Dear Clackamas County Voter:

This Voters' Pamphlet contains information designed to assist you in voting: Candidates' statements, ballot titles, explanatory statements and arguments pertaining to local measures that appear on the November 6, 2012 General Election ballot in Clackamas County. Please remember, in order to vote on a certain measure, you must be an active registered voter of the jurisdiction placing the measure on the ballot.

You will not vote on everything that appears in this pamphlet, only those candidate races and measures that appear on the Official Ballot in your Vote-By-Mail packet.

Your voted ballot must be received at an official ballot drop site or at the Elections Office, 1710 Red Soils Ct., Ste. 100, in Oregon City by 8:00 p.m. on election night in order to be tallied. Remember, the postmark on a mailed ballot does NOT count.

Official ballot drop sites are listed on Page 3-96 of this pamphlet. Indoor drop boxes will be available during regular business hours (and outdoor drop boxes are available 24 hours a day) beginning Friday, October 19 until 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday, November 6, 2012.

Ballots will be delivered to households between Friday, October 19 and Tuesday, October 23. Don't hesitate to contact us if you have not received a ballot by October 24.

If a ballot was delivered to your residence for someone who should no longer be receiving ballots at your address, please write "RETURN" on the envelope and place it back in your mailbox. If a ballot was sent to someone who has passed away, please write "DECEASED" on the envelope and place it back in your mailbox.

If you need assistance voting or have any questions about this particular election or the election process, please call the Elections Division at **503.655.8510**.

# **Vote your Official Ballot**

Locate the candidate or measure response (YES or NO) of your choice for each contest. To vote, you must completely darken the rectangle to the left of the response of your choice with black or blue ink. [Figure 1]

To vote for a candidate whose name does not appear on the Official Ballot, completely darken the rectangle to the left of the blank line provided for the office and fill in the blank with the full name of the candidate. [Figure 2]

Remember: If you vote for more than the number of candidates allowed for an office, or you vote both YES and NO on a measure, it is called an overvote, and your vote for that candidate or measure will not count. [Figure 3]



# **Review your Official Ballot**

Ensure you have correctly marked your choice for each contest. Your official ballot may contain contests printed on both front and back. If so, remember to vote both sides!

If you lose your ballot, make an error on it or spoil it in any way, contact the Clackamas County Elections Division at **503.655.8510** (or TTY at 503.655.1685) to request a replacement.



# **Return your Official Ballot**

Place your voted Official Ballot in the Ballot Secrecy Envelope and seal it. Place the sealed secrecy envelope inside the Return Ballot Envelope (white with a colored edge) and seal it.

Remember: Read and sign the Voter's Statement on the Return Identification Envelope. Your ballot will not be counted if the Return Identification Envelope is not signed.

By Mail: Attach sufficient first-class postage to the signed and sealed Return

Identification Envelope. Mail it as soon as possible; it must arrive at Clackamas County Elections Divison no later than 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday,

November 6, 2012. Remember, the postmark does not count!

In Person: Deliver the signed and sealed Return Identification Envelope to any official

ballot drop site (see list on page 3-96) no later than 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday,

November 6, 2012. Postage is not required if ballot is delivered to a drop site.

# **REGISTERING TO VOTE**

#### WHO MAY REGISTER TO VOTE?

Anyone who is:

- ★ A resident of Oregon;
- ★ A United States citizen; and
- ★ 17 years of age or older. [Note: Registered Voters must be 18 years of age to receive a ballot.]

#### **HOW CAN I REGISTER?.**

By mail-in registration form or in person at any county elections office or at a designated state agency, including the Department of Motor Vehicles and some public assistance agencies. Also, voters can access secure online voter registration at http://www.oregonvotes.org.

# WHEN MAY I REGISTER AND WHAT IS THE REGISTRATION DEADLINE?

You may register at any time. However, your voter registration form must be received or postmarked no later than the 21st day before the election at which you intend to vote.

#### WHERE CAN I FIND VOTER REGISTRATION FORMS?

Post offices, public libraries, city halls, DMV offices and Clackamas County Elections, 1710 Red Soils Ct., Ste. 100, in Oregon City. You can register online, or download and print a PDF form from the Secretary of State's web site at the Oregon Voter Registration link, which can be found at http://www.oregonvotes.org.

