Blueprint Community Grant presentation: Clackamas Fire – Project Hope	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Project Hope is a collaborative, person-centered approach to assist people who have a substance, use disorder and helping them on a pathway to successful recovery, which began in 2018 • Project Hope Team: Health center referrals, EMS referrals, Jail referrals, Emergency department referrals, Law Enforcement referrals • Goals of project Hope is to reduce the number of people who have had first time/repeat overdose on opioids or other drugs decreasing future 911 and hospital readmission, and improve the quality of life for patients with substance use disorders, and hope to bridge gaps of care for resources and treatment. • Social determinants influence half of health incomes • Was able to utilize the Blueprint grant to increase staffing • Open to volunteers distributing Naloxone
IV. Opioid Settlement, Fentanyl Update	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Oregon saw a 1.8% increase in ALL overdose deaths – October 2021-October 2022 • Oregon now ranks 2nd in the country for substance use disorders • Oregon 7th highest in access to treatment • Oregon ranks 1st in prescription opioids misuse • Oregon ranks 1st in methamphetamine use

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Overall deaths related to fentanyl increased by 83% • Clackamas County saw a 87% increase in drug-related deaths from 2019 (46) to 2021 (86) • Project Hope is a collaborative, person-centered approach to assist people who have a substance, use disorder and helping them on a pathway to successful recovery • Clackamas County will hopefully receive \$13.7 million or more after the settlement agreement is completed. • Next Steps: August policy session - Launch Multi-disciplinary steering committee, Get BCC approval to proceed with next steps of opioid settlement framework, and present coordinated funding request • Can regroup after session to get some feedback
V. Suicide Prevention Update	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 60% of all suicides are via firearm (56% increase in firearm suicides over last 10 years) • 22% of all suicides are via hanging • 80% of all suicide deaths are men • The rate of suicide in Clackamas County for the age group 55-69 remained the highest of all ages • Age groups 25-34, 35-44, and 45-54 have all declined since 2016 • 24% decrease in the number of deaths by suicide from 2021-2022 • Suicide Prevention Strategic Plan 2023 provides a blueprint for our county's comprehensive and collective approach to preventing suicide and its devastating consequences, developed over time with input from over 200 members of our community, will be develop further and reviewed/revised on a regular basis to meet the changing needs and circumstances of Clackamas County • Given out over 2000 no-cost secure storage items into the community • Collaborative and active partnerships with gun community • Supporting health care providers in being more intentional about suicide prevention • No-cost suicide prevention trainings continue to be offered at GetTrainedToHelp.com

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	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Suicide fatality review annual report 2022 released • Held listening sessions with the Latinx community about gun ownership and suicide • HB 3090 (2017) - This law requires Oregon hospitals, that have emergency departments, to adopt certain policies for releasing patients from the emergency department following treatment for a behavioral health crisis. • House Bill 390 is really all about supporting individuals, to have safe and coordinated transitions out of the emergency department back home. • Passage of the bill to fund 988 services through a telecom fee • Passage of HB 2656 which will require schools to participate in the Healthy Teens Survey • Possible considerations: Advocate to the Oregon Health Authority for the oversight of HB 3090 to improve safe and coordinated transitions, Promote no-cost secure storage items to our community to help spread the word, Recommend the continued funding of these secure storage items, Promote messaging and education that highlights and increases awareness that the majority of who is dying from suicide in our community is 50-69 y/o men via firearm.
