EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: The Children, Family & Community Connections (CFCC) Division of the Health, Housing and Human Services Department requests the approval of a Subrecipient Grant Agreement with Northwest Family Services for the continuation of Children of Incarcerated Parents (CIP) program services. The youth being served by CIP were disproportionately affected by the immediate and lasting effects of the COVID pandemic. The program meets the complex needs of children who have at least one incarcerated parent through mentorship, the development of positive social norms, working collaboratively to provide resources and advocacy to youth and families, and provide small group support to younger children affected by parental absence.

In the 2022-2023 fiscal year, CIP provided services to 40 'core' children, 30 of which were matched with a mentor. In addition to core children, an additional 47 children received mentor matching and participation in program activities (a sibling of a core child) who were impacted by parental incarceration.

This Grant Agreement has a value of \$202,000 for 2 years. Agreement is effective upon signature for services July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2025.

RECOMMENDATION: Staff recommends the County approve this agreement and authorize Tootie Smith, Chair, sign it on behalf of Clackamas County.

RECITALS

- There are over 20,000 children in Oregon with a parent in prison. Two-thirds of those parents have child(ren) under 18 with half of them expecting to live with their children after they are released. Children of Incarcerated Parents (the "Program") aims to meet the complex needs of these children though mentorship, the development of positive social norms, working collaboratively to provide resources and advocacy to youth and families, and to bring awareness and education to communities.
- 2. SUBRECIPIENT improves family stability and child well-being by focusing on the social determinants of health. Since 1983, NWFS has worked to reduce poverty through health, education, employment, and social justice services. Programs and services include health and social service navigation, culturally specific women and children's shelter who have experienced violence, youth prevention and intervention programs, outpatient alcohol and drug treatment, coalition support for drug free communities, support for youth and families affected by incarceration, youth education and employment success, restorative justice, mental health services, job readiness and placement, couple's classes, parenting, healthy relationship

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education, and more. Services are offered in the greater Portland-Salem metro area in both English and Spanish.

 COUNTY desires to work with SUBRECIPIENT as part of a comprehensive, multi-agency approach to address the needs of very high-risk families and build strong parenting skills, prevent child abuse/neglect, and improve family stability through a variety of support activities and referral services including:

The Program includes mentoring and support services to children whose parents are or have been involved in the criminal justice system, which includes the following: youth will receive oneon-one support, connection to needed resources, and other targeted services. Youth are referred to the program by schools, PreventNet (a COUNTY-funded school-based program designed to improve outcomes for children by creating web of support in schools and in the community addressing poor academic performance, truancy, family management issues, alcohol, and other drug use, etc.) site staff, homeless liaisons, federal, state, and local agencies, and other community partners.

4. The Program aims to meet the complex needs of children who have at least one incarcerated parent though mentorship, the development of positive social norms, working collaboratively to provide resources and advocacy to youth and families, and provide small group support to younger children affected by parental absence.

The students being served by the Program were disproportionately affected by the immediate and lasting effects of the COVID pandemic in the following ways:

- Experienced effects of increased domestic violence in the home.
- Decrease in school engagement and attention/completion rates due to remote learning.
- Increase in mental illness (e.g., anxiety, depression) as well as suicide ideation.
- Increase in substance use.
- Fewer chances for social interaction with subsequent decrease in future opportunities.
- Fewer opportunities for teachers and other community adults to identify risks to children.

NOW THEREFORE, according to the terms of this Subrecipient Grant Agreement (this "Agreement") the COUNTY and SUBRECIPIENT agree as follows:

