THIS MATTER COMING on at this time and it appearing to the Board of Commissioners that the proposed expenditures and resources constituting the budget for Clackamas County, Oregon, for the period of July 1, 2011, through June 30, 2012 inclusive, have been prepared, published, and approved by the Budget Committee, and that the matters discussed at the public hearing were taken into consideration as pursuant to state statute; and

IT ALSO APPEARING that in accordance with ORS 294.421 the notice of this public hearing and a financial summary was published in the Clackamas Review on June 15, 2011;

IT ALSO APPEARING that the budget as approved by the Budget Committee and published in accordance with statute has been amended by the Commissioners as detailed in the attached Exhibit A;

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that the budget for FY 2011-2012 is adopted as amended and appropriations established as shown in the attached Exhibit B, which by this reference is made a part of this order;

ORDER NO. (Page 2 of 2)

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that ad valorem taxes, all of which are categorized as subject to the General Government Limitation, are imposed as provided for in the adopted budget as follows:

for operations in the amount of \$2.4042 per \$1000 of assessed value in cities which provide their own police patrol service and \$2.9766 per \$1000 of assessed value in the remaining cities and unincorporated areas; and

for the fifth and final year of a five-year public safety local option tax for operations in the amount of \$0.2480 per \$1000 of assessed value in the county.

Clackamas County Service District No. 5 supplies street lighting service to un-incorporated Clackamas County and to the cities of Happy Valley and Damascus. The cost of street lighting is paid by direct assessment of benefiting property owners within the District.

The five year budget forecast created last year shows that the current street lighting rates are more than sufficient to meet the expenses for the district and provide for an adequate reserve for the 2011-2012 fiscal year, resulting in an even higher ending fund balance for 2011-2012. Thus, a slight rate decrease for rates A B, C, D, F, H, J, K and R is necessary to provide revenue that will meet projected expenses and maintain the necessary ending fund balance, to accommodate the first five (5) months of electricity bills for the next fiscal year. The district believes with this rate adjustment the proposed rate structure will allow the district to continue to achieve its goal of having each rate cover its share of electricity costs and expenditures while maintaining the necessary level of reserves each year.

The Budget Committee for the District met and approved the proposed budget at a public meeting on May 25, 2011. A public hearing will be held on June 23, 2011, to hear public input on the proposed 2011-2012 budget and the companion rate schedule. This hearing has been duly advertised in the local newspaper.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board approve this Order adopting the proposed 2011-2012 budget for Clackamas County Service District No. 5.

Clackamas County Service District No. 5 supplies street lighting service to unincorporated Clackamas County and the cities of Happy Valley and Damascus. The cost of street lighting is paid by direct assessment of benefiting property owners within the district. Rates for the District were last set on June 25, 2010, by Board Order No. 2010-86.

The recommended budget of \$2,709,213 for the 2011-2012 fiscal year proposes changes in nine of the ten existing rates the District charges property owners benefiting from street lighting service. The proposed rate schedule is projected to produce revenue at a level that will meet the expenses of the district as well as result in a forecasted ending fund balance of \$889,177, which would accommodate a sufficient reserve for future expenditures to cover the first five months of the District expenses until revenues become available in November.

The Service District No. 5 Budget Advisory Committee approved a recommendation for the proposed rate structure as illustrated in the attached proposed Board Order and Budget Report.

This rate schedule hearing was duly advertised in the local newspaper.

BOARD ORDERS ADOPTING AND APPROPRIATING FY 2011-12 BUDGETS AND FUNDS FOR CLACKAMAS COUNTY SERVICE DISTRICT NO. 1, TRI-CITY SERVICE DISTRICT AND THE SURFACE WATER MANAGEMENT AGENCY OF CLACKAMAS COUNTY

The attached Board Orders adopt and appropriate funds for the enterprise fund budgets for FY 2011-12 for Clackamas County Service District No. 1, the Tri-City Service District, and the Surface Water Management Agency of Clackamas County, and further adopt and appropriate debt service fund budgets for Clackamas County Service District No. 1 and the Tri-City Service District.

