This Voters' Pamphlet contains information designed to assist you in voting: candidates' statements, ballot titles, explanatory statements and arguments pertaining to local measures that appear on the May 21, 2013 Special District Election ballot in Clackamas County. Please remember, in order to vote on a certain measure, or vote for a candidate of a Special District, you must be an active registered voter of the jurisdiction or district placing the measure or candidate on the ballot.

You will not vote on everything that appears in this pamphlet, only those candidate races and measures that appear on the Official Ballot in your Vote-By-Mail packet.

Your voted ballot must be received at an official ballot drop site or at the Elections Office, 1710 Red Soils Ct., Ste. 100, in Oregon City by 8:00 p.m. on election night in order to be tallied. Remember, the postmark on a mailed ballot does NOT count.

Official ballot drop sites are listed on Page 98 of this pamphlet. Indoor drop boxes will be available during regular business hours (and outdoor drop boxes are available 24 hours a day) beginning Friday, May 3 until 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday, May 21, 2013.

Ballots will be delivered to households between Friday, May 3 and Tuesday, May 7. Don't hesitate to contact us if you have not received a ballot by May 8.

If a ballot was delivered to your residence for someone who should no longer be receiving ballots at your address, please write "RETURN" on the envelope and place it back in your mailbox. If a ballot was sent to someone who has passed away, please write "DECEASED" on the envelope and place it back in your mailbox.

Voting is as Easy as 1-2-3

Vote your Official Ballot

Locate the candidate or measure response (YES or NO) of your choice for each contest. To vote, you must completely darken the rectangle to the left of the response of your choice with black or blue ink. *[Figure 1]*

To vote for a candidate whose name does not appear on the Official Ballot, completely darken the rectangle to the left of the blank Write-in line provided for the office and fill in the blank with the full name of the candidate. *[Figure 2]*

Remember: If you vote for more than the number of candidates allowed for an office, or you vote both YES and NO on a measure, it is called an overvote, and your vote for that candidate or measure will not count. *[Figure 3]*



Review your Official Ballot

Ensure you have correctly marked your choice for each contest. Your official ballot may contain contests printed on both front and back. If so, remember to vote both sides!

If you lose your ballot, make an error on it or spoil it in any way, contact the Clackamas County Elections Division at **503.655.8510** (or TTY at 503.655.1685) to request a replacement.

Return your Official Ballot

Place your voted Official Ballot in the Ballot Secrecy Envelope and seal it. Place the sealed secrecy envelope inside the Return Ballot Envelope (white with a colored edge) and seal it.

Remember: Read and sign the Voter's Statement on the Return Identification Envelope. Your ballot will not be counted if the Return Identification Envelope is not signed.

- By Mail: Attach sufficient first-class postage to the signed and sealed Return Identification Envelope. Mail it as soon as possible; it must arrive at Clackamas County Elections Divison no later than 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday, May 21, 2013. Remember, the postmark does not count!
- In Person: Deliver the signed and sealed Return Identification Envelope to any official ballot drop site (see list on page 98) no later than 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday, May 21, 2013. Postage is not required if ballot is delivered to a drop site.

AMENDS OREGON CITY CHARTER TO ELIMINATE SETBACK OF WATER RATES

QUESTION: Shall the Oregon City Charter be amended to eliminate a provision requiring the setback of water rates to 1994 levels?

SUMMARY: Section 58 of the Oregon City Charter contains a provision that requires water rates to be set back to those in place in 1994, with certain additional increases. This measure would eliminate this provision and allow the City's current water rates to remain in effect.

Section 58 of the Oregon City Charter was adopted in 1996 and both limited future water rate increases to three percent annually and required water rates to be set back to 1994 rates. The resetting of the water rates did not occur in 1996 because of a court decision to protect bond holders. Those bonds are scheduled to be repaid in 2014 and, if this provision is not adopted, water rates would be set back to 1994 water rates, plus those increases of not more than three percent annually.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

In 1994, the voters of Oregon City adopted an initiative measure that limited the ability of the City Commission to raise water rates. That provision currently reads as follows:

Section 58 - Water Rates.

Upon passage of this amendment to the City Charter city water rates shall be those in effect as of October 31, 1994. The commission may not increase water rates by more than 3 percent annually without a vote of the people. The commission may not declare any ordinance or resolution establishing water rates to be an emergency nor use any other means to prevent their referral to the voters.

The first sentence of that provision, requiring water rates to go back to those in effect in 1994, has not been implemented because of a federal court decision. Shortly after the measure was adopted, a group of bond holders sued the City to avoid the rate setback and ensure that their bonds could be repaid. The court ordered the City to not implement that provision until the bonds had been repaid. The bonds are scheduled to be repaid in the fall of 2014.

