




#### Tobacco use

Tobacco use remains the most preventable cause of illness and death in America and Clackamas County. About 14% of adults are reported smokers in America and 20% of deaths annually are linked to tobacco use across the nation. In Clackamas County in 2019, 11% of adults reported smoking cigarettes regularly and 20,370 people have a serious illness caused by tobacco. Tobacco is directly related to the top three causes of death in Clackamas County: major cardiovascular disease, cancer (lung, breast, lymphoid), and chronic lower respiratory disease. These deaths are not limited to those who smoke; nearly 20% of Clackamas County residents are exposed to secondhand smoke indoors, contributing to severe illness. Additionally, e-cigarettes have emerged as a popular substance among youth, with 26% of Clackamas County 11th-graders reporting using them.

- Leading cause of preventable death
- \$153.7 million on tobaccorelated medical care
- Disproportionately impacts low-income, LGBTQ, people with mental illness, BIPOC
- Increases risk of severe COVID symptoms and outcomes
- Nicotine addiction is the gateway to illicit drugs

## Our Response



#### Health Systems Strategies\*

- Implement the electronic referral (e-referral) to the Oregon Tobacco Quit Line in four Federally Qualified Health Centers
- 2) Develop and implement a tobacco prevention and cessation communication campaign focused on communities experiencing health disparities.

## TPEP Work Plan 2021 - 2023

#### Policy Strategies\*

- Adopt a tobacco-free ordinance for all countyowned properties.
- 2) Implement policies that restricts the use of tobacco products at outdoor areas (dining, downtowns, public events, recreational areas).
- 3) Replace tobacco products with healthy options in a local corner store with the goal of showcasing healthy tobacco-free retail environments.

#### **Current policy**

No smoking or vaping within 25 feet of doors & windows. Smoking & vaping allowed in designated areas.

#### **Future policy**

No tobacco use on all county-owned properties, including smokeless and inhalant delivery systems

# TF County Campus Policy

- Creates an environment that supports health
- Decreases exposure to secondhand smoke
- Normalizes tobacco-free environments
- Models policy for other employers
- Reduce health-related costs
- Lower risk of fire and fire insurance premium
- Reduce cost of maintaining property
- Increase productivity and morale
- Improves eligibility for grant funding





# TF County Campus Policy

## Then & Now



Year	<b>Event</b>
2008	Employee survey completed. Assessed readiness for a tobacco-free campus policy & measured prevalence of tobacco use.
2008	Oregon passes Indoor Clean Air Act (ICAA) - no smoking indoors and within 10 feet of windows, doors, air intakes
2008	Board of County Commissioners (BCC) adopted ordinance – no smoking within 25 feet; created designated smoking areas
2014	BCC amended County Code to include vaping.
2019	Employee survey completed
2019	Clackamas County Leadership Academy recommended implementing a county-wide tobacco-free policy on all county-owned, leased or operated property.



# 2019 Employee Survey

### Results



#### 2500 County Employees

875 Respondents (36.8% response rate)
55% support tobacco-free county policy
44% do not support a policy
12% currently use tobacco
(compared to 16% in 2008)