AGREEMENT

- Term and Effective Date. This Agreement shall become effective on the date it is fully executed and will terminate on June 30, 2025, unless sooner terminated or extended pursuant to the terms hereof. Eligible expenses for this Agreement may be charged during the period beginning July 1, 2023, and expiring June 30, 2025, subject to additional restrictions set forth below and to the exhibits attached hereto, and unless this Agreement is sooner terminated or extended pursuant to the terms hereof. No grant funds are available for expenditures after the expiration date of this Agreement.
- 2. **Program.** The Program is described in the attached Exhibit A: Subrecipient Statement of Program Objectives & Performance Reporting. SUBRECIPIENT agrees to carry out the Program in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement and according to SUBRECIPIENT Scope of Work and Performance Reporting in Exhibit A.
- 3. Standards of Performance. SUBRECIPIENT shall perform all activities and programs in accordance with the requirements set forth in this Agreement and all applicable laws and regulations. Furthermore, SUBRECIPIENT shall perform all activities and programs in with the requirements of the America Rescue Plan Act that is the source of the grant funding and other required information in Exhibit A- I, which are attached to and made a part of this agreement by this reference. SUBRECIPIENT shall further comply with any and all terms, conditions, and other obligations as may

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be required by the applicable local, State or Federal agencies providing funding for performance under this Agreement, whether or not specifically referenced herein. SUBRECIPIENT agrees to take all necessary steps and execute and deliver any and all necessary written instruments, to perform under this Agreement including, but not limited to, executing all additional documentation necessary to comply with applicable State and Federal funding requirements.

- 4. Grant Funds. COUNTY's funding for this Agreement is the America Rescue Plan Act State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (ARPA SLFRF Assistance Listing Number ["ALN"] #: 21.027), issued to COUNTY by the United States Treasury. Additional funding is through Clackamas County Behavioral Health ("CCBH"). The maximum, not to exceed, grant amount COUNTY will pay is \$202.000. This is a cost reimbursement grant, the award is conditional, and disbursements will be made in accordance with the schedule and requirements contained in Exhibit D: Required Financial Reporting and Payment Request. Failure to comply with the terms of this Agreement may result in withholding of payment or COUNTY pursuing any other rights or remedies available to it under this Agreement, at law, or in equity. Funds advanced and unspent must be returned to COUNTY within 30 days of the end of termination period in Section 1 if award conditions are not met.
 - 4.1. ARPA (ALN: 21.027)
 - Amount passed to SUBRECIPIENT: \$180,000.
 - 4.2 Clackamas County Behavioral Health Division
 - Other funds passed to SUBRECIPIENT: \$22,000.
- 5. Amendments. The terms of this Agreement shall not be waived, altered, modified, supplemented, or amended, in any manner whatsoever, except by written instrument signed by both parties. SUBRECIPIENT must submit a written request including a justification for any amendment to COUNTY in writing at least forty-five (45) calendar days before this Agreement expires. No payment will be made for any services performed before the beginning date or after the expiration date of this Agreement. If the maximum compensation amount is increased by amendment, the amendment must be fully executed before SUBRECIPIENT performs work subject to the amendment.
- 6. **Termination.** This Agreement may be suspended or terminated prior to the expiration of its term or with 30 days' notice from either party by:
 - a. At COUNTY's discretion, upon thirty (30) days' advance written notice to SUBRECIPIENT;
 - b. Written notice provided by COUNTY resulting from material failure by SUBRECIPIENT to comply with any term of this Agreement;
 - c. Mutual agreement by COUNTY and SUBRECIPIENT;
 - d. Written notice provided by COUNTY that ARPA and Behavioral Health has determined funds are no longer available for this purpose; and/or
 - e. Written notice provided by COUNTY that it lacks sufficient funds, as determined by COUNTY in its sole discretion, to continue to perform under this Agreement.

Upon completion of improvements or upon termination of this Agreement, any unexpended balances shall remain with COUNTY.

- 7. **Effect of Termination**. The expiration or termination of this Agreement, for any reason, shall not release SUBRECIPIENT from any obligation or liability to COUNTY, or any requirement or obligation that:
 - a. Has already accrued hereunder;
 - b. Comes into effect due to the expiration or termination of the Agreement; or
 - c. Otherwise survives the expiration or termination of this Agreement.

