Dear Clackamas County Voter:

This Voters' Pamphlet contains information designed to assist you in voting: candidates' statements, ballot titles, explanatory statements and arguments pertaining to local district races and measures that appear on the May 17, 2011 Special District Election ballot in Clackamas County. Please remember, in order to vote on certain measures or contests, you must be a resident of the city or special district that has placed the measure or position on the ballot.

You will not vote on everything that appears in this pamphlet, only those candidates or measures that appear on the Official Ballot contained in your Vote-By-Mail packet.

Your voted ballot must be received in the Elections Office, 1710 Red Soils Ct., Ste. 100, Oregon City, OR 97045 by 8:00 p.m. on election night in order to be counted. Remember, the postmark does NOT count!

If you prefer, instead of mailing your ballot, you may take it to one of the ballot drop sites listed on Page 99 of this pamphlet. Indoor drop boxes will be available during regular business hours (and outdoor drop boxes are available 24 hours a day) beginning April 29 and extending until 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday, May 17, 2011.

If a ballot was delivered to your residence for someone who should no longer be receiving ballots at your address, please write "RETURN" on the envelope and place it back in your mailbox. If a ballot was sent to someone who is deceased, please write "DECEASED" on the envelope and place it back in your mailbox.

If you need assistance voting or have any questions about this particular election or the election process, please call the Elections Division at 503.655.8510.


Voting is as Easy as 1 - 2 - 3

Vote your Official Ballot

Locate the candidate or measure response (YES or NO) of your choice for each contest. To vote, you must completely darken the oval to the left of the response of your choice with black or blue ink. [Figure 1]

To vote for a candidate whose name does not appear on the Official Ballot, completely darken the oval to the left of the blank line provided for the office and fill in the blank with the full name of the candidate. [Figure 2]

Remember: If you vote for more than the number of candidates allowed for an office, or you vote both YES and NO on a measure, it is called an overvote, and your vote will not count for that candidate or measure. [Figure 3]





Review your Official Ballot



Return your Official Ballot

Place your voted Official Ballot in the ballot secrecy envelope and seal the envelope. Place the sealed secrecy envelope in the return identification envelope (white with colored edge) and seal it.

Remember: Read and sign the Voter's Statement on the return identification envelope. Your ballot will not be counted if the return identification envelope is not signed.



By mail:


Attach sufficient first-class postage to the signed and sealed return identification envelope. Mail it as soon as possible to arrive at the Clackamas County Elections Division no later than 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday, May 17, 2011. Remember, the postmark does not count!

Deliver the signed and sealed return identification envelope to any official ballot drop site (see list on Page 99) no later than 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday, May 17, 2011. Postage is NOT required if delivered to a drop site!



Ensure Your Ballot Will Be Counted:

Place ONLY YOUR voted official ballot in the secrecy envelope and seal it.




Place the sealed secrecy envelope in the white (with colored edge) return identification envelope and seal the return envelope.



Read and sign the voter's statement on the return identification envelope.

Your ballot will NOT be counted if the return envelope is not signed.



Attach sufficient first-class postage to the signed and sealed return identification envelope and mail it as soon as possible to arrive at the Clackamas County Elections Division no later than 8:00 p.m., Tuesday, May 17, 2011. The postmark does not count!

Deliver the signed and sealed return identification envelope to any official ballot drop site **no later than** 8:00 p.m., Tuesday, May 17, 2011. First-class postage is **NOT** required if delivered to a ballot drop site.

REGISTERING TO VOTE

WHO MAY REGISTER TO VOTE?

Anyone who is:

- * A resident of Oregon;
- * A United States citizen; and
- ★ 17 years of age or older. [Note: Registered Voters must be 18 years of age to receive a ballot.]

HOW CAN I REGISTER?

By mail-in registration form or in person at any county elections office or at a designated state agency, including the Department of Motor Vehicles and some public assistance agencies, and voters can access secure online voter registration at http://www.oregonvotes.org.

WHEN MAY I REGISTER & WHAT IS THE REGISTRATION DEADLINE?

