Introductions	<p>Joey Johns – Human Services Manager for Housing and Veterans Services. Joey has filled Erika Silvers previous position. Joey comes to the county from Central City Concern. Joey’s extensive background includes veteran’s services, supportive housing and social services with a focus on harm reduction.</p> <p>Tina Foley-Strehl – Case Manager with the Veterans Directive Care Program. Tina is enrolled in a Master of Social Work Program with Jennifer Much Grund as supervisor.</p>

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Community Needs Assessment	<p>Jennifer Much Grund, Policy, Performance & Research Analyst with Clackamas County Social Services and direction of the Community Action Board wrapped up work on the Community Needs Assessment. The Board will pivot focus to a Community Action Agency. A mandate for Community Action Agencies is the development of a 4 year Strategic Plan. Currently the plan is 3 years overdue. The most recent data collected was generated through 211, Census and survey's. The focus to collect data on what poverty looks like in Clackamas County to check the boxes to meet Community Service Block Grant funding.