#### WHAT INFORMATION IS REQUIRED?

In October 2002, the "Help America Vote Act" was signed into law. The Act changed voter registration requirements nationwide for voting in federal elections. When registering to vote in Oregon for the first time, you must provide an Oregon Driver's License / ID. If you do not have a valid ODL / ID, the last four digits of your Social Security number must be provided.

If you do not have a valid Oregon Driver's License / ID or a Social Security number, you must affirm this by marking the appropriate box on the registration form. If you are registering by mail, you must provide a copy of one of the following: a valid photo identification, a copy of a paycheck stub, utility bill, bank statement or other government document showing your name and address.

If sufficient documentation is not provided at the time of registration, it will be requested by elections officials in order for you to vote at the next federal election.

When filling out the registration card, you must furnish your full name, residence address (and mailing address, if different), ODL or Oregon ID, date of birth, political party preference, and signature. Your residence address must be the physical address where you reside - not a post office box.

# WHAT IF I TURN 18 AFTER THE REGISTRATION DEADLINE?

If you will be 18 years of age by election day, you must register no later than the 21st day prior to the election to be eligible to vote in that election.

As a candidate for Clackamas County Soil and Water District Board of Directors, I believe the District has a responsibility to support farmers and other rural landowners with technical assistance and training for the purpose of maintaining the environmental health of farmscapes and communities. Primary to these areas is the control of soil erosion which, if allowed, can result in the loss of topsoil and stream and river contamination and modification.

Being raised on a small dairy farm situated on coastal plain soil, which erodes easily by wind and water, I saw firsthand how recommended technical services such as those provided by Clackamas Soil and Water District address soil erosion issues. Soil terraces that were recommended in our dairy farm pastures corrected much of the erosion problem.

On a backdrop of raising, showing and judging dairy cattle, I studied agriculture at undergraduate and graduate levels. I was a research assistant in tomato breeding at the University of Arkansas. At Rutgers, I conducted research on blueberries. Subsequently, I taught undergraduate and graduate students in the plant sciences at Texas A&M and California State University,

I believe in the responsible use of our agricultural resources. I fully support the use of water resources for irrigation of agricultural crops and homescapes. Productive agricultural land provides a wildlife habitat which supports a diversity of birds, insects and mammals which enriches everyone.

I believe in the mission and vision of Clackamas County Soil and Water Conservation District and that is why I am a candidate for the board of directors.





MEASURE APPROVING ANNEXATION OF 0.79 ACRES INTO CITY OF CANBY

QUESTION: Shall 0.79 acres located adjacent to the south of Hope Village, on S. Ivy Street, be annexed into Canby?

**SUMMARY:** Annexation is the legal process to bring property into the Canby City limits. Robert Price has filed an application on behalf of Hope Village, the owner of two parcels totaling 0.79 acres, asking the City to bring them into the City limits. The legal description of the parcels is Tax Lots 1100 and 1101 of Tax Map 4S-1E-4D. The tax lots are located adjacent to the southern boundary of Hope Village adjacent to the west side of the 1600 block of S. Ivy Street in Canby. This application has been approved by the City Planning Commission following a hearing on July 9, 2012 and further approved by the Canby City Council at its meeting of July 18, 2012. One tax lot is vacant land while the other currently has a manufactured home on it. It is currently zoned Exclusive Farm Use (EFU) by Clackamas County. Canby's Comprehensive Plan Map will designate the property for High Density Residential (R-2) zoning upon annexation. Any future development requires City review and must comply with land use laws.

# **EXPLANATORY STATEMENT**

This measure would approve the annexation of 0.79 acres into the city limits of the City of Canby. The property which would be included within the City boundaries is known as Tax Lots 1100 and 1101 of Tax Map 4S-1E-4D and is located generally in the southern part of the City. Tax Lots 1100 and 1101 are currently zoned Exclusive Farm Use (EFU) under County zoning. If annexation into the City is approved by the voters, the parcels would be rezoned to R-2, High Density Residential, as will be required under the City's Comprehensive Land Use Plan (Comp Plan) and Zoning Map.

Tax Lots 1100 and 1101 are owned by Hope Village, Inc.. Robert Price has filed the application for annexation into the City of Canby on behalf of Hope Village. The City, following its Charter, has put this matter before the voters for approval.