This measure would delete the first sentence of section 58 and avoid a rate setback to 1994 levels. If the rate setback goes into effect, it would decrease water revenue by approximately 27 percent and those rates would not cover current operating costs and maintenance requirements, resulting in significant changes to the City's water system operations and maintenance programs.

This measure would eliminate the rollback of water rates to 1994 levels, plus those increases of not more than three percent annually. Any greater increase must be authorized by City voters.

As the chief petitioner of the 1996 initiative to amend the city charter to add section 58 requiring water rates to rollback to 1994 rates and limiting the city commission to an increase of no more than 3% without a vote of the people.

I support Measure No.3-423, Setback of Water Rates for the following reasons:

It was never the intent of our measure to roll the rate back to the 1994 level 20 years later.

After passage of this measure it was challenged in federal court and the judge determined that the rates could not be rolled back due to the contracts clause of the Oregon constitution.

Because the judge limited his ruling to the immediate rate rollback it will take effect in 2014 if we do not pass measure 3-423. The result of that rollback would be a drastic reduction in the revenue to the water department. This could have a dramatic negative effect on water services in Oregon City.

This measure will prevent the water system in Oregon City from having less money than it takes to run and do regular repairs.

This measure will have no effect on the limitation of 3% per year increases in the rates without a vote of the people.

Avoid these mistakes when signing and returning your ballot, and make sure your vote gets counted!

Letting your spouse (or child or parent) sign your ballot envelope: Some families like to make voting a communal event, but make sure the envelope you sign is your own, and doesn't belong to some other family member. If the signature on the envelope doesn't match the pre-printed name, the ballot will be set aside and not tallied until we can resolve the mistake.

Signing by Power of Attorney: Don't do it. If a voter is unable to sign, a Signature Attestation form may be obtained so that the voter is able to use a rubber stamp of their signature.

Saving a stamp by putting two ballots in one envelope: Don't do it. Both ballots will be rejected.

Forgetting to use the secrecy envelope:

USE OF CERTAIN COUNTY RESOURCES FOR PORTLAND MILWAUKIE LIGHT RAIL

QUESTION: Should Clackamas County use certain County resources to meet previous contractual commitments toward the Portland Milwaukie Light Rail Project?

SUMMARY: Agreements signed by prior Board of County Commissioners in 2010 and 2012 obligate the County to use the following County resources toward completion of the Portland Milwaukie Light Rail Project:

- funding \$1,279,740 in improvements to roads and signals near the proposed Park Avenue Light Rail Station, with the funding sources to be the County Road Fund and \$279,740 in Systems Development Charges to be paid by Tri-County Metropolitan Transportation District of Oregon ("TriMet");
- allowing TriMet to conduct operations on and maintain portions of county roads and sidewalks occupied by Portland Milwaukie Light Rail facilities; and
- transferring two parcels of real property to TriMet: a 2,614 square foot parcel valued at \$20,915, and a 3,485 square foot parcel valued at \$1,360.

This Measure seeks voter approval of an ordinance authorizing the Board to use those County resources to meet the County's previous contractual commitments toward the Portland Milwaukie Light Rail Project. Approval or rejection of the ordinance will not affect the County's obligations with respect to those previous contractual commitments.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

In September, 2012 County voters approved Measure 3-401, which requires voter approval before the Board of Commissioners authorizes the use of any County resources for public rail transit.

TriMet is constructing the PMLR line, which will run from Downtown Portland to a proposed station near the intersection of Park Avenue and McLoughlin Boulevard. The PMLR line will run along an alignment selected by area governments as the Locally Preferred Alternative in 2008.

In February, 2010, the Board of County Commissioners (Board) approved an Agreement with TriMet for the PMLR project. Under the Agreement, the County agreed to provide \$25 million toward the project, and also agreed to negotiate in good faith for any further agreements that might be necessary to complete the project. The Clackamas County Development Agency and the North Clackamas Parks and Recreation District were also parties to the agreement.

In August of 2012, the Board approved a Supplemental Agreement which reduced the County's cash contribution by \$2.4 million dollars. As part of the agreement, the County agreed to fund road and signalization improvements to roads in and around the intersection of Park Avenue and Oatfield Road. The County also agreed to transfer to TriMet a small (2,614 square foot) parcel of property for which the County will receive a credit of \$20,915.

In addition, this measure addresses a small, landlocked parcel (3485 square feet) that would be conveyed to TriMet for construction of the Trolley Trail and retaining walls. TriMet values the property at approximately \$1,360.