You may register at any time. However, your voter registration form must be received or postmarked no later than the 21st day before the election at which you intend to vote.

WHERE CAN I FIND VOTER REGISTRATION FORMS?

Post offices, public libraries, city halls, schools, the DMV, and Clackamas County Elections, 1710 Red Soils Ct., Ste. 100, in Oregon City. You can download and print a form in PDF format from the Secretary of State's web site at the Oregon Voter Registration link, which can be found at http://www.oregonvotes.org.

WHAT INFORMATION IS REQUIRED?

In October 2002, the "Help America Vote Act" was signed into law. The Act changes voter registration requirements nation-wide for voting in federal elections. If you are registering to vote in Oregon for the first time, you must provide an Oregon Driver's License / ID. If you do not have a valid ODL / ID, the last four digits of your Social Security number must be provided.

If you do not have a valid Oregon Driver's License / ID or a Social Security number, you must affirm this by marking the appropriate box on the registration form. If you are registering by mail, you must provide a copy of one of the following: a valid photo identification, a copy of a paycheck stub, utility bill, bank statement or other government document showing the registrant's name and address.

If sufficient documentation is not provided at the time of registration, it will be requested by elections officials in order for the person to vote at the next federal election.

When filling out the registration card, you must furnish your full name, residence address (and mailing address, if different), ODL or Oregon ID, date of birth, political party preference, and signature. Your residence address must be the physical address where you reside - not a post office box.

DO I HAVE TO RE-REGISTER FOR EACH ELECTION?

No. You only need to update your registration when your residence (even moving to a different apartment within a complex) or mailing address changes; your name changes; or you wish to change your political party affiliation.

WHAT IF I TURN 18 AFTER THE REGISTRATION DEADLINE?

If you will be 18 years of age by election day, you must register no later than the 21st day prior to the election to be eligible to vote in that election.







Since 1976, Oregon's David Evans & Associates, Inc. has grown into a national leader in engineering and sustainable infrastructure design. Our firm has led the design and/or construction inspection of over 140 new and rehabilitated bridges in Oregon in the last 14 years.

When large cracks were discovered in the Sellwood Bridge, Multnomah County hired our firm to evaluate the strength of the bridge and calculate the appropriate load rating for vehicles using the bridge. The results of our 2005 evaluation identified several areas of structural deficiency related to the bridge's design and its location near a historic landslide. For example, the bridge's concrete girders have significant cracks (mainly at the west end) that are under continual force from a historic landslide that continues to move. These cracks led to limiting large trucks and buses. Additionally, the steel floor stringers in the truss spans aren't adequate for modern trucks, the structural design is inadequate to resist moderate seismic forces and it lacks redundancy.

The Sellwood Bridge does not have time on its side. After 85 years, the bridge has reached the end of its service life. The bridge has a sufficiency rating of 2 on a scale of zero to 100. A moderate sized earthquake or landslide could damage the bridge and force its closure, leaving 30,000 people to find a new river crossing each day.

Replacing the bridge is a funding challenge for our region. Local governments have worked together to provide much of the funding that will be needed to pay for a new bridge. Funds from Clackamas County, where many Sellwood Bridge users live, are crucial to completing the funding package.

The recent earthquake in Japan reminds us of the importance of building public infrastructure we can rely on. Replacing the Sellwood Bridge, a vital link in our regional transportation system, is an infrastructure project that everyone should be able to support.

Americans for Prosperity Clackamas County urges a "NO" vote on Measure 3-372, the new County Vehicle Registration Fee. The measure would impose on Clackamas County residents a fee of \$5 per vehicle per year to pay for repairs to the Sellwood Bridge, located in Multnomah County. Commissioners tried to raise the fee to \$40, but, faced with significant opposition from county residents at two public hearings, the Commission reduced this to \$5. County residents refused to give up and put this measure on the ballot to let the People decide. If this fee is approved, the Commission may feel empowered to raise the fee as high as \$43. The average Clackamas County household could then expect to pay a minimum \$172 Vehicle Registration Fee every two years after 2013.

