxes will be available at these locations from May 3 through 8:00 PM on May 20, 2003.

If a ballot was delivered to your residence for someone who should no longer be receiving ballots at your address, please write "RETURN" on the envelope and place it back in your mailbox. If a ballot was sent to someone who is deceased, please write "DECEASED" on the envelope and place it back in your mailbox.

The address for Internet access for election results is on page 20. Results will be posted on the Internet beginning shortly after 8:00 PM on election night.

VOTING-BY-MAIL IS AS EASY AS 1-2-3!

Using the Official Ballot Guide, note the number to the right of the candidate or measure response (Yes or No) of your choice. Locate the same number on the Punch Card Ballot.

Example:

1 Looking at the sample Official Ballot Guide (figure 1) you decide to vote for George Washington for President of the United States and YES on the annexation measure. The number of these choices is 60 and 81.

2 You place the Punch Card Ballot (figure 2) on a hard, flat surface and locate the same numbers (60 and 81). Using a pen, pencil or any item with a pointed tip, you press straight down on the small black dot above the numbers of your choice.

3 While pressing down, slowly lift the top of the Punch Card Ballot with your other hand until the rectangles containing the black dots are completely detached (figure 3).

Remember: To make sure you have voted correctly, check to see that the numbers of the selections of your choice match on both the Punch Card Ballot and the Official Ballot Guide.

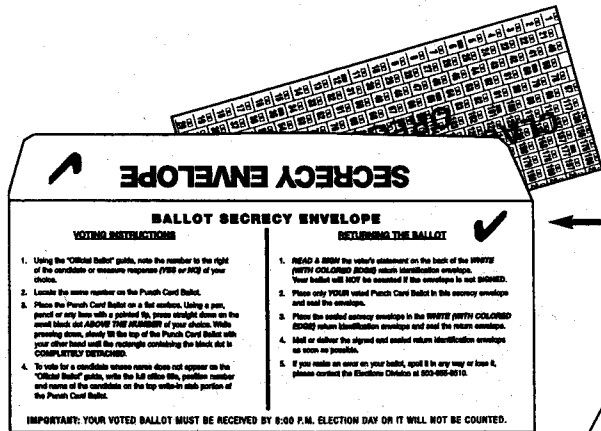

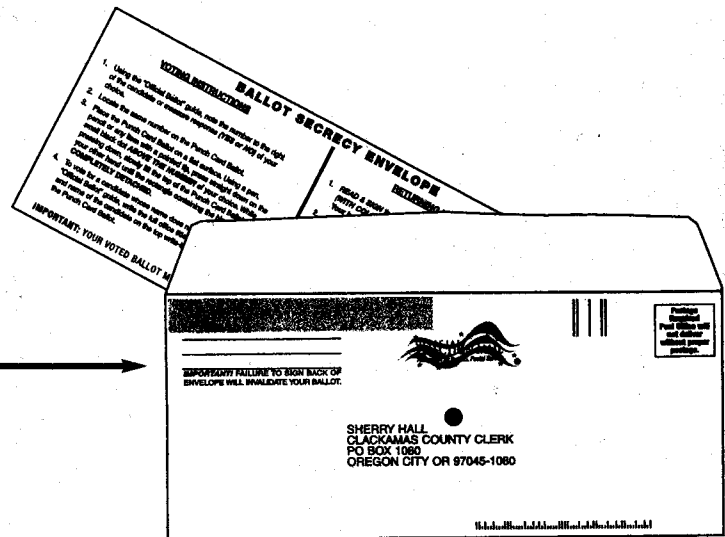

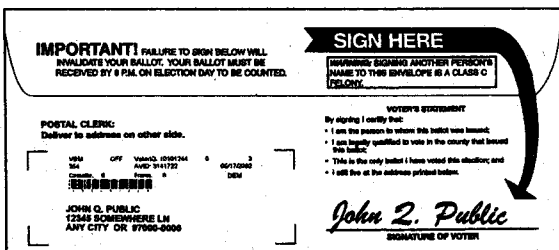

MEASURE APPROVING ANNEXATION OF 4 ACRES INTO CITY OF CANBY

QUESTION: Shall 4 acres located on NE Territorial, West of N Juniper be annexed into Canby?

SUMMARY: Annexation is the legal process to bring property inside the City limits. Michael S. Smith of SR Management, on behalf of property owner Jim Thielen, has filed an application asking the City to bring 4 acres of property into the City limits. The legal description of the property is Tax Lot 1400 of Tax Map 3-1E-28CD, located on the south side of NE Territorial Road and west side of N. Juniper Street. Properties surrounding this tax lot on the west, south and east are all within the City limits. Properties to the north are outside the City's Urban Growth Boundary. This application has previously been approved by the Planning Commission and City Council. The property currently contains one single family residence. The City's Zoning Map calls for low density residential for the property upon annexation. Although no development is proposed at this time, future development would allow up to 19 new single family lots. Any further development requires City review and must comply with land use laws.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This measure would approve the annexation of 4 acres into the city limits of the City of Canby. The property which would be included within the City boundaries is known as Tax Lot 1400 of Tax Map 3-1E-28CD and is located generally in the northeast part of the City. Tax Lot 1400 is located at 185 NE Territorial Road, near the corner of Territorial Road and N. Juniper Street. Tax Lot 1400 is currently zoned RRRF-5 (Rural Residential, Farm and Forest). If annexation into the City is approved by the voters, the property would be rezoned Low Density Residential as required under the City's Comprehensive Land Use Plan (Comp Plan).

Tax Lot 1400 is owned by Jim Thielen. Michael S. Smith of SR Management has filed the application for annexation on behalf of the owner as allowed by Oregon law. The City, following its Charter, has put this matter before the voters for approval.

The 4 acre parcel is surrounded on the west, south and east by residential properties within the City limits. Properties to the north are outside the City's Urban Growth Boundary. The lot presently contains one single family residence. Under the current zoning regulations, future development would allow up to nineteen lots to be developed. However, annexation alone does not set the future uses to be built on the property. Any further development would have to comply with state and local land use laws and would be subject to public review.