Approval of this measure would constitute approval by the voters of an authorizing ordinance authorizing the following four items related to the Portland/Milwaukie Light Rail line:

- Execution of a funding agreement funding \$1,279,740 in road and signalization improvements in the vicinity of Park Avenue, Oatfield Road and McLoughlin Boulevard. TriMet will pay \$279,740 of that amount in Systems Development Charges, while the remainder will come from the County Road fund. All of these improvements were previously set forth in the County Transportation System Plan.
- Transfer of a property described as Tax Lots 11 E36CD03300 and 11 E36CD03400, approximately 2,614 square feet in size, for which the County will be credited \$20,915.
- Transfer of a parcel of approximately 3,485 square feet in size, for the sum of \$1,360.
- Execution of a Continuing Control Agreement providing that TriMet will control any portions of county-owned streets and sidewalks that will be occupied by light rail tracks or stations. This agreement is required by the Federal Transit Administration.

The actions authorized by this measure would be one-time authorizations that end with the completion of the project. The cost of staff time for completion of these items would not be likely to exceed \$23,000.

Rejection of this Measure would mean that the Board of Commissions will not have obtained approval of an authorizing ordinance as required by Measure 3-401.

Last summer, those commissioners authorized a private bank loan sending \$20 million to TriMet just days before a public vote to stop them.

TriMet is now in the throes of a financial meltdown. Over a billion dollars in the hole already, TriMet continues to hemorrhage millions while slashing bus services. Now we are asked to believe the voting public is to blame for their troubles?

TriMet has not been a good partner for Clackamas. TriMet's manipulation has already put us on the hook for \$20million. When asked to reconsider options that shorten the line and save public funds, TriMet filed suit to invalidate this election.

Less than a month before ballots started hitting the mail, TriMet filed suit to invalidate this election. The fact that you are voting right now, speak volumes about their strategy. Unable to appeal to Clackamas voters directly, TriMet hoped filing a lawsuit would change your mind.

For Clackamas voters, cynical maneuvers of this sort are becoming all too commonplace. TriMet never wanted your opinion about light rail in the first place, they just wanted your money and, thanks to some double-crossing ex-county commissioners, TriMet pocketed \$20million of it last summer (four days before a public vote to stop them).

So why file suit just weeks before voters weigh the issues?

The truth is TriMet is more concerned about the message your vote sends than the money involved. Their lawsuit suit seeks damages of less than 0.1% of the project's total cost. TriMet fears losing another light rail election.

The only thing more tattered than TriMet's finances is its public reputation. Each year TriMet hikes business taxes and customer fares while bus service is cut. TriMet fears our countywide vote against light rail will spur action in neighboring counties. In Clackamas County alone, a half-dozen communities have already de-annexed from TriMet. Wilsonville, Canby, Damascus, Sandy, Mollala and Boring have already left TriMet behind. Most provide better bus service for themselves, and more may follow.

While many openly wonder whether Clackamas would be better off without TriMet altogether, the transit giant desperately needs to draw a big smiley face on this light rail project. That's where you, the voter, come in. TriMet's *unelected* board can't continue building light rail lines into their *underserved* territories if the public keeps voting in opposition. People are starting to catch on.

ARGUMENT IN OPPOSITION

Last year the voters overwhelmingly approved 3-401, a measure requiring voter approval for the use of county resources for the purposes public rail transit. Consequently 3-424 and 3-425 are on the ballot in accordance with the spirit and intent of the voter approved ordinance, and arguably required by law.

There are conflicting legal opinions and legal challenges that center on whether the previous existing contracts entered into by the county are subject to an ordinance that was established after the contractual commitments were made.

A recent ruling by a judge suggests that 3-424 and 3-425 are advisory and may have no effect on the Portland Milwaukie Light Rail line

Simply put, you have an opportunity to vote on this matter although it has been ruled <u>ADVISORY</u> and may have no impact on the completion of Portland Milwaukie Light Rail Line.

However, I believe it is important to express your opinion on this matter for the following reasons:

- The circumstances as to which this project has been extended into unincorporated Clackamas County are troubling and created controversy that was unnecessary and should not ever occur again.
- The current bus service provides similar transit connections and flexibility at a fraction of the capital cost. The future of transit service relies upon practical choices the region can afford. Can we afford to build and maintain a functional light rail system?
- Tri-met is facing a serious financial crisis that jeopardizes transit service in the region, regardless of the skeleton light rail system in place or under construction.

I realize many citizens oppose this light rail project and have expectations that the project can be stopped. I believe the fate of this project will be subject to a court ruling in the near future.

I have not supported the Portland Milwaukie Light Rail line but I urge the Clackamas County voters to help send a message by voting on these measures.

