Voters' Pamphlet

Your official 2012 Primary Election Voters' Pamphlet provides you with information about candidates who will appear on your ballot.

It includes instructions for marking your ballot, a complete list of federal and state candidates, as well as other information to assist you through the voting process.

Candidate statements are printed as submitted. The state does not correct punctuation, grammar, syntax errors or inaccurate information. The only changes made are attempts to correct spelling errors if the word as originally submitted is not in the dictionary.

The voters' pamphlet has been compiled by the Secretary of State since 1903, when Oregon became one of the first states to provide for the printing and distribution of such a publication. One copy of the voters' pamphlet is mailed to every household in the state. Additional copies are available at the Secretary of State's office, local post offices, courthouses and all county elections offices. It can also be viewed at oregonvotes.org.

Candidates

In the primary election, candidates are divided into three sections: Democratic candidates, Republican candidates and nonpartisan candidates. Major party candidates appear before nonpartisan candidates and every two years the order in which major political party candidates appear is rotated. For 2012, Democratic candidates appear first. Candidates pay a fee, or submit signatures in lieu of paying the fee, for space in the voters' pamphlet. The information required by law—pertaining to occupation, occupational background, educational background and prior governmental experience—has been certified as true by each candidate.

Random Alphabet

Oregon statute (ORS 254.155) requires the Secretary of State to complete a random order of the letters of the alphabet to determine the order in which the names of candidates appear on the ballot.

If your ballot is lost, destroyed, damaged or you make a mistake in marking your ballot, you may call your county elections office and request a replacement ballot. One will be mailed to you as long as you request it by May 10. After that, you may pick it up at the elections office. If you have already mailed your original ballot before you realize you made a mistake, you have cast your vote and will not be eligible for a replacement ballot.

Your voted ballot must be returned to your county elections office by 8pm election day, Tuesday, May 15, 2012.

Postmarks do not count!

County elections offices are open on election day from 7am to 8pm.

California and Washington have both adopted "Top Two" elections where all candidates compete in a single open primary, with only two candidates advancing to the general election. Why not Oregon? Open primaries apparently work just fine and Oregon's closed primaries clearly do not. This "private" Democratic primary is financed entirely with "public" money. Doesn't the Oregon Constitution require the same subsidy for all candidates?

Art I, Sect 20. Equality of privileges and immunities of citizens.

No law shall be passed granting to any citizen or class of citizens privileges, or immunities, which, upon the same terms, shall not equally belong to all citizens.

In 1987, the Libertarian Party challenged Oregon's partisan primary system - but was rebuffed by the Oregon Supreme Court:

Without a more substantial showing by the LPO that the purpose of ORS 248.008 and 249.732 is to discourage the development of political rivals of the major parties, we cannot conclude that these statutes violate Article I, section 20, or Article II, section 1, of the Oregon Constitution.

LPO v. Roberts, 305 Ore, 238, 1988.

Using the pretense of a criminal trial, the court ignored the equal privileges clause, and instead, acquitted the legislature on all charges for lack of evidence. This is absurd — Supreme Court judges don't decide guilt or innocence, juries do:

O.R.C.P. Rule 51.

A. Issues. Issues arise upon the pleadings when a fact or conclusion of law is maintained by one party and controverted by the other.

B. Issues of law; how tried. An issue of law shall be tried by the court.

 $\underline{\textbf{C.}}$ Issues of fact; how tried. The trial of all issues of fact shall be by jury \dots

Someone should find a good lawyer, file a class action lawsuit, and assert that all "issues of fact" decided in LPO v. Roberts, be retried - by a jury.

You have the right to Vote:

If you are a US citizen, live in Oregon, are 18 years old and have registered to vote.

- You have the right to vote even if you are homeless.
- **You have the right** to vote if you have been convicted of a felony but have been released from custody, even if you are on probation or parole.
- You have the right to vote even if you have a guardian and even if you need help reading or filling out your ballot.
- You have the right to vote or cast your ballot if you are in line by 8 PM on Election Day.
- You have the right to know if you are registered to vote.
- You have the right to choose whether or not you want to register as a member of a political party.
- You have the right to use a signature stamp or other mark but first you have to fill out a form. No one can sign for you.
- from elections staff or from a friend or family member. There are some people who cannot help you vote, for example, your boss or a union officer from your job.

- You have the right to a secret vote. You do not have to tell anyone how you voted.
- You have the right to get a "provisional ballot", even if you are told you are not registered to vote.
- You have the right to get a new ballot if you make a mistake.
- → You have the right to vote for the person you want. You can write in someone else's name if you don't like the choices on your ballot.
- You have the right to vote "yes" or "no" on any issue on your ballot.
- You have the right to leave some choices blank on your ballot. The choices you do mark will still count.
- you have the right to use a voting system for all Federal Elections that makes it equally possible for people with disabilities to vote privately and independently.
- You have the right to know if your ballot, including a "provisional ballot", was accepted for counting.
- You have the right to file a complaint if you think your voting rights have been denied.



To vote for a candidate whose name does not appear on the Official Ballot, completely darken the rectangle to the left of the blank line provided for the office and fill in the blank with the full name of the candidate. [Figure 2]

Remember: If you vote for more than the number of candidates allowed for an office, or you vote both YES and NO on a measure, it is called an overvote, and your vote for that candidate or measure will not count. [Figure 3]





Return your Official Ballot

What's new?

Clackamas County now provides unique Precinct Committeeperson ballots for each precinct. No more hunting for your precinct number on the outer envelope; the ballot you've received is all you need. Unique PCP ballots also allowed us to cut our paper usage by about 75%!

On your precinct committeeperson paper ballot, note the number of *male and female* candidates for which you may vote. If the precinct is designated "Vote for One," you may vote for one male *and* one female candidate. If it says "Vote for Two," you may vote for two male and two female candidates, and so on. The total number allowed *includes* any write-in candidates.