County residents have not been provided accurate information on the amount to be raised by the fee and the short and long-term financial impact on the economy. Among some of the more troubling information is:

- Commissioners used a 10-year old study claiming that 70% of the trips over the Sellwood Bridge are from Clackamas County to justify the fee. The Oregonian found the study to be totally without merit.
 - The new Sellwood Bridge design provides more lane space for bikes and pedestrians than cars.
 - Taxpayers as far as 20 miles away in Canby, Sandy, and Damascus paying for a bridge in Portland? That's not right or fair.
 - The \$22 million in new fees are not scheduled to end.
 Long after the bridge is paid for, the fee would stay in place to pay to be used however the Commissioners want.

County residents have already told Commissioners they don't want to pay fees for a bridge in another county. Working families are struggling in this economy, and the Commission needs to put jobs and the economy first.

I do not feel that during the worst recession we have seen since the Great Depression that we should be subjecting our citizens to higher fees and diverting those dollars to Multnomah County for the Sellwood Bridge to ultimately help pay for light rail to Milwaukie.

I am aware of the need for transportation dollars and am not totally opposed to a vehicle registration fee to pay for it. I am concerned about the timing and the dollars leaving our county to potentially pay for light rail. If our citizens are to pay a higher vehicle registration fee I would prefer the dollars stay in Clackamas County and be specifically designated (restricted) for roads and bridges in Clackamas County.

Explanatory Statement

Clackamas Community College (CCC) serves over 38,000 students, offering college-level skill training and academic instruction, transfer to four-year university, job training and retraining, life-long learning and high school graduation programs.

The college faces a number of issues due to tight budgets:

- Much of the instructional equipment and technology at CCC is out of date and inadequate to support the number of students seeking training and expertise.
- Students are not able to work with, and experience, upto-date equipment they will encounter in employment and four-year university.
- College buildings are deteriorating and need major repair, updating and additional space. Basic buildings systems need attention such as electrical, plumbing, lighting, heating, earthquake safety, security, and handicapped accessibility.

As a student studying science in order to pursue my Renewable Energy Engineering degree, I get a lot out of Clackamas Community College. It's an affordable path to higher education and my classes and studies can be scheduled around my job.

However, we're overcrowded and out of date here at CCC.

About 1000 students like myself take science laboratory classes each term. (And I can tell you firsthand, that they fill up in about 10 minutes upon the opening of registration.)

That translates to nearly 10,000 experiments by students each term, in only eight lab classrooms.

Despite space and budget constraints, the Science Department has seen increased enrollment of 14 percent over the last two years. The single chemistry lab sees nearly 200 students each term. It's the only space on campus where chemistry experiments (and water chemistry experiments for water quality classes) can be safely performed. The lab is now 30 years old and has never been renovated.

Increased enrollment in science has not only packed classrooms but has also filled CCC's lab equipment storage and lab prep areas to capacity. Chemical storage rooms are tightly confined, and storage areas have expanded into rooms originally designed for other purposes.

And, our lab equipment is really out of date. It isn't up to the standards of the universities where many students transfer, nor is it current for the workplace. So, students end up behind of their fellow students or co-workers.

The college needs this bond:

- to update labs and invest in lab equipment suitable for modern science instruction; and
- to enlarge existing classrooms so students aren't turned away who need required science classes.

Science is a required class for dozens of college programs. It is part of a fundamental college education for thousands of students.

Ballot Title

ESTABLISH PERMANENT RATE LIMIT, CANBY AREA PARKS AND RECREATION DISTRICT

QUESTION: Shall the park and recreation district establish a permanent rate limit of 42 cents per \$1000.00 assessed valuation beginning 2012-2013?

SUMMARY: Establishes a fixed rate tax base limited to a maximum 42 cents per thousand dollars of assessed valuation for the Cariby Area Parks and Recreation District (CAPRD). It is estimated that the total revenue raised for the fiscal year 2012-2013 will be approximately \$840,000.