This Advisory Question asks voters within the boundary of the North Clackamas Parks and Recreation District (NCPRD) whether the NCPRD should sell approximately 0.6 miles of the 6-mile Trolley Trail property to TriMet. In exchange, TriMet will sell NCPRD 0.6 miles of adjacent property; construct the trail at TriMet's cost and provide NCPRD with additional funds. NCPRD acquired the Trolley Trail property, including the segment discussed in this Measure, from Metro in 2005. Under the terms of the agreement with Metro, if the property is no longer used for green space/trail purposes, NCPRD needs to either repay the cost of the property or purchase replacement green space. TriMet is constructing the Portland Milwaukie Light Rail line	
(PMLR), which will run from Downtown Portland to a proposed station near the intersection of Park Avenue and McLoughlin Boulevard. The PMLR line will follow an alignment selected by area governments as the Locally Preferred Alternative in 2008. In 2010, NCPRD along with Clackamas County signed an agreement recognizing this route and agreeing to negotiate in good faith to complete all transactions necessary related to the same. Tri-Met has already clear cut hundreds of trees along our Linear Park, including the ones on the front cover of the MP.

The scars they have inflicted will take decades to repair and will not happen in my lifetime.

There is no reason to believe Tri-Met will start becoming good stewards moving forward.

The agreement with Tri-Met doesn't require us to sell our park lands to them outright.

Keep this in mind: Who owns controls!

I say give them as little control as possible.

ANNEXES JOHNSON CITY INTO CLACKAMAS RIVER WATER DISTRICT

QUESTION: Shall the City of Johnson City annex into the Clackamas River Water District?

SUMMARY: Annexes the entire city limits of Johnson City into the Clackamas River Water District (District) as of July 1, 2013.

Johnson City currently obtains its water from the Clackamas River Water District. Even though Johnson City is surrounded by the boundaries of the District, it is not a part of the District. Annexation into the District would result in little change for the residents of the City of Johnson City, except it would ensure continued water supply for the residents of Johnson City from the District and allow the citizens of Johnson City an opportunity to participate in the District.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This measure would expand the boundaries of Clackamas River Water District (CRW) to include all of the territory within the City of Johnson City, Oregon (City). Although the City is surrounded by CRW, the City is not a part of CRW. Water for City residents is currently supplied by CRW; annexation into CRW would make City residents also residents of CRW and it would be more difficult for CRW to cancel water service. On February 14th the Board of CRW adopted a resolution approving the request of the City to annex into the CRW, so the annexation is welcomed by CRW.

Annexation into the CRW would result in little change for the residents of the City, except it would ensure continued water supply for the residents of the City from the CRW and allow the citizens of Johnson City an opportunity to participate in the CRW. City water service will be maintained largely as it is provided today.

The City Council has determined that it is in the best interests of the residents of the City and CRW to request the CRW and voters of the City to annex the City into the CRW and, therefore, has placed this measure before the voters of the City.



BALLOT TITLE

FIVE-YEAR LOCAL OPTION LEVY FOR FIRE SERVICES

QUESTION: Shall Lake Grove Fire District levy five-year local option levy of \$.40 per \$1,000 of assessed value beginning FY 2014-15?

This measure renews current local option taxes.

SUMMARY: This measure would authorize the Lake Grove Rural Fire Protection District No. 57 ("District") to renew its local option tax levy for fire services at a rate of \$.40 per \$1,000 dollars of assessed value on real property located within the District, beginning in FY 2014-15. The District's previous five-year levy for fire services, in the amount of \$0.55 per \$1,000 of assessed value, expires June 30, 2014.

The District contracts with the City of Lake Oswego for the provision of all fire services for District residents. This levy, if approved, will be used to reimburse the City for those services. A small portion of the levy would be retained by the District to pay for District administration such as auditing, legal services and election expenses.

The estimated total amount to be levied each year is as follows: FY14-15: \$ 167,877.00 FY15-16: \$ 172,914.00

FY16-17: \$ 178,101.00 FY17-18: # 183,444.00 FY18-19: \$ 188,947.00

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

For many years, the Lake Grove Fire District has provided fire protection services to its residents by contract with the City of Lake Oswego. The District has paid the City for those services by means of the District's permanent tax rate and by a five-year local option levy. That current local option levy, in the amount of \$.55 per \$1,000 of assessed value of property, will expire June 30, 2014. The local option levy proposed by this ballot measure is intended to replace the levy which will expire in 2014, thereby allowing the District to pay the City of Lake Oswego for fire services for an additional four years, until June 30, 2018. The levy is in addition to the District's permanent tax rate of \$1.9092 per \$1,000 of assessed value.