Remember to completely fill in the rectangle to the left of the candidate name(s) of your choice.

Write-In Candidates

If no one in your precinct has filed for any of the precinct committeeperson positions, the words "No Candidate Filed" will appear, followed by spaces for writing in candidates' names.

If you choose to write in names of candidates, do so by printing their full name on the line provided, and completely fill in the rectangle to the left of the line.

Enclose your PCP ballot with your regular ballot in the secrecy envelope.

REGISTERING TO VOTE

SOME FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

WHO MAY REGISTER TO VOTE?

Anyone who is:

- * A resident of Oregon;
- ★ A United States citizen; and
- 17 years of age or older. [Note: Registered Voters must be 18 years of age to receive a ballot.]

HOW CAN I REGISTER?

By mail-in registration form or in person at any county elections office or at a designated state agency, including the Department of Motor Vehicles and some public assistance agencies. Also, voters can access secure online voter registration at http://www.oregonvotes.org.

WHEN MAY I REGISTER AND WHAT IS THE REGISTRATION DEADLINE?

You may register at any time. However, your voter registration form must be received or postmarked no later than the 21st day before the election at which you intend to vote.

WHERE CAN I FIND VOTER REGISTRATION FORMS?

Post offices, public libraries, city halls, DMV offices and Clackamas County Elections, 1710 Red Soils Ct., Ste. 100, in Oregon City. You can register online, or download and print a PDF form from the Secretary of State's web site at the Oregon Voter Registration link, which can be found at http://www.oregonvotes.org.

WHAT INFORMATION IS REQUIRED?

In October 2002, the "Help America Vote Act" was signed into law. The Act changed voter registration requirements nationwide for voting in federal elections. When registering to vote in Oregon for the first time, you must provide an Oregon Driver's License / ID. If you do not have a valid ODL / ID, the last four digits of your Social Security number must be provided.

If you **do not** have a valid Oregon Driver's License / ID or a Social Security number, you must affirm this by marking the appropriate box on the registration form. If you are registering by mail, you must provide a copy of one of the following: a valid photo identification, a copy of a paycheck stub, utility bill, bank statement or other government document showing your name and address.

If sufficient documentation is not provided at the time of registration, it will be requested by elections officials in order for you to vote at the next federal election.

When filling out the registration card, you must furnish your full name, residence address (and mailing address, if different), ODL or Oregon ID, date of birth, political party preference, and signature. Your residence address must be the physical address where you reside - not a post office box.

WHAT IF I TURN 18 AFTER THE REGISTRATION DEADLINE?

If you will be 18 years of age by election day, you must register no later than the 21st day prior to the election to be eligible to vote in that election.

CAPTION:

VOTER APPROVAL REQUIRED FOR DEBT FINANCING FOR PUBLIC PROJECTS

QUESTION:

Shall Gladstone amend the City Charter to require voter approval for incurrence of any debt in financing a public project?

SUMMARY: This measure was proposed by an initiative petition. The Oregon Constitution gives City voters the right to adopt and amend their charter.

If approved, the measure would amend the City Charter to prohibit the City of Gladstone from incurring debt in financing any public project, except through the issuance of municipal bonds by bond measure duly approved by a majority of the voters in a regularly scheduled election set forth in ORS 221.230, or special election.

This measure shall be effective immediately upon its passing. This measure shall apply to any and all projects in any phase of planning, design, development, or construction.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This measure would amend the Gladstone City Charter to prohibit the City of Gladstone from incurring any debt, irrespective of amount, in financing any public project. The prohibition would not apply to the issuance of municipal bonds to finance a public project if a bond measure is approved by a majority of voters.

If approved, the measure would be effective immediately and would apply to all existing projects in any phase of planning, design, development or construction, including the Gladstone library. The measure would also apply to future construction projects including the potential rehabilitation of City Hall and the Police Station. Past projects that would have been subject to the prohibition because they required the City to incur debt in order finance the project include water system improvements and the City's participation in the North Clackamas Water Commission.

This measure was proposed by a citizen initiative petition. After the City Recorder certified to the Gladstone City Council on January 10, 2012 that the petition has sufficient qualified signatures, the City Council referred the petition to the ballot for approval by city voters.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR

This measure is not about denying the City a new library. Maybe taxpayers would vote to build a 19,000 S.F. library costing \$15.6 million. However, it is about the City's disregard for your right to vote on such a large capital project and their willingness to significantly, and perhaps catastrophically, sacrifice other needs within our community for this single project.

Library supporters have come up with an elaborate financial scheme to dowse our concerns. They want us to believe that the County's operational funding for the new library results in a cash windfall — a windfall that somehow allows the City to pay for neglected road, sewer and water repairs. To receive this hypothetical windfall we must build a library.

Well if the <u>past</u> is any predictor of the <u>future</u>, City Council has a lot of explaining to do. Consider the existing library. Currently the City's operating expenses are 25% greater than County provided funding. The City subsidizes the 25% shortfall from its general fund. This is true. Yet, they want us to believe their financing rhetoric for building a new library that is three times larger and employs many more librarians and staff.

Why does the City Council not treat taxpayers as does the School District? The District has always publicly presented their case for building projects and service expansion. More importantly, the District consistently places their agenda forefront for a vote. And because of their forthrightness, schools have been rewarded with our confidence and financial support.

Trust — that is what Measure 3-394 is about. Our schools have not suffered catastrophically by having their needs put to a vote.

It is time to stop the rhetoric coming out of City Hall. It is time that the City demonstrates honesty, financial frankness, and proper planning for their expenditures.

QUESTION:

Shall Gladstone amend Charter to require a public vote if City spends \$1,000,000 or more to construct a public building?

SUMMARY: This measure was proposed by an initiative petition. The Oregon Constitution gives City voters the right to adopt and amend their charter.