The Budget Committees for Clackamas County Service District No. 1 (CCSD#1), Tri-City Service District (TCSD), and the Surface Water Management Agency of Clackamas County (SWMACC) met on May 25, 2011 to consider their respective budgets. The budgets for CCSD#1 and SWMACC were unanimously approved as recommended by staff. The budget for TCSD was approved with one modification as recommended by staff and approved by the Budget Committee. The attached Order changes the Equivalent Dwelling Unit (EDU) monthly charge for wholesale sanitary sewer service within the Tri-City Service District (TCSD) from \$12.35 to \$13.35 per EDU. The City may set such additional amounts for monthly user charges which shall be added to the District's wholesale charge, and the entire amount shall be billed by the City. Payment shall be made to the City in which the property is located for subsequent remittance to the District, except for those areas billed directly to the users by the District. No single point of connection through the system shall have a smaller sewer service charge than any other, and the District shall receive \$13.35 thereof with the balance retained by the City for operation and maintenance of collection sewer facilities. The District shall bill for and directly receive the retail charge of \$23.00. The District shall set the sewer service charges for each user based upon Table 1 of the District's Rules and Regulations. District staff is directed to amend Table 1 in accordance with this Order.
- 2. In all other respects, the Rules and Regulations of the District remain in full force and effect.
- 3. An executed copy hereof shall be kept on file at Water Environment Services.

Approving a Participation Agreement with Clean Energy Works Oregon to Expand Energy Efficiency Financing in Clackamas County

Clackamas County is working to make home energy efficiency upgrades more affordable and accessible by partnering with Clean Energy Works Oregon, Inc, a new statewide non-profit that delivers a streamlined, simple process for homeowners to apply for and repay a loan for an energy efficiency remodel.

In 2009 the County approved an energy loan program as one activity under our federal Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant (EECBG). The attached Agreement between Clean Energy Works Oregon (CEWO) and Clackamas County formally implements this activity.

The County will invest \$600,000 of its EECBG funds to support the in-county expansion of CEWO. CEWO will leverage this to provide up to 150 loans in 2011 (an estimated value of \$2.7 million in total resources). Through a corollary agreement the County will also access CEWO marketing assistance, and receives a commitment to allocate additional resources in 2012, if available, to another 150 homes. The long-term goal is to establish a sustainable model attractive to homeowners and lenders, while increasing employment in energy efficiency contracting.

Approval of a Contract with Accela Inc. to Upgrade Accela Permits Plus System to Accela Automation

The County's existing permits system is Accela Permits Plus which has been the primary permitting software in use for the last 15 years. Accela has supported the Permits Plus platform during that time but will be directing more of its support toward their current product, Accela Automation, in the near future.

The Accela Automation product is a web-based computer permitting software which will allow our citizens access to many services not currently available to them through Permits Plus. Accela Citizen Access, a component of the new software, allows online permitting and access to data, real-time status checks of permits and plan reviews, and will allow citizens to self-report alleged code violations, amongst other things.

The contract price includes the Land Management module (the basic permitting component for Land use, Engineering, WES and Building Codes), along with a GIS component, a licensing module, Accela Mobile Office and more. This product possesses features which will enable the County to meet its business needs for permitting in the future and is consistent with the County's sustainability goals.

Approval of this contract is being requested under the Local Contract Review Board Rule C-047-0288 (15) where the efficient use of existing equipment or supplies requires compatible products or services of a particular manufacturer or seller, the Contracting Agency may purchase such particular product or service with obtaining competitive bids or proposals.

A notice of intent to purchase was issued June 9, 2011. No competing proposals were received at the time of closing on June 15, 2011.

The amount of this contract shall be \$715,554.29. Funds for this project are budgeted in 215-2424-437231 in FY 2010/2011 and FY 2011/2012 for this project.

County Counsel has reviewed this contract.

Board Order Clarifying Assignment of Secure Rural Schools and Community Self-Determination Act Revenue for Fiscal Year 2010-2011

When the Secure Rural Schools and Community Self-determination Act (commonly referred to as timber legislation) was extended, it was determined that the County would receive approximately \$16 million over the remaining years of the Act before funding terminated. The Board of County Commissioners did not want the County to rely upon one-time or non-continuing dollars to fund continuing operations. Thus the Commissioners earmarked an amount of resources equal to the estimated remaining timber proceeds for specific purposes.

In particular, the Board assigned \$7 million for a rainy day reserve, \$4 million for future public safety facilities, and the balance to a variety of special projects and general support. As federal revenues are restricted by the Code of Federal Regulations, it should have been clearly stated that the federal funds would be expended on only allowed costs and that a corresponding amount of fully discretionary revenue originating in the General Fund would be used to fund the rainy day and public safety facility reserves.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff respectfully recommends that the Board adopt the attached board order to clarify its intention regarding use of timber revenues.