In order to have sufficient funds to continue receiving fire protection services from the City, the District Board has determined the need to replace the current levy. The proposed levy would be for five years in the amount of \$.40 per \$1,000 of assessed value each year, which is a reduction of \$0.15 per \$1,000 of assessed value.

The funds collected from the proposed levy would be used primarily to reimburse the City of Lake Oswego for fire protection services, but also to cover administrative costs of the District, such as auditing and legal expenses, election costs, and other minor administrative matters.

By mail-in registration form or in person at any county elections office or at a designated state agency, including the Department of Motor Vehicles and some public assistance agencies. Also, voters can access secure online voter registration at http://www.oregonvotes.org.

WHEN MAY I REGISTER AND WHAT IS THE REGISTRATION DEADLINE?

You may register at any time. However, your voter registration form must be received or postmarked no later than the 21st day before the election at which you intend to vote.

WHERE CAN I FIND VOTER REGISTRATION FORMS?

Post offices, public libraries, city halls, DMV offices and Clackamas County Elections, 1710 Red Soils Ct., Ste. 100, in Oregon City. You can register online, or download and print a PDF form from the Secretary of State's web site at the Oregon Voter Registration link, which can be found at http://www.oregonvotes.org. WHAT INFORMATION IS REQUIRED?

In October 2002, the "Help America Vote Act" was signed into law. The Act changed voter registration requirements nationwide for voting in federal elections. When registering to vote in Oregon for the first time, you must provide an Oregon Driver's License / ID. If you do not have a valid ODL / ID, the last four digits of your Social Security number must be provided.

If you do not have a valid Oregon Driver's License / ID or a Social Security number, you must affirm this by marking the appropriate box on the registration form. If you are registering by mail, you must provide a copy of one of the following: a valid photo identification, a copy of a paycheck stub, utility bill, bank statement or other government document showing your name and address.

BALLOT TITLE

SILVER FALLS SCHOOL DISTRICT CAPITAL CONSTRUCTION AND MAINTENANCE BOND

QUESTION: Shall Silver Falls School District No. 4J issue general obligation bonds not exceeding \$36,900,000 with citizen oversight? If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of Sections 11 and 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

SUMMARY: If approved, this measure would provide funds for capital costs and bond issuance costs. Specifically, bond proceeds would be used to:

- Fund deferred maintenance and facility upgrade projects at each of the District's elementary schools.
 Examples of deferred maintenance projects include re-roofing, painting, improved plumbing and electrical, flooring replacement, and parking lot repair. Examples of facility upgrade projects include door locks, security cameras, fencing, telephone and intercom, technology infrastructure, furnishings and equipment.
- Fund the reconstruction of the Schlador Street campus into a grades 5-6 self-contained, 7-8 departmentalized school, related site improvements, furnishings and equipment. Completion of this project results in the discontinued use of Eugene Field School.
- · Pay bond issuance costs.

Bonds would mature in twenty-five (25) years or less from issuance date and may be issued in one or more series. Estimated yearly property tax rate is anticipated to remain at existing levels due to expiration of outstanding bonds. Actual rate may vary depending upon interest rates, assessed value growth, and other factors. Citizen oversight committee will ensure funds are used as intended.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

In September 2011, the most recent Long Range Facility Planning Committee was formed, comprised of community members from each school attendance area in the district as well as municipality, school board and school employee representatives. The group was charged with developing district-wide facility recommendations for consideration by the Silver Falls School Board and met monthly between October 2011 and May 2012. Members became familiar with recent facility studies and current conditions, safety and security needs, history of district schools, projected enrollment, anticipated instructional requirements, 21st century educational needs and other facility related information. Facility recommendations were formed and submitted to the school board in June of 2012. After review, public input and some modifications, the recommendations were approved by the board, including the recommendation to place a bond on the May 2013 ballot.

If approved by the voters, bond proceeds would be used for completion of a variety of district-wide deferred maintenance projects and facility upgrades. Completion of these projects would allow for continued use of each school and include the following:

- · Roof Replacements.
- Plumbing and Electrical Upgrades.
- Improvements to heating, ventilations systems and related controls.
- Site water collection and drainage improvements.
- Sidewalk, parking lot and playground improvements.
- Structural repairs.
- · Siding improvements.

- Restroom improvements.
- Flooring repair and replacement.
- District-wide infrastructure upgrade for equal technology access in each school.
- District-wide safety and security upgrades including installation of electronic perimeter door hardware, classroom door hardware, security cameras and additional fencing.

Bond revenue would also be used for conversion of the Schlador Street (former high school) campus to a school for Silverton area students in grades 5-8. To address seismic and code compliance requirements, this conversion includes a combination of partial demolition and new construction. Completion of the Schlador Street conversion would allow for discontinued use of Eugene Field Elementary School. Mark Twain and Robert Frost Schools are expected to be used for Silverton area students in grades K-4. The grade configurations for these schools would be determined following public input and evaluation of multiple options.

