Clackamas County at a glance

Clackamas County, named for the resident Clackamas Indians, was established July 5, 1843. Oregon City, the county seat, was the first incorporated city west of the Rockies, the first capital of the territorial government in 1848 and the site of the first state legislative session.

The County encompasses 1,893 square miles — well over a million acres. It ranks 18th in size and third in the state of Oregon for total population, with an estimated population of 381,775 people. About 47 percent of the population lives in urban areas, with the remaining proportion in rural areas and towns. The largest cities in the county are Lake Oswego, with a population of 36,845; Oregon City, with a population of 30,995; West Linn, with a population of 24,455; and Milwaukie, with a population of 20,930.




Clackamas County is located in the northern Willamette Valley of western Oregon. Hood River and Wasco Counties bound the county on the east, with Multnomah County sitting to the north. Marion County borders the south and also on the west along with Yamhill and Washington Counties. Butte Creek forms most of the western boundary, while the eastern boundary generally follows the crest of the Cascade Mountains.

From an elevation at Oregon City of 55 feet, Clackamas County rises to 11,235 feet at the peak of Mt. Hood on its northeastern boundary — the highest point in the state. Forest resources, lakes, rivers and streams provide numerous opportunities for hunting and fishing, as well as camping and other forms of recreation. Special points of scenic and historic interest are Willamette Falls, the McLoughlin House, Lake Oswego, Wilhoit Mineral Springs, Mt. Hood and Timberline Lodge.

Reports Processed

During 2010, the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office processed 52,117 reports that were entered into C.L.A.S.S. During 2009, the Sheriff's Office processed 47,809 reports. This is an increase of 4,308 reports, or 9.0%, during 2010 compared to 2009.


The average number of reports processed during the previous three years was 49,201.4. The 52,117 reports processed during 2010 is an increase of 2,915.6 reports, or 5.9%.

This includes all reports (except for "specials" and follow-up reports) processed by the Sheriff's Office — including reports written in contract cities and courtesy reports written for other agencies. Each report is only counted once, regardless of the number of crimes or violations documented in the report. For the number of reported crimes, please see the "All Reported Crimes" chart on pages 10-11.

The chart below is a breakdown of report types and total number processed for each type during 2010, 2009 and the average for the previous three years of 2007, 2008, and 2009.




Unincorporated Clackamas County Population

INTERCEPT detects online predators and arrests and prosecutes them before they meet vulnerable children in person.





There were 14,098 people booked into the Clackamas County Jail in 2010. 10,857 (77.0%) of those people were male and 3,241 (23.0%) were female. This includes new bookings during 2010 only, and does not account for people who were already in custody prior to the beginning of the year.



Community Corrections

Community Corrections is committed to helping offenders change through:

- Supervision & Accountability
- Transitional Services
- Residential Drug & Alcohol Treatment
- Domestic Violence Treatment
- Substance Abuse Testing/Monitoring
- Cognitive Skills Training
- Outpatient Drug/Alcohol Treatment
- Residential Work Release
- Community Service Work Crews
- Sex Offender Treatment & Accountability
- Community Support & Mentoring
- Employment Services

Out of the six largest counties in Oregon, Clackamas County Community Corrections has the lowest recidivism rates for prison releases at 17.1% with the state average being 27.1%. This is largely due to our excellent transition services.



Transition programs include a mutual partnership with **Bridges to Change**, which is a local non-profit organization who provides services such as:

- Mentoring
- Transitional Housing
- Cognitive Programs

Clackamas County Community Corrections, Corrections Substance Abuse Program (CSAP) is rated in the top 6% of evidenced based substance abuse programs in the nation.

Clackamas County Community Corrections meets & exceeds SB267 requirements, which requires 90% of treatment dollars to be spent on Evidence Based Practices.

Community Service clients have provided 62,152 hours of work, which is equivalent to \$522,077 in savings to entities within Clackamas County. Work crews run seven days a week averaging three crews per day.

The Women's Empowerment Project is a 13 week course designed for victims of domestic violence and funded by Oregon Department of Justice grant money. To date 37 women have graduated from this program offered by Clackamas County Community Corrections.



Clackamas County Community Corrections provides probation, parole & post prison supervision, inpatient and outpatient drug & alcohol treatment, work release, community service and victim services. We focus our services on those individuals most at risk to re-offend.

