EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: For fiscal year 2023, the Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) annual application amount is \$193,644. HUD provides Clackamas County annual allocations of these federal block grant funds to benefit low-income neighborhoods and low-income persons throughout the county. The annual Emergency Solutions Grant provides funds for homeless shelter services, rent assistance, Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) data collection, and grant administration in Clackamas County.

A list of ESG project Funding Recommendations is included in the 2023 Action Plan.

A Public Hearing requesting public testimony was held at the BCC on April 13, 2023, for anyone wishing to comment on the plan for these funds. The Draft Action Plan, including proposed ESG-funded projects, was posted on our county webpage at <u>https://www.clackamas.us/communitydevelopment</u> from March 16 to Monday, April 17, 2023, for public viewing and comments.

RECOMMENDATION: Staff recommends that the Board of County Commissioners take the following actions:

1) Place approval of the 2023 ESG Grant Application on the Board of County Commissioners' consent agenda for approval at the May 4, 2023, meeting.

Emergency Solutions Grants Certifications

The Emergency Solutions Grants Program recipient certifies that:

Major rehabilitation/conversion/renovation – If an emergency shelter's rehabilitation costs exceed 75 percent of the value of the building before rehabilitation, the recipient will maintain the building as a shelter for homeless individuals and families for a minimum of 10 years after the date the building is first occupied by a homeless individual or family after the completed rehabilitation.

If the cost to convert a building into an emergency shelter exceeds 75 percent of the value of the building after conversion, the recipient will maintain the building as a shelter for homeless individuals and families for a minimum of 10 years after the date the building is first occupied by a homeless individual or family after the completed conversion.

In all other cases where ESG funds are used for renovation, the recipient will maintain the building as a shelter for homeless individuals and families for a minimum of 3 years after the date the building is first occupied by a homeless individual or family after the completed renovation.

Essential Services and Operating Costs – In the case of assistance involving shelter operations or essential services related to street outreach or emergency shelter, the recipient will provide services or shelter to homeless individuals and families for the period during which the ESG assistance is provided, without regard to a particular site or structure, so long the recipient serves the same type of persons (e.g., families with children, unaccompanied youth, disabled individuals, or victims of domestic violence) or persons in the same geographic area.

Renovation – Any renovation carried out with ESG assistance shall be sufficient to ensure that the building involved is safe and sanitary.

Supportive Services – The recipient will assist homeless individuals in obtaining permanent housing, appropriate supportive services (including medical and mental health treatment, victim services, counseling, supervision, and other services essential for achieving independent living), and other Federal State, local, and private assistance available for these individuals.

Matching Funds – The recipient will obtain matching amounts required under 24 CFR 576.201.

Confidentiality – The recipient has established and is implementing procedures to ensure the confidentiality of records pertaining to any individual provided family violence prevention or treatment services under any project assisted under the ESG program, including protection against the release of the address or location of any family violence shelter project, except with the written authorization of the person responsible for the operation of that shelter.

Homeless Persons Involvement – To the maximum extent practicable, the recipient will involve, through employment, volunteer services, or otherwise, homeless individuals and families in constructing, renovating, maintaining, and operating facilities assisted under the ESG program, in providing services assisted under the ESG program, and in providing services for occupants of facilities assisted under the program.

Consolidated Plan – All activities the recipient undertakes with assistance under ESG are consistent with its consolidated plan.

Discharge Policy – The recipient will establish and implement, to the maximum extent practicable and where appropriate, policies and protocols for the discharge of persons from publicly funded institutions or systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care or other youth facilities, or correction programs and institutions) in order to prevent this discharge from immediately resulting in homelessness for these persons.