The Board also intends to sell surplus property with the proceeds dedicated to funding of district-wide maintenance projects in the future.

Based upon a \$36,900,000 bond, the total estimated bond levy rate is projected to remain at the current level of approximately \$3.35 per \$1000 of assessed value for the life of the bond. The final payment on the school bond approved by voters in 1994 (approximately \$1.19 per \$1000 of assessed value), is scheduled to occur in June 2013 and enables the district to issue the new bond without increasing the total bond levy rate.

These rates are estimates only and will vary depending on interest rates, growth in the district's total assessed value and other factors.

FLUORIDATION OF PORTLAND DRINKING WATER SUPPLY

QUESTION: Shall Portland fluoridate its drinking water supply?

SUMMARY: Portland supplies drinking water to city residents and businesses and to several other municipalities and water districts outside Portland. Portland currently does not add fluoride to its drinking water supply.

This measure requires Portland to fluoridate Portland's drinking water supply. The measure requires fluoridation at the levels recommended by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention or the Oregon Health Authority intended to reduce tooth decay and promote oral health. The measure is a referral of an Ordinance adopted by the Council. Although the Ordinance requires fluoridation of Portland's drinking water supply by March 1, 2014, the actual date of implementation of fluoridation will depend on the effective date of this measure. The fluoride must meet standards of the American Water Works Association. The measure requires record-keeping related to quantities of water treated and the type and amounts of fluoride in treated and untreated water in accordance with state and federal recommendations.

The measure funds fluoridation through water user fees.

No statement was filed per Oregon Admistrative Rule.

(1) The governing body for any local government which has referred a measure to the voters, shall submit an impartial, simple and understandable statement explaining the measure and its effect.

Everyone talks about how important water fluoridation helps kids – and it's true. But it helps all of us ---especially seniors!

As our teeth develop in youth, fluoride makes the naturally occurring calcium and phosphorus in our teeth bond together more strongly, creating a harder enamel surface so we can maintain healthy teeth longer. If you didn't have fluoride as a kid (for example, if you are from Portland!) your teeth are naturally weaker when you grow up. As you age, that makes you more susceptible to all the problems and expenses that go along with weak teeth ---- fillings, root canals, implants.

For those living on a fixed income, it can be a choice between living in constant pain and paying your living expenses!

As we age, medications we take can make our mouth drier which means that our teeth are more at risk of breaking, cracking, and becoming a problem.

Our gums also begin to recede, and that makes it easier for decay to attack the roots of our teeth, which aren't as strong as the surfaces with enamel. A decayed root means pain and a costly, difficult procedure.

Fluoride remineralizes teeth as we get older. <u>Water fluoridation</u> keeps teeth strong and healthy throughout our entire life.

As a community health dentist I support Measure 26-151 because I've seen firsthand the terrible impact of our failure to provide fluoridation for our community.

I remember a young girl, 11-12 years old, that I treated a few years back while providing care at a local middle school. She was suffering from a very bad dental infection of an adult molar tooth which I could only treat by extraction (removing the tooth). When I told her she would not be able to eat on that side for 2-3 days after the extraction she began to cry and told me that she had not eaten on that side of her mouth for months due to the severe pain in the tooth. I wish this was an unusual story. It isn't.

For those of us who treat low income patients it is common to see children 2-4 years old whose teeth are so decayed and infected that treatment can only be provided by restraining the child or sending them to the hospital to get their dental care under general anesthesia (being put completely to sleep). This is not a rare occurrence: one of Oregon's largest health insurance companies for low income patients reports that 7% of its 0-5 year old children have dental decay so bad that they had to get care in a hospital. By that number about 2 children out of every low-income preschool class of 25 children is living with chronic infection and pain in their teeth.

These stories are tragic not only because no child should have to live with pain but because it is preventable. For those of us who see this daily there is no debate: we are in a dental health crisis. And among respected scientific organizations there is no question that fluoridated water would reduce the number of these heart breaking scenarios in our community.

We can prescribe tablets and provide varnish at office visits, but the maximum reduction of dental decay is achieved when fluoride is available both topically and systemically every day.

What is water fluoridation?

Water fluoridation is simply the adjustment of the existing, naturally occurring fluoride levels in drinking water to an optimal fluoride level recommended by the U.S. Public Health Service. Fortifying the water with fluoride is similar to adding Vitamin D to milk and Vitamin C and Calcium to orange juice.

