RE:	Supportive Housing Services FY 22-23 Annual Work Plan
DATE:	September 7, 2022

Following the completion of the Supportive Housing Services (SHS) program's first year of operations, the program will begin submitting Annual Plans for each fiscal year to Metro. These plans are being composed in a template created by Clackamas, Multhomah, and Washington Counties in collaboration with Metro to ensure regional consistency and detail the program's goals and objectives for the new fiscal year. The FY 22-23 Annual Plan, which furthers the Board-approved goals and objectives outlined in Clackamas County's Local Implementation Plan (LIP), is the first of these new plans and is attached for your review. This memorandum is provided for informational purposes only and staff is not seeking Board action because the Board has already approved the goals and objectives outlined in the LIP. Staff can incorporate feedback or edits as requested by the Board.

The FY 22-23 Annual Plan contains four categories of annual objectives:

<u>Category 1: Housing/Program Quantitative Goals</u> – In FY 22-23 Clackamas County's primary focus will be on increasing the number of permanent supportive housing units by expanding its Regional Long-term Rent Assistance program and by supporting affordable housing developments at three sites: Tukwila Springs, Fuller Road Station, and Clayton Mohr Commons. Additionally, the Clackamas County service provider community has expressed the need for additional rapid rehousing resources. In response, the County will be expanding its array of rapid rehousing services this year. The SHS program plans to provide permanent supportive housing for an additional 385 households and rapid re-housing for an additional 140 households. FY 22-23 will also see a significant expansion of community outreach and engagement and eviction prevention services. The SHS program will also expand its inventory of supported shelter units by expanding capacity and assuming funding responsibility for existing shelters so that County resources can be reallocated towards housing and homeless services in underserved areas of the County.

<u>Category 2: Racial Equity</u> – Clackamas County committed to addressing racial disparities present in our housing services system through a variety of strategies and goals outlined in the County's Local Implementation Plan. In FY 22-23, the SHS program plans to increase the number of contracted culturally specific service providers from two to five. The program will also be hiring



multiple program coordinators and an Equity Lead who will help build anti-racist, gender affirming systems, both internally and in collaboration with our provider partners. Throughout FY 22-23, program staff will also be working to implement the various recommendations made in the County's Local Implementation Plan to advance racial equity within the County's coordinated entry system. Program staff will partner with the Coalition of Communities of Color and Unite Oregon to conduct a series of engagements with communities of color to further the implementation of the Coalition's recommendations for advancing equity within the coordinated entry system.

<u>Category 3: Capacity Building</u> – Capacity building both internally and throughout the system as a whole continues to be one of the County's key focuses to ensure it can meet its other goals for enhancing and expanding housing and homeless services. In FY 22-23, the SHS program will continue to expand its team by adding several new positions to support program delivery and operations. Program staff have also taken the initial steps to join the Built for Zero initiative, which aims to make homelessness rare and brief in communities through the use of a comprehensive and constantly maintained by-name list of who in the community is experiencing homelessness. Additionally, the SHS program will increase its investments in expanding the capacity of small grassroots service providers and expand stakeholder inclusion by expanding its advisory and steering committee boards.

<u>Category 4: Other Annual Goals</u> – In FY 22-23, the SHS program will continue to align its work with the County's behavioral health system by expanding partnerships and funding new case manager positions within the Health Center Division's Behavioral Health program. Additionally, the County remains committed to promoting geographic equity in the provision of housing and homeless services throughout the rural and urban regions of the County. County staff will continue identifying services which can be funded with SHS resources to allow for the reallocation of other funding sources to provide housing and homeless services in the historically underserved areas of rural Clackamas County.

Category 1: Framing and context narrative

In FY 2022-2023 Clackamas County's primary focus will be on rapidly increasing the number of permanent supportive housing units by expanding its Regional Long-term Rent Assistance program, housing navigation assistance capacity, supportive housing case management capacity, and through project based housing at three sites: Tukwila Springs, Fuller Road Station, and Clayton Mohr Commons. Additionally, the Clackamas County service provider community has expressed the need for additional rapid rehousing resources and in response to this the County will be expanding its array of rapid rehousing services this year. A significant expansion of community outreach and engagement services, including those tailored for specific demographics such as youth or the BIPOC community, is also planned for this year. Additionally, the Supportive Housing Services program will also be expanding its array of shelter services by funding new shelter units and also assuming funding responsibility for a number of existing shelters. This assumption of funding responsibility will enable the County to shift resources to other housing and homeless services in areas of need such as rural Clackamas County.