This tax base will replace the current swim center serial operating levy of 42 cents per thousand paid by City of Carby resident. The operating levy expires June 30, 2012. The primary purpose of the funds is to maintain and operate the existing pool facility. Any additional funds will be used to support recreation providers within the district through grants. Those providers include, but are not limited to, the Carby Adult Center, Carby Kids youth sports associations, Carby Community Education, Carby School District recreation facilities, and the City of Carby Swim Center.

CAPRD boundaries include Canby, Carus, Ninety-One, Barlow and surrounding areas and mirror the Canby School District with the exception of the Charbonneau area.

Explanatory Statement

The primary purpose of this election is to keep the Canby Swim Center open. The five year serial operating levy passed by the City of Canby residents in 2006 will expire June 30, 2012. Without continued tax payer support, the pool will close. This ballot measure will insure the Swim Center has permanent funding to stay open in the future.

Why is the pool important?

Most importantly, it's where our children learn to swim. Knowing how to swim is a survival skill that saves lives. The Swim Center coordinates with the Canby School District to teach every 2nd grade student in the school district how to swim.

It provides an important recreation and exercise facility for youth, adults and seniors. It is home to the Gator Swim Club and the Canby High School swim team. It provides valuable jobs and experience for many youths as life guards, swim instructors and more.

The pool is a longtime community resource that needs to be maintained and preserved. This measure will provide funds to keep this valuable facility in good working order. Last year's swim totaled nearly 75,000 with approximately 50% of the swimmers from outside the city limits. It is clear the pool is not just a City of Canby resource but a regional resource. With the approval of this measure the Swim Center will no longer charge extra for out of town residents.

Where else will the money be spent?

This measure will provide funding support for existing community recreation services such as: the Canby Adult Center, Canby Kids youth sports associations, Canby Community Education and the Canby School District recreation facilities. The District will work hand in hand to support the efforts of the Whiskey Hill Kids, Carus and Ninety-One Elementary School PTA's to develop and enhance recreational opportunities in their communities.

The District will create a reserve account, saving dollars now, to pay for future improvements in the District. Improvements might include the development of a sports field complex to increase the the number of tournaments and events held in the District, helping local businesses to prosper. Another improvement could be the

future development of a "Community and Aquatics Center". This would be a combined facility that would provide for groups of all ages and include the replacement of the Swim Center.

A more efficient use of your tax dollars.

The District will use existing community partners to provide services. It will not create another wasteful government bureaucracy or hire staff to provide services. There is no increase in taxes for City of Canby residents, as City residents are currently paying the same tax rate as this measure. Property owners outside the city will see a small tax increase. There will be no overlap of taxes, this measure will begin as the previous levy ends.

The Board of Directors for the recreation district has listened to district residents and believes that this ballot measure reflects the priorities and values of the voters.

SUMMARY: Oregon City School's budget is significantly reduced due to state funding cuts.

Over the last three years, OC schools have:

- · Cut 13 school days, including 5 this year;
- Eliminated all elementary physical education teachers:
- Cut 50 teaching positions, increasing class size at every grade level;
- Reduced pay and benefits for all employees;
- Reduced maintenance, school supply budgets; not replaced out of date textbooks;

Upcoming state budget cuts require additional local cuts, including cutting at least 10 more school days in 2011-2012.

The proposed Local Option Levy:

- Will restore two weeks of school days stated for elimination;
- All funds go to OC schools; none goes to the state;
- · No funds go to additional administration;
- Independent citizen oversight to review expenditures so funds are used as intended.

Levy cost is \$1.09 per \$1,000 assessed property value (not market value). Typical home owner pays \$16 a month for three years.

The proposed rate is estimated to raise approximately \$2,043,000 in:2011-12; \$2,028,000 in:2012-13; and \$2,012,000 in:2012-13; for a total of \$6,083,000.

Explanatory Statement

Oregon City Schools designs its budget to provide the learning tools, instructional programs and materials that students and teachers need for a well-rounded education.

Currently, Oregon City Schools serves nearly 7500 students in schools from the city of Oregon City to Redland to Beavercreek.

