


Q1 Access to Care, \$705,000: Provides coordinated opportunities for care, referrals, education, and support services to eligible residents – primarily pregnant women – to receive care that improves health.




Q2 Behavioral Health Safety Net Services, \$605,000: Provides trauma-informed crisis, safety net, and monitoring services to individuals with a high level of behavioral health needs and risks so they access services, reduce reliance on higher levels of care, and remain in the community.




Q3 Center for Public Health Advancement, \$499,000: Provides health data information, policy development and recommendations, research, emergency preparedness, and public health communications services to stakeholders so they can access tools needed to improve identified health priorities within 10 health equity zones.




Q4 Infectious Disease Control and Prevention, \$324,000: Provides disease monitoring, prevention, investigation, and control services to residents so they can be protected from the spread of infectious diseases of public health significance.




Q5 Medical Examiner's Office, \$966,000. Provides investigation services to generate scientific and legal determinations of deaths. Aimed at effecting resolutions, determining responsibility, and protecting public health and safety.




Q6 Public Health Population Health Strategies, \$785,000: Provides collaborative policy and systems assessment, development, and implementation services to family and community leaders so they can take action to support healthy, clean, and safe places to live, work and play.




Q7 Community Workforce, \$930,000: Provides customized services to individuals with barriers to employment so they can obtain and retain meaningful employment through a successful job placement.






Q17 Property Records, \$1.69 million: Provides current and historical property information services to stakeholders so they can receive prompt and accurate property information.








Q20 Conflict Resolution Services, \$521,000. Provides mediation and other dispute resolution services to people and organizations experiencing conflicts.






Q22 County Parks, \$210,000. Provides parks, recreation, facilities, and services to residents and visitors.






Q24 Dog Services, \$1.75 million: Provides dog sheltering, education, complaint resolution, licensing, protection and enforcement services to the public.




Q25 Library Systems, \$2.6 million. Provides informational, recreational, community, cultural, and support services to libraries in Clackamas County.




Q26 Traffic Safety program, \$302,000: Provides education, commercial vehicle inspection, traffic operations and engineering services to all road users.






Q30 District Attorney: Family Support, \$401,000: Provides services aimed at ensuring children and families receive necessary financial support from parents responsible for making payments.






Q34 Jail Operations, \$24.77 million: Provides secure custody and program services for adult offenders lodged in jail.








Q37 Sheriff Support Services, \$6.93 million: Handles criminal reports, warrants, protective orders, concealed handgun licensing, and public safety training.




Q38 Sheriff Civil Support, \$3.8 million: Responsible for security within the Clackamas County Courthouse and civil process proceedings.



Q39 Sheriff Investigations, \$7.41 million: Responsible for responding to and investigating major criminal incidents and processing related evidence.