If approved, the measure would amend the City Charter to require majority voter approval at a regularly scheduled or special election for the expenditure of \$1,000,000 or more by the City any of its departments, service districts or agencies for the construction of any public building by or for the City of Gladstone.

In calculating whether the project will involve the actual or reasonably projected expenditure of \$1,000,000, the calculation shall include the fair market value of any real estate to be utilized or committed to the project based on a current market appraisal performed by a certified real estate appraiser.

This measure will be effective immediately and will apply to all public building projects in any phase of planning, development, or construction. On the date of effectiveness any project to which this measure applies and any expenditures connected therewith, must be suspended until an affirmative vote is obtained.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This measure would amend the Gladstone City Charter to require voter approval for the expenditure of \$1,000,000 or more by the City or any of its departments, service districts or agencies for the construction of any public building by or for the City of Gladstone.

A calculation regarding whether the project will involve the actual or reasonably projected expenditure of \$1,000,000 must include the fair market value of any real estate that will be utilized or committed to the project based on a current market appraisal performed by a certified real estate appraiser.

If approved, this measure would be effective immediately upon passage and would apply to all public building projects in any phase of planning, development, or construction including the new Gladstone Library project and future construction projects such as the potential City Hall and Police Station rehabilitation. If approved, any project to which this measure would apply must be suspended until voter approval is obtained.

This measure was proposed by citizen initiative petition. After the City Recorder certified to the Gladstone City Council on January 10, 2012 that the petition has sufficient qualified signatures, the City Council referred the petition to the ballot for approval by City voters.

SOME COMMON VOTE-BY-MAIL MISTAKES

Avoid these mistakes when signing and returning your ballot, and make sure your vote gets counted!

Letting your spouse (or child or parent) sign your ballot envelope: Some families make voting a communal event, but make sure the envelope you sign is your own, and doesn't belong to some other family member. If the signature on the envelope doesn't match the pre-printed name, the ballot will be challenged.

Signing by Power of Attorney: Don't do it. If a voter is unable to sign, a Signature Attestation form may be obtained so the voter is able to use a rubber stamp of their signature.

Saving a stamp by putting two ballots in one envelope: Don't do it. Both ballots would be rejected.

Forgetting to use the secrecy envelope:

First of all, don't panic! And don't bother mangling the return envelope to re-open it just because you forgot the secrecy envelope. Even without it, your vote will still be confidential and it will be counted.

Waiting until Election Day to mail your ballot:
Mail your ballot back as soon as you can. The Postal
Service simply cannot get a ballot from the mailbox
to our office in the space of one day, and (it can't
be said often enough) the postmark does not
count. Waiting until Election Day to return the ballot
practically ensures that your vote will not be counted,
but if you do wait that long, please make use of one
of our official drop sites (see the list on page 3-48).



EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This measure would expand the City's boundaries by approximately 6.5 acres. The property is located on the south side of Holcomb Boulevard and north of Redland Road and is identified as Tax Lot 180 on Clackamas County Map 2-2E-28D.

The property is located within the larger Park Place Concept Plan area, which was brought into Portland metropolitan urban growth boundary ("UGB") in 2002 to accommodate growth.

The property is currently designated Medium Density Residential on the Oregon City Comprehensive Plan and zoned County FU-10 ("Future Urbanizable"). Approval of the annexation would allow connection to city services for existing and future development. No further development of the parcel could occur until a re-zoning and development application has been approved by the City of Oregon City and the parcel would remain zoned County FU-10 in the interim.

The City Charter requires voter approval of annexations. A map showing the parcels is included.



MEASURE APPROVING ANNEXATION OF 129.67 ACRES INTO CITY OF SANDY

QUESTION:

Shall 129.67 acres east of Marcy Street extending to the Sandy River known as the "Sandy River Park" be annexed into the Sandy City Limits?

SUMMARY: Annexation is the legal process to bring property into the city limits. The City of Sandy as applicant and property owner is asking to bring eight parcels of land east of Marcy Street, known as the "Sandy River Park" into the city limits. The legal description of the properties is: T2S R4E Section 11DD Tax Lots 100, 3300, T2S R4E Section 12 Tax Lots 600, 602, 700, 701, and T2S R4E Section 13BB Tax Lots 100, 101

The annexation area is adjacent to the city limits on two sides. Proposed uses for the property are limited to those identified in the Sandy River Park Master Plan.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT


This measure would approve annexation of 129.67 acres into the city limits of the City of Sandy. The property is known as the "Sandy River Park" and includes the following tax lots: T2S R4E Section 11DD Tax Lots 100, 3300, T2S R4E Section 12 Tax Lots 600, 602, 700, 701, and T2S R4E Section 13BB Tax Lots 100, 101. The annexation area is located east of the end of Marcy Street and extends north to the Sandy River. The property is currently undeveloped and following annexation would include limited development as identified in the Sandy River Park Master Plan. The property is contiguous to the city limits on two sides. The requested parcels are currently zoned by Clackamas County as Timber. If annexation of the parcels is approved by voters, the area will be zoned POS (Parks and Open Space) by the City of Sandy.

The City of Sandy as applicant and property owner has applied for approval of this annexation request as allowed by Oregon law. The city, following its Charter, has put this matter before the voters for approval.

The parcels are currently undeveloped except for the construction of hiking trails. Access to the subject property is from Marcy Street. Following annexation, any development of the property will occur in compliance with the Sandy River Park Master Plan.

The Sandy City Council reviewed this application on March 5, 2012 and approved it for inclusion on the May 15, 2012 ballot by adopting Resolution 2012-02 by a 7-0 vote.

CHARTER AMENDMENT TO REQUIRE VOTE TO REMOVE RESOURCE DESIGNATION

QUESTION:

Shall the Charter be amended to require voter approval to remove "park" or "open space" designations from city-owned property?