Similarly, the Board clarifies its intention that funds held in the General Fund as "rainy day" reserves are comprised of fully discretionary dollars, not federal timber dollars. Federal timber funds are to be expended in support of County operations and shall not be held in reserve.

Resolution Establishing Policies for Fund Balance and Committing Revenues and Ending Fund Balances in Accordance with Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 54

For your consideration is a proposed resolution establishing policies for fund balance and committing revenues and ending fund balances in accordance with Government Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 54.

The Government Accounting Standards Board (GASB) establishes reporting requirements which government agencies must follow to present their annual financial statements in a comparable format and to receive an unqualified or "clean" audit opinion for these statements. Furthermore, in order for a government agency to be awarded the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting by the Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA), comprehensive annual financial reports (CAFRs), must be presented as prescribed by the GASB. The County has received this prestigious national award for approximately sixteen years.

The GASB has recently issued Statement No. 54, Fund Balance Reporting and Governmental Fund Type Definitions. GASB Statement No. 54 redefines the qualifications of governmental-type (does not include enterprise funds) special revenue, debt service and capital project funds in an effort to establish consistent application across government agencies. Additionally, the Statement develops new definitions for classifications of governmental-type fund balances, again to create consistency in reporting by various government agencies. These new categories will be used to classify fund balances beginning with fiscal year 2010-2011 in compliance with the Statement. The classifications are defined as follows:

- Non-spendable: Non-spendable is defined as fund balance amounts which cannot be spent
 because they are either (a) not in spendable form or (b) legally or contractually required to be
 maintained intact. Examples of "not in spendable form" include inventories or prepaid
 expenses. The corpus (or principal) of a permanent fund is an example of an amount that is
 legally or contractually required to be maintained intact.
- Restricted: Restricted is defined as constraints placed on the use of resources externally
 imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments.
 Examples include revenue sources from federal grants with a specific purpose, donations
 from citizens with specific instructions, or State Gas Tax revenue to be used for roads.

- Committed: Committed is defined as constraints which have been imposed by formal action of the government's highest level of decision-making authority (i.e. the County Commissioners). An example would be a County resolution committing certain revenue sources to specific activities.
- Assigned: Assigned is defined as fund balance which a delegate (i.e. County Administrator or Finance Director) of the County Commissioners has been given authority to apply less formal constraints than those listed above. An example would be the Finance Director setting aside fund balance to be used to support library services that is otherwise available for general use.
- Unassigned: Unassigned is defined as the residual classification for the General Fund without constraint. This is only applicable to the General Fund (unless another governmental fund has a deficit fund balance). An example of a revenue source which could result in an unassigned fund balance is property taxes available for general purpose use.

In order for the County to be in compliance with GASB Statement No. 54, a resolution is required that formally commits revenues to be accounted for in certain special revenue funds, categorizes fund balances, and establishes policies. This new pronouncement requires a formal commitment, by resolution, to preserve certain County special revenue funds as previously reported in the audited financial statements. It retains the special revenue fund structures and ending fund balance policies by doing the following:

- 1. Reserving the Commissioner's authority to establish, maintain and commit fund balances;
- 2. Granting authority to the County Administrator and Finance Director to assign portions of revenue sources or ending fund balance; and
- 3. Establishing the County's policy on the use of restricted and unrestricted fund balance when available.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff respectfully recommends the Board approve the attached resolution establishing policies for fund balance and committing revenues and ending fund balances in accordance with GASB Statement No. 54. Thank you.

WHEREAS, the Government Accounting Standards Board (GASB) has issued Statement No. 54 effective for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2011, titled Fund Balance Reporting and Governmental Fund Type Definitions; and

WHEREAS, the County recognizes the importance of maintaining consistent fund structures for financial planning and conformity to authoritative standards;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

<u>Section 1.</u> In accordance with GASB Statement No. 54, the County Commissioners reserve the authority to establish and modify commitments of revenue sources and ending fund balance which are not otherwise non-spendable or restricted. The County Commissioners hereby grant authority to the County Administrator and Finance Director or designee to assign portions of revenue sources or ending fund balance which are not determined to be non-spendable, restricted or committed.

