MEASURE EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

If approved by the voters, this measure provides a five (5) year law enforcement operating levy in Happy Valley starting July 1, 2015 running through June 30, 2020. The current law enforcement operating levy expires June 30, 2015.

The proposed levy would increase the tax assessment for law enforcement by \$0.27 from \$1.38/\$1000.00 of tax assessed value to \$1.65/1000.00 of tax assessed value, an increase of 19.57%. This is the first proposed tax increase since 2002.

For a residence in Happy Valley with a tax assessed value of \$300,000.00, the proposed levy results in an annual tax increase for law enforcement services of \$81.00 from \$414.00 to \$495.00.

Between 2002 – when the City's \$1.38 levy was first approved by the voters – until the end of 2013 (the most recent period for which numbers are available) – annual call volume for law enforcement services rose from 1348 to 3417, an increase of over 250%; in that same period, the City's population rose from 4930 to 15575 (315% increase) and grew physically from 4.5 to 9 square miles.

An agreement between Happy Valley and the Clackamas County Sheriff sets out both the City's and Sheriff's respective obligations for law enforcement; this contractual approach has been used since the 2002 and would continue under the proposed levy.

Before placing this proposed levy on the ballot, the City Council appointed a 7 person panel in October 2013 to review the law enforcement needs of the City. The Panel was made up of two (2) City Council members, two (2) volunteer members of the City's Traffic and Public Safety Committee and three (3) citizen volunteer members. The Panel reviewed a variety of items over a seven month period and after holding two Open Houses made recommendations to the Council in July, 2014 relative to the law enforcement needs for Happy Valley including the proposed levy of \$1.65.

Law enforcement services in the City are currently provided by 10 experienced, sworn full-time deputies from the Sheriff's Office, one (1) part time and one (1) non-sworn Community Services Officer.

With monies from the proposed levy, those 12 personnel would remain and two (2) additional full-time experienced sworn sheriff deputies added. That would then allow for 24/7 coverage in the City by two (2) deputies.

In addition, monies generated by the proposed levy would be sufficient to fund a School Resource Officer providing law enforcement and related services to schools located in Happy Valley if necessary.

In addition to the two new deputies and a possible school resource officer, the levy increase provides monies for a contingency in the amount of 15% of expenditures for emergency events needing law enforcement services.

Should the measure fail and no replacement measure pass prior to June 30, 2015, all City specific dedicated law enforcement services would end and City residents would then receive those law enforcement services available to the unincorporated areas of the County not covered by an Enhanced Law Enforcement District or the like.