This measure is necessary to preserve your right as a West Linn elector to vote on the sale, lease or non authorized use of City owned Park and open space. Chapter 11 of the West Linn City received overwhelming voter approval in 2001 and established the right of West Linn voters to vote on any proposal to sell, lease or swap City park or open space or to use such property for non-park open space purposes.

This measure would add language that strengthens Chapter 11. This language is necessary because a court decision by the Oregon Court of Appeals found that since the existing language of Chapter 11 didn't explicitly prohibit the City from changing City property designations for park and open space to that of regular non restricted City property that the City had the right to do so without voter approval. This means in essence that there exists what I would call a loophole in Chapter 11 that allows the City to bypass the protections of the Chapter. In other words the City has the right to take a piece of park property change its designation to regular City property and then potentially sell, swap or lease such property without seeking voter approval.

This Measure if approved would close that loophole restore the protections and purpose that Chapter 11 was always intended to have.

I congratulate the current City Council for keeping faith with the prior will of West Linn's voters and with the clear purpose and intent of Chapter 11 by voting unanimously to place this measure before the voters of West Linn.

CANBY SCHOOL DISTRICT THREE-YEAR DISTRICT OPERATIONS LOCAL OPTION LEVY.

QUESTION:

Shall the Canby School District levy \$0.85 per \$1000 of assessed value for each of three years' beginning 2012-2013 for operations? (This measure may cause property taxes to increase more than three percent.)

SUMMARY: This measure authorizes Canby
School District No. 86 to levy a property tax in the
amount of \$0.85 per \$1000 of assessed value
each year for three years. The levy would be used
to help finance District operations. Areas of emphasis for the use of these funds are student school
days, class sizes, and implementation of new state
academic standards.

An estimate of the total amount to be raised each fiscal year is:

2012-2013 \$ 811,000 2013-2014 \$ 513,000 2014-2015 \$ 414,000

Total amount of local option tax to be raised: \$1,738,000.

The estimated tax cost for this measure is an ESTIMATE ONLY based on the best information available from the county assessor at the time of the estimate.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

A local option levy is a temporary property tax that would be used to fund school district operations and would expire after three years. The Canby School District No. 86 Board of Directors is placing a three-year local option levy of \$0.85 per year per \$1,000 of assessed value before the voters on May 15th, 2012. If approved, this local option rate would raise approximately \$1.74 million dollars over the three years of the levy (\$811,000 in year one, \$513,000 in year two, and \$414,000 in year three).

State revenue to the Canby School District has been reduced by \$2.76 million per year since the 2007-08 school year. Over this time the district has reduced teachers by 12%, support staff by 13%, administration by 22%, postponed all new curriculum materials adoptions, and reduced the length of the school year. The local option tax revenue would be used to fund student school days, smaller class sizes, and instructional materials and staff time for implementation of new state academic standards. (Cont.)

This levy would cost property tax payers a maximum of \$0.85 per year per \$1,000 of assessed value each year for three years. It would not cause the total property tax paid for education to exceed the Ballot Measure Five (5) limit of \$5 per \$1,000 of real market value on any property. This tax will not apply to any property where the market value is less than 110% of the assessed value.

An example of the possible tax amounts for a home with an "average" assessed value of \$223,160 is:

- For a market value of \$283,564 or above, a \$189.69 annual tax would be imposed on this property (or approximately \$15.81 per month).
- For a market value between \$283,564 and \$245,628, this same property would have a proportionally lower tax amount.
- For a market value of \$245,628 (110% of the assessed value) or less, this property would not pay any additional taxes.

The "average" market value of homes in the Canby School District is \$271,300, which would cap the average home at a total collection of \$1,356.50 and limit the annual Levy collection to \$128.36 (or approximately \$10.70 per month).

Canby School District has maintained a well-deserved reputation for quality programs over the years. Our graduates go on to attend the top universities. Canby is recognized nationally as a leading innovator in the use of technology as an instructional tool. However, reductions in state funding for public education over the past four years have forced the reduction and elimination of even our basic education programs. For example, Canby has one librarian and one nurse for 9 schools.

Prior to 2008, the Canby School District provided outstanding programs while also building a healthy reserve account to guard against fluctuations in state operating revenue. Over the last four years, state funds have dropped more than \$10 million - or \$7,000 a day! Even with the reserve fund use, Canby reduced teachers by 12%, support staff by 13%, and administration by 22%. During this time Canby has delayed all instructional material replacement even though state math standards have changed twice.

With reserve funds limited, the Board voted unanimously to exercise the only option available for additional funding. The proposed 3-year levy is intended to bridge the gap in state funding through the next biennium. This temporary measure would generate funds critical to preventing further cuts in instructional time, keeping necessary school days, and preventing class sizes from growing even larger.

These funds will only be accessible to the school district and cannot be accessed by the city or the state. The maximum rate of \$0.85/\$1,000 will only apply to a few properties as Measure 5 limits will cause many properties to see little if any increase. The school district web site has links and tools to help residents determine the impact on their personal rates.

CAPTION:

ESTACADA RURAL FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND AUTHORIZATION

QUESTION:

Shall Estacada Rural Fire Protection District No. 69 be authorized to issue general obligation bonds not to exceed \$5,600,000? If bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of section 11 and 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

SUMMARY: If approved, this measure would provide funds for capital costs and bond issuance costs. Specifically, this measure would help finance;

- · Capital costs for a new fire station;
- · Site improvements and costs of issuance.

Bonds would mature in 20 years or less from issuance and be issued in one or more series. The estimated average annual cost of this bond would be 39 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value. The owner of a home assessed at \$175,000 is estimated to pay \$68.25 a year. The estimated tax cost for this measure is an ESTIMATE ONLY, based on the best information available from the County assessor at the time of the estimate.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

Estacada Fire District covers approximately 85 square miles and includes the City of Estacada and surrounding area. The District provides fire protection, emergency medical services, fire and life safety education and prevention services. It is staffed by 10 paid career and 40 volunteer firefighters and emergency medical personnel. Estacada Fire District is a special service district governed by a Board of Directors elected by District residents.