The Canby Comp Plan also designates properties for annexation as Priority "A", "B" or "C". Priority "A" properties shall generally be annexed prior to those areas shown as Priority "B" which, in turn, shall generally be annexed prior to those areas shown as Priority "C". This lot is designated Priority "A" property. Both the Canby Planning Commission and the Canby City Council unanimously approved this annexation application.

MEASURE APPROVING ANNEXATION OF 19.91 ACRES INTO CITY OF CANBY

QUESTION: Shall 19.91 acres located north of NE Territorial, near N Holly be annexed into Canby?

SUMMARY: Annexation is the legal process to bring property inside the City limits. G. Cam Ltd, on behalf of owners Martha and Thomas Dodds, has filed an application asking the City to bring 19.91 acres of property into the City limits. The legal description of the property is Tax Lots 400 and 500 of Tax Map 3-1E-28C. The two lots are adjoining and are located on the north side of NE Territorial Road between N Locust and N Holly Streets, south of NE 22nd Avenue. This application has previously been approved by the Planning Commission and City Council. The property currently contains several single family residences and outbuildings, but is mainly vacant farmland. The City's Zoning Map calls for low density residential for the property upon annexation. Although no development application is pending at this time, future development would allow approximately eighty-six (86) new single family lots. Any further development requires City review and must comply with land use laws.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This measure would approve the annexation of 19.91 acres into the city limits of the City of Canby. The property which would be included within the City boundaries is known as Tax Lots 400 and 500 of Tax Map 3-1E-28C and is located generally in the north central part of the City. Tax Lots 400 and 500 are currently zoned RRRF-5 (Rural Residential, Farm and Forest). If annexation into the City is approved by the voters, the property would be rezoned Low Density Residential as required under the City's Comprehensive Land Use Plan (Comp Plan).

Tax Lots 400 and 500 are owned by Martha and Thomas Dodds. G. Cam Ltd has filed the application for annexation on behalf of the owner as allowed by Oregon law. The City, following its Charter, has put this matter before the voters for approval.

The two lots are adjoining and are located on the north side of NE Territorial Road between N Locust and N Holly Streets, south of NE 22nd Avenue. The lots presently contain several single family residences, as well as outbuildings. The majority of the property is vacant farmland. Under the current zoning regulations, future development would allow approximately eighty-six (86) lots to be developed. However, annexation alone does not set the future uses to be built on the property. Any further development would have to comply with state and local land use laws and would be subject to public review.

The Canby Comp Plan also designates properties for annexation as Priority "A", "B" or "C". Priority "A" properties shall generally be annexed prior to those areas shown as Priority "B" which, in turn, shall generally be annexed prior to those areas shown as Priority "C". This lot is designated Priority "A" property. The Canby Planning Commission approved the application by a 4-2 vote and the Canby City Council unanimously approved this annexation application.

My family has been active residents of the Canby community for over four decades. We have seen this community mature and prosper, and the time has come for Canby to take another step into its future. Twenty acres of my family's land has been placed on the ballot for annexation into Canby. This annexation will help Canby accomplish its goal of providing buildable land within city limits, and has our family's full support.

The City of Canby has a goal of possessing enough available land for three-years of residential building. Currently, only one year and two months of land is available, and the addition of our property will extend that inventory to one year and eight months; still well below Canby's policy of three years. It is a responsible step to ensure that Canby has the necessary room to grow without overwhelming our community. As a city develops, it needs to mature responsibly to remain healthy and vital, and this annexation will help Canby do just that.

This annexation is a reasonable and responsible step for a number of reasons:

- The Canby School District has stated that the elementary school with jurisdiction over this annexation has space available for additional students.
- A traffic study has concluded that this annexation will not place undue stress on Canby's transportation system.
- Part of the annexed land will be used for a public park to further a strong sense of community.
- This annexation represents responsible building. It will include two phases over four years, and will not be completed until 2007.
- Properties will be developed by a responsible builder, who has worked in Canby and understands the quality of life we value and work to preserve.
- This annexation will bring new jobs and business spending to Canby.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR

Canby is a great community and a wonderful place to raise a family. Canby's small-town feel is something that all residents cherish. Even though we all want to protect our quality of life, some citizens go too far. Some residents believe Canby should never experience any growth and no one else should be allowed to move into Canby, starting the day they moved in.

That is not to say that we should allow uncontrolled expansion in Canby. It does not overstress roads or overload schools. The annexation will also help fulfill Canby's target of having three-years worth of buildable land within the city. QUESTION: Shall 2.98 acres located south of NE Territorial, east of N Vine Street be annexed into Canby?

SUMMARY: Annexation is the legal process to bring property inside the City limits. Nick and Jamie Netter have filed an application asking the City to bring 2.98 acres of property into the City limits. The legal description of the property is Tax Lots 602 and 700 of Tax Map 3-1E-27DB. The two lots are adjoining and are located on the south side of NE Territorial Road, just east of N Vine Street near the Vine Meadows Subdivision. This application has previously been approved by the Planning Commission and City Council. The property currently contains one single family residence and outbuildings. The lots are flat and not being used for farming. The City's Zoning Map calls for low density residential for the property upon annexation. Although no development application is pending at this time, future development would allow approximately twelve (12) single family lots. Any further development requires City review and must comply with land use laws.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This measure would approve the annexation of 2.98 acres into the city limits of the City of Canby. The property which would be included within the City boundaries is known as Tax Lots 602 and 700 of Tax Map 3-1E-27DB and is located generally in the northeast quadrant of the City. Tax Lots 602 and 700 are currently zoned RRF-5 (Rural, Residential, Farm and Forest). If annexation into the City is approved by the voters, the property would be rezoned Low Density Residential as required under the City's Comprehensive Land Use Plan (Comp Plan).

Tax Lots 602 and 700 are owned by Nick and Jamie Netter. They have filed the application for annexation as allowed by Oregon law. The City, following its Charter, has put this matter before the voters for approval.

