EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

On May 15, 2019, the Board of County Commissioners received a report on a regional research and planning effort entitled the *Tri-County Equitable Housing Strategy to Expand Supportive Housing for People Experiencing Chronic Homelessness*. That report identified a need for a total of 440 supportive housing units within Clackamas County over the next ten years. Earlier this year, a waitlist analysis of our Coordinated Housing Access system determined that at the current level of supportive housing supply in the County, and at current rates of turnover, it would take 22 years for the 450 households currently on supportive housing waitlists to be placed into existing housing programs.

A variety of new resources will help the County expand the number of affordable housing units in our community, but significant funding gaps remain with respect to supportive services and rental assistance. Twenty-four new units of supportive housing will open in November, 2019 at the Clayton Mohr Commons, with supportive services funded by the County's Affordable Housing and Services Fund. The Metro Affordable Housing Bond will provide the County with resources to develop approximately 812 new units of affordable housing. Forty percent, or approximately 325, of those units must serve households who make 30% or less of area median income. Many of those families will need supportive services to successfully remain in their homes. And while the Housing Authority has 200 Housing Choice Vouchers that will provide rental assistance to these families, and is working to secure more, the projected units to be developed significantly outnumber the available vouchers. The supportive services needed for these hundreds of units to be developed also remains a significant gap.

In the County's Local Implementation Strategy for the Metro Affordable Housing Bond, the Housing Authority makes a commitment to "work with regional and state partners to identify a consistent funding source to serve vulnerable homeless or at risk populations. It is through a consistent funding of resident and supportive services that vulnerable population can remain housed and help the project succeed financially."

One such regional effort is Here Together, a non-profit organization that has convened local government, service providers, businesses, and philanthropic partners to develop and promote solutions to end regional chronic homelessness. Here Together is working to develop new funding resources dedicated to homeless services in the tri-county region.
