

Your voted ballot must be received at an official ballot drop site or at the Elections Office, 1710 Red Soils Ct., Ste. 100, in Oregon City by 8:00 p.m. on election night in order to be tallied. Remember, the postmark on a mailed ballot does NOT count.

Official ballot drop sites are listed on the front of this pamphlet. Indoor drop boxes will be available during regular business hours (and outdoor drop boxes are available 24 hours a day) beginning Wednesday, February 21 until 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday, March 13, 2018.

Ballots will be delivered to households between Wednesday, February 21 and Tuesday, February 27. Please contact us if you have not received a ballot by February 27.

If a ballot was sent to someone who has passed away, please write "DECEASED" on the envelope and place it back in your mailbox.

VOTER INFORMATION

YOU MAY REGISTER TO VOTE IF:

- 1. You are a resident of Oregon;
- 2. You are at least 16 years of age (though you will not receive a ballot until an election occurs on or after your 18th birthday), and
- 3. You are a United States citizen.

YOU MUST UPDATE YOUR REGISTRATION IF:

- 1. Your residence or mailing address changes;
- 2. Your name changes, or
- You wish to change political affiliation.

To be eligible to vote, you must be registered by the end of the 21st day before an election (February 20, 2018).

If you make a mistake or damage your ballot in any way and need a replacement, or if you have questions on registration or updating your registration, contact the Elections Division by calling **503.655.8510**.


If a ballot was delivered to your residence for someone who should no longer be receiving ballots at that address, please write "RETURN" on the unopened envelope and put it back in your mailbox.

CAPTION: ANNEXATION OF CITY OF NEWBERG TERRITORY BY TVF&R

QUESTION: Shall Tualatin Valley Fire and Rescue annex the City of Newberg territory to provide fire, emergency medical, and ambulance services?

SUMMARY: In 2016, the City of Newberg signed a two-year contract with Tualatin Valley Fire and Rescue District (TVF&R) to provide fire protection, advanced emergency medical, and ambulance services. During the contract, elected leaders of TVF&R and Newberg evaluated the feasibility and cost-benefit of annexation. In June 2017, the Newberg City Council approved annexation to TVF&R, subject to voter approval. Voters residing within the City of Newberg voted on the question of annexation to TVF&R in Yamhill County measure 36-190. The outcome of that November 8, 2017, election was 69.32% in favor of annexation.

This measure seeks approval of the annexation from voters residing in TVF&R's existing service area. Once annexed, the City of Newberg residents will pay the same tax rate as existing TVF&R patrons. They will also become eligible to vote for TVF&R directors and on any future TVF&R property tax proposals. This measure will not increase taxes paid by existing TVF&R patrons.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

Approval of this measure would annex all the territory within the City of Newberg into Tualatin Valley Fire and Rescue. Annexation was proposed by the elected bodies of TVF&R and the City of Newberg. Voters residing within the City of Newberg voted on the question of annexation to TVF&R in Yamhill County Measure 36-190. The outcome of that November 8, 2017 election was 69.32% in favor of annexation.

If TVF&R voters also approve annexation of the City of Newberg territory, the City of Newberg residents will pay the same tax rate as current TVF&R residents beginning July 1, 2018. They will also become eligible to vote for TVF&R directors and on any future TVF&R property tax proposals. TVF&R's combined tax rate is \$2.0799, which includes a permanent tax rate of \$1.5252 per \$1000 of assessed valuation, a local option levy of \$0.45 (expiring in 2020), and a bond levy of \$0.1047.

Approval of this measure will not increase taxes for existing TVF&R residents and could possibly decrease the rate paid on bonded debt. TVF&R will also receive all fire and emergency response assets such as fire stations, equipment, and apparatus, from the City of Newberg.

TVF&R's history is based on similar voluntary and mutually beneficial annexations. TVF&R took shape between 1972 and 2016, as a number of city fire departments and rural districts consolidated to share limited resources and save money. TVF&R achieves cost savings through economies of scale such as buying trucks and equipment in bulk, reducing administrative overhead, and leveraging a system of response to strategically locate stations, resources, and personnel.