Following the termination of this Agreement, SUBRECIPIENT shall promptly identify all unexpended funds and return all unexpended funds to COUNTY. Unexpended funds are those funds received by SUBRECIPIENT under this Agreement that (i) have not been spent or expended in accordance with the terms of this Agreement; and (ii) are not required to pay allowable costs or expenses that will become due and payable as a result of the termination of this Agreement.

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- 8. **Funds Available and Authorized.** COUNTY certifies that it has received an award sufficient to fund this Agreement. SUBRECIPIENT understands and agrees that payment of amounts under this Agreement is contingent on COUNTY receiving appropriations or other expenditure authority sufficient to allow COUNTY, in the exercise of its sole administrative discretion, to continue to make payments under this Agreement.
- 9. **Future Support.** COUNTY makes no commitment of future support and assumes no obligation for future support for the activity contracted herein except as set forth in Section 8.

10. Federal and State Procurement Standards

- a) All procurement transactions, whether negotiated or competitively bid and without regard to dollar value, shall be conducted in a manner so as to provide maximum open and free competition. All sole-source procurements must receive prior written approval from COUNTY in addition to any other approvals required by law applicable to SUBRECIPIENT. Justification for sole-source procurement should include a description of the project and what is being contracted for, an explanation of why it is necessary to contract noncompetitively, time constraints and any other pertinent information. Interagency agreements between units of government are excluded from this provision.
- b) COUNTY's performance under the Agreement is conditioned upon SUBRECIPIENT's compliance with, and SUBRECIPIENT shall comply with, the obligations applicable to public contracts under the Oregon Public Contracting Code and applicable Local Contract Review Board rules, which are incorporated by reference herein.
- c) SUBRECIPIENT must maintain written standards of conduct covering conflicts of interest and governing the performance of its employees engaged in the selection, award and administration of contracts. If SUBRECIPIENT has a parent, affiliate, or subsidiary organization that is not a state, local government, or Indian tribe, SUBRECIPIENT must also maintain written standards of conduct covering organizational conflicts of interest. SUBRECIPIENT shall be alert to organizational conflicts of interest or non-competitive practices among contractors that may restrict or eliminate competition or otherwise restrain trade. Contractors that develop or draft specifications, requirements, statements of work, and/or Requests for Proposals ("RFP") for a proposal to compete for the award of such procurement. Any request for exemption must be submitted in writing to COUNTY.
- a) Contracting with Small and Minority Businesses, Women's Business Enterprises, and Labor Surplus Area Firms. SUBRECIPIENT shall take all necessary affirmative steps to assure that small & minority businesses, women's business enterprises, and labor surplus area firms are used when possible when contracting for services or soliciting for potential resources, per 2 CFR 200.321.

11. General Agreement Provisions.

- a) **Non-appropriation Clause.** If payment for activities and programs under this Agreement extends into COUNTY's next fiscal year, COUNTY's obligation to pay for such work is subject to approval of future appropriations to fund the Agreement by the Board of County Commissioners.
- b) Indemnification. SUBRECIPIENT agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold COUNTY, and its elected officials, officers, employees, and agents, harmless with respect to any claim, cause, damage, action, penalty or other cost (including attorney's and expert fees) arising from or related to (1) SUBRECIPIENT's negligent or willful acts or those of its employees, agents, or those under SUBRECIPIENT's control; or (2) SUBRECIPIENT's acts or omissions in performing under this Agreement including, but not limited to, any claim by State or Federal funding sources that SUBRECIPIENT used funds for an ineligible purpose. SUBRECIPIENT is responsible for the actions of its own agents and employees, and COUNTY assumes no liability or responsibility with

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respect to SUBRECIPIENT's actions, employees, agents or otherwise with respect to those under its control.

