





- Goals covered most topics; many people focused on challenges and ideas










Incorporating participant feedback into project



Map Focus Areas

Characteristics and existing conditions

Light industrial and residential area between Sunrise Expressway and OR 212. Includes Camp Withycombe and two mobile home housing areas.

- Light industrial, commercial, and residential area between I-205 and Union Pacific railroad. Western gateway to the Sunrise Corridor.

Light industrial area between OR 212 and the Clackamas River. Major local freight and employment access.

Sunrise transportation corridor. Lower density light industrial and commercial uses. Includes low density residential areas and limited river access.

Employment, education, and residential area with transportation gaps that need funding. Nature trail access around Hidden Falls and Hood View Park.

Newly-built residential area at the split between OR 212 and OR 224. Includes some commercial and educational uses in the Carver community.

Approach to Scenario Development

For the entire area, we're looking at the goals, including:

- Anti-Displacement Risks to residential and businesses
- Economic Development Opportunities to bring about economic prosperity.
 Strong job stability over recent past and expected diversification. Industrial district provides base for growth.
- Mobility & safety for all travelers Area has incomplete infrastructure, such as lack of shoulders, sidewalks, etc.
- Access & Accessibility Transportation facilities not keeping pace with current growth.
- Equitable Engagement Balance between residents and business owners (through commuters' voices also important)
- Land Use & Housing Industrial and residential conflicting uses. Some underutilized, aging properties in industrial districts.

For each scenario, we'll start with:

- Adopted and past plans Transportation System Plans, Utility plans, etc.
- Existing conditions Current land uses and development, topography, area needs, etc.
- Community feedback Community members have shared specific locations for challenges and ideas.
- Best practices in planning Transportation safety best practices, economic development strategies, etc.



Map Focus Area A: What we heard

- Transportation concerns related to OR 212 connections, safety, etc.
- High commercial and industrial potential visibility from Sunrise Expressway.
- Mix of Industrial and Residential
- Industrial identity can be highlighted
- Anti-displacement is a big issue: two residential parcels in the middle of industrial and commercial activity with no buffer zones.
- Potential for expanded community facilities like school facilities, libraries and fire stations.
- All voices are important residents, business owners and commuters through the area.





Map Focus Area B: What we heard



- Transportation facilities growth is needed traffic congestion is an issue, and infrastructure growth not keeping up with community growth.
- Lack of pedestrian and bicycle facilities bike lanes and sidewalks are needed, as well as safe highway crossings.
- Community identity is important focus on maintain identity while making improvements.
- Improve freight traffic and facilities add parking and queueing areas for trucks.
- Safety concerns: no shoulders on road, no room for error when driving, ditches on both sides.
- Need for mixed zoning including healthcare delivery services and increased residential with proximity to services.
- Major businesses are shutting down or moving, and the community is not gaining any businesses.
- More access to parks and natural areas.



Map Focus Area C: What we heard

- High commercial and industrial use.
- Manufacturing, distribution, and warehousing industries are growing.
- Transportation facilities are not keeping pace with community growth.
- Tree canopy around industrial/warehouse buildings is important – air quality continues to be an issue.
- Clackamas Industrial Shuttle needs more frequency, sidewalks, and bike routes.
- Increased green space and access to the river
 waterfront parks, trails, boardwalks.
- Balance housing, parks, other community spaces with industrial areas.
- Need for pedestrian and bicycle facilities.



Map Focus Area D: What we heard

- Improvements to reduce congestion and increase flow of traffic are needed on OR-212. Increase the number of vehicle lanes, signals, and turn lanes.
- Improve movement of traffic onto OR-212.
 Connecting highways and side roads are experiencing traffic, congestion, and can't access OR-212.
- Concerns about pedestrian and bicycle safety. Build facilities along and over OR-212, especially connections from residential areas to the high school.







Map Focus Area E: What we heard

- Limited access to schools is an issue the single access point to Adrienne Nelson High School causes significant congestion.
 Need more access to schools beyond SE Rock Creek Blvd.
- Safety for drivers, but especially for people crossing highway and kids needing to get to school and around neighborhoods is an issue. OR-212 is a barrier between the community and schools.
- Pedestrian and bicycle infrastructure is needed.
- Workforce development programs to connect employers to middle/high school through training programs.
- Develop more community infrastructure, including a community center, a middle school, and youth focused recreation and businesses.
- Increase access to trails and green spaces.

Map Focus Area F: What we heard

- Add sidewalks and bicycle facilities to improve multimodal options, helping to remove cars from the road.
- More pedestrian and bicycle crossings to improve safety.
- Need mixed commercial and residential developments.
- Preserve and enhance the scenic and natural qualities of the area's forests and open space.
- Need more parks and green spaces that are connected.
- Environmental restriction areas.
- Limited community resources and facilities need community destinations.
- Reduce congestion and traffic.
- Area has grown quickly.
- Housing affordability concerns.






Gateway Concept

- Partner with ODOT, Happy Valley, Metro, and community to refine the concept for all users.




2020 Sunrise Gateway Concept

Clackamas County designed a preliminary Sunrise Gateway Concept for a regional transportation funding measure.

The Sunrise Gateway Concept:


- Meets the original project (FEIS) safety and congestion goals
- Lowers environmental and property impacts
- Reduces cost

The Sunrise Corridor Community Vision will bring the concept forward for partner agency and public feedback in fall of 2024.

How we got to where we are today. Information to understand needs, opportunities and constraints. Technical, social, and political sideboards. Planning framework – goals and objectives.

Scenarios

Develop & Screen

Collect feedback on proposed scenarios through screening process. Build on past plans.