HUD AWARDS \$60.9 MILLION IN OREGON FOR ANNUAL AFFORDABLE HOUSING, COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT, AND HOMELESS ASSISTANCE GRANTS

Nationally, funding will go to 1,200 communities through 2,400 grants to support the needs of families and individuals

PORTLAND – The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) today announced \$5.6 billion in funding will go to 1,200 communities through more than 2,400 grants to States, urban counties, insular areas, DC, Puerto Rico, and local organizations across the country, **including \$60,918,202 to recipients in Oregon**. These annual formula grants provide critical funding for a wide range of activities including affordable housing, community development, and homeless assistance. "Viable communities must promote integrated approaches to develop decent housing, suitable

living environments, and expand economic opportunities to the most vulnerable," said **HUD Secretary Marcia L. Fudge**. "These funds allow communities to address their unique needs by prioritizing what matters most to their residents and letting them own their investments in community development through these important federal resources."

"This funding allows communities to address their most pressing local needs, providing flexible resources to build homes, support renters and homeowners, provide life-saving assistance to people experiencing homelessness, and improve public facilities, community resilience, and local economies," said **Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary for Community Planning and Development Marion McFadden**. "HUD's annual formula block grants allow states and localities to invest in the success of neighborhoods and allow people of modest means to thrive."

"Our partners across the Northwest continue to show up and do the good work of building homes and strengthening our communities," said **HUD Northwest Regional Administrator Margaret Salazar.** "Today's funding announcement will help them continue that work and make our communities strong, resilient, and vibrant places to call home."

The grants announced today are provided through the following HUD programs:

- \$3.3 billion to 1239 states and localities to build stronger communities, including \$34,753,244 in Oregon The Community Development Block Grants (CDBG) provides annual grants on a formula basis to states, cities, counties, and insular areas to develop stronger, more resilient communities by providing decent housing and a suitable living environment, and by expanding economic opportunities, principally for low- and moderate-income people. In 2022 the program helped over 60,000 families through housing activities, 46,000 individuals through job creation or retention, 83,500 people experiencing homelessness through improvements to homelessness facilities, over 5.3 million people through public services, and over 39 million people through public improvements.
- \$1.5 billion to 664 participating jurisdictions to produce affordable housing, including \$20,260,511 in Oregon — The HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME) is the primary Federal tool of States and local governments to produce affordable rental and owner-occupied housing for low-income families. HOME funds a wide range of activities including building, buying, and/or rehabilitating affordable housing for rent or homeownership or providing direct rental assistance to low-income people. HOME projects leverage non-federal funds including, in many cases, tax credits for affordable rental housing. In 2022 the program helped create over 15,000 units of housing and nearly 17,000 households were assisted with tenant based rental assistance through the HOME program.
- \$499 million to 130 qualifying cities and eligible states to connect people with HIV/AIDS to housing and support, including \$2,851,520 in Oregon The Housing Opportunities for Persons With HIV/AIDS (HOPWA) program provides stable and permanent housing assistance and supportive services to low-income people living with Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV). Over 100,000 households receive HOPWA housing assistance and/or supportive services annually.

PORTLAND – The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) today announced \$5.6 billion in funding will go to 1,200 communities through more than 2,400 grants to States, urban counties, insular areas, DC, Puerto Rico, and local organizations across the country, **including \$60,918,202 to recipients in Oregon**. These annual formula grants provide critical funding for a wide range of activities including affordable housing, community development, and homeless assistance. "Viable communities must promote integrated approaches to develop decent housing, suitable

living environments, and expand economic opportunities to the most vulnerable," said **HUD Secretary Marcia L. Fudge**. "These funds allow communities to address their unique needs by prioritizing what matters most to their residents and letting them own their investments in community development through these important federal resources."

"This funding allows communities to address their most pressing local needs, providing flexible resources to build homes, support renters and homeowners, provide life-saving assistance to people experiencing homelessness, and improve public facilities, community resilience, and local economies," said **Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary for Community Planning and Development Marion McFadden**. "HUD's annual formula block grants allow states and localities to invest in the success of neighborhoods and allow people of modest means to thrive."

"Our partners across the Northwest continue to show up and do the good work of building homes and strengthening our communities," said **HUD Northwest Regional Administrator Margaret Salazar.** "Today's funding announcement will help them continue that work and make our communities strong, resilient, and vibrant places to call home."
