Omicron update

Oregon reported a 19% drop in weekly COVID-19 cases on Monday, marking the eighth consecutive week of cases declining. Current cases are 3.5% of what they were at the peak of the Omicron surge on January 18. State data also shows dropping daily averages to levels not seen since the summer lull before the Delta surge. Hospitalizations are still dropping slowly, with fewer than 200 COVID patients are in the hospital and ICUE and ventilator patients resuming a slow decline. The average rate of all COVID-19 tests that came back positive, an important measure of how prevalent the virus is in the community, fell to the lowest level since May 2020, to 2.3%.

Nationally, experts are monitoring the Omicron subvariant, BA.2, which could trigger an increase in cases. BA.2 is the dominant strain in Europe right now, but data indicate BA.2 is not causing significant problems so far. BA.2 now accounts for nearly 35 percent of COVID-19 cases in the U.S., the CDC reported Tuesday, a 10 percent increase from the week before.

While BA.2-related infections could rise, severe disease or deaths associated with the subvariant are unlikely to increase. In areas where there is a high level of immunity, both from vaccination and from the Omicron surge, the impact from BA.2 is not substantial. So far, the OSU wastewater analyses have shown a consistent decline or plateau in "viral concentration," a measure of how much virus is in a sample relative to the number of people who use the wastewater system. That means the analyses are mirroring the continued swift decline in case counts from testing. Cases will likely increase a bit, mostly due to a lack of masking and distancing, not BA.2.

Flu vaccination encouraged as people remove masks

Oregon is seeing a late-season rise in flu cases – flu season generally peaks around late January or February – as mask requirements for public indoor spaces and schools fall away, making it easier to spread the virus from person to person, according to Oregon Health Authority communicable disease experts. The 2020-2021 flu season was virtually non-existent as public health restrictions, such as stayhome orders, mask requirements, and limits on indoor and outdoor gatherings, kept flu cases down at record-low levels.

Now, Oregon is seeing more cases at a time when the season is usually ending. During the week of March 6 to March 12, Oregon reported that 3.1% of influenza tests were positive, compared with 2.5% the week of February 27 to March 5, 1.6%.

Anyone ages 6 months and older should get the flu vaccine, particularly young children, older adults and those who have chronic conditions such as cardiovascular disease or metabolic diseases such as diabetes. Flu vaccines do not protect against COVID-19, so it's important to get both the flu vaccine and the COVID-19 vaccine. Both vaccines are available from health care providers, local health departments and many pharmacies in Oregon.

Isolation calculator

CDC's new COVID-19 Quarantine and Isolation (Q&I) Calculator takes the stress out of figuring when, and for how long, people with COVID-19 and close contacts need to stay home, get tested, and wear a well-fitting mask. Developed in response to requests from partners and the public, the calculator provides important information about what precautions people with COVID-19 and their close contacts can take to protect loved ones and slow the spread of COVID-19 in their communities.

This online, mobile-friendly calculator provides an easy-to-use way to help people follow CDC's <u>quarantine and isolation</u> guidance and get customized information to address their unique situation. It can be used by individuals, healthcare providers, businesses, and organizations that are managing COVID-19 cases and close contact exposures. The Q&I Calculator is **not** for people with COVID-19 who are moderately or severely ill or those who have a weakened immune system (immunocompromised)—they should talk to their doctor about when to end isolation.

In addition, this tool does not apply to cases and close contacts identified in certain settings. Parents with children in K-12 schools or early care and education (ECE) programs should consult their program administrator for specific isolation and quarantine guidance in their school or ECE setting. OHA seeks youth ages 15-19 for advisory council on pandemic recovery

Oregon Health Authority (OHA) is looking for young people ages 15-19 to lead a <u>Youth Advisory Council</u> (<u>YAC</u>) that will decide how to spend \$1 million to help youth and their communities and schools recover from the COVID-19 pandemic. The funding is part of a grant from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to provide economic relief following the pandemic.

YAC members will work together to:

- Define what recovery looks like and the values of recovery
- Identify needs and health inequities that are priorities for youth
- Have discussions about health equity and community engagement
- Talk about what is already happening regarding pandemic recovery for youth

From applications received through March 31, OHA will select 20 youth to serve on the advisory council. They will be required to attend a once monthly two-hour meetings and asked to spend about three additional hours a month on council activities, as well as attend two four-hour retreats.

COVID-19 hospitalizations

The number of hospitalized patients with COVID-19 across Oregon is 179, which is 13 fewer than yesterday. There are 28 COVID-19 patients in intensive care unit (ICU) beds, which is one fewer than yesterday.

There are 110 available adult ICU beds out of 668 total (16% availability) and 338 available adult non-ICU beds out of 4,256 (8% availability).

Disease Response

All regularly scheduled vaccine clinics remain open and the walk-in numbers are increasing substantially. Staff is working in partnership with Clackamas Community College for a two-day vaccine clinic on March 29-30, where free at-home test kits and PPE for students and faculty will be distributed. The mobile vaccine team will be conducting an onsite business vaccine clinic for boosters at Imperfect Foods on March 29.


The POD Assistants team completed first round of the Alert database outreach project, contacting more than 2,200 records from everyone vaccinated through Clackamas County Public Health who did not complete their primary series and/or were due for a booster. Project results: 1,819 phone calls were initiated; 45 scheduled vaccine appointments; 36 walk-in commitments; 16 updated Alert records from vaccine cards; 5 in-home vaccine appointments scheduled; and 23 informed they had already completed their series.

Last week, the COVID Investigation & Outreach opened 143 cases and managed 20 active outbreaks. The team continued their work of updating resources to reflect the changes in quarantine, masking, and investigative guidelines in order to provide ongoing support to our community partners. With the decreased case load, staff have been able to use their skills to provide assistance in other Public Heath areas. The Education and Referral team within our unit has begun processing rental assistance through the Social Services Rent Assistance Program (SSRA). This program is for individuals who lost income due to COVID-19 and may be at risk of missing a rent payment, being late on a rent payment, or being evicted. It represents one of many ways our unit supports the citizens of Clackamas County.





COVID-19 Positive Patients in Oregon Hospitals






Oregon's SARS-CoV-2 Wastewater Monitoring



Entire ClackCo Population