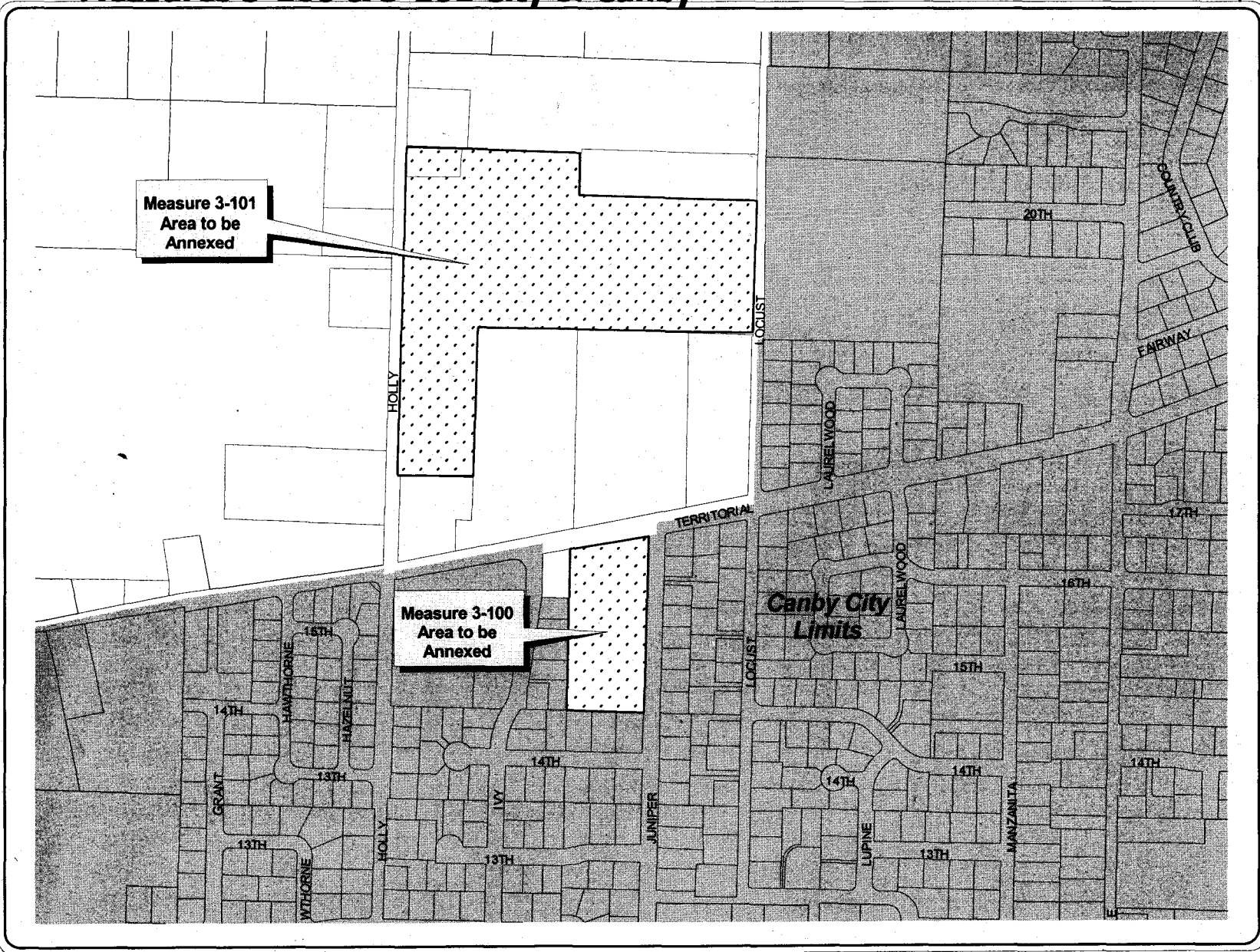
Properties to west of the subject parcel are located within the City and are zoned single family residential. Properties to north, east and south are outside the City, but within the Urban Growth Boundary and are being used for rural residential use. The lots are flat and are not being used for farming. There is presently located one single family residence, as well as outbuildings on the property. Under the current zoning regulations, future development would allow approximately twelve (12) lots to be developed. However, annexation alone does not set the future uses to be built on the property. Any further development would have to comply with state and local land use laws and would be subject to public review.

The Canby Comp Plan also designates properties for annexation as Priority "A", "B" or "C". Priority "A" properties shall generally be annexed prior to those areas shown as Priority "B" which, in turn, shall generally be annexed prior to those areas shown as Priority "C". This lot is designated Priority "B" property. The Canby Planning Commission approved the application by a 2-1 vote and the Canby City Council unanimously approved this annexation application.