Most funding for Oregon City Schools comes from the State of Oregon. Due to state budget cuts, OC Schools has had to make over \$18 million in budget cutbacks over the past three years including:

- · Cut 13 school days, including 5 this year;
- Cut elementary PE (physical education) teachers;
- Cut 50 classroom teaching positions, increasing class size at every grade level;
- Frozen or reduced scheduled pay increases and benefits for all employees;
- · Reduced maintenance and school supply budgets;
- Eliminated textbook budget postponing replacement of out of date textbooks;
- Reduced middle and high school activity and athletic programs;
- Eliminated 44 student support staff including custodians,

teachers' aides, clerical staff, elementary music teachers, and school counselors;

- · Cut an administrator; and
- Closed an elementary school.

Over this period, Oregon City Schools have saved additional funds by:

- Elimination of one administrative position.

The local option levy is the only method available to local communities to raise additional funds for local schools. The proposed local option for Oregon City Schools will:

- · Restore two weeks of school slated for elimination;
- · All funds go to OC schools; none goes to the state;
- · No funds go to additional administration;
- An Independent Citizen Oversight Committee will be appointed to review proposed expenditures of local option funds to assure funds are used as intended.

Levy cost is \$1.09 per \$1,000 assessed property value (not market value). Typical home owner pays \$16 a month for three years.

If the State of Oregon provides enough funding to Oregon City Schools in any of the three years of this levy to restore two weeks of school days, local option funds will be used to restore classroom teaching positions to lower class sizes or restore previously-cut educational programs.

PORTLAND PUBLIC SCHOOLS BONDS TO UPDATE, RENOVATE LOCAL SCHOOL BUILDINGS.

QUESTION: Shall PPS update, rebuild, increase safety at public schools; retire debt; issue \$548 million in general obligation bonds, audit spending? If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of sections 11 and 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

SUMMARY: Portland Public Schools buildings average 65 years old. Safety, security, classrooms and technology are out of date in nearly every building.

Bond funds support capital projects at 95 schools:

- · 86 schools receive updates such as:
 - o Fire and life safety;
 - o Electrical, plumbing, lighting, roofing, heating, security;
 - o Earthquake safety, handicapped accessibility;
 - o Modern science classrooms:
 - Classroom teaching technology;
 - o School grounds, exteriors, fields.
- · 9 schools rebuilt:
 - o N/NE Portland: Roosevelt High; Faubion, Rigler, Laurelhurst
 - o SE Portland: Cleveland High; Marysville
 - o West Portland: Markham Elementary, East Sylvan on West Sylvan campus
 - o Middle College Program with Portland Community College at Jefferson High.
- Planning, design to prepare for rebuilding Lincoln High.

Bond funds will retire existing school projects debt.

Citizen oversight and annual audits of bond projects and expenditures are required.

Most bonds mature in 1 - 3 years to minimize interest expense. Cost estimated to be approximately \$2 per \$1,000 assessed property value for six years, then reduced. Median homeowner pays \$300 annually for six years, reduced to approximately \$22 annually.

Explanatory Statement

Portland Public Schools is the largest public school district in Oregon, with 95 school buildings and over 47,000 students:

PPS buildings average 65 years in age; most were built in the 1920's, 40's and 50's. Only two schools have been built in the last 30 years. A dozen schools have been closed in the last ten years.

Years of tight budgets have deferred major school repairs in order to direct funds to teachers and learning materials.

As a result, the schools face multiple issues:

- Schools need updated plumbing, electrical wiring, heating and ventilation, fire alarms, lighting, and more;
- Classrooms, science labs and libraries are out of date and cannot support modern educational programs;
- Buildings need additional earthquake safety, handicapped accessibility, and safety in stage areas;
- School grounds, fields and exteriors need repair or replace-

The proposed bond measure funds capital projects for school and classroom needs to extend their use, including:

- · Increasing school safety;
- Renovating and updating school building systems, classrooms and grounds;

- · Rebuilding or comprehensively renovating schools located across Portland for which it's more cost effective to do so;
- Retiring existing school projects debt; and

Increase school safety:

· Safety updates such as fire and security systems; replacing electrical wiring, plumbing and lighting; replacing deteriorated outdoor play areas; installing exterior security; replacing unsafe school stage rigging.