A "yes" vote approves annexation. A "no" vote rejects annexation.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR

For more than 30 years, I've worked as a physician in the field of emergency medicine. I support Measures 34-280 and 34-281.

As an EMS medical director, I'm particularly passionate about saving lives. I know that competent care at the scene of emergencies has a huge impact on outcomes. I've focused much of my career educating and supervising our first responders so their protocols and training are based on the best available evidence.

When individuals experience heart attacks, strokes, sudden cardiac arrest, or a severe traumatic injury, the treatment they receive in the first minutes is vital. TVF&R firefighters respond to thousands of medical emergencies every year. In the case of cardiac arrest, TVF&R has made great strides in improving patient survival rates which have tripled since 1998. I believe their performance during cardiovascular emergencies is largely due to strong leadership supported by a dedicated workforce of firefighters and paramedics; use of data to make decisions about where and how they locate resources; organizational focus on quality and safety and a commitment to ongoing training

TVF&R's current system exists because of annexations and mergers. If TVF&R expands into Newberg and the surrounding rural area, I'm confident that their service to residents in Beaverton, Tigard, Tualatin, North Plains, Aloha, West Linn, Wilsonville, Rivergrove, Durham, King City and Sherwood will not sustain any negative impacts. On the contrary, regionalization of emergency medical services has always helped improve the quality of care through the adoption of novel approaches and ideas that such mergers provide.

CAPTION: ANNEXATION OF NEWBERG RURAL FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT TERRITORY BY TVF&R

QUESTION: Shall TVF&R annex all territory within Newberg Rural Fire Protection District (Newberg Rural) upon Newberg Rural's dissolution?

SUMMARY: Since July 1, 2016, Tualatin Valley Fire and Re.scue District (TVF&R) has provided fire protection, emergency medical, and ambulance transport services to Newberg Rural Fire Protection District (Newberg Rural) under contract. In July 2017, Newberg Rural's board of directors decided that dissolution of the Newberg Rural Fire Protection District and annexation to TVF&R would provide the most stable solution for long-term service to the area. Voters residing within the Newberg Rural territory voted on the questions of dissolution of their district and annexation to TVF&R in Yamhill County measures 36-187 and 36-188, respectively, on November 8, 2017. The outcome was 62.28% in favor of dissolution and 62.99% in favor of annexation to TVF&R. This measure seeks approval of the annexation from voters residing in TVF&R's existing service area.

Once annexed, Newberg Rural's residents will pay the same tax rate as existing TVF&R patrons. They will also become eligible to vote for TVF&R directors and on any future TVF&R property tax proposals. This measure will not increase taxes paid by existing TVF&R patrons.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

Approval of this measure would annex all the territory within Newberg Rural Fire Protection District (Newberg Rural) by Tualatin Valley Fire and Rescue.

For decades, Newberg Rural had an agreement with the City of Newberg for the provision of fire and emergency medical services. The City of Newberg approached TVF&R for contract services in 2016 due to funding limitations that made it difficult to sustain adequate staffing, maintain equipment, and comply with national standards given increased service demands. When the City of Newberg began contracting with TVF&R, services were extended to Newberg Rural to honor the historic arrangement.

After hiring an independent consultant to research options for Newberg Rural's future, the Newberg Rural board of directors decided that dissolution of the district and annexation to TVF&R would provide the most stable solution for long-term service to the area. Voters residing within the Newberg Rural territory voted on the questions of dissolution of their district and annexation to TVF&R in Yamhill County measures 36-187 and 36-188, respectively, on November 8, 2017. The outcome of that election was 62.28% in favor of dissolution and 62.99% in favor of annexation to TVF&R.

If TVF&R voters also approve annexation of the territory within Newberg Rural, Newberg Rural residents will pay the same rate as current TVF&R residents beginning July 1, 2018.