By unanimous vote, the Board of Directors approved placement of a bond measure on the May 2012 General Election ballot. If approved, this measure would provide funding for the construction, furnishing and equipping of a new fire station.

The Board is asking District residents to consider a \$5.6 million bond measure to be paid over approximately 20 years. This would represent an estimated 39 cents per \$1000 of assessed property valuation at an annual cost of \$68.25 to the owner of a home with an assessed valuation of \$175, 000.

The estimated tax cost for this measure is an ESTI-MATE ONLY based on the best information available from the county assessor at the time of the estimate.

The Board of Directors placed the measure on the ballot for these reasons:

- Constructed in 1964, the Main Station located downtown is no longer able to adequately meet the needs of the fire district. Personnel and equipment are currently dispersed between the main station, a modular office building, a storage container, and a small house. Back up power is limited in cases of power outages. In an extended emergency this facility is designated as "Emergency Operations Center" for the District which includes the City of Estacada.
- 2. Volunteer firefighters allow the District to maintain current service levels. Indoor facilities for education and training for volunteers the public, consists of asingle classroom. Outdoor training often requires traffic control or closure of streets. Although the District was successful in obtaining a federal grant to purchase a new training tower, we have not been successful in obtaining grant funds for a new fire station. Current facilities make it difficult to meet increased Federal and State mandated training requirements for multiple disciplines and thus simultaneous classes.
- 3. When the Main Station was built 48 years ago the District responded to 100 calls annually with 2 paid and 20 volunteer personnel. In 2011 the District responded to 1,200 calls with 10 career and 40 volunteers. With a total staff of 50, the Main Station has one public restroom, and one restroom with a shower and a toilet. There are no separate facilities, including sleeping accommodations, for female members. The District volunteers now include: career firefighters, volunteer firefighters (half living outside the District's boundary) and fire corps members.

If approved, funding of these projects would provide the District with updated facilities from which to operate and would also provide updated training and living space for volunteers.

There are many different perspectives on how we use the public's tax dollars. This fire station is many things to many in our community. For us it is our part time home, office, training site, community room, meeting place, and most importantly where emergencies start to get fixed.

Your fire fighters need a new facility, this plan will serve another several generations of our citizens and its rescuers.

This bond will cost 39 cents per thousand dollars of property valuation, or \$68.25 a year for a home valued at \$175,000. That is \$5.69 per month for a \$175,000 valued property.

The roof needs to be replaced, the bell tower is crumbling, plumbing issues arise frequently, and significant energy efficiency upgrades are badly needed. The heating system is obsolete, finding replacement part is a challenge. The electrical and wiring system is significantly below modern equipment requirements.

In addition to the repairs and upgrades required for the current building, more space is necessary. The apparatus bays were designed for the fire engines of the 60's, limiting the options available when replacing equipment. Offices are split between the main building and modular building. Rental containers are used for equipment storage. Firefighters don't have the appropriate storage area for their personal safety equipment, forcing them to store the gear in multiple bags.

The current station has no dedicated classroom training space. Tables and chairs are stored in closets, blocking access to medical training supplies. The one room sleeping quarters and single shower are insufficient for the number of people needed to respond quickly to emergencies. Providing a reasonable working, sleeping, and training facility will help Estacada Fire recruit and maintain quality volunteers and career staff well into the future.

Due to the current low interest rates and competitive construction costs, now is the time to build. For the average household in the 88 square mile fire district, the cost will be under \$6.00 per month (\$0.39 per \$1,000 of assessed value annually). We urge you to vote **YES on 3-400.**

QUESTION: Shall tort claim notice provision in Portland City Charter be amended to be consistent with state law?

SUMMARY: Currently, Portland City Charter
Section 1-106 states that tort claim notices must
be presented to the City Attorney. The Oregon
Tort Claims Act identifies who may receive tort
claim notices for the City, including the City Attorney and other City officials. For consistency
with state law, this measure removes the Charter
requirement that service be made only on the
City Attorney.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This measure amends the Portland City Charter. Charter Section 1-106 currently states that tort claim notices must be presented to the City Attorney. This is inconsistent with the Oregon Tort Claims Act, which identifies who may receive tort claim notices for the City, including the City Attorney and other City officials. For consistency with state law, this measure removes the Charter requirement that service be made only on the City Attorney.

The City Charter Commission referred this measure to the voters. The Charter Commission reviewed the Charter and identified parts of the Charter that the Commission determined are outdated, unenforceable or offensive, including the notice provision in Charter Section 1-106. This amendment will not change City government structure or operations.

CAPTION:

AMENDS CITY CHARTER PROVISIONS REGARDING MAYOR'S FUND

QUESTION: Shall Charter language allowing use of Mayor's limited fund without documentation be deleted and name of fund be changed?

SUMMARY: Portland City Charter Section 2-105(a)(14) currently provides that the Council may appropriate up to \$2,000 per year to the Mayor for a secret service fund and that no supporting documentation of expenditures from that fund must be provided. This measure would delete the Charter language allowing the fund to be used without providing supporting evidence of expenditures. As a result, expenditures from this fund would be accounted for in the same manner as other City expenditures. The measure would also change the name of the fund from "secret service Fund" to "discretionary Fund."

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This measure amends the Portland City Charter. Currently, the Portland City Charter Section 2-105(a) (14) allows the Council to appropriate up to \$2,000 per year to the Mayor for use as a secret service fund for which no vouchers need to be provided, meaning that no supporting evidence of expenditures from the fund is required. This measure would delete the Charter language allowing the fund to be used without vouchers. As a result, expenditures from this fund would be accounted for as other City expenditures are by submitting supporting documentation. The measure would also change the name of the fund from "secret service Fund" to "discretionary Fund" to clarify the purpose of the fund.