- 4,526 total intakes to Community Corrections
- 2,358 new supervision referrals to Community Corrections
- 2,704 adults were placed on formal probation
- 289 adults were paroled to Clackamas County from prison
- 62,152 Community Service hours were completed
- \$165,296 in restitution was paid back to victims (fiscal year 09/10)
- 86% of the high-risk, highly criminal men who completed the Corrections Substance Abuse Program were crime free after one year out of the program
- 355 offenders were placed in Clackamas County Work Release

Community Corrections supervises individuals convicted of all offense types. Clients are supervised by teams as outlined on the graph below. The General Team includes drug, arson, theft, robbery, as well as any other category not covered by a specialized caseload. "Other" includes cases on an inactive status. Reduced supervision encompasses clients who are low risk to re-offend.

Caseload Distribution





Recidivism is a statewide outcome measure that indicates how often clients re-offend. Out of the 6 largest counties in Oregon, Clackamas County has the lowest recidivism rate for both parole & probation.

We hold offenders accountable by utilizing Evidence Based Practices, including validated risk tools, to address criminogenic risk factors. By reducing these risk factors we are able to reduce the likelihood that someone will commit a new offense.



Domestic Violence

The following is a report on the domestic-violence cases reported to the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office during 2010.

The data used for this report was obtained from the Domestic Violence Database maintained by the **Domestic Violence Enhanced Response Team (DVERT)**. It includes crimes reported in the contract cities and courtesy reports for other jurisdictions.



During 2010, the Sheriff's Office investigated 575 incidents of domestic violence involving 670 crimes. The following chart reflects the number of incidents and the number of reported crimes during the last five years.

The 575 incidents during 2010 reflect a 17.0% decrease from 2009 and an 18.7% decrease from the prior three-year average of 707.0.

There was at least one child present during 181 (31.5%) of the domestic-violence incidents that were reported in 2010.








Stolen Vehicles: 2010 by Month







Clackamas County Inter-agency Task Force (CCITF)

In 2002, Clackamas County was designated as a High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA). The **Clackamas County Inter-agency Task Force (CCITF)** was formed in September 2006. In October 2007, CCITF began its first year as a HIDTA-funded task force.



CCITF also works with local community organizations and other government agencies (including Code Enforcement) to step up the pressure on offenders through neighborhood outreach and the application of nuisance laws.

- 20 children referred to DHS
- 40 search warrants obtained
- 31 guns seized
- 52 controlled drug buys



INTERCEPT

Protecting Our Children from Online Predators

The Inter-agency Child Exploitation Prevention Team (INTERCEPT) was established in August 2007 by the Sheriffs of Clackamas, Multnomah and Washington Counties.


INTERCEPT is staffed with one Detective each from the Clackamas, Multnomah and Washington County Sheriff's Offices, a Sergeant, a District Attorney, one office staffer, two consulting Oregon Department of Justice (DOJ) investigators and a consulting Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) investigator. Two computer forensic examiners are paid for by a COPS grant.

Mission Statement

The mission of INTERCEPT is to investigate violation of state and federal laws, with an emphasis on crimes against children and to prosecute those violations in state and federal court. INTERCEPT investigations will include, but are not limited to, violations of child sex crimes, child pornography, child exploitation and the use of computers to promote these crimes.

More than 65 million children ages 17 and younger are online in the United States.

According to a study conducted by the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children in partnership with Cox Communication:



- 61% of children ages 13-17 have a personal profile on a social networking site such as MySpace or Facebook. Half of them have posted pictures of themselves online.
- 71% of teens report receiving online messages from someone they do not know, and 45% were solicited for personal information. Only 18% said they would tell a parent about receiving a message from someone they do not know.
- 40% said that when they receive a message from someone they do not know, they usually reply and begin a conversation with them.
- 14% have met someone in person who they first met online, and 30% have considered doing so.
- 33% reported that their parents know very little or nothing about what they do on the Internet.

S.W.A.T.

The Clackamas County Sheriff's Office Special Weapons and Tactics team (SWAT) responded to 16 incidents in 2010. The SWAT team responded to 19 calls in 2009 and an average of 13.7 in the previous 3 years of 2007, 2008 and 2009.

Eight of the suspects surrendered, 1 was subdued by SWAT members, 3 committed suicide, and 1 was not found at the scene. The other 3 calls were determined to be non-criminal, and no arrests were made.



Traffic

The Clackamas County Sheriff's Office investigated 1,307 traffic accidents in 2010. There were 10 people killed in 10 separate accidents. There were also 44 "courtesy" reports written for accidents that happened in other jurisdictions.

The top two causes for accidents in 2010 were careless driving (219) and excessive speed (144). Alcohol was involved in 122 (9.3%) of the accidents. One of the fatal accidents was alcohol-related.



- The Sheriff's Office issued 8,806 traffic citations with 11,284 charges in 2010. The top two charges were speed-related violations (2,431) and driving while suspended/revoked (1,575). - The Sheriff's Office also performed 484 commercial vehicle inspections in 2010.