- c) **Assignment.** This Agreement may not be assigned in whole or in part without the prior express written approval of COUNTY.
- d) Independent Status. SUBRECIPIENT is independent of COUNTY and will be responsible for any federal, state, or local taxes and fees applicable to payments hereunder. SUBRECIPIENT is not an agent of COUNTY and undertakes this work independent from the control and direction of COUNTY excepting as set forth herein. SUBRECIPIENT shall not seek or have the power to bind COUNTY in any transaction or activity.
- e) Notices. Any notice provided for under this Agreement shall be effective if in writing and (1) delivered personally to the addressee or deposited in the United States mail, postage paid, certified mail, return receipt requested, (2) sent by overnight or commercial air courier (such as Federal Express), (3) sent by electronic mail with confirming record of delivery confirmation through electronic mail return-receipt, or by confirmation that the electronic mail was accessed, downloaded, or printed. Notice will be deemed to have been adequately given three days following the date of mailing, or immediately if personally served. For service by facsimile or by electronic mail, service will be deemed effective at the beginning of the next working day.
- f) Governing Law. This Agreement is made in the State of Oregon and shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of that state without giving effect to the conflict of law provisions thereof. Any litigation between COUNTY and SUBRECIPIENT arising under this Agreement or out of work performed under this Agreement shall occur, if in the state courts, in the Clackamas County court having jurisdiction thereof, and if in the federal courts, in the United States District Court for the State of Oregon.
- g) **Severability**. If any provision of this Agreement is found to be illegal or unenforceable, this Agreement nevertheless shall remain in full force and effect and the provision shall be stricken.
- h) **Counterparts.** This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, all of which together will constitute one and the same Agreement. Facsimile copy or electronic signatures shall be valid as original signatures.
- i) **Third Party Beneficiaries**. Except as expressly provided in this Agreement, there are no third party beneficiaries to this Agreement. The terms and conditions of this Agreement may only be enforced by the parties.
- j) **Binding Effect.** This Agreement shall be binding on all parties hereto, their heirs, administrators, executors, successors and assigns.
- k) **Integration**. This Agreement contains the entire Agreement between COUNTY and SUBRECIPIENT and supersedes all prior written or oral discussions or Agreements.
- No Attorney Fees. In the event any arbitration, action or proceeding, including any bankruptcy proceeding, is instituted to enforce any term of this Agreement, each party shall be responsible for its own attorneys' fees and expenses.
- m) **Debt Limitation**. This Agreement is expressly subject to the limitations of the Oregon Constitution and Oregon Tort Claims Act and is contingent upon appropriation of funds. Any provisions herein that conflict with the above referenced laws are deemed inoperative to that extent.

Program Objectives

Children of Incarcerated Parents (CIP) aims to meet the complex needs of these children though mentorship, the development of positive social norms, working collaboratively to provide resources and advocacy to youth and families, and to bring awareness and education to communities.

COUNTY has determined children of incarcerated parents in Clackamas County are a class of individuals who have been disproportionately affected by the pandemic and its after-effects. COUNTY has determined these children have:

- Experienced effects of increased domestic violence in the home.
- Decrease in school engagement and attention/completion rates due to remote learning.
- Increase in mental illness (e.g., anxiety, depression) as well as suicide ideation.
- Increase in substance use.
- Fewer chances for social interaction with subsequent decrease in future opportunities.

Therefore, all children of incarcerated parents served by this Program are eligible to receive services under the State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds ("SLFRF") Final Rule issued by the United States Treasury (as amended).

Performance Standards

- SUBRECIPIENT will be solely responsible for determining that each youth served is a child of one or more incarcerated parent(s) and shall maintain documentation to this effect.
- A minimum of 25 unduplicated core youth will be referred by school, PreventNet, homeless liaisons and other community partners will be met with a minimum of 6 times per quarter.
- A minimum of 14 core youth will be matched with a mentor to provide individual support services, included, but not limited to tutoring, transportation, assistance with applications for college, etc.
- Will provide a minimum of two *Big Challenges* support groups to elementary school youth a total of 16 youth. Big Challenges is an 8-week support group geared toward children with an incarcerated family member with a focus on providing comfort and teaching coping strategies.

- b) **County's Default**. COUNTY will be in default under this Agreement if, after thirty (30) days' notice and opportunity to cure, COUNTY fails to perform a material obligation under this Agreement provided, however, that failure to disburse grant funds due to lack of appropriation shall not constitute a default of COUNTY.