Renovate and update school facilities buildings, classrooms, grounds, including:

- · Modernize heating systems with more efficient and lowermaintenance fuel source:
- Replace leaking roofing;
- Upgrade or create some science labs for grades 6-12 needed to support a modern science program including equipment, sinks, outlets, lab benches, burners and more;
- Provide up-to-date classroom teaching technology for every school:
- Refurbish school grounds, exteriors, and fields to reduce injury, and increase security and safety.

Rebuild schools not cost-effective to repair piecemeal, including:

- · Rebuild Roosevelt and Cleveland High Schools, Rigler, Faubion, Laurelhurst, Marysville K-8 schools, Markham Elementary, and East Sylvan on West Sylvan campus;
- Conduct planning and design to prepare for Lincoln High rebuild in the next phase of school modernization;
- Establish Middle College Program open to all PPS students. with Portland Community College, at rebuilt Jefferson High

Debt retirement and oversight for bond expenditures

 Pay off approximately \$33 million in school projects debt including Rosa Parks School;

Citizen oversight and annual audits to review bond projects and expenditures are required.

Bonds funded through a 'pay-as-you-go' system

Bonds would mature primarily in 1,2 or 3 years, saving interest payments of over \$200 million. Remaining bonds would be issued over 20 years or less.

The bonds' principal amount cannot exceed \$548 million.

Bond cost for six years is estimated at approximately \$2.00 per \$1,000 of assessed property value, reduced to an estimated fifteen cents per \$1,000 for not to exceed 20 years.

The median assessed home value in the school district is \$147,000. Median homeowner would pay approximately \$300 annually for 6 years then reduced to \$22 per year.

Ballot Title

PORTLAND PUBLIC SCHOOLS LEVY FOR TEACHERS AND EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS.

QUESTION: Shall schools protect class size, teaching positions; levy \$1.99 per \$1,000 assessed value for five years beginning 2011; require oversight?

This measure may cause property taxes to increase by more than three percent.

SUMMARY: Portland Public Schools' voter-approved local option levy currently provides funding for retaining teachers and providing instructional programs that students need for a well-rounded education. As PPS responds to substantial cuts in state funding to local schools, continuing a local option will:

- Fund 600 teaching positions (some in every school), including 200 that would be lost in the coming school year due to state budget cuts without levy funds;
- Prevent substantial increases in class size so students receive more individual attention from teachers;
- Continue educational programs necessary for a wellrounded education.

Levy cost is \$1.99 per \$1,000 assessed property value of which \$1.25 per \$1,000 assessed property value is currently being paid. Typical home currently pays \$15.36 per month which would be replaced by payment of \$24.45 a month for five years.

No levy funds go to administration. Independent citizen oversight will review expenditures so funds are used as approved by voters.

The levy will produce an estimated \$57 million in 2011-12; \$58 million in 2012-13; \$62 million in 2013-14; \$65 million in 2014-15; and \$66 million in 2015-16.

Explanatory Statement

Portland Public Schools has growing enrollment, currently serving almost 47,000 students in 65 schools and other programs throughout the neighborhoods of Portland. PPS has sent ambitious targets for student success, and academic achievement has increased on six of the seven critical Milestone measures in the last year.

However, Portland Public Schools counts on the State School Fund for three-quarters of its budget that pays for general school operations and teachers, and that level has dropped in recent years due to state budget shortfalls.

As a result, PPS has taken action to reduce costs and to ensure a full school year and strong academic programs for students, including the following over the last ten years;

- Closed schools and sold or leased unoccupied buildings and land;
- Negotiated agreements with employees to forgo cost-of-living increases or take pay freezes or furloughs during years of substantial budget cuts;
- Managed health coverage costs through plan design and contributions by all employees to their health premiums;
- Employees pay 6 percent of their salary toward their public retirement plans;
- Streamlined operations such as student transportation and reduced utility costs where possible through energy and watersaving retrofits; and
- Hired an independent auditor working for the Board of Education to complete several audits each year of school programs and

services, which has identified efficiencies and further cost savings.

