Public Health Updates: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • PH Budget • Director Recruitment • Board of Health future meetings/agendas • PH Week Update • Vaccine Hesitancy | <p><u>PH Budget</u>: The 2019-2020 budget is proceeding as expected with no reductions. The budgeting cycle will be completed by mid-June. The 2020-2021 budget is expected to have the same level of funding.</p> <p><u>Board of Health</u>: Public Health will provide an update to the BOH on July 11. The topics presented will include: Transportation Safety Plan, Blueprint Grants update. PHAC members were invited to attend beginning at 10:00.</p> <p><u>Public Health Week</u>: TEDMED has chosen to move the event to the March/April which will coincide with PH Week 2020. Ideas for topics included Climate Change and Chronic Illness.</p> <p><u>Vaccine Hesitancy</u>: Health Share will launch a vaccine hesitancy campaign in July/August. Part-time temp staff has been hired to focus on the three counties.</p> |
| 3. Legislative Update | Additional funding for modernization support was in the Governor’s budget. If funding is allocated it will go to counties through an OHA funding formula. Previous modernization funding went to strengthen the county’s Infectious Disease program area. |
| 4. Tobacco Retail License Update | County Administration has instructed PH to convene a TRL Task Force that will make recommendations to the BCC on the TRL proposal and administrative rules. The task group will meet in June and July and if the fee is passed the task group will reconvene through early 2020 to work on administrative rules. |
| 5. Health Share Update | An update by Health Share staff was provided that shared information on its updated Community Health Plan. The Health Share CHP was then compared with the three metro counties through cross-walk analysis. |