The parcels are located adjacent to the west side of the 1600 block of S. Ivy Street in Canby. One tax lot is vacant land while the other currently has a manufactured home on it. Adjacent properties to the south and east are outside current city limits and are zoned Exclusive Farm Use (EFU). The adjacent property to the north is occupied by Hope Village and is located within the city limits. Under the Comp Plan, property to the north is zoned for Medium Density Residential. Property to the west is currently zoned High Density Residential and is vacant. As indicated above, the subject property would be rezoned upon annexation approval to R-2, High Density Residential. Under the R-2 zoning regulations, the applicant indicates they would construct a minimum of eleven additional senior housing units which would be allowed in that zone. Annexation alone does not set the future uses to be built on the property. Any further development would have to comply with state and local land use laws and would be subject to public review.


The Canby Planning Commission unanimously voted to approve the application and the Canby City Council unanimously voted to approve the application and refer it to a vote of the Canby electorate.

QUESTION: Should Charter be amended to limit City's spending growth rate to no more than 2.5 percent increase annually?

**SUMMARY:** This Measure creates a new Charter section limiting the growth rate of total city spending. The starting total spending number would be 90% of the city's 2010-2011 fiscal year expenditures. With certain exceptions, total city spending from one year to the next could not exceed the previous year's spending, plus, 2.5 percent.

"Total spending" would include all disbursements pursuant to acts by the Council authorizing the expenditure of public funds, except for:

- proceeds from the sale of bonds specifically approved by voters;
- money to refund any taxes, fees, fines or charges;
- proceeds from the sale of city property at real market value to non-governmental entities;
- 4. money voluntarily donated to the city; and
- 5. federal funds.

The limitations for any year could be exceeded for an amount approved by unanimous vote of the Council, then approved by a majority of electors voting in a regular May or November election.

### **EXPLANATORY STATEMENT**

This Measure, if passed, would create a new City Charter section limiting the growth rate of total city spending. The starting total spending number would be 90% of the City's 2010-2011 fiscal year expenditures. With certain exceptions, total city spending from one year to the next would be capped at previous year's spending, plus, 2.5 percent.

"Total spending" would include all disbursements pursuant to acts by the Council authorizing the expenditure of public funds, except for the following:

- proceeds from the sale of bonds specifically approved by voters;
- 2. money to refund any taxes, fees, fines or charges;
- 3. proceeds from the sale of city property at real market value to non-governmental entities;
- 4. money voluntarily donated to the city; and
- 5. federal funds.

The limit on total spending established by this section for any year could be exceeded for that year provided the excess spending is approved by an unanimous vote of the City Council and then approved by a majority of electors voting on the issue in a regular May or November election. Excess spending could not be approved during a special election, or without unanimous consent of the City Council.

### **EXPLANATORY STATEMENT**

A vote of "yes" would direct the City to prepare and submit an application to Metro, requesting that the Urban Growth Boundary (UGB) be amended so that only the land in the City needed to provide housing and urban services to the projected population of the area would be included in the UGB.

Generally, Oregon law provides that land located inside the UGB can be developed and used at urban levels, while land outside of the UGB can be developed and used at rural levels.

A vote of "yes" does not amend the UGB, but would put in motion a process that culminates in Metro deciding whether and how to amend the UGB. The geographic location of a proposed amended UGB has not been identified.

I'll lay out a few problems with this referral,

**First** -This boundary line adjustment does nothing to alleviate our high property taxes.

Second -This UGB discussion was originated in a secret meeting at the Wescott's shop with a quorum of city councilors in attendance. Sixth - Because our population figures are lower than expected I see this as good news, not a reason to shrink the UGB. This referral forces all the density requirements into a much smaller west side of Damascus (Apartment City). We don't want Metro's cookie cutter high density "Portland Creep" prescribed development that disrespects the people of Damascus.

This is the fifth time the city council has made a referral to the voters; all manipulative, and all failing measurably. Please vote no!

CITY OF ESTACADA SEWER RATE INCREASE

**QUESTION:** Shall Estacada raise sewer rates to fund sewer treatment plant improvements to comply with new federal and state requirements?