The City Charter Commission referred this measure to the voters. The amendment will not change government structure.

QUESTION: Shall unenforceable power in Charter regarding regulation of obscenity be deleted to be consistent with state constitution?

SUMMARY: Charter Section 2-105(a)(50) currently states that the City has the power to define what materials are obscene, to prohibit distribution and to punish persons who distribute such materials. Prohibiting obscenity has been foreclosed by the Oregon Supreme Court's interpretation of Article I, Section 8 of the Oregon Constitution. This measure would delete Section 2-105(a)(50) to make the Charter consistent with the Oregon Constitution. Deletion of this section of the City's specific powers would not impair the City's general powers and authority to protect and support public health and safety.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This measure amends the Portland City Charter. Charter Section 2-105(a)(50) currently states that the City has the power to define what materials are obscene, to prohibit distribution and to punish persons who distribute such materials. Prohibiting obscenity has been foreclosed by the Oregon Supreme Court's interpretation of Article I, Section 8 of the Oregon Constitution. This measure would delete Section 2-105(a)(50) to make the Charter consistent with the Oregon Constitution. Deletion of this section of the City's specific powers would not impair the City's general powers and authority to protect and provide support for the City's public health and safety.

QUESTION: Shall outdated and unenforceable Portland City Charter power regarding vagrants and paupers be deleted?

SUMMARY: Charter Section 2-105(a)(51) currently states that the City has the power to define vagrancy and to provide support, restraint, punishment and employment of vagrants and paupers. This measure deletes Section 2-105(a)(51). Portions of this Section are outdated and unenforceable because the City does not have legal authority to punish or restrain or to require employment of vagrants and paupers. Deletion of this section of the City's specific powers will not impair the City's general powers and authority to protect and support the City's public health and safety.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This measure deletes Portland City Charter Section 2-105(a)(51) which gives the City the power to define vagrancy and to provide support, restraint, punishment and employment of vagrants and paupers. This Section is outdated and unenforceable because the City does not have legal authority to punish or restrain or to require employment of vagrants and paupers. Deletion of this section of the City's specific powers will not impair the City's general powers and authority to protect and support public health and safety.

The Charter Commission referred this measure to the voters. The City's Charter Commission reviewed the Charter and identified parts of the Charter that the Commission determined are outdated, unenforceable or offensive, including Charter Section 2-105(a)(51). The Charter Commission proposes deletion of Section 2-105(a)(51) of the Charter because the section contains outdated, offensive and unenforceable terms. This section can be deleted without changing City government structure or operations.

QUESTION: Shall outdated Portland City Charter language referring to prohibitions on exhibition of "deformed or crippled persons" and begging be deleted?

SUMMARY: Currently, Charter Section 2-105(a) (54) states that the City may "prohibit the exhibition of deformed or crippled persons" and prohibit all persons from begging on streets or in public places. This measure deletes Section 2-105(a) (54). The terms "deformed or crippled" in the current Charter section are outdated and offensive. Further, the City does not have legal authority to prohibit all begging. Deletion of this section of the City's specific powers will not impair the City's general powers and authority to protect and support public health and safety, including constitutionally allowed restrictions on activities in the right of way and in public places.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This measure deletes Portland City Charter Section 2-105(a)(54) which currently states that the City may "prohibit the exhibition of deformed or crippled persons" and prohibit all persons from begging on streets or in public places. The terms "deformed or crippled" are outdated and offensive. Further, the City does not have legal authority to prohibit all begging. Deletion of this section of the City's specific powers will not impair the City's general powers and authority to protect and support public health and safety, including constitutionally allowed restrictions on activities in the right of way and in public places.

The Charter Commission referred this measure to the voters. The City's Charter Commission reviewed the Charter and identified parts of the Charter that the Commission determined are outdated, unenforceable or offensive, including Charter Section 2-105(a)(54). The Charter Commission recommends deletion of Section 2-105(a)(54) because the section includes outdated, offensive and unenforceable terms. This section can be deleted or amended without changing City government structure or operations.

QUESTION: Shall Charter language allowing use of Council emergency fund without documentation be deleted?

SUMMARY: Portland City Charter Section 2-108 currently provides that an annual appropriation of \$5,000 will be placed in a fund to be used at the Council's discretion. The Charter further provides that the Council is not required to provide documentation of use of the funds. This measure would delete the Charter language allowing the fund to be used without providing supporting evidence of expenditures. As a result, spending from this fund would be accounted for in the same manner as other City spending.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This measure amends the Portland City Charter. Currently, Portland City Charter Section 2-108 provides that the Council may appropriate up to \$5,000 per year to the Council to use without providing vouchers, meaning that no supporting evidence of the expenditures is required. This measure would delete the Charter language allowing the fund to be used without vouchers. As a result, spending from this fund would be accounted for by submission of supporting documentation in the same manner as other City expenditures.

The City Charter Commission referred this measure to the voters. This amendment will not change City government structure.

CAPTION:

AMENDS CHARTER TO CLARIFY ELECTION PROCEDURE FOR FILLING VACANCIES

QUESTION: Shall Portland City Charter procedures to fill vacancies in elective office be clarified?