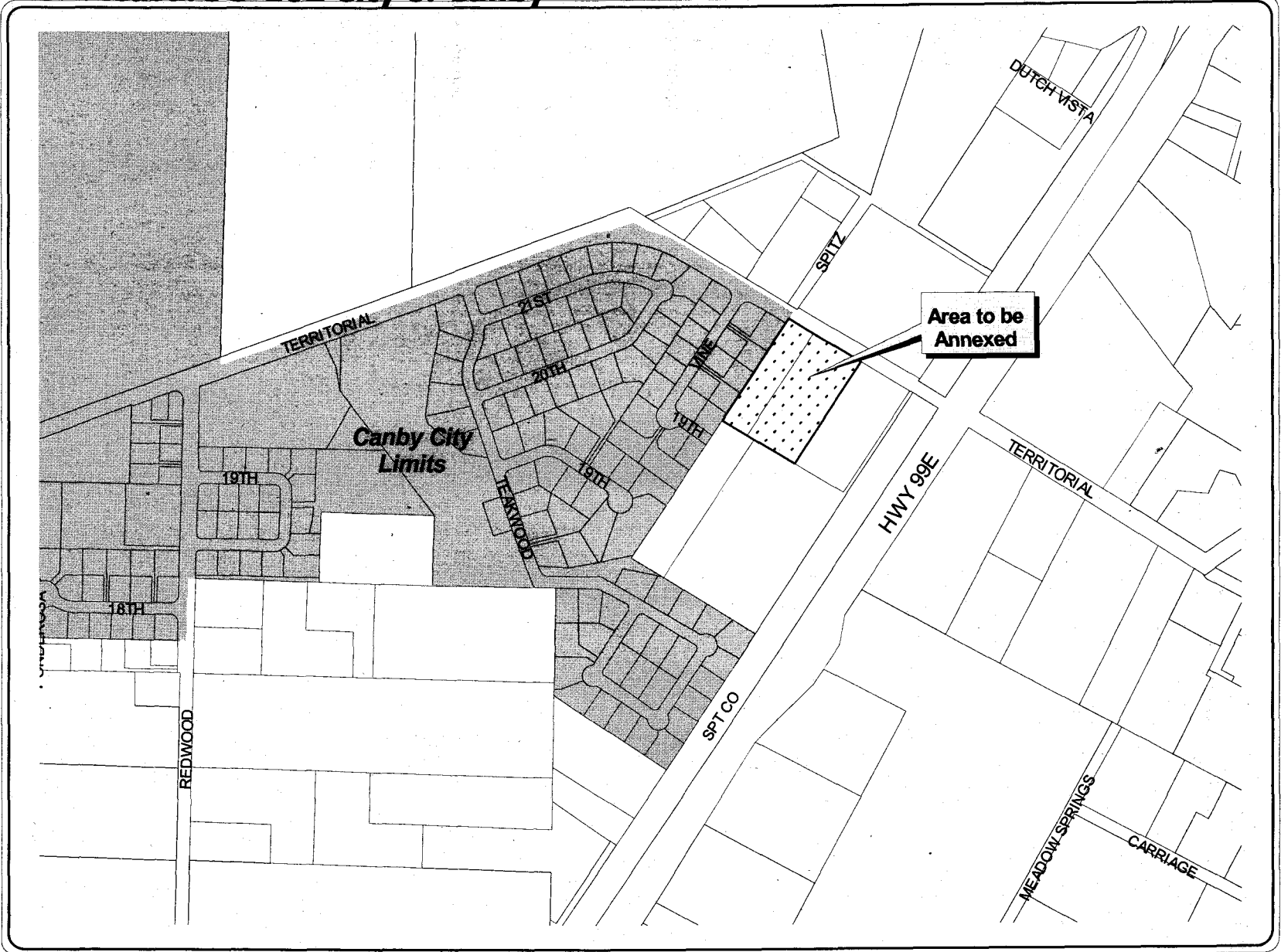

BALLOT TITLE

EXPANDS OREGON CITY BOUNDARIES TO INCLUDE ADDITIONAL LAND

QUESTION: Shall the City's boundaries include 18.6 acres of additional land on the southeast edge of the City?

SUMMARY: This measure would expand the City's boundaries by approximately 18.6 acres by including within the City, property described as follows:

An 18.6-acre tract comprised of four tax lots located on the southeast edge of the City, east of Beaver Creek Road, north of Thayer Road and east of Maplelane Road; more particularly described as Tax Lot 2100 SW 1/4 of Section 4, Tax Lots 100 and 201 SW 1/4 of SE 1/4 of Section 4, and Tax Lot 400 NW 1/4 of SE 1/4 of Section 4, T3S R2E, W.M., Clackamas County, Oregon.

The proposal was submitted to allow future rezoning and eventual redevelopment of the property. The property contains three single-family dwellings and a population of 4. It is currently zoned FU-10 "Future Urbanizable" and is located within the City's UGB. The County's "Oregon City Area Land Use Plan" designates the property Low Density Manufactured Housing. The City Commission has concluded that it meets all state, regional and City requirements for annexation into the City and services can be adequately provided to the property.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

The territory to be annexed is located generally on the southeast side of the City on the east side of Beaver Creek Rd., north of Thayer Rd. and east of Maplelane Rd. The territory is Proposal No. AN02-01 and it contains 4 tax lots totaling 18.62 acres, with three single-family residences with a population of 4, and is valued at \$488,600.

The property owners initiated this proposal, as they desire city services to facilitate development. They do not propose to develop the site now but anticipate single-family dwellings under authorized zoning.

Based on the study and the Proposed Findings and Reasons for Decision, the City Commission adopted Resolution No. 03-01 setting forth this proposal to the voters of Oregon City for an election on May 20, 2003.

Once approved, City Staff recommends that the territory be withdrawn from Clackamas County R.F.P.D. #1 and the County Service District for Enhanced Law Enforcement as allowed by statute.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR

