Clackamas County focus

- Start from the baseline that certain communities will experience disproportionate harm from climate change impacts and climate actions
- Recognize that historically, policies have relied on market forces to identify transitions, often leaving communities behind
- The climate action plan will seek to provide supported transitions to avoid these impacts with policies that anticipate and provide alternatives to family and community-level harm

Let's take a deeper look

- Reduced timber harvests on federal land
 - + a narrative of threatened timber communities
 - + automation of timber jobs
 - + a large corporate model of maximum extraction
 - = fewer jobs and a diminished tax base for timber communities with more intense private timber harvesting
