Use of Force Annual Report 2019

Overview

At the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office, we invest in hiring people who have the right temperament for public safety work with backgrounds that demonstrate good decision making. Fewer than 4% of applicants are hired. Typically, it takes eighteen months of training from the date of hire to the day a Deputy Sheriff begins their independent assignment. Then, throughout their career, professional training and on-going performance evaluation continue. These standards are among the ways we ensure we have a professional workforce capable of making the right decisions in the field.

Each day in carrying out their duties our deputies are involved in numerous and varied interactions with the people they contact. When resistance occurs, we expect our deputies to use their skills and abilities to safely and effectively resolve confrontations and minimize the need to use force whenever reasonably possible. To ensure this capacity, our deputies receive monthly training by certified instructors on all categories of force and de-escalation techniques.

Our commitment to public safety emphasizes respect, professionalism and the protection of human life, even when force is necessary. In the use of force to effectively gain control of an incident, deputies shall only use force that reasonably appears necessary, given the totality of the circumstances perceived by the deputy at the time of the event. Deputies are trained to continually evaluate the situation after an application of force, and render first aid as needed. Further, deputies are required to intervene when they believe a use of force is unjustified or excessive.

The Sheriff's Office recognizes the degree of responsibility that comes with the authority to use force and the obligation to be accountable for its proper use. Toward that end, every use of force must be lawfully justified. Whenever a deputy uses force, they are required to complete an after-action Use of Force Report documenting and explaining why force was used, the nature of the force, and the outcome. All Use of Force Reports are reviewed by supervisors to determine whether the deputy's actions were justified and within policy. We also review those reports to ensure consistency in practices throughout our agency and to inform our training needs.

We realize that law enforcement use of force is a matter of critical public concern and that transparency in use of force practices is essential to community trust. The intent of our Use of Force Annual Report is to aid the public in understanding our practices by providing transparent and accountable information. The data presented in this report is derived from the Use of Force Reports completed by our deputies and required by policy to be submitted in every use of force.

Force was used in 1 out of every 228 Calls for Service (0.4%).²

Force was used in 1 out of every 12 custodies (8.2%).3



Subjects reported 97 injuries. About 93% of the reported injuries were abrasions/lacerations. Deputies reported 21 injuries.





Officer-Involved Shooting (OIS) Event Summaries

Case Number: 19-000347

Number of Deputies Involved: 2

District: 99/McLoughlin

On January 5th, 2019 at about 3:12 a.m., a deputy was doing routine patrol in a church parking lot. He checked the license plate of a vehicle parked in the lot and found the registered owner had a felony warrant for his arrest. When the deputy saw the vehicle was occupied, he called for a cover deputy to assist him in contacting the person. The deputies identified the male inside the vehicle as the person with the felony warrant. After a short conversation with the deputies, the person produced a firearm and began firing. Both deputies drew their service weapons and returned fire. The person was later pronounced dead. The cause of death was ruled a suicide by the Medical Examiner. Both deputies were uninjured in the event.

Case Number: 19-001568

Number of Deputies Involved: 4

District: South County

On January 19th, 2019 at about 10:15 p.m., deputies were dispatched to a domestic disturbance involving family members at a rural residence. It was reported the caller's adult son was on drugs and breaking things in the house. When deputies arrived they discovered a deceased family member on the back porch. The deputies could hear a male voice inside and the sounds of pounding. Knowing there were reported to be multiple people inside the residence, the deputies made entry and found three more deceased people. They followed the sounds of the male's voice to a back bedroom where he was found attempting to kill an eight-year-old girl. Deputies used lethal force on the suspect and rescued the girl. The suspect was pronounced dead at the scene. No deputies were injured in the event.

Case Number: 19-012065

Number of Deputies Involved: 1

District: City of Oregon City

On May 24th, 2019 at about 4:28 p.m., the Clackamas County Interagency Special Weapons and Tactics Team (SWAT) was called to assist Oregon City Police Department on a call involving a shooting. An adult male suspect shot an adult male victim in the head and barricaded himself inside an apartment. The victim was rescued by officers and deputies who initially responded to the scene and was sent to the hospital. During the standoff, a SWAT member fired a shot at the suspect inside the apartment, but did not strike him. Chemical munitions were deployed and were successful in forcing the suspect to exit the apartment. Multiple less lethal options were used to take the suspect into custody. No deputies were injured in the event.