Proposed Annexation to Oregon City

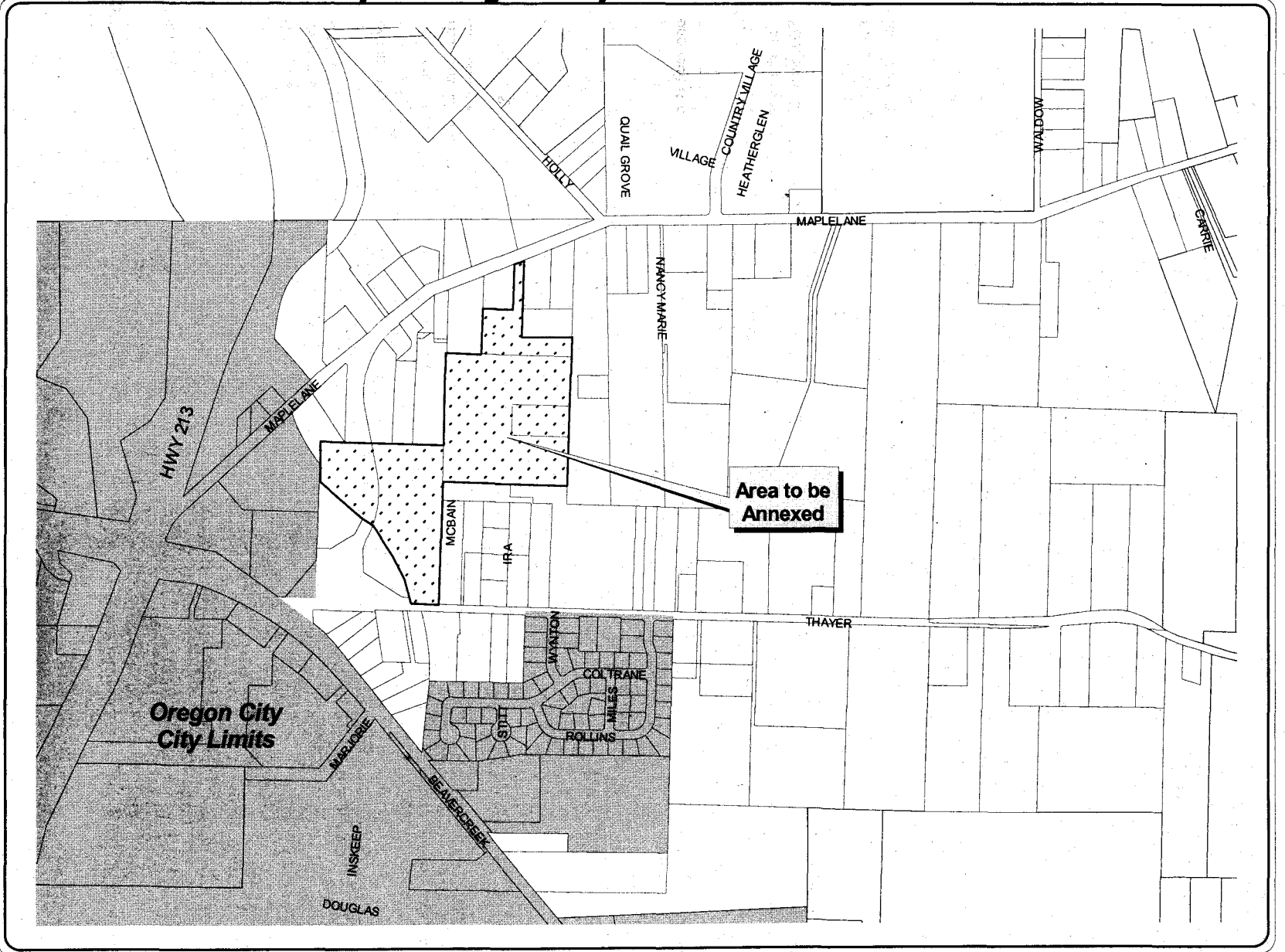
This property should be annexed to the City and added to the City's property tax role. Properties that are inside the Oregon City Urban Growth Boundary but just outside the City limits already fully use all City services and public facilities - like streets, fire and police, library, parks and the like - but they don't pay for them like City residents do. Properties that use City services and public facilities should annex to the City when requested and should pay their fair share of property taxes and City assessment to support City services and facilities. Currently, this 18.6-acre parcel is adjacent to, but outside, the City limits. It does not pay City property taxes or other assessments, and it is not subject to any City regulation. The owner has asked that it be annexed so that it will be subject to City regulation. EXPANDS OREGON CITY BOUNDARIES TO INCLUDE ADDITIONAL LAND

QUESTION: Shall the City's boundaries include 1.1 acres of additional land that are completely surrounded by the City limits?

SUMMARY: This measure would expand the City's boundaries by approximately 1.1 acres by including within the City property described as follows: A 1.1 acre-tract comprised of three tax lots located in the southwest part of the City, west of Meyers Road and south of Leland Road; more particularly: Tax Lots 09300, 09400, and 09500 in the NE¼ of NE¼ of Section 7, T3S R2E, W.M., Clackamas County, Oregon and which is completely surrounded by the City (island).

This measure would expand the City's boundaries to include three parcels of land that are completely surrounded by the City limits, yet are in unincorporated Clackamas County. The property contains three single-family dwellings and a population of 6. It is currently zoned FU-10 "Future Urbanizable" and is located within the City's UGB. The County's "Oregon City Area Land Use Plan" designates the property Low Density Residential. The City Commission has concluded that it meets all state, regional and City requirements for annexation into the City and services can be adequately provided to the property.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This measure would approve expansion of the City limits of the City of Oregon City to include three parcels that are currently an "island", i.e., lands within the City's urban growth boundary and surrounded by the City, but not yet within the City limits. The Oregon City Commission initiated this annexation. The annexation is consistent with the City's Comprehensive Plan. The annexation would allow City services to be supplied to this "islanded" urban land.

The three properties are currently within the Clackamas County Rural Fire Protection District No. 1 and the Clackamas County Service District for Enhanced Law Enforcement. If this annexation is approved, these properties will be withdrawn from those districts and Oregon City will be responsible for provision of fire and police services.

Chapter I, section 3 of the Oregon City Charter of 1982, as amended requires voter approval of all annexations, including this one. A map showing three parcels accompanies this explanatory statement.

