Clackamas County provides winter warming shelters, which are only open when the wind chill predicted temperature drops below 33 degrees from Oct 1 to April 15th. In the 2018 count, most of these shelters were not open. In the 2019 count all winter warming shelters were open. During the 2018 count, two shelters were closed due to construction and one had not yet opened. Those three shelters were included in the 2019 count as well. ES beds went from 3 in 2018 to 203 in 2019.

The increase in emergency shelter capacity between 2017 and 2019 (2 most recent unsheltered counts), resulted in a higher percentage of sheltered persons in the 2019 count. The 2017 HIC reported 77 ES beds, while the 2019 HIC reported 203 ES beds. This was a result of a coordinated effort to increase the number of beds available for those in need of winter warming shelters.

Clackamas County CoC has worked hard to address literal homelessness among families with children through improved coordinated entry processes and increasing RRH beds. Between 2017 and 2019, the HIC reports an increase of 75 RRH beds for homeless families. This increased capacity resulted in a 60% reduction of unsheltered homeless families with children.