**SUMMARY:** The City of Estacada was notified this year, by the Oregon Department of Environmental Quality, that the City is in violation of the new National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System permit limits. The new permit limits are mandated by federal and state requirements, and the City is subject to fines and other legal actions if the City does not comply. The Department of Environmental Quality has given the City three years to come into compliance with the permit limits. The City received a grant to analyze the issue. That analysis determined that the cost for the construction necessary to solve the issue is estimated to be \$650,000.00. The City has determined that it will need a loan to pay for the construction. The City has also determined that it will be necessary to raise sewer rates from \$29.35 per calendar month per unit to \$32.20 to pay for the loan needed to comply with the Oregon Department of Environmental Quality mandates. If this measure is approved, sewer rates will be increased to \$32.20 per month.

# **EXPLANATORY STATEMENT**

The City was notified this year, by the Oregon Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) that the City is in violation of the new National Pollution Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit limits.

The City's current sewer treatment plant, which was built in 1986 to meet all of the requirements for removing various compounds and meeting load limits for suspended solids (TSS) and oxygen demand (BOD) that existed at that time. The sewer treatment plant has served the City well for 26 years and required only minor improvements.

The limits on TSS, BOD and other chemical compounds are set forth in an NPDES permit issued by Oregon DEQ. The NPDES permit is required by law and must be renewed every six years. Six years ago, DEQ required the City to measure the amount of ammonia in the treated water that was going into the river. There was no requirement to reduce or eliminate it, just to measure it. When the City applied for the new permit, DEQ made it a legal requirement that the City reduce the ammonia. Since the current

sewage treatment plant was never designed to eliminate ammonia, the City must now upgrade the plant to comply with DEQ's requirements.

DEQ has given the City three years (until July 2015) to come into compliance with the NPDES permit limits. If the City does not comply with the new legal requirements, it will be subject to fines and other legal actions. The City also received a grant to analyze the issue and design the most cost-effective solution. That study concluded that the cost for the construction necessary to solve the issue is estimated to be \$650,000.00. The City has determined that it will need a loan to pay for that construction.

The City currently has 1400 billing units, that are billed each month. In order to pay for the loan, each of those units will need to pay \$2.85 per month. If this measure is approved, sewer rates will be increased from \$29.35 per month to \$32.20 per month, to cover the loan necessary to pay for the cost of construction needed to comply with the NPDES permit requirements. The City operates the sewer treatment plant like a business (called an enterprise fund) using only the money received from monthly sewer service charges, paid by customers, to pay all operating expenses, including loan payments.

# Estacada City Council Urge a Yes Vote on Measure 3-414

### The Situation

Every six years we must renew our National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit issued by the DEQ. In November 2010 DEQ made it a requirement that the city reduce the ammonia content to a level that the treatment plant was never designed to meet. City staff and engineers tried a number of different process changes to meet the new requirements but were not successful.

### The Solution

A grant-funded technical study concluded that the least-cost solution is to construct a new "Nitrifying Trickling Filter" at a cost of \$650,000. A 20-year loan taken out by the City would cost approximately \$47,500 per year, or \$2.85 a month for each of the city's billing units.

# Can't This Be Paid Through Grants?

Grantors will only fund projects where the community has done everything it can to fund the solution on its own. A requirement is that the rate it charges for sewer is at least the statewide average of \$52. Estacada has one of the lowest rates in the state at \$29.35 per unit and therefore does not qualify. The new rate would be \$32.20 per unit.

# Why Can't the City Just Cut Expenses or Use Property Taxes to Pay for This?

Rates collected by Estacada utilities are dedicated to the operations and maintenance of the utility only. There is not enough revenue from current rates to handle the extra \$47,523 a year that will be required to meet DEQ's ammonia-reduction requirement. We only collect what we need to operate and maintain it.

# What happens if this measure doesn't pass?


Then the City could be fined by DEQ. The City may be asked by DEQ to give up the operation and maintenance of our treatment plant, which could mean privatizing.