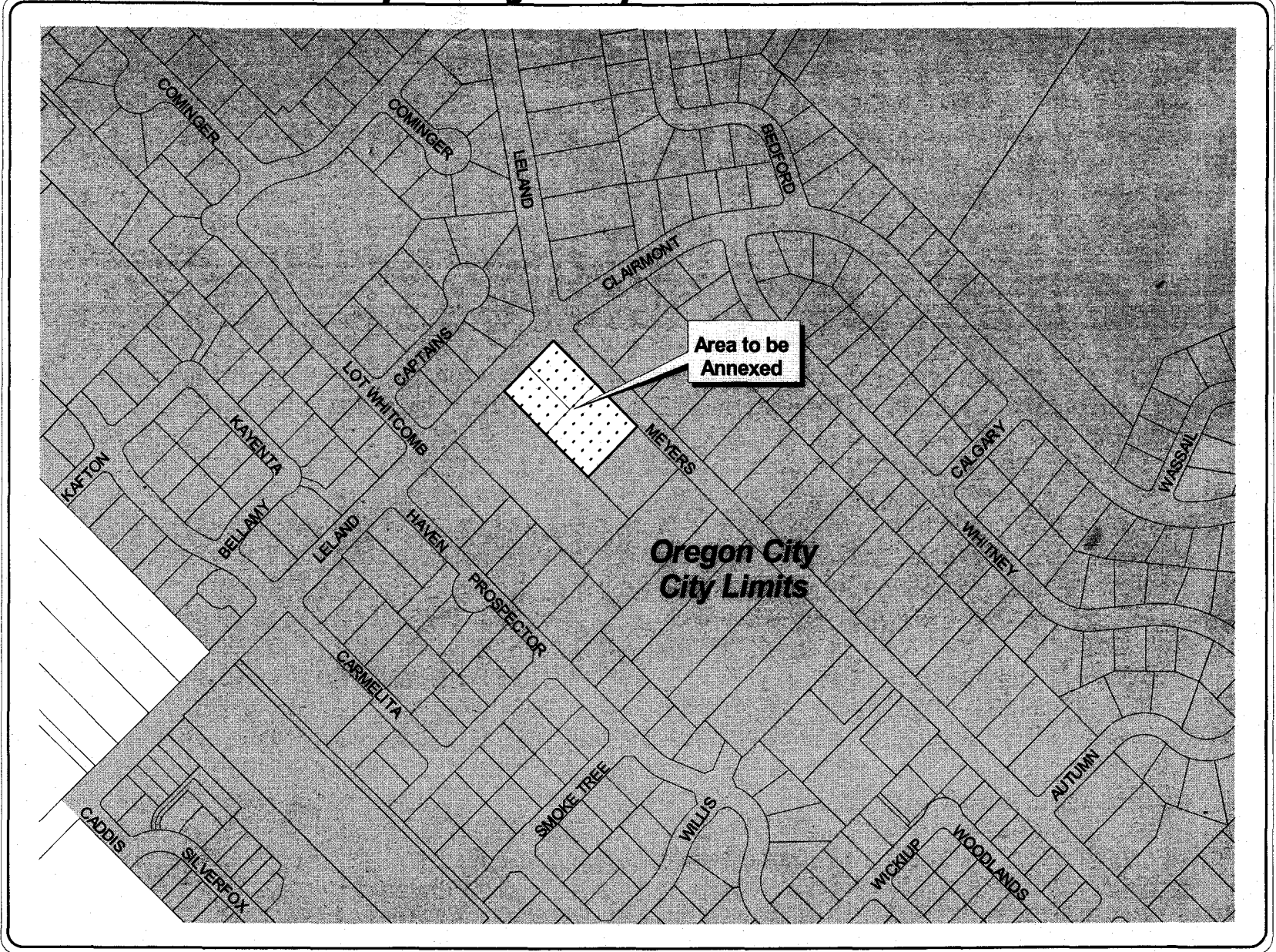

QUESTION: Shall 4.83 acres west of Bornstedt Road, south of Cascadia Village Drive be annexed into the Sandy city limits?

SUMMARY: Annexation is the legal process to bring property into the city limits. Bill and Sherre Purdy, as property owners, have asked the city to bring one parcel of land west of Bornstedt Road into the city limits. The legal description of the property is: T2S R4E Section 24B Tax Lot 1900.

The parcel is located on the west side of Bornstedt Road south of Hwy. 211 and Cascadia Village Drive. Properties to the north and east of this parcel are in the city limits, although the immediately adjacent properties to the south and west are not within the city limits but are within Sandy's Urban Growth Boundary. Future development requires City review and must comply with land use laws.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This measure would approve annexation of 4.83 acres into the city limits of the City of Sandy. The property is known as Tax Lot 1900 of Map R24E Section 24B located on the west side of Bornstedt Road south of Hwy. 211 and Cascadia Village Drive. The property is contiguous to the city limits on its northern and eastern boundaries. The parcel is currently zoned by Clackamas County as RRRF-5. If annexation is approved by the voters, the property would be zoned R-1, Low Density Residential, as required under the City's Comprehensive Land Use Plan. Currently, the property contains a single-family residence.

Bill and Sherre Purdy, as owners and applicants, have applied to the City of Sandy for approval of their annexation request as allowed by Oregon law. The city, following its Charter, has put this matter before the voters for approval.

Under the City of Sandy's Comprehensive Plan, the zoning for this property, when annexed, is R-1, Low Density Residential. This allows a range of between five and ten units per gross buildable acre. The property contains a small wetland area on the eastern portion of the site and may contain constrained slopes. Specific site features shall be identified and taken into consideration during any future development process. Allowed housing types include single-family dwellings, duplexes, row houses, and manufactured home parks. Annexation alone does not set the future uses to be built on the property. Any development would have to comply with state and local land use laws and would be subject to public review.

Public water and sanitary sewer lines can be extended to serve the site. Public utilities, installed in the Cascadia Village subdivision can be extended to serve the site. Extension of sanitary sewer may be accomplished through several means, including but not limited to, easements, local improvement districts, and agreements between property owners, grants or city projects. Other properties within the "Bornstedt Village" would benefit from extension of public sanitary sewer lines. All future development on these sites will also be required to conform to applicable stormwater management policies and regulations.