SUMMARY: Section 2-206 of the Charter specifies the elections process and timing for filling vacancies in elective City offices. Section 2-206 provides an election procedure to fill vacancies that may occur at any time during a City elected official's four year term. Each of the three subsections of Section. 2-206 - (b), (c) and (d) - applies to different periods of time during the four year term. While the wording of Subsection (b) is ambiguous, the City has interpreted Subsection (b) to apply to the periods of time not covered by Subsections (c) and (d). However, because of one ambiguous word, Subsection (b) could possibly be interpreted in a way that renders Subsection (b) meaningless. Changing the single word "but" to "or" in Subsection (b) would clarify that section's meaning consistent with intent and would ensure that vacancies occurring during the first three years of an elected official's term are appropriately addressed by the Charter election procedures.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This measure amends the Portland City Charter. Section 2-206 of the Charter specifies the elections process and timing for filling vacancies in elective City offices. The intent of Section 2-206 is to ensure that there is an election procedure to fill vacancies that may occur at any time during a City elected official's four year term. Each of the three subsections of Section 2-206 - (b), (c) and (d) - is intended to apply to different periods of time during the four year term. While the wording of Subsection (b) is ambiguous, the City has interpreted Subsection (b) to apply to the periods of time not covered by Subsections (c) and (d). However, Subsection (b) could be interpreted to apply only if a vacancy occurs both more than 100 days before the primary election in the fourth year of the term but also less than seventy-one days before the general election in the fourth year, even though these two time periods could not overlap, rendering Subsection (b) meaningless. Changing the single word "but" to "or" in Subsection (b) would clarify that section's meaning consistent with intent and would ensure that vacancies occurring during the first three years of an elected official's term are covered by the Charter.

The Charter Commission referred this measure to the voters. The City's Charter Commission reviewed the Charter and identified parts of the Charter that the Commission determined are outdated, unenforceable or offensive, including Section 2-206(b). This section can be amended without changing City government structure or operations.

CAPTION:

AMENDS CHARTER: ADDS TERMS AND VACANCY PROVISION FOR CHARTER COMMISSION

QUESTION: Shall terms of office and vacancy provisions for the Charter Commission be added to the Portland City Charter?

SUMMARY: Currently, Charter Section 13-301 directs the City Council to appoint a Charter Commission at least every ten years. The Charter does not specify the length of Charter Commission members' terms, nor does the Charter identify how vacancies on the Charter Commission will be filled.

This measure provides that the term of office for Charter Commission members shall be no less than two years; the Council will also have the power to reappoint members to additional terms or future Charter Commissions. The measure defines when a vacancy exists on the Charter Commission and how vacancies will be filled.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This measure amends the Portland City Charter. In 2007, City voters approved Charter amendments requiring the City to periodically review its Charter. The new Charter provisions direct the City Council to appoint a Charter Commission at least every 10 years. However, the Charter does not specify the length of Charter Commission members' terms or identify how vacancies on the Charter Commission are to be filled.

The Charter Commission referred this measure to the voters. The Charter Commission recommends amending Charter Section 13-301 to specify that the Council shall appoint Charter Commission members to a term of office of at least two years and may appoint members to additional terms or later Charter commissions. The Housekeeping Committee further recommends amending Charter Section 13-301 to define when a vacancy exists on the Charter Commission and how a vacancy will be filled.

This measure would delete Charter Chapter 14.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This measure amends the Portland City Charter. The City's Charter Commission reviewed the Charter to identify parts of the Charter that the Commission determined are outdated, unenforceable or offensive, including Chapter 14. The Charter Commission recommends deletion of Chapter 14 of the Charter, Exposition-Recreation Commission because the chapter is obsolete. The functions previously carried out by the City Exposition-Recreation Commission are now carried out by the Metropolitan Service District (Metro) through its Metropolitan Exposition and Recreation Commission under a 1989 agreement (as amended) among Portland and other government bodies. Any remaining rights or obligations of the former City Exposition-Recreation Commission are otherwise vested in the City Council pursuant to the Charter and these agreements. This measure would delete Charter Chapter 14 without affecting City government structure or operations.

The Charter Commission referred this measure to the voters.



Vote by Mail Frequently Asked Questions

As a voter, what do I have to do?

Your ballot packet will automatically be mailed to you between April 27 and May 1, 2012. Inside the packet you will find the ballot, a secrecy envelope and a return envelope. Once you vote the ballot, place it in the secrecy envelope and seal it in the pre-addressed return envelope. Be sure you sign the return envelope on the appropriate line. After that just return the ballot either by mail or at a designated dropsite.

What if I am uncomfortable voting my ballot at home?

There are privacy booths available for you to cast your ballot at your county elections office and there may be others at dropsite locations elsewhere in your county. For further information, call your county elections official.

What if my ballot doesn't come?

If you are registered to vote and have not received your ballot by May 4th, call your county elections office. They will check that your voter registration is current. If it is, they will mail you a replacement ballot. You can also check the status of your ballot at My Vote at oregonvotes.org.

What if I have moved and have not updated my registration?

If you were registered to vote by April 24 but now have a different address, call your county elections office for instructions on how to update your registration and receive a ballot.

Do I have to return my ballot by mail?

You have the choice of mailing your ballot or returning it to any county elections office or any designated dropsite in the state. You can find your nearest dropsite along with a map of how to get there by going to www.oregonvotes.org or you may contact your county elections office.

How much postage is required to mail the ballot back?

Your voted ballot can usually be returned using a single 45¢ first-class stamp. In those instances where additional postage is necessary, it will be clearly indicated on the ballot materials.

When must the voted ballot be returned?

The voted ballot must be received in any county elections office or designated dropsite by 8pm on election night. Postmarks do not count!

How do I know if my ballot is received?

You can track the status of your ballot by going online to: My Vote at www.oregonvotes.org or you can call your county elections office and ask if they received your ballot. A record is kept showing each voter whose ballot has been returned.

Can anyone find out how I've voted once I mail my ballot?

No. All ballots are separated from the return envelope before the ballots are inspected. This process ensures confidentiality.

What if I forget to sign the return envelope?

Your elections office will contact you, if possible, to come to the elections office to sign it.

Can the public watch the election process?

All steps of the process are open to observation by the public. Contact your county elections official to make arrangements.

When will election results be known?