Currently PPS faces further reductions in the state budget projected to cut the equivalent of hundreds of teaching positions over the next two years.

To effectively serve all students in the face of continued state revenue cuts, the Portland Public School District has referred a new five-year local option levy to the voters that will fund teaching positions that would otherwise have been lost due to state budget cuts.

The local option levy will fund:

- At least 600 teaching positions (roughly 20 percent of school staff working with students every day), of which 200 would be lost without passage of this local option.
 - This includes teachers in every school, and will protect class sizes that permit more individual attention for students;
 - Funds help to maintain a well-rounded core program, with enrichment for elementary and middle grades and electives in varied interest areas and disciplines for high school students.

2. Fiscal Accountability and Taxpayer Oversight:

This local option will mandate independent citizen oversight to ensure that tax dollars are used only for purposes approved by local voters as listed above.

No funds from the local option levy will be used for district administration.

This local option levy will replace the levy passed by voters in 2006, and the Portland Public Schools Board of Education will not collect the final year of the previous levy.

TIGARD-TUALATIN SCHOOL BONDS FOR FACILITY REPAIRS, UPDATES, TEXTBOOKS, TECHNOLOGY.

QUESTION: Shall district repair, construct, update facilities; purchase textbooks, science materials; upgrade computer technology and issue \$20 million in bonds? If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of sections 11 and 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

SUMMARY: This measure would provide funds for repairs and updates to district facilities including:

- replacing or repairing roofs:
- repairing and updating electrical, lighting, energy and heating and ventilation systems;
- replacing leaking windows
- replacing some floor coverings, equipment and furnishings in older buildings;
- constructing a small facility for bus parking;
- repairing exterior pavement and repairing or resurfacing school tracks;
- updating handicapped accessibility at all schools;
- installing emergency lighting.

It would also provide funds for:

- replacing textbooks and science materials;
- replacing and upgrading computer technology for all schools in the district.

The cost is expected to be about 36 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value or about \$6 per month for a home assessed at \$200,000.

The bonds would be repaid in 6 years. If approved in May, \$10 Million of the bonds would qualify for interest-free financing which would reduce the cost to taxpayers.

Explanatory Statement

 This measure would fund repairs and improvements that have been postponed due to budget restrictions. It would also pay to replace outdated textbooks and for computer technology replacement and upgrades.

Repairs, updates and replacements would include:

- Roofs at two schools would be replaced to prevent structural damage. Portions of roofs at other schools would also be repaired
- Repairs and updates would be made to electrical, lighting, energy and heating and ventilation systems throughout the district.
- Some floor coverings, equipment and furnishings would be replaced in older buildings.
- Handicapped accessibility would be updated at every school.
- Leaking windows would be replaced.
- Emergency lighting would be installed and exterior pavement would be repaired.
- A small facility would be constructed for bus parking.
- Tracks at several schools would be resurfaced or repaired.
- Textbooks and science materials would be replaced.
- Computers and computer technology would be replaced and upgraded for all schools in the district.
- Using bond dollars to pay for these facility repairs, improvements, technology and curriculum materials would make it possible to complete deferred projects while allowing more of the district's operating budget to be used for classroom instruction and to keep class sizes smaller.

- For property owners, the cost of this \$20 million bond measure is expected to be about 36 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value or about \$6 a month on a home assessed at \$200,000.
- To reduce interest costs, this bond measure would be repaid in 6 years. If approved at the May election, \$10 million of the bonds would qualify for interest-free financing which would also reduce the cost to taxpayers.

Some Common Vote-by-Mail Mistakes

Avoid these mistakes when signing and returning your ballot, and make sure your vote gets counted!