A 65 Year Record of Efficacy and Safety

As stewards of oral health, our policies are based on the best science available. The effectiveness of water fluoridation has been researched and documented for over 65 years. Water fluoridation has become one of the most widely studied public health measures in history. These studies show that water fluoridation reduces tooth decay by over 25% in adults and children, even in an era with widespread availability of fluoride from other sources, like toothpaste.

Hi, I'm Bitty. I grew up in California, where we had community water fluoridation. So I also grew up with really strong teeth; I only have one filling. My grandmother still has all of her teeth, and she's 98!

I moved to Portland with my husband in 2003. I really love it here, and I love raising my family here.

Even though I love Portland, I don't love how much I have to worry about my kid's teeth. Of course we make him brush and floss---but for even the most careful parents, it's so easy to forget to give them their tablets. And even if we were perfect, that is no substitute. Portland's failure to fluoridate our water means my kid isn't building strong teeth to last lifetime.

And it shows. My son has had terrible problems with his teeth starting at age 2. He had to have two crowns and six fillings. Because he was so young, the doctor had to use general anesthesia. That was scary. Watching him suffer, and having to explain the dental procedures he would have to endure, was excruciating. It is especially frustrating knowing that if our water was fluoridated, Oscar would have stronger teeth.

I've heard the arguments opponents make and I've explored the research. With several decades of comprehensive reviews by federal scientists, <u>no reputable scientific study disputes that water</u> <u>fluoridated at the optimum level helps improve the oral health</u> <u>of everyone in the community</u>. No peer-reviewed federal study concludes that water fluoridated at the proposed standard causes the health issues that opponents claim. <u>Not one</u>.

Trust me, if you've ever suffered from dental pain, or had someone close to you have to endure painful dental surgery, you wouldn't wish that on anyone. Especially kids. Fluoridating Portland's water is the right thing to do - for everybody.

A NEUROSCIENTIST SORTS FACT FROM FICTION

My name is Damien Fair, and I am a neuroscientist who heads xxxxx at OHSU. I've spent my life studying the brain. I'm a passionate advocate for the fluoride measure because I know how important it is to the health of our community and our kids.

This debate has been filled with both facts and fiction. As a scientist, I wanted to help sort one from the other.

Fiction: Fluoride affects IQ.

The Facts: Community water fluoridation at the recommended level does not affect IQ. Flawed IQ studies cited by the opposition were in fact not about municipal water fluoridation, but were poorly designed foreign studies about water systems with naturally high levels of fluoride – up to 1500% higher than optimally fluoridated water. The authors of the study have said that their results do not relate to the safety of water fluoridation in the U.S.

Fiction: Fluoride causes cancer and other health problems.

The Facts: All the major health and medical organizations agree: optimally fluoridated water is both safe and effective, and is not linked to any of the health concerns opponents of fluoridation falsely claim.

Fiction: The National Research Council's 2006 report says "fluoride can have harmful effects."

The Facts: In 2006, the NRC did not study optimally fluoridated water but instead evaluated areas of the U.S. where the natural fluoride levels are unusually high --three to five times higher than the level used to fluoridate public water systems. The NRC itself explained that its report was not an evaluation of the safety of water fluoridation.

Every reputable study shows that fluoridation is a smart, effective and safe thing to do. <u>I say with confidence, there is no action we could take that could be more important to the health of our community than voting yes on 26-151</u>.

A Financial Analyst Breaks Down the Numbers

Water fluoridation saves teeth. It also saves money (lots of it!).

We don't often hear about the financial impact of poor oral health As a health care financial analyst I can tell you how much it costs.

I review the costs of our failure to fluoridate our water every day. Here are just a few examples:

- \$350-\$600 to remove an infected tooth and this does not even include the replacement cost of an implant.
- \$600-900 for a root canal. Molar or back teeth root canals are more expensive than anterior or front teeth.
- \$2,500 for the average complete dental case requiring general anesthesia in an operating room setting for kids whose teeth are so damaged that the only kind thing to do is let them be asleep while their mouth is repaired.

And here is another thing you might not know: **in many cases you are picking up the tab**: at least half of the bills I see are paid by the taxpayer when children do not have private dental insurance.

That's right: even if you have perfect teeth, you are paying to repair damage that could have been prevented simply by having fluoridated water in Portland. It's simple -fluoride makes teeth stronger.

This math is basic:

- A ten-year old child who develops cavities will pay more than \$2,000 over a lifetime to take care of each decayed tooth.
- On the other hand, every \$1 invested in fluoridation saves \$38 in treatment costs for fillings and more serious dental work with a savings estimated over \$20 million per year in Portland.

The numbers speak for themselves. Voting yes means saving teeth and saving money.