Initial results are released at 8pm election night and will continue to be updated through election night until all ballots have been counted. Final certified results will be available 30 days after the election.

Provisional Ballot Information

You will be issued a provisional ballot if:

- there is a question about your eligibility as a voter (for example, there is no evidence on file that you are an active or inactive voter in Oregon)
- you need to vote at a county elections office in a county other than the one you live in

In order to obtain a provisional ballot, you need to fill out a Provisional Ballot Request Form in person at the county elections office.

Your provisional ballot will not be counted until it is determined that you are eligible to vote.

After you have voted the ballot, you can call 1-866-ORE-VOTE (1-866-673-8683) or the county elections office in which you voted to find out if your ballot was counted. If your ballot was not counted, you can also find out the reason it was not counted.

If it is determined that you are ineligible to vote in this election, the completed Provisional Ballot Request Form will serve as your voter registration for future elections.

How to File a Complaint

Any registered voter may file a written complaint with the Secretary of State alleging that a violation of an election law or rule adopted by the Secretary of State has occurred. The complaint should state the reason for believing that the violation occurred and provide evidence relating to it. The complaint must be signed by the elector; anonymous complaints will not be accepted. The complaint should be mailed to, or filed at:

Voters who do not have accessible tools at home may vote the HTML ballot using a tablet computer. An accessible computer station is located in every county elections office.

If, because of a disability, a person is unable to sign a ballot or registration card, they may use a signature stamp or other indicator that represents their signature. A signature stamp attestation form must be completed along with an updated (or new) voter registration card.

I need assistance to vote

Any voter with a disability can request assistance to register to vote, vote their ballot and/or return their ballot. You can also request assistance from a caretaker, care provider or someone else you choose.

I want to assist a voter

Your county elections office can suggest resources you can use to help inform voters. Resources must be nonpartisan and unbiased.

Who can provide assistance?

- → A County Voting Assistance Team
- → A Facility Voting Assistance Team
- → Someone chosen by the voter

Who can not provide assistance?

- → The voter's employer
- → An agent of the voter's employer
- → A union officer or agent of a union of which the voter is a member

What is a facility voting assistance team?

A congregate living facility may form a Facility Assistance Team to assist voters living in their facility.

Teams must be made up of **two registered voters** that do not have the same political party affiliation.

Registering to Vote

To vote in Oregon you need to be registered in the county where you reside.

You can register if you can answer yes to these three questions:

- → Are you a resident of Oregon?
- → Are you a US citizen?
- → Are you at least 17 years of age?

If you are 17 years of age, you will not receive a ballot until an election occurs on or after your 18th birthday.

How to register

You can register to vote online at www.oregonvotes.org or you can get a voter registration card at any of the following places:

- → in this Voters' Pamphlet
- > any county elections office
- → the Secretary of State's Office
- some state agencies such as the Division of Motor Vehicles
- → a voter registration drive

You can fill the card out in person or send it in by US mail.

You can also print out a registration card online at: www.oregonvotes.org.

To vote in the May 15, 2012, Primary Election, your completed voter registration card must be either:

- → postmarked by Tuesday, April 24, 2012
- delivered to a county elections office by Tuesday, April 24, 2012 or
- delivered to any voter registration agency (e.g., DMV) by Tuesday, April 24, 2012.

If you register to vote online, your registration must be submitted by 11:59pm on Tuesday, April 24, 2012.

What information is required to register?

To complete your registration you will provide your:

- → Full legal name
- → Home address
- → Date of birth
- → Signature
- → Valid identification

What are the identification requirements?

 If you have a current, valid Driver's License, Permit or ID number issued by the State of Oregon Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV), you must provide it in the boxes on the card.

A suspended Driver's License is still valid; a revoked Driver's License is NOT valid.

- If you do not have a current, valid Driver's License, Permit
 or ID number issued by the State of Oregon Division of
 Motor Vehicles, you must affirm this on the card by marking
 the appropriate circle and you must then provide the last
 four digits of your Social Security Number.
- If you do not have a Social Security number, you must affirm this on the card by marking the circle in indicating you do not have a valid Driver's License or Social Security number.
- 4. If you do not have a Driver's License, Permit, ID number, or a Social Security number, and you are registering by mail, you must provide a copy of one of the following which shows the voter's name and current address:
 - valid photo identification
 - → a paycheck stub
 - → a utility bill
 - → a bank statement
 - > a government document
 - → proof of eligibility under the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act (UOCAVA) or the Voting Accessibility for the Elderly and Handicapped Act (VAEH)

If you do not provide valid identification, you will not be eligible to vote for Federal races. You will, however, still be eligible to vote for state and local contests.

Updating your voter registration

Once you have registered, you are responsible for keeping your information up to date. You can do this online at www.oregonvotes.org or by completing and returning a voter registration card with the new information. You should update your registration if you do any of the following:

- > change your home address
- → change your mailing address
- → change your name
- → change your signature
- want to change or select a political party
- → will be away from home on election day

If you notify your county elections office of your change of residence address after May 10, 2012, you must request that a ballot be mailed to you or go to your county elections office to get your ballot.

It is against the law to:

- sign another person's ballot return envelope for them
- > vote more than once in an election or cast a fraudulent ballot
- → vote a ballot if you are not legally qualified
- → coerce, pressure or otherwise unduly influence another voter
- → sell, offer to sell, purchase or offer to purchase another voter's ballot
- obstruct an entrance of a building in which a voting booth or official ballot dropsite is located
- deface, remove, alter or destroy another voter's ballot, a posted election notice or election equipment or supplies
- attempt to collect voted ballots within 100 feet of an official ballot dropsite
- attempt to collect voted ballots without displaying a sign stating "Not An Official Ballot Dropsite"

Any violations of the identified election laws are subject to penalties ranging from Civil Penalties (Up to \$250 per Violation), Class A Misdemeanors or Class C Felonies.