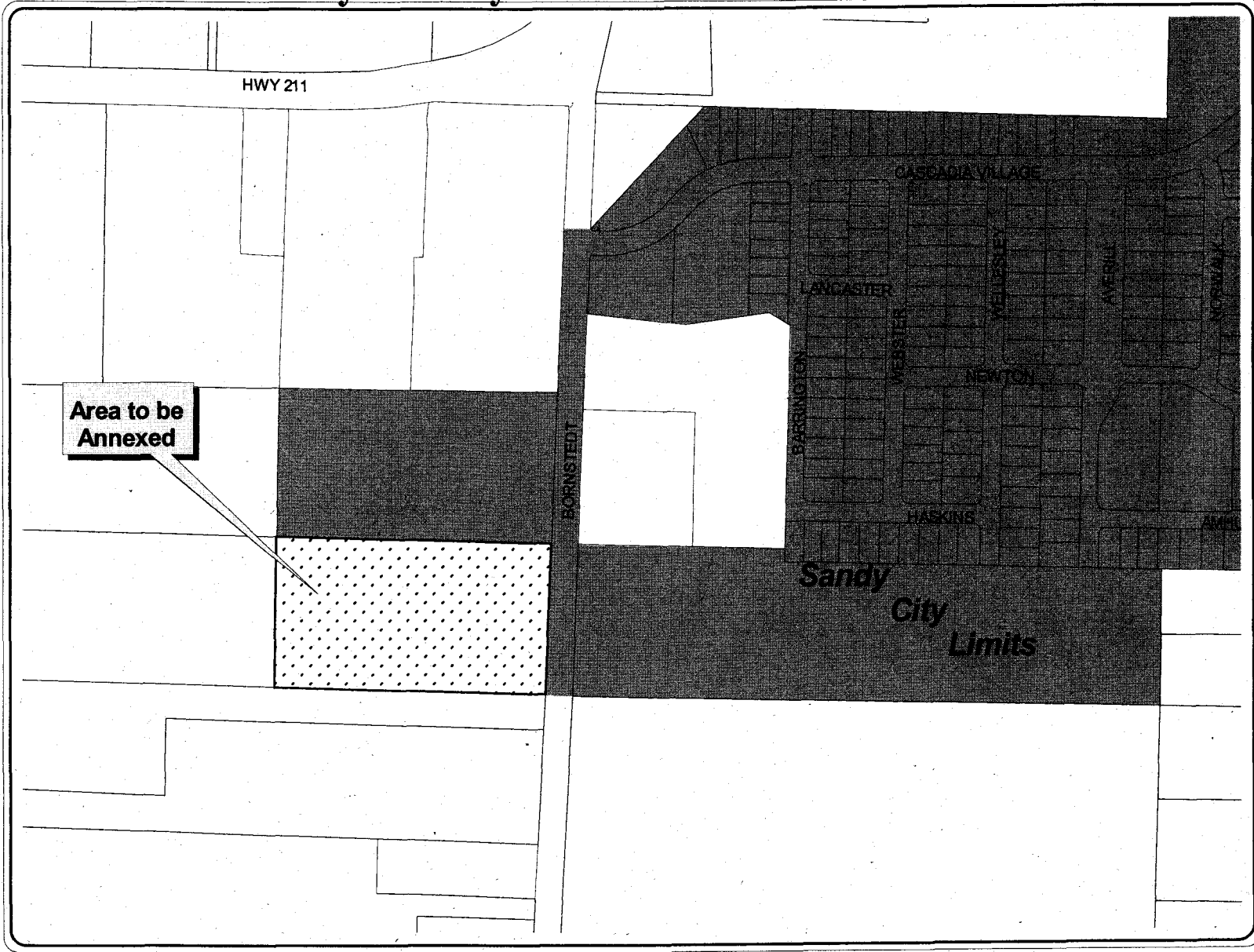

These now vacant lands will eventually add hundreds of new homes, and thousands of new residents to our city. 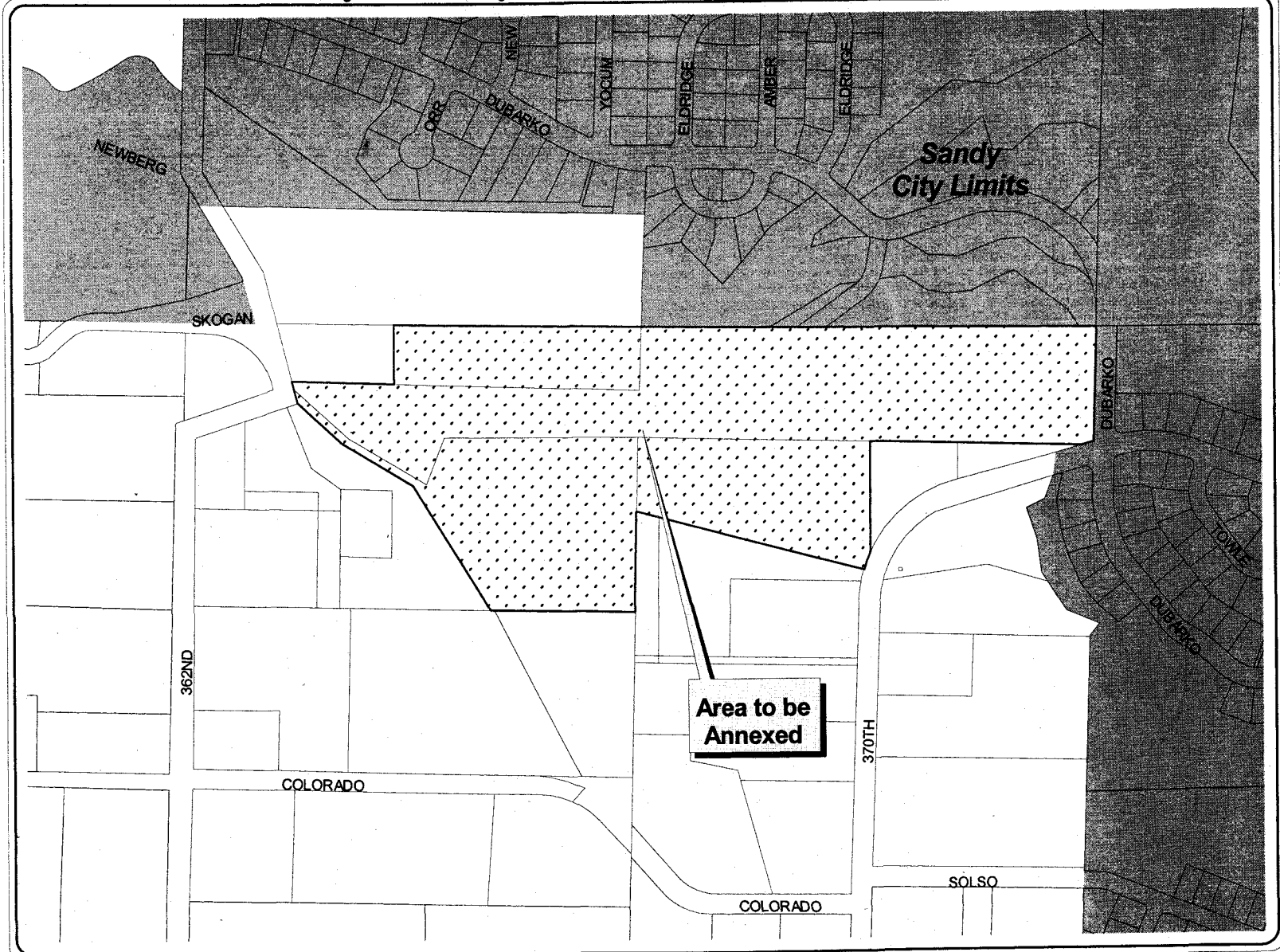

CANBY SCHOOL DISTRICT LOCAL OPTION LEVY TO SUPPORT CLASSROOM INSTRUCTION

QUESTION: Shall the District impose \$.90 per \$1,000 assessed value to support classroom instruction beginning 2003-2004 for two years? This measure may cause property taxes to increase more than three percent.