4. Remedies

a) **County's Remedies.** In the event of SUBRECIPIENT's default, COUNTY may, at is option, pursue any or all remedies available to it under this Agreement, at law, or in equity including, but not limited to: (1) withholding SUBRECIPIENT grant funds until compliance is met; (2) reclaiming

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grant funds in the case of omissions or misrepresentations in financial or programmatic reporting; (3) requiring repayment of any funds used by SUBRECIPIENT in violation of this Agreement; (4) termination of this Agreement; (5) declaring SUBRECIPIENT ineligible for receipt of future awards from COUNTY; (6) initiation of an action or proceeding for damages, declaratory, or injunctive relief.

b) Subrecipient's Remedies: In the event COUNTY is in default, and whether or not SUBRECIPIENT elects to terminate this Agreement, SUBRECIPIENT's sole remedy for COUNTY's default, subject to the limits of applicable law or in this Agreement, is reimbursement for eligible costs incurred in accordance with this Agreement, less any claims COUNTY may have against SUBRECIPIENT. In no event will COUNTY be liable to SUBRECIPIENT for expenses related to termination of this Agreement or for any indirect, incidental, consequential or special damages.

- b) Rights to Inventions Made Under a Contract or Agreement. As part of the Commercial General Liability policy, SUBRECIPIENT shall obtain Abuse and Molestation coverage in a form and with coverage satisfactory to COUNTY covering damages arising out of actual or threatened physical abuse, mental injury, sexual molestation, negligent hiring, employment, supervision, investigation, reporting to proper authorities, and retention of any person for whom SUBRECIPIENT is responsible including but not limited to SUBRECIPIENT and SUBRECIPIENT's employees and volunteers. Policy endorsement's definition of an insured shall

include SUBRECIPIENT, and SUBRECIPENT's employees and volunteer. Coverage shall be written on an occurrence basis in an amount of not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence. Any annual aggregate limit shall not be less than \$3,000,000.

- 6) Additional Insured Provisions. All required insurance, other than Professional Liability, Workers' Compensation, and Personal Automobile Liability and Pollution Liability Insurance, shall include "Clackamas County, its agents, elected officials, officers, and employees".
- 7) **Notice of Cancellation.** There shall be no cancellation, material change, exhaustion of aggregate limits or intent not to renew insurance coverage without 60 days written notice to COUNTY. Any failure to comply with this provision will not affect the insurance coverage provided to COUNTY. The 60 days' notice of cancellation provision shall be physically endorsed on to the policy.
- 8) Insurance Carrier Rating. Coverage provided by SUBRECIPIENT must be underwritten by an insurance company deemed acceptable by COUNTY. Insurance coverage shall be provided by companies admitted to do business in Oregon or, in the alternative, rated A- or better by Best's Insurance Rating. COUNTY reserves the right to reject all or any insurance carrier(s) with an unacceptable financial rating.
- 9) Certificates of Insurance. As evidence of the insurance coverage required by this Agreement, SUBRECIPIENT shall furnish a Certificate of Insurance to COUNTY. The COUNTY and its elected officials, employees and officers must be named as an additional insured on the Certificate of Insurance. No Agreement shall be in effect until the required certificates have been received, approved, and accepted by COUNTY. A renewal certificate will be sent to COUNTY 10 days prior to coverage expiration.
- 10) **Primary Coverage Clarification**. SUBRECIPIENT coverage will be primary in the event of a loss and will not seek contribution from any insurance or self-insurance maintained by, or provided to, the additional insureds listed above.
- 11) **Cross-Liability Clause**. A cross-liability clause or separation of insured's condition will be included in all general liability, professional liability, and errors and omissions policies required by the Agreement.
- 12) **Waiver of Subrogation**. SUBRECIPIENT agrees to waive their rights of subrogation arising from the work performed under this Agreement.

- 6. Pursuant to Executive Order 13513, 74 FR 51225 (October 6, 2009), SUBRECIPIENT is encouraged to adopt and enforce policies that ban text messaging while driving.
