Oak Lodge Water District/Oak Lodge Sanitary District Consolidation Explanatory Statement

Overview

This measure authorizes consolidation of the Water and Sanitary Districts that serve the Oak Lodge area. The consolidation is proposed by the elected Boards of both Districts.

Oak Lodge Water District and Oak Lodge Sanitary District provide drinking water, sewage collection and treatment, and surface water management services in the Oak Grove/Jennings Lodge area. The two Districts' boundaries are nearly the same.

Since 2013, the elected Boards of both Districts have jointly conducted legal and financial studies to evaluate the pros and cons of consolidation. The studies demonstrate a single consolidated District could save ratepayers an estimated \$4.25 million over the first 10 years. Savings come from: not replacing three duplicative positions that will be vacant due to retirement and attrition; combining financial systems; and sharing office space – there is room for everyone in the Water District building.

Summary of Reasons to Consolidate

The organizational and financial studies jointly performed by the Oak Lodge Water District and Oak Lodge Sanitary District anticipate a number of benefits for consolidation:

- Cost savings: Estimated at \$4.25 million over the first 10 years
- More efficient: eliminates overlap and duplication.
- Improved customer service through a single point of contact.
- Better prepared for natural disasters and emergencies.
- Shared mission: provide clean water, protect public health and the environment in the most cost-effective manner.
- Customers receive combined water/sewer bill.
- No job losses. Only vacant, duplicative management and administrative positions will be eliminated.
- Maintains independent, local service for water, sewer and surface water management.

Consolidation Requires Voter Approval

Both District Boards have adopted matching resolutions to place ballot measures before voters on the May 2016 Primary Election ballot. The proposed consolidation must be approved by voters in both Districts. If approved, both Districts will continue until the consolidated District takes effect. The consolidated District will remain an independent public agency directed by its own elected Board.

Board and Management Team for the Consolidated District

The new Board's five members will be selected from among the ten current elected directors/commissioners of the Oak Lodge Water District Board of Commissioners and Oak Lodge Sanitary District Board of Directors. Both the current Water District and Sanitary District Boards will be represented by at least two members on the new Board.

The Water District and Sanitary District boards have named the initial management team for the consolidated District:

General Manager: Dan Bradley, from the Water District

Deputy General Manager - Planning & Engineering: Jason Rice, P.E. from the Sanitary District

Financial Manager: Kelly Stacey, from the Water District

Wastewater Operations Manager: Mark Walter, from the Sanitary District

Water Superintendent: Todd Knapp, from the Water District

Asset Maintenance Manager: Rich Ludlow, from the Sanitary District

RESOLUTION 16-01

A RESOLUTION BY THE OAK LODGE SANITARY DISTRICT BOARD OF DIRECTORS AUTHORIZING A BALLOT MEASURE TO APPROVE CONSOLIDATION WITH THE OAK LODGE WATER DISTRICT

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of Oak Lodge Sanitary District (OLSD) has been engaged in a process to consider the merits of consolidation with Oak Lodge Water District (OLWD); and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of OLSD and the Board of Commissioners of OLWD engaged FCS Consulting to perform a consolidation study (FCS Study) that was presented, reviewed and accepted by each Board; and

WHEREAS, the FCS study revealed multiple benefits to each District if consolidation were to occur; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors seeks approval of consolidation through a vote by District electors; and

WHEREAS, the May 17, 2016 election is the most timely opportunity to solicit approval by District electors through a ballot measure;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Oak Lodge Sanitary District Board of Directors that:

- 1. District Staff and legal counsel proceed with developing and submitting the following Ballot Title, Caption, Question, and Summary to the Clackamas County Clerk for inclusion in the May 17, 2016 election.

Caption:

CONSOLIDATES OAK LODGE WATER DISTRICT AND OAK LODGE SANITARY DISTRICT

Question:

Shall Oak Lodge Water and Oak Lodge Sanitary Districts be authorized to consolidate as jointly proposed by their elected boards?

Summary:

This measure authorizes consolidation of the Water and Sanitary Districts that serve the Oak Lodge area. The consolidation is proposed by the elected Boards of both Districts.

Oak Lodge Water District and Oak Lodge Sanitary District provide drinking water, sanitary sewers and surface water management services in the Oak Grove/Jennings Lodge area. The two districts' boundaries are nearly the same.

- 3. District management and staff begin collaborating with Water District management and staff to ensure an effective transition to a joint entity should the electors approve the Ballot Measure.
