17a. Compared to last year, the 2015 sheltered count:

- Increased

Explain:

Though there was variation in household size and utilization rate in some ES and TH programs, the main reason our sheltered count increased in 2015 from 2014 was that 3 warming shelters were open during the night of the count, which were not open in 2014.

17b. Compared to last year, the 2015 unsheltered count:

- Decreased

Explain:

In 2013 (the year of our last full count), we counted 478 unsheltered homeless individuals and in 2015 we counted 308. The explanation for this reduction is based on methodology. In 2013, we included data provided by homeless school liaisons on children in their schools experiencing homelessness on the night of the PIT Count. The liaisons do not collect data on adults in the household, so we only had data on the children. This year, we did not include these children, at the advice of Lauren Dunton. The data was showing a disproportionate number of children to adults, which caused a validation error. Lauren suggested that, in the future, if we choose to use the school liaison data that we work with the liaisons to obtain information on the adults in the households so that our data is not skewed to show a disproportionate number of children.