Letting your spouse (or child or parent) sign your ballot envelope: Make sure the envelope you sign is your own, and doesn't belong to another family member. If the signature doesn't match the pre-printed name, the ballot will be challenged.



Signing by Power of Attorney: Don't do it. If a voter is unable to sign, a Signature Attestation form may be obtained so that the voter is able to use a rubber stamp of their signature.

Saving a stamp by putting two ballots in one envelope: Don't do it. Both ballots would be rejected.

Forgetting to use the secrecy envelope: Don't panic! And don't bother mangling the return envelope to re-open it just because you forgot the secrecy envelope. Your vote will still be confidential and it will be counted.

Waiting until Election Day to mail your ballot: Mail your ballot back as soon as you can. The Postal Service simply cannot get a ballot from the mailbox to our office in the space of one day, and (it can't be said often enough) the postmark does not count. Waiting until Election Day to mail the ballot back practically ensures that your vote will not be counted. If you do wait that long, please make use of one of our official drop sites (see the list on page 99).

NEWBERG SCHOOL BOND TO UPGRADE SCHOOLS'
AND EQUIP CLASSROOMS.

QUESTION: Shall Newberg School District upgrade and equip schools, classrooms, textbooks and technology by issuing \$27,144,286 in general obligation bonds? If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of sections 11 and 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

SUMMARY: Federal stimulus funds have been awarded to the District that are projected to pay substantially all the interest on \$15 million of the bonds, saving taxpayers approximately \$4 million I total interest cost.

Passage of this measure would provide funds to:

- Upgrade school facilities including replacing roofs and boilers, flooring and outdated electrical systems
- Install energy updates by replacing low efficiency lighting, windows, heating and ventilating systems
- · Update technology for student learning
- Purchase textbooks and classroom materials
- Build classroom space for online and alternative learning programs
- Renovate and furnish existing space for classrooms and high school cafeteria
- · Install security systems, cameras and intercoms
- · Pay associated bond issuance costs

Bonds would mature in 10 years or less from the date of issue and may be issued in one or more series. Repayment is structured so new residents will assist in paying bond.

Explanatory Statement

This Newberg School District measure is on the ballot due to:

Facilities Report identifies major repairs and energy efficiencies

A 2010 Facilities Task Force reported that major repairs such as replacing roofs and boilers would be required at some schools. The report also stated that the installation of energy-efficient lighting, windows, heating and ventilating systems would reduce utility costs.

 Taxpayers projected to save substantially all of the interest on \$15 million

The school district has been awarded an allocation of subsidized bonds in which it's projected that the federal government will pay substantially all of the interest on \$15 million in bonds. This would save Newberg taxpayers approximately \$4 million.

 Tax payers would pay less than their current property tax rate.

The Newberg school tax rate decreases when the 1993 bond that built Antonia Crater and Chehalem Valley Middle schools retires in 2012. The combined new and existing rate would be lower than the current rate.

· Building now would lower financing costs

Current interest rates would allow the district to finance construction projects at a lower cost than if construction occurred at a later date.

The bond measure would:

 Address maintenance and repair of school facilities including replacing roofs and boilers, heating and ventilating systems, flooring and electrical systems, and track and field repairs.

- Install energy upgrades by updating electrical systems, lighting, windows, heating and ventilating systems.
- Update and equip classrooms by purchasing textbooks and classroom equipment, replace aging technology, renovate existing space for additional science and technology classrooms, and build classroom space for online and alternative learning programs.
- Increase school security by installing additional cameras, replacing intercoms and security systems.

This bond would cost:

The bond would not exceed \$27,144,286 million. Property owners would pay approximately 95 cents for \$1,000 of assessed property value over the life of the bonds, which is 10 years or less. (\$190 per year on a home assessed at \$200,000.)

Because the 1993 bond expires, the combined new and existing rate would mean a reduction of 85 cents per \$1000 of assessed value, or \$170 less per year than the current tax bill on a home assessed at \$200,000.

Levy rates may vary depending on interest rates, growth in the District's total assessed value and other factors. Repayment would be structured so new residents would assist in paying the bond.