**QUESTION:** Shall Gladstone renew the operating levy of \$0.31 per \$1,000 for fire and medical services for five years beginning 2014-15? This measure renews current local option taxes

**SUMMARY:** This measure renews the current fire and emergency medical services operating levy which will expire in June 2014. The City Council placed this measure on the ballot to maintain existing services for fire protection and emergency medical response such as:

- Current staffing level to maintain response times for emergency calls
- Full-time Firefighter Coordinator position
- Capital funds for future purchases of fire engines and rescue vehicles
- Other services to maintain existing fire protection and emergency medical services

Estimated amounts to be raised by this levy:

2014-2015 \$281,836 2015-2016 \$290,291 2016-2017 \$298,999 2017-2018 \$307,969 2018-2019 \$317,208 TOTAL \$1,496,303

This tax is subject to the local government rate limit of Section 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

### **EXPLANATORY STATEMENT**

Measure 3-402 will enable the Fire Department to maintain current fire and emergency medical services by funding the Firefighter Coordinator position which ensures that firefighters receive proper required OSHA, State and Federal training and that equipment is adequately maintained and repaired. In addition to continuing the current staffing level, the levy will provide capital funds for the purchase of necessary fire engines, rescue vehicles and personal protective equipment in the future along with other services to provide a high level of fire and emergency medical response to safeguard residents of Gladstone. There will be no added full-time personnel.

With continued support the Fire Department can:

- Continue to efficiently and quickly respond to 9-1-1 calls 24/7 to effectuate critical lifesaving responses
- Respond to motor vehicle accidents, wild land and structure fires, and water rescues
- Provide mutual assistance to surrounding fire districts when needed
- Maintain a safe working department that meets heightened Federal and State requirements aimed at providing adequate homeland security
- Properly train and equip firefighters with required skill sets and functioning equipment to allow for optimal operation of the Fire Department

# How Does this Renewal Affect Property Taxes If Passed?

The levy would continue the current rate of \$0.31 per \$1,000 of assessed value, unchanged from the current rate. The cost per household for a home with a taxable assessed value of \$200,000 (different than market value) would be, on average, about \$62. The estimated tax cost for this measure is on estimate only based on the best information available from the County Assessor at the time of the estimate.

# What is the City's Recent Fire and Medical Service Tax Levy History?

This levy was first authorized by voters in 1998. In 2008, the voters authorized a tax levy of \$0.31 per \$1,000 of assessed value which expires in 2014. It is estimated that the levy will raise \$265,657 for fiscal year 2012-2013.

# **EXPLANATORY STATEMENT**

# What is the Police Services Levy?

The City of Gladstone provides police services to preserve the safety and well-being of the community. This measure would provide funding to maintain police services at their existing levels. There are currently 16 authorized sworn officer positions with an average of 1.39 officers per 1,000 populations, below the statewide average of 1.6. There are also three police support staff members. This levy will continue the current level of service and the current staffing level to serve the Gladstone community.

# What Would Renewal of the Police Levy Do?

Measure 3-403 would maintain police services at existing levels and would allow the police department to continue to fund three officer positions including the school resource officer; continue its current level of 9-1-1 emergency dispatch services; and fund a Municipal Ordinance Specialist who administers the Gladstone Municipal Code by investigating neighborhood nuisances, responding to animal complaints, and processing police property and evidence.

With these positions and the current level of staffing, the Police Department is able to:

- Respond to emergency situations in a timely and effective manner
- · Provide backup for officers during night shifts
- Maintain the ability to investigate serious crimes against persons, death investigations, assault, rape and kidnapping
- Increase the level of crimes solved and criminals arrested
- Keep the School Resource Officer
- Maintain connection with the regional county dispatch center to handle priority calls and emergency response for fire, police, ambulance, search and rescue.

# How Does this Renewal Affect Property Taxes if Passed?

The levy would continue the current rate of \$0.68 per \$1,000 of assessed value, unchanged from the current rate. The cost per household for a home with taxable value of \$200,000 (different from market value) would be, on average, about \$136. The estimated tax cost for this measure is an estimate only, based on the best information available from the County Assessor at the time of the estimate.

AUTHORIZATION TO CONSTRUCT AND INCUR DEBT TO FINANCE NEW LIBRARY

QUESTION: Shall Gladstone authorize construction and incurrence of a maximum debt of \$7.5 million to finance a new \$10 million library?

**SUMMARY:** This measure authorizes the Gladstone City Council to incur debt through the issuance of municipal bonds to finance and construct a new Gladstone Library.