Evaluate

Evaluate scenarios and give stakeholders information so they can provide input on approach, benefits and priority.

Preferred Scenario Selection

Use feedback to combine the best of the top 3 scenarios into a Preferred Scenario.

Final Report & Recommendations

Create an Implementation Action Plan with stakeholder and partner buy-in.



Project Planning & Preparation Learn

What is the project? What should the vision include? Who are the people and what are the key places of the corridor community? What are the communities' preferred methods of engagement?

Phase 1: Introduce &

Introduce project to stakeholders and the public. What are we building on? How does the community use the corridor today? What does the community envision for the future? What are the needs, opportunities, goals, and concerns?

Phase 2: Explore & Refine

How do we meet the needs and build on opportunities, measure our goals, and build upon past work?

What parts of these scenarios best fit the needs of the corridor community? Which were preferred by the community and why? What components should be kept or removed?

Phase 3: Vision & Action

Does this scenario match what the community told us? Does it balance the tradeoffs we heard from communities and businesses? Does it have key stakeholder buy-in and support? What do we need to do next to make the vision become reality?



Map Focus Area A: Key Issues and Goals



- Anti-Displacement Risks to the two existing residential parcels north of OR-212 due to industrial and commercial nature of the area.
- Economic Development Utilize unused abundant infrastructure to bring about economic prosperity. Strong job stability over recent past and expected diversification. Industrial district provides base for growth.
- Mobility & Safety Lack of shoulders on roads, ditches on both sides, and trucks exiting off I-205 into the industrial area.
- Access & Accessibility Transportation facilities not keeping pace with current growth.
- Equitable Engagement Balance between residents and business owners (through commuters' voices also important)
- Land Use & Housing Industrial and residential conflicting uses, impacting livability and leading to displacement and economic development concerns. Some underutilized, aging properties in industrial districts.



Map Focus Area B: Key Issues and Goals



- **Economic Development** The area is largely built out and stable. There may be opportunity for higher density uses on commercial corridors to leverage transportation and transit access, and increase value.
- Anti-displacement residential and commercial properties may face pressure from new development, though the area provides stable and affordable facilities.
- Zoning and land use The mix of residential, commercial and light industrial can create conflicts for residents and workers.
- Public health The area is bounded by a major freeway and industrial uses, with need to mitigate air, noise and other pollution. Access to neighborhoods without driving is limited.
- **Mobility & safety –** The highway, rail lines and streets isolate some areas from neighboring open space, neighborhoods and services. The existing streets including internal circulation on large properties create risks for travel.




Map Focus Area C: Key Issues and Goals



- Access & Accessibility There are access issues to address for all modes, non-motorized, freight and motor vehicles, to ensure safe and efficient movement.
- Anti-Displacement Displacement issues here are largely commercial and industrial related, to ensure affordable work spaces are maintained.
- Economic Development there are opportunities for commercial and industrial growth and diversification, though aging facilities and conflicting uses can create barriers.
- Health the area is largely paved with air, noise and water pollution risks. There is good potential access to natural areas to facilitate outdoor recreation opportunity.
- Mobility & Safety The local street network has gaps on streets such as missing sidewalks, and conflicting mobility uses create risk for non-motorized modes.
 Some issues have been addressed on OR-212, with space for road safety measures beyond.



Map Focus Area D: Key Issues and Goals



- Mobility & Safety The segment of OR-212 presents safety and capacity issues for the future to support the mix of residential and business uses for statewide trips.
- Equitable Engagement Existing transportation plans require transparent communication and equitable engagement with local communities.
- Health and Environment the area proximity to slopes and Clackamas river present challenges and opportunity.
- Economic Development Areas near OR-212 offer opportunities to support economic opportunity, and maintaining safe movement is critical to business stability.
- Land Use & Housing The highway plans present development opportunities that may require zoning changes.



Map Focus Area E: Key Issues and Goals



- Zoning and land use Area as employment center is envisioned out through Rock Creek Employment Center plan and supplemented by Gateway Concept. Major developments in near term.
- Economic development Area growth planned and included in planning forecasts. Transport access for students and employees is a key component for successful growth.
- Health and Environment Area bound by accessible natural areas offering connections to Clackamas River and providing important access for residents, students, employees.
- Mobility & Safety Safety for drivers and people traveling to schools is a key issue. The RCEC and Gateway plans present significant changes in the area.



Map Focus Area F: Key Issues and Goals

Sunrise Corridor Community Visioning



- Access & Accessibility Congestion and safety issues on OR-224.
 Realign OR-224 to allow traffic movement along the edge of the 'district'.
 Provide a safe and interconnected pedestrian system for the walking mode of travel, especially short trips.
- Climate & Environment Environmental issues include steep slopes and floodways. Wetlands and habitat areas should be conserved.
- Economic Development Mixed-use growth opportunities are abundant along OR-224. Clackamas River offers riverfront development opportunities (within floodplain constraints). Goal is to create a unique, mixed-use riverfront district.
- Health There are few developed parks in the area and a need for developed parkland. Goal is to create a connected system of parks and open space.
- Land Use & Housing Much of the land south of the Happy Valley residential area is vacant and constrained due to steep slopes and wetlands.
- Mobility & Safety OR-212 is seen as a barrier, creating unsafe conditions for kids needing to get to school. OR-224 has no sidewalks. Bike lanes are narrow and speeds high. OR-212/OR-224 intersection is congested and unsafe.

Transportation Outcomes from Past Work

- The County and partner agencies recognize that previous studies didn't provide the right answer for the corridor and today's surrounding community.
- Future transportation outcomes need to learn from past work and collaborate with community members to:
 - Right-size infrastructure improvements
 - Focus on community needs
 - Provide equitable access