SUMMARY: This measure may be passed only at an election with at least a 50 percent voter turnout. The District has already reduced \$3 million in school programs and staff over the past three years and now faces an additional \$2.7 million dollars in reductions for 2003-2005. This levy will generate approximately \$1 million in both fiscal years to partially offset planned reductions to:

- Classroom teachers K-12,
- Music and physical education specialists,
- Athletics and activities in grades 6-12,
- Instructional assistant support in the classroom and library, and
- Math/science textbooks district wide.

A rate of \$.90 per \$1,000 of assessed value is estimated to raise \$1 million in 2003-04 and \$1 million in 2004-05. The estimated tax cost for this measure is based on information available from the County Assessor at the time of the estimate.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

The Canby School District has made significant progress over the past several years in attaining high performance standards for all of its 5,200 students. In our recent Oregon Report Card, for example, Canby schools were highly rated for continued achievement gains in all academic areas. In addition, we have long enjoyed community support for many of the programs we have traditionally offered students at elementary, middle and high school. The District has already reduced approximately \$3 million in programs and services over the past three years and now faces in a best-case scenario an additional \$2.7 million in reductions for 2003-2005. Student enrollment continues to increase as do the state and federal requirements for public schools. This levy will generate approximately \$1 million in both fiscal years of the biennium to partially offset planned reductions to:

• Classroom teachers K-12,

The District has protected the classroom during prior budget reductions by reducing/eliminating other programs and services. As a result, our student/teacher ratio is the same as it was in 1999-2000, much better than many other school districts. We cannot, however, maintain current class sizes during the upcoming school year due to the size of the budget shortfall. Levy dollars will be used to retain some classroom teachers that would otherwise be laid off.

• Music and physical education specialists

These programs, which have benefited our students for many years, will be reduced to a minimal level. Levy dollars will be used to maintain music and physical education instruction at all schools.

• Athletic and activities 6-12

Co-curricular activities support students' academic, social and emotional development. Levy dollars will partially reinstate programs planned for elimination at the middle and high school.

• Instructional assistants in the classroom and library

Librarians at each school were eliminated as part of the budget reductions made in 2000-2001. We now have only one librarian for the entire district. Levy dollars will allow the District to staff each school library with an assistant to help students access library materials and services. Levy dollars will also provide assistants to the classroom to help teachers meet student needs in math and reading.

• Math/science materials district wide

The \$2.7 million in reductions for the 2003-04 fiscal year include the elimination of all monies to purchase textbooks. The levy will provide \$50,000 to purchase math and science materials to support student learning.

A rate of \$.90 per \$1,000 of assessed value is estimated to raise \$1 million in 2003-04 and \$1 million in 2004-05. The estimated tax cost for this measure is based on information available from the County Assessor at the time of the estimate.

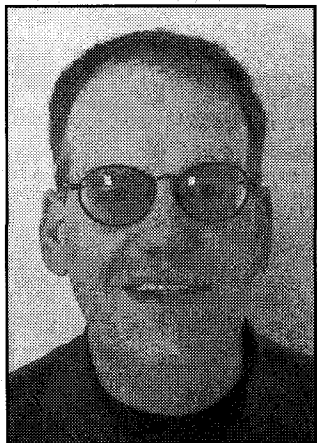

Indeed, my first hint of trouble in the Canby schools came when my child brought home a spelling test with half the incorrect answers not marked wrong, and the teacher informed me that too much red on papers could interfere with self-esteem.

Slowly but surely, political correctness has infested the schools, with Christmas carols banned, assemblies turned into Leftist indoctrination sessions, and self-esteem substituted for achievement. Foolish educational fads, like "problem solving" and "critical thinking" have begun to replace solid basic skills in reading, writing, and arithmetic. Enormous sums are wasted on heavy textbooks where every page is in color, and riddled with distractions.

The State takeover of school funding has turned local school boards into little more than caretakers for an absentee landlord. Nearly every step toward greater centralization has been a step backwards, as education professionals imposed programs like bilingual education with "sheltered" classes that responsible parents have rejected across the country. There is even credible statistical evidence to suggest that the State is dumbing down standardized tests to create the illusion of progress.

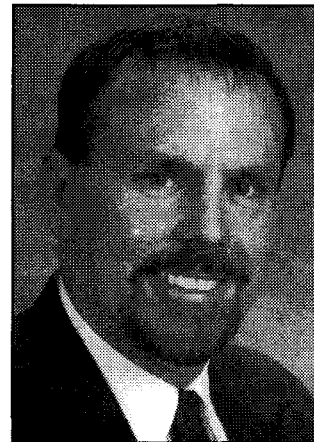

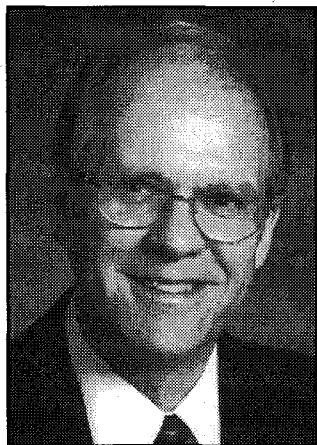

I was also disappointed to learn that the best solutions the current school board and administration could come up with to deal with reduced funding were to reduce the teaching time for students and to propose a property tax increase.

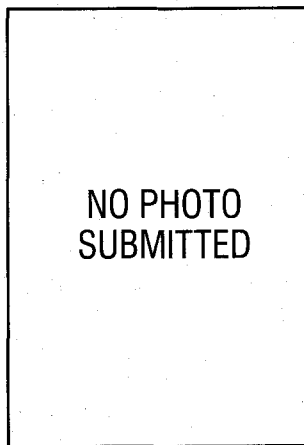
