



Our work for children, youth and families, focuses on programs and activities that *promote well-being*, *reduce harm* and *improve health and education outcomes*.


The Prevention Unit is part of Children, Family and Communities Connection (CFCC) Division of Clackamas County Health, Housing and Human Services Department.

CLACKAMAS 2024 July 2023-June 2024 CFCC - Prevention Unit ALL: READY NETWORK

The All:Ready Network is re-designing our early childhood system of care so that race, class and ability are no longer predictors of accessing early childhood resources and services that mitigate adverse health experiences.

125 Early childhood & health systems partners engaged



525 Somali and Ethiopian community members engaged in culturally specific education on disability supports and resources to improve access to services.

Black Futures Initiative

Provided policy recommendations to health care and early childhood partners to strengthen a culturally affirming system of care for Black, African and African American families. Workshops on disability justice to transform how healthcare and early childhood partners understand the role of language and culture in disability inclusion.

520 Public health staff, primary care providers, pediatricians, early childhood & early learning providers, participated in trainings on the role of culture and language in disability inclusion.

1 in 3 women and 1 in 7 men have experienced domestic violence in their lifetime

39 Strangulation Forensic Evidence Kits (SKITs) completed in Clackamas County. Strangulation has been identified as one of the most lethal forms of domestic violence. Use of SKITs improves medical assessment of strangulation survivors.

AS 2024 CFCC - Prevention Unit July 2023-June 2024 CFCC - Prevention Unit EARLY LEARNING

The Early Learning Hub of Clackamas County (ELHCC) is funded by The Oregon Department of Early Learning and Care with state and federal funds. Our Early Learning Hub connects and coordinates early learning and family support services throughout the county.



79 Children Attending 36 local programs received a total of \$250,000 in Child Care scholarships for low and moderate income families.

196 Children Enrolled in Preschool Promise

Preschool Promise (PSP) is a publicly funded program for free preschool to families with income at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level. Families enrolling in Preschool Promise are referred to other resources needed to improve early learning success for their children.

2 Parent Advisory Councils

Our English and Spanish-speaking Parent Advisory Councils host events to inform parents of community resources, identify gaps of unmet need in the community and suggest improvements to our programming.

Community Events

- 14 adults Planted Pinwheels to raise awareness of child abuse
- 55 people participated in a Community Baby Shower
- 38 families participated in an Early Childhood Fair to get information about preschool and other services
- 31 Spanish-speaking families attended an Emergency Preparedness Event
- 21 families participated in Rainbows and Unicorns for LGBTQ families

We Play Wednesdays

15 families participated in guided play and information sharing during the summer at community parks.

2 Parent Cafés

Parent Cafés are an opportunity for parents to create strategies from their wisdom and experiences to strengthen their families.


AS July 2023-June 2024 PARENTING EDUCATION

Clackamas Parenting Together (CPT) is our parenting education hub. CPT is funded through the Oregon Parent Education Collaborative with state, federal and private funds. CPT offers parenting education classes for all ages of childhood.

232 Classes & Workshops

were offered across Clackamas county and virtually. Classes are free, evidence-based, and culturally responsive.







While classes are open to anyone regardless of income, 67% of participants identified as low income and used at least one public resource such as WIC, OHP, SNAP/TANF.



attended weekly parenting classes and workshops.

Parenting from the Inside Out

20 parents who are incarerated or on probation participated in classes proven to reduce recidivism and improve family relationships and parenting skills.

Increased Confidence

Parenting skills improved a significant amount in all surveyed areas—including "I understand my goals and values as a parent" and "protecting my child from unsafe conditions."

2024 CFCC - Prevention Unit YOUTH ENGAGEMENT/ CLACKAMAS July 2023-June 2024 SUBSTANCE USE PREVENTION COUNTY

We support substance use prevention programs and coalitions that focus on positive approaches, highlighting the natural strengths and abilities that young people have to help them grow and develop in the best way possible.

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Participated in activities that:

- Increased understanding of youth substance use & the developing brain
- Reduced peer misconceptions about substance use
- Provided information on using Naloxone to save lives

10 Trainings In Communities and Schools

- Strengthening Families
- Teen Brain Development
- Restorative Justice

After participating in prevention programming 87% of reporting youth demonstrated increased knowledge about substance use/misuse.
