WHAT ACTION ARE YOU REQUESTING FROM THE BOARD?

The desired outcome of this study session is to "take the pulse" of the Board to see if there is a consensus to begin planning efforts for a business registration program in Clackamas County. Staff proposes the following questions for Board discussion:

- 1. Does the BCC want staff to begin the process of instituting a business registration/licensing program, and if so what is a reasonable timeline?
- 2. What is the desired goal of a business registration program?
- 3. Who will a business registration program apply to? All businesses? Are any businesses exempt? How would it affect the County's Home Occupation permit program?
- 4. Should the program use one general registration fee, or categories?
- 5. What department will administer the program, Planning or Business & Community Services?

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

Over the course of the past several years and again recently, Board members have suggested that the County consider instituting a business registration program. There have been several reasons for the interest:

- A registration program will give us contact information and better data on our businesses.
- A registration program would provide a vehicle to enforce time place and manner restrictions on marijuana dispensaries.

This summer the Board requested that staff come back in a study session to further discuss whether or not to pursue instituting a business registration program.

On September 10, 2014, staff from Administration, County Counsel, BCS, Planning, and PGA met to vet the implementation of a business registration program with the goal of creating a database of information. A business registration program could be a valuable resource, as it would improve community outreach, public relations, and the public well-being by providing businesses with vital information regarding safety, code, life, health, and signage.

From an economic development standpoint, BCS staff has indicated that a business registration program would provide a much-needed tool to track businesses, would provide an accurate employee count, and provide the County with important contact information.

The below list of pros and cons were discussed at the meeting:

PROS

A business registration program:

- Provides a much-needed tool to track businesses. It would enable the County to have vital contact information and an accurate employee count and it would be a valuable resource from an economic development standpoint
- Improves community outreach, public relations, and pubic well-being by providing businesses with critical information regarding safety, code, life, health, and signage.
- Meets a need as many business owners request a business registration
- Provides a vehicle to enforce time place and manner regulations for marijuana dispensaries.

CONS

A business registration program may:

- Be perceived as another tax and more government regulation
- Create an unknown as to costs to start up and administer the program

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS (see Fiscal Impact Form):

The financial implications have yet to be determined and will be established by the department administering the program. For the sake of discussion, a cost-neutral scenario has been presented illustrating potential staffing needs and the registration fee needed to cover costs.

<u>Current year</u>: Revenue is based on the existing number of businesses (2,200) in unincorporated Clackamas County multiplied by a flat rate general registration fee of \$40. The \$40 fee was chosen as it created a revenue stream that was slightly higher than projected expenses and met the objective of a cost-neutral program. The number of businesses was determined with feedback from BCS on businesses (2,000) and Planning staff on home occupations (200).

Ongoing costs: Maintain current year costs less the cost for a temporary position. See Fiscal Impact Form.

Other considerations include staff time:

Technical Services: implement/design online application (allocated costs)

PGA: community outreach program (allocated costs)

DTD: code enforcement (receive a share of program revenue)?

LEGAL/POLICY REQUIREMENTS:

The County is not required to have any type of business license or registration program. However, such a program could provide a valuable vehicle to enforce time place and manner restrictions on marijuana dispensaries.

PUBLIC/GOVERNMENT PARTICIPATION:

None to-date. If the BCC is in agreement to pursue a business registration program, then the designated department would work with PGA on a public outreach program, including study sessions, public hearings, and outreach to Chambers, CCBA, MABA, and other business groups.

OPTIONS:

Option A: Authorize staff to begin the process for instituting a business registration

program, and recommends that BCS administer the program.

Option B: Do not authorize staff to begin the process for instituting a business

registration program.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends Option A, authorizing staff to begin the process for instituting a business registration program, and recommending that BCS administer the program.