<u>Section 2.</u> The County Commissioners consider then, when both restricted and unrestricted fund balance is available for use, the purpose for which that is restricted, it is the County's policy to use restricted fund balance first, then unrestricted fund balance as needed. When unrestricted fund balance is spent, the County will consider that committed amounts will be reduced first, followed by assigned amounts, and then unassigned amounts last.

<u>Section 3.</u> The County Commissioners commit the following revenue sources and ending fund balance which have not otherwise been previously restricted or committed to their respective Special Revenue Funds:

Sheriff's Operations Fund: The annual distribution of a portion of property tax collections from the County General Fund and into the Sheriff Operations Fund, is hereby committed to the special purpose of funding Sheriff services of public protection, and can only be used for specific purposes within that definition.

Juvenile Fund: The annual distribution of a portion of property tax collections from the County General Fund and into the Juvenile Fund, is hereby committed to the special purpose of funding Juvenile services of public protection to children, and can only be used for specific purposes within that definition.

Approval Of A Contract With Corizon Health Inc. For Medical Services
At The Clackamas County Jail

Over the last several years we have audited our medical department for costs and efficiencies, based upon a 2004 recommendation by the National Commission on Correctional Health Care (NCCHC) to bring our inmate medical services into compliance with industry standards and stabilize our ever-rising costs.

In 2004 the jail medical department was audited by the NCCHC, as it was and still is our goal to be accredited. The jail was able to address policy concerns raised by NCCHC, but further measures are needed to meet the standards and will require additional expenditures for staffing and equipment and a comprehensive overhaul of our health care delivery system. This option does not appear to be a viable option due to our current budget limitations during this economic climate.

In early 2009, as a continuing effort by the Clackamas County Jail Administration to identify inefficiencies in operations and reduce spending, we chose to study and compare our jail's medical department to other similar operations nationwide in both best practices and expenditures.

The Clackamas County Jail has historically provided "in house" medical services utilizing county employees to staff the medical department along with subcontracted physicians, psychologists, dentists and outside providers including pharmacy and emergency hospital services.

It became obvious in studying the last few years of medical expenditures as compared to our budget that we were overspending compared to our allocated funds and the percentages by which we were overspending was trending to larger and larger deficits. For example, year to date, we are at 178% of our allocated budget for the year. We have two more months of expenses remaining in the budget year.

Clackamas County Sheriff's Office

Jail staff identified deficiencies in the existing medical department. They included, industry best practices, staffing, emerging technologies, and management practices that were falling behind due to rising costs and shrinking budgets.

To that end, Jail administrative staff compared our medical delivery system to similar systems incorporating private contractors, and we issued a Request for Proposal (RFP) to gauge the efficiencies and costs of a transition of this magnitude.

A Medical RFP evaluation committee was formed and unanimously selected Prison Health Services, now doing business as "Corizon" as our choice to partner with Clackamas County Jail in providing these services.

The committee believes that Corizon can bring many enhancements over and above our current operations including NCCHC accreditation for our medical department while providing a higher level of inmate health care, accountability and efficiency.

Corizon will provide Electronic Medical Records (EMR), which is a valuable time saving tool for staff and also provides searchable databases for statistical reporting. The jail has requested an EMR program in previous budgets only to be cut as cost prohibitive. Our research indicated that it would cost in excess of \$100,000 to purchase and implement an EMR system in the jail. The EMR system will streamline our record keeping ability, reduce our dependency on paper files and reduce the chance of missing important medical information on inmates returning to our facility with pre-existing conditions.

The medical service model that we are proposing to contract with Corizon provides medical staff in booking to perform initial intake screenings on incoming inmates. This function is currently performed by corrections deputies. Having medically trained staff to evaluate incoming inmates concerning medical and mental health status will be a benefit and is a requirement of NCCHC standards. Additionally it may reduce future liabilities.

Corizon will also assume the responsibility of responding to inmate grievances concerning medical care and treatment. Jail administration currently is tasked with this and medical grievances have historically been the highest number of grievances we receive.

Corizon will incorporate a Utilization Management System using corporate protocols to ensure that outside treatment such as hospitalizations and follow up treatment appointments are necessary and appropriate. We should reduce our emergency and non-emergency transports with these protocols in place.

The Corizon contract also provides for in-house dental services for inmates. This will reduce the number of transports and therefore reduce overtime and other associated transport costs.

