# NCPRD/Libraries



### Task forces recommend Master Plan reports for Oak Lodge and Gladstone Community Project

After more than two years of planning, design, analysis, and extensive community involvement, our two task forces made of up dedicated, caring community members have each unanimously recommended a master plan — one for a new library in Gladstone and one for a new community center, library, park, and NCPRD offices on the Concord Property in Oak Grove.

The Board of County Commissioners approved both <u>Master Plan reports</u> at a policy session on Nov. 24 and are scheduled to make the final approval in January 2021. We'll also be asking them to approve staff moving forward to work with the community and consultants to complete design and engineering in preparation for construction to begin in spring 2022.

#### New park and trail at Boardman Wetlands

On Sept. 19, NCPRD opened a new park along Boardman Creek in Jennings Lodge. This 5.8acre park is part of the Boardman Wetlands and features a nature play area, outdoor educational areas and a scenic boardwalk trail loop. Developed in partnership with Oak Lodge Water Services District, this new park provides recreational activities for people of all ages, opportunities to connect with nature and access to observe the diverse ecology of wetland habitats. ## Elk Rock Island wildfire update

Elk Rock Island suffered extensive damage during a wildfire that took place on Sept. 9. The park contains downed trees, hazard trees, hanging limbs, loose rocks, high erosion potential, sensitive soils and vegetation, and trail damage. Both Elk Rock Island and parts of Spring Park are closed to the public.

This closure includes hiking, water recreation access, and all other forms of recreational activity on additional lands and trails that provide access to Elk Rock Island and the fire perimeter until March 31, 2021 for the protection of public health and safety. NCPRD is coordinating with the City of Milwaukie to keep the community informed through website updates, social media posts and postcards. <u>Please see updates on the NCPRD website for more information</u>.

The Milwaukie Center's Nutrition Program has provided a community Thanksgiving dinner for the past 30 years. While operations were changed to abide by current health standards, the tradition continued in 2020. The Milwaukie Center kitchen cooked up a delicious meal consisting of roast turkey, gravy, mashed sweet potatoes, dressing, green beans, cranberry sauce, and pumpkin custard for dessert. The meal was made ready for pick up or delivery on Wednesday, Nov. 25. Center volunteer drivers made the deliveries and over 200 meals were distributed to the community.

While the minimum donation for this Thanksgiving meal was \$15 per meal, some community members donated more to help support the program and their senior neighbors. In this COVID-19 affected world, many of the Nutrition Program fundraisers have been cancelled. With the record number of meals being delivered to our neighbors this year, fundraising and community support is more important than ever.

#### Supera groundbreaking

Economic Development is pleased to announce the groundbreaking of a new headquarter facility for <u>Supera LLC</u> in the Estacada Industrial Park! Supera is a Clackamas County homegrown business and produces anesthesia equipment for the veterinary industry. This new building will help Supera expand their operations to meet an increasing demand for their products. This business retention/expansion project was done in partnership with the City of Estacada with assistance from the Clackamas County Assessment and Taxation Office given the company's participation in the Enterprise Zone Incentive Program (facilitated by Economic Development).

# Parks and Forests



#### Metzler Park restroom completed

After a lot of work, many delays and outstanding effort by the parks team, the long-awaited Metzler restroom was completed. This newly installed CXT restroom unit was funded in part by an Oregon Parks and Recreation District (OPRD) Local Government Grant, features four individual non-gendered restroom stalls and three shower rooms for park visitors, as well as a laundry room for the park hosts. The finished project is a great improvement over the old modular unit in both appearance and functionality.



#### **Dump Stoppers**

Dump Stoppers is a grant-funded program that was the brainchild of the Clackamas County Forester in 2003. It was started in response to the problem of garbage being dumped near forest industry gates and properties. The program cleans up an average of 80,000 pounds of solid waste per year and removes numerous vehicles, boats and campers abandoned on forest lands. The Dump Stoppers Program has been working with the Trash No Land program since its inception four years ago. Dump Stoppers is part of the Parks and Forest Division.

#### Mobile printing available at many LINCC Libraries

Ten LINCC Libraries have added the printing service *PrinterOn*, which allows patrons to access library printers safely and confidentially during the pandemic and beyond. Patrons can send print jobs to a library printer from home, work or a mobile device and then arrange with the library to pick up their prints.
