Chair's Report	 Adam called on Casey, chair of the VAC Mental Health and Suicide Prevention Subcommittee to provide an update on the Mental Health Summit. At this time, the Summit postponed until February 22, 2023. Advertisements with the new date are in circulation, and the County website updated. Speakers for the Summit to include: Galli Murray, LCSW - is a Licensed Clinical Social Worker who specializes in crisis trauma and suicide prevention. In her current position as Clackamas County Health, Housing and Human Service's Suicide Prevention Coordinator, she works within the county health and various other systems in order to reach Clackamas County's goal of zero suicide. Dr. Martha Carlson - is a Licensed Psychologist who has made a career working with the Veteran population since 2004. Her specialties are suicide prevention, trauma treatment, couples therapy and substance abuse treatment.	
	• Eddie Black, B.S. Psychology-Philosophy - Eddie Black served in Marines as an avionics technician on F/A-18 Hornets from 1989 -1994 with deployment to Desert Storm. In the Marines, he obtained the rank of Sgt E5. In 2004, while attending the University of Oregon, he enlisted into the Oregon Army National Guard and later deployed to Iraq for Operation Iraqi Freedom 2. In 2007, he transitioned from C Co 2-162 IN to work as an infantry instructor with 1-249th Regional Training Institute. In 2017, he rejoined C Co 2-162 and deployed to Somalia in 2019/20. He retired from the ORARNG in FEB 2021.

	The PACT Act named in honor of Sergeant First Class (SFC) Heath Robinson includes the following. • Expands VA healthcare and benefits to Veterans exposed to burn pits, Agent	
	 Orange, and other toxic substances. Extends automatic eligibility for Post 9/11 combat Veterans from 5 years to 10 years post discharge. 	
	 Mandates Expansion of Healthcare Staffing and Facilities. Mandates Research on Toxic Exposure and Enhances the Process of adding New Presumptive Conditions.

	 Mandates Review of Previously Denied Claims. Adds 3 new groups of veterans with presumed exposed to radiation. The Camp Lejeune Justice Act of 2022 establishes a federal cause of action for any individual who resided, worked, or otherwise exposed to contaminated water at Camp Lejeune for at least 30 days beginning August 1, 1953 and ending December 31, 1987. With all the changes and new presumptive conditions, it is a great time to check in with a VSO to reevaluate benefits.
