Metro is planning to build a new, state-of-the-art facility to complement and expand the garbage and recycling services currently offered at the Metro South Transfer Station in Oregon City.

Increasing population means more demand on our garbage and recycling system, including the aging Metro South Transfer Station. This existing facility, which is operating beyond its capacity, handles garbage from large commercial trucks, individual households, small businesses, as well as recycling and household hazardous waste. This results in:

- · Long lines and extensive waiting periods for customers
- Delays at peak periods, leading to off-site traffic congestion
- Unsafe conditions because of too many competing uses in a limited space
- Low rates of recycling and recovery due to space constraints

To meet our region's growing needs and as part of a strategy to provide excellent and accessible services to the public that protect the environment and human health, Metro is working to locate and build a new facility in the south part of the region. The preferred site and services to be moved is expected to be determined by Metro Council in late 2020, after extensive engagement with customers, local residents, businesses, government partners and community leaders.

A multi-use facility, it will also provide people with education about reducing their environmental impact, create family-wage jobs and provide community amenities.



Over 285,000 customers visited Metro South in 2018



Average of 750 customers visit Metro South a day



16% increase in customers over past 10 years

REGIONAL MODEL

The new facility will be designed with many features of modern, state-of-the-art facilities in the Pacific Northwest, including the Factoria Recycling and Transfer Station in Bellevue, Washington. While meeting current design standards and increasing facility capacity and efficiency, the Factoria facility incorporates a number of sustainable design features:

- An enclosed building for the collection of garbage and recycling minimizes noise, dust and odors
- Solar skylights and translucent wall panels that reduce energy demand
- Rainwater harvesting technology that saves 1.3 million gallons of water annually
- A household hazardous waste building with advanced environmental protection features



REGIONAL MODEL

Fostering economic well-being and providing excellent and equitable services to the Metro region

Building a new facility to improve garbage and recycling services for the public aligns with the vision of Metro's 2030 Regional Waste Plan —to make "reduce, reuse, recycle, repair, donate" mainstream practices accessible to all. It will create good jobs, will be a safe place for workers and the public and will provide services and programming based on the needs of area residents and a growing region.



The facility will specialize in meeting the needs of residents and small businesses, eliminating long lines, waiting periods and traffic congestion.



On-site programming will provide community members with more options for recovering materials from the waste stream, reuse and recycling.



Customers will be able to safely dispose of household hazardous waste materials such as paint, batteries, cleaners, and chemicals.



The new state-of-the-art center will adhere to green building standards that manage noise, dust and odors.



Following the example of innovative facilities around the country, the facility could incorporate public art on-site.



The community will be engaged in the design and programming of the facility so that its features will provide the greatest community benefits. These could include community gathering places, a reuse store, a playground, or bicycle and pedestrian pathways.

SUBJECT: Overview of the Metro 2020-21 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP

At the April 16th JPACT meeting, the 20-21 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) will be discussed. The Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) is developed annually by Metro as the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) for the Portland Metropolitan Area. It is a federally-required document that serves as a guide for transportation planning activities to be conducted over the course of each fiscal year, beginning July 1.

The UPWP is developed by Metro with input from local governments, TriMet, ODOT, the Port of Portland, FHWA, and FTA. Included in the UPWP are detailed descriptions of the transportation planning tasks, listings of various activities, and a summary of the amount and source of state and federal funds to be used for planning activities.

Included in your packet is the short PowerPoint given at TPAC that describes the UPWP. The full document will be available in the JPACT packet.

What is the UPWP

- Annual federally-required document that ensures efficient use of federal planning funds
- Describes:
 - Transportation planning tasks
 - Relationship to other planning activities in the region
 - Budget summaries

What the UPWP isn't

- Not a regional policy making document
- Not a funding decision document, does not allocate funds
- No construction, design, or preliminary engineering
- Only includes transportation planning projects, federal funds, coming fiscal year

What are we asking you to do?

Recommend that JPACT adopts Resolution 20-5086
 which includes the 2020-21 UPWP (Exhibit A) and
 self-certification findings that demonstrate that
 Metro meets federal planning regulations (Exhibit B).

Overview

Following is a brief summary of the April 3, 2020 TPAC Meeting. The TPAC packet, as well as the full TPAC Work Program can be found here.

March Fatal Crash Briefing

- Within the three counties, 133 people were killed in traffic crashes in 2019, 117 were killed in 2018, 110 were killed in 2017 and 129 were killed in 2016. To date this year, there have been 24 traffic fatalities in the Metro region, of which 11 occurred in January and 8 in February, and 5 so far in March. Neighbors lost in the last month include:
 - Lulia, age 39, Multnomah County, killed while walking, 3/17/20
 - o Andrew, age 35, Washington County, killed in single vehicle crash, 3/5/20
 - Tina, age 52, Multnomah County, killed in single vehicle crash, 3/4/20
 - Joyce Ann, age 61, Clackamas County, killed while driving, 3/2/20
 - Reginald, age 36, Washington County, killed while riding a motorcycle, 3/1/20



Local Focus: In March 2020 Oregon began to seriously feel the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic, by mid-March businesses had closed, many people were working from home and the traffic was reduced 30% nationally¹.

Technical Recommendations to JPACT

TPAC recommended the following items be moved to JPACT:

Metropolitan Transportation Improvement Program (MTIP) Formal Amendment 20-5094
 Adding new or amending existing projects to the 2018-21 Metropolitan Transportation Improvement
 Program which involves project changes to five projects impacting Gresham, ODOT, and TriMet. (AP20-11-APR)

The amendments include:

- Gresham's NW Division Street adds additional funding, bringing the project to full funding and advances project to start Preliminary Engineering.
- ODOT is transferring \$150K from the Roadways Safety Audit Implementation project grouping bucket to their Region 1 Bike Pedestrian Crossing safety project.
 - Project Grouping Buckets: Projects exempt from air quality analysis will be in MTIP as one project, grouped with other similar type projects.
- TriMet has determined that work will not commence until Fall 2020 on the Red Line Extension Project, so the funding in the 2018-2021 MTIP is proposed to be cancelled. Project funding is included in the 2021-2024 MTIP draft.
- TriMet has received a grant to develop a mobility payment system, this adds that project and funding to the MTIP.

2020-2021 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) Resolution 20-5086

For the purpose of Adopting the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 Unified Planning Work Program

- The UPWP is developed annually by Metro as the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) for the Portland Metropolitan Area. It is a federally-required document that serves as a guide for transportation <u>planning</u> activities to be conducted over the course of each fiscal year, beginning on July 1st.²
- O JPACT will review the Revised UPWP at its April 16 meeting and will be asked to take action on May 21. The Metro Council is scheduled to take final action May 21. Staff will transmit the adopted UPWP to Federal & State partners on May 22. This allows time for the IGA to be signed by Metro COO's by June 30, allowing for federal funding to continue flowing to the region without delay.