Corizon has in place a multi-layered approach to risk management including proven policies and procedures. Corizon provides nursing evaluation tools to provide guidance to staff, an internal risk management team, a patient safety committee, quality improvement programs, training and education of staff. Corizon also has a claims management department to oversee and manage any liability claim or lawsuit.

Clackamas County Sheriff's Office

Corizon has proposed interviewing and potentially hiring existing employees as they move forward. The Clackamas County Jail medical unit is comprised of 13 allocated FTE's, at this time, 5 of those positions are unfilled. Corizon has stated that their best resource for operating the medical department is the experience of the people who already work here. Corizon offers a competitive salary based upon regional studies and a strong benefit package. Corizon's staffing plan included in the proposed contract increases the size of the medical department from 13 FTE's to 16.4 FTE's.

The Sheriff's Office has completed mandatory bargaining with the Police Officers Association (POA) and has reached an agreement. We have a signed Memorandum of Understanding outlining a severance package for the 8 employees who would be displaced by this plan.

The total cost for the first year of the contract with Corizon is \$2,499,281. The annual cost for the second year is \$2,577,971 and the annual cost for the third year is \$2,642,381. Funds for this contract will come from Professional Services, line item 431000.

This contract has been reviewed and approved as to form by county purchasing and county counsel.

RECOMMENDATION:

The Sheriff's Office believes that privatization of our inmate medical service is the most viable option at this time. Corizon is a national company with a proven track record in providing evidence based best practices in corrections health care management. This partnership will deliver the best inmate health care and it will benefit our organization, the inmates housed in the jail, and the community we serve.

We are asking that the board accept the proposal and award a contract to Corizon. The terms of this contract run through June 30, 2012, with two annual renewal options.

Approval and Adoption of the Revised Affirmative Action Plan Hiring Goals

Clackamas County is a voluntary participant in the development of a written affirmative action plan. The Affirmative Action Plan (AAP) reaffirms the County's continuing commitment to the principles of equal employment opportunity; to increase effectiveness by setting forth current and future action being taken by the County concerning employment opportunities; and to provide for implementation, self-policing, and monitoring through a comprehensive affirmative action program.

The Department of Employee Services (DES) along with the Affirmative Action Committee (AAC) meets annually to evaluate the current year AAP. The AAC is comprised of County employees from most departments including directors, supervisors or their designated representatives, and several employees from minority groups serving as "members at large." The primary responsibility of the AAC is to review availability and utilization figures and to recommend countywide hiring goals to the BCC. This process requires an analysis of the County workforce in comparison to labor market availability from the 2000 census and identifies areas of underutilization of women and minorities in eight job categories.

If underutilization is found, the County must use its best efforts to develop and implement procedures that are designed to increase the number of qualified women and minority candidates in the applicant pool. The AAC recommends hiring goals to correct underutilization in categories where there is significant underutilization of women and/or minorities.

At a Work Session held on June 7, 2011, the AAC recommended the Board approve the following hiring:

APPROVAL OF AN INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT WITH DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES AND THE CLACKAMAS COUNTY JUVENILE DEPARTMENT

Attached is Amendment No 125425 to an Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) between the Clackamas County, through the Juvenile Department, and the Department of Human Services (DHS). The purpose of this IGA is to continue the access to behavioral rehabilitation services (BRS) to youth residing in Clackamas County. The BRS program is a federal Medicaid program designed to ensure that each youth's individual needs are met in a planned and purposeful manner. By entering into this IGA, Clackamas County youth who are eligible for Medicaid benefits will have access to this federally funded program, without being in the legal custody of the Oregon Youth Authority. DHS will process and pay claims for BRS services provided by the Department or its subcontractors on a monthly reimbursement basis.

If approved, the Juvenile Department will contract with three treatment providers, Parrott Creek Child and Family Service, Christian Community Placement Center and Boys and Girls Aid Society, to provide shelter care and evaluation services to youth referred to this Department, both prior to and after adjudication. BRS funding will provide 40 percent of the funding of the daily costs of such services. It is anticipated the total federal funding to be received will be approximately \$471,120 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2011 and ending June 30, 2012.

This request for approval continues the current practice with the State of Oregon. The difference is that instead of the State managing the BRS program, Clackamas County will do so in partnership arrangement with the State. This change in

management of funds was initially effected in September 2002. It will allow for youth, other than those in state custody, to be served with BRS funds.

RECOMMENDATION

I respectfully recommend that the Board approved the attached Amendment to the Intergovernmental Agreement.
