V. Blueprint Community Grant Presentations a. LoveOne b. Familias en Accion	<p>a. LoveOne</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Started as laundry service in 2012 and quickly realized that along with the basic needs of clean clothes, hygiene was important and therefore, started offering hygiene supplies. • Now have they 5 laundry events a month in Clackamas County and a new laundry mat in Oregon City. • When COVID hit, started seeing infections and infestations like never before at events and that brought up the need for access to soap and water to wash. • Was connected to the USDA Farm to Table food box program and had multiple distribution sites throughout Clackamas County. • Recently signed own contract with Oregon Food Bank, to be able to access food directly through them.

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	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Carol and volunteers show up every single Thursday at the Redland Grange. • Have partnered with law enforcement, local municipal courts, and also businesses and those housed • Have a contract with the county for outreach and housing and at about 40 people since contract started in October. • Have trash extravaganzas, who go out and clean up uninhabited camps and/or trash around campsites with items that have been identified as trash. Working closely with the sheriff's department law enforcement • Collaborated with a lot of community organizations. • Public health onsite offering immunizations and access to other resources <p>b. Familias en Accion</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Located in Portland and founded in 1998 to provide culturally specific services to promote health in the Latinx communities in Oregon. • 4 primary service areas: Community health work, Climate Health Equity, Nutrition and Food Equity, HIV, STI, & Sexual Health • Have an annual Latino Health Equity Conference held June every year. • Recently approved to do a new phase of work in certifying community health workers for the State of Oregon. • The funding that was received supports 30 food boxes, but have a contract with Lomita • Want to identify at least one distribution site in each Health Equity (HE) Zone • Create and disseminate educational materials with each food box distribution • Provides health education classes • Facilitated 3 chronic disease self-management classes. • Delivered food boxes from May-November 2022 that reached 734 household members and 151 households • Delivered additional food boxes from Clay Street Table, Hygiene Kits, Diapers, etc. • Conducted a Social Media post in Familias Social Media • Communicate with community members before the day of delivery

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	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Provided a post survey after the end of the CSA (Community Supported Agriculture) season to get demographics information • Provided more than 700 CSA shares, which contain fresh veggies • The main priority is to provide service where families generally identify as low-income immigrants and Spanish speakers, Latinx population who were impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. • Increased access to healthy & culturally preferred food • Supported Latinx farm/farmworker • Increased availability of chronic disease prevention education for Latinx community members in Spanish • Utilized feedback/input from community members for distribution strategy, health education materials, etc. • Shared educational materials in Spanish • Lessons learned: Be flexible with unforeseen circumstances

Have given away 500 items so far. c. COVID After Action Report <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Finalized after action COVID report and working on prioritizing the recommendations (over 250) from report. • An executive summary of the after action report will be translated into 3 different languages • The federal emergency for COVID will be ending in May • Anticipating a much more simple vaccine schedule for COVID vaccines. • Still have a fair number of hospitalizations • Fatality rate for COVID has declined vastly. • COVID vaccine services ending June. • Masking requirements/needs are changing d.