LOCAL OPTION LEVY: IMPROVE NATURAL AREAS, WATER QUALITY FOR FISH

QUESTION: Shall Metro improve natural areas, water quality for fish: five-year operating levy, \$.096 per \$1,000 assessed value, beginning 2013?

This measure may cause property taxes to increase more than three percent.

SUMMARY: Twice in two decades, Metro voters approved measures to acquire thousands of acres of natural areas throughout the tri-county region. Past measures could not include money for maintenance and restoration.

This levy creates a dedicated fund to improve water quality for salmon and native fish, remove invasive weeds that threaten the health of these natural areas, restore wetlands and provide opportunities for people from around the region to experience nature close to home.

Cost

The estimated cost for the typical household is \$20 per year for five years.

Result of a "yes" vote

- Improve water quality in local rivers and streams for salmon and other native fish including the Clackamas, Sandy, Tualatin rivers; Fanno, Johnson creeks.
- Restore wildlife habitat and remove weeds that choke plants wildlife need for food and shelter.
- Restore wetlands and floodplains to control flooding, provide habitat for birds and amphibians.
- Construct or replace capital projects in parks, such as restrooms, picnic shelters, playgrounds.
- Provide nature education programs in natural areas to visitors and school-aged children.

The proposed rate (at \$.096/\$1,000) will raise approximately \$10.2 million in 2013-14, \$10.4 million in 2014-15, \$10.6 million in 2015-16, \$ 10.9 million in 2016-17 and \$11.2 million in 2017-18. The estimated tax cost for this measure is an ESTIMATE ONLY based on the best information available from the county assessors at the time of estimate

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

As a result of two voter-approved bond measures in 1995 and 2006, Metro owns or manages 16,000 acres of land. While the funding voters approved provided money to acquire new natural areas, the law prohibits the use of bond money for maintaining and operating these lands.

The Metro Council is proposing a five-year natural areas local option levy of 9.6 cents per \$1,000 of assessed home value. The funds will be spent to improve water quality, restore habitat, maintain Metro's parks and natural areas and expand opportunities for people to use them.

What it will do: The levy would raise approximately \$10 million each year for five years. Funds would be used to:

- Improve water quality in local rivers and streams, including the Clackamas, Sandy and Tualatin rivers and Fanno and Johnson creeks, for salmon and other native fish
- Restore wildlife habitat and remove invasive weeds that crowd out native plants needed by wildlife for food and shelter
- Restore wetlands and floodplains to control flooding and provide habitat for birds and amphibians

- Improve visitor services in Metro's parks, including replacing aging restrooms, picnic shelters, and playgrounds
- Provide nature education programs to school-aged children and visitors
- Support community partnership projects that connect people with nature

What it will cost: The owner of a home assessed at \$200,000 would pay approximately \$19.20 per year, for five years.

Where the money will go: About half the new funding will be spent to improve habitat for fish, wildlife and water quality at some of the 16,000 acres of parks and natural areas Metro owns or manages. Projects will include large-to-small scale habitat restoration projects, as well as everyday maintenance such as controlling invasive weeds.

The other half of the levy funding would help provide opportunities for the region's residents to visit and learn about nature at Metro's parks and natural areas. Park maintenance would be supported at destinations serving more than 1.3 million visitors a year including Oxbow and Blue Lake regional parks; Chinook Landing Marine Park; parts of the Springwater Corridor trail; Smith and Bybee Wetlands Natural Area; and Cooper Mountain, Graham Oaks and Mount Talbert nature parks. Improvements would be made to some natural areas to make these lands more accessible to visitors. Conservation education programs and volunteer activities would be expanded throughout the region. Approximately \$750,000 would be awarded annually in Nature in Neighborhoods community grants to citizen groups, nonprofits and other service groups or organizations with nonprofit or other tax-exempt status.

Measuring performance: To ensure accountability, an annual report to the Metro Council will detail program expenses, major accomplishments and progress toward specific outcomes. The work plan and annual report will be presented at a Metro Council meeting and made available on the Metro website. Program expenses will be subject to annual audits and presented in the budget adopted by the Metro Council.

Twice in just two decades, voters have chosen to protect thousands of acres of natural areas. So far, we as a region, have invested \$221 million to acquire these lands.

These investments are not without ongoing costs. If we don't take care, invasive species like blackberry and ivy will choke out native plants and trees, threatening the health of our forests and streams. Water quality will suffer, along with the native fish, birds, and plants that need it to survive.

This May, voters can continue our legacy by approving Measure 26-152 to invest in clean water, healthy fish, wildlife, and people. Acting today reduces the cost of taking care of these places in the future.

The typical homeowner will pay about \$20 per year, but the benefits will multiply for decades.


