## WHAT ACTION ARE YOU REQUESTING FROM THE BOARD

Review, discuss the attached draft Funding Recommendations for the 2020 and 2021 program years. Prepare for the draft 2021 Action Plan Public Hearing on April 8<sup>th</sup>.

## **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:**

The Community Development Division staff to provide the BCC with a program performance report and to respond to any questions on the draft 2020-2021 Funding Recommendations. A Public Hearing on the draft 2021 Action Plan (application to HUD) will be held on April 8<sup>th</sup>. The attached funding recommendations for 2021 projects will be included in the 2021 Action Plan application to HUD. The Action Plan is the application for an estimated \$2,253,017 in Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds, \$1,006,963 in HOME funds, and \$192,629 in Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funds during the 2021 program year.

## Background:

The Community Development Division (CDD) holds the Action Plan Public Meeting every year with the Board of County Commissioners in order to provide a program performance report and to receive testimony on the proposed Action Plan for the coming program year. The Action Plan is the annual application to HUD for CDBG, HOME and ESG funding that must be submitted by May 15<sup>th</sup> (45 days before the beginning of the program year on July 1<sup>st</sup>).

In 2019, a Combined Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) and Public Meeting was advertised in all County newspapers on November 6th and 7<sup>th</sup> and posted at the Community Development website. Applications for CDBG funding for program years 2020 and 2021 were collected from November 5 to December 19, 2019. Community Development Division (CDD) staff have reviewed all applications, visited some of the proposed sites and requested additional information from some applicants. CDD staff have also met with the Policy Advisory Board on February 26<sup>th</sup> to review, discuss and approve the draft 2020-2021 Funding Recommendations.

The draft 2021 Action Plan and the draft 2020-2021 Funding Recommendations will be posted for review and comment on March 25<sup>th</sup>. A Notice of Public Hearing on April 8<sup>th</sup> will be published in all County newspapers on March 24<sup>th</sup> and 25th with a link to the county website location of the draft Action Plan for review. CDD staff will accept comments on the draft plan for a 30 day period until April 26, 2021.

On May 6th the final 2021 Action Plan will be on the BCC business meeting agenda for approval.

Dear Chairperson of the Board of Commissioners Smith:

I am pleased to inform you of your jurisdiction's Fiscal Year (FY) 2021 allocations for the Office of Community Planning and Development's (CPD) formula programs, which provide funding for housing, community and economic development activities, and assistance for low- and moderate-income persons and special needs populations across the country. Public Law 116-260 includes FY 2021 funding for these programs. Your jurisdiction's FY 2021 available amounts are as follows:

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)	\$2,253,017
Recover Housing Program (RHP)	\$ 0
HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME)	\$1,006,963
Housing Opportunities for Persons With AIDS (HOPWA)	\$ 0
Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG)	\$192,629

Individuals and families across the country are struggling in the face of four converging crises: the COVID-19 pandemic, the resulting economic crisis, climate change, and racial inequity. Through these bedrock programs, CPD seeks to develop strong communities by promoting integrated approaches that provide decent housing and suitable living environments while expanding economic opportunities for low- and moderate-income and special needs populations, including people living with HIV/AIDS. We urge grantees to strategically plan the disbursement of grant funds to provide relief for those affected by these converging crises and help move our country toward a robust recovery.

Based on your jurisdiction's CDBG allocation for this year, you also have \$165,085 in available Section 108 borrowing authority. Since Section 108 loans are federally guaranteed, this program can leverage your jurisdiction's existing CDBG funding to access low-interest, long-term financing to invest in Opportunity Zones or other target areas in your jurisdiction.

Because the funds are not appropriated by Congress, Housing Trust Fund (HTF) formula allocations will be announced at a later date under separate cover.

HUD continues to emphasize the importance of effective performance measurements in all its formula grant programs. Proper reporting in the Integrated Disbursement and Information System (IDIS) is critical to ensure grantees comply with program requirements and policies, provide demographic and income information about the persons that benefited from a community's activities, and participate in HUD-directed grantee monitoring. Your ongoing attention to ensuring complete and accurate reporting of performance measurement data continues to be an invaluable resource with regard to the impact of these formula grant programs.

The Office of Community Planning and Development is looking forward to working with you to promote simple steps that will enhance the performance of these critical programs and successfully meet the challenges that our communities face.