Funding sources to finance, construct, and operate the new library:

- Clackamas County Capital Contribution One time contribution of \$2.5 million
- Clackamas County Library Fund Library support of approximately \$1.32 million per year, increased from \$537,000 the City currently receives.
- Gladstone Urban Renewal Agency Funds Current and future revenues for the Gladstone Urban Renewal Agency ranging from \$140,763 to \$261,070 per year depending on loan repayment period.
- City General Fund- Increased Clackamas County Library District funds for library operations will allow the City to redirect General Fund money of approximately \$114,365 per year that is currently allocated for library operations to pay part of debt incurred for the library.

The design for the new library is approximately 97% complete. The City has spent \$1,189,278 and cannot recover that money if the project is not completed.

There are no new taxes associated with this proposal.

# **EXPLANATORY STATEMENT**

If approved by the City of Gladstone voters, this referral would authorize the Gladstone City Council to construct and incur debt to finance a new library. The new library will be built near the corner of Webster and Oatfield Roads at 18235 Webster Road on land that currently may only be used for open space, library or park purposes.

This referral is a direct result of the Gladstone Charter amendments passed in May 2012 that require voter approval for public projects costing more than \$1,000,000 and/or which require the City to incur debt to finance. The City has expended \$1,189,278 on planning and design for the new library.

The library design and construction will cost approximately \$10 million of which the City will need to finance and incur debt for \$7.5 million. The total library project costs (including design, construction, and debt repayments) are expected to be between \$12.6 and \$13.6 million (this includes the above mentioned \$1,189,278 that has already been spent) depending on whether the City chooses a 15 or 20 year loan repayment plan.

The current projected cost for design and construction of the library is \$10 million. However, there are additional financing and operating costs that must also be taken into account when determining the overall cost of the project. The funding to finance, construct and operate the library will come from several sources:

# 15 Year Loan Repayment:

•	Clackamas County Capital Contribution	\$2,500,000
•	Clackamas County Library District**	\$4,500,000
•	Gladstone General Fund - Library Operating*	\$1,715,481
•	Gladstone Urban Renewal Agency**	\$3,916,056

Over a 15-year time span approximately 27% of Gladstone Urban Renewal Agency revenue would go towards the library project versus 73% for other urban renewal projects.

### 20 Year Loan Repayment:

•	Clackamas County Capital Contribution	\$2,500,000
•	Clackamas County Library District**	\$6,000,000
•	Gladstone General Fund - Library Operating*	\$2,287,307
•	Gladstone Urban Renewal Agency**	\$2,815,265
	Total	\$13,602,572

Over a 20-year time span approximately 14% of Gladstone Urban Renewal Agency revenue would go towards the library project versus 86% for other urban renewal projects.

\*The Clackamas County Library District funds will allow the City to redirect the City's library operating funds to pay debt service for the new library.

\*\*Amount will vary depending on amount of operating savings from County Library District funding.

The above-mentioned Clackamas County Capital Contribution and part of the Library District funds are conditioned on the City's agreement to build a new library and provide library services to Gladstone and Oak Lodge library patrons. If this referral does not pass, the City will retain \$1 million of the County Capital Contribution and the Library District funds will remain at its current level of approximately \$537,000 per year and \$1.5 million of the County Capital Contribution will be returned to the County.

A financing plan for the library will be finalized after voter approval is received.

In 2000, the City purchased the property where the new library will be located for \$1,049,069. That cost is not included.

### **ARGUMENT IN OPPOSITION**

Gladstone citizens testified before the City Council more than a year ago that we wanted to vote on the new library.

The City's response, last August was to authorize spending an additional \$250,000 on further planning for the library. To date, the City has spent \$1 million on this oversized and overpriced project without our approval.

They say this was done because it was what we all wanted. How could they have known? Do you remember being asked? We don't! Money wasted on a plan that now requires voter approval.

Our concerns expressed more than a year ago were simple. The library is one of many spending priorities. How does the new library balance itself against other priorities within Gladstone? Offcials were aware of other perilous issues from existing City documents: a water system that will require \$12.6 million in repairs: a City Hall building that requires \$2.9 million in seismic upgrades; and numerous storm sewer and road issues for which price tags have yet to be attached.

The City's planning a then was incomplete. In recent months they began constructing a master plan for water and sewer system repairs and upgrades, but the results are still months away. Yet without these results we are being asked to build a \$10 million library and incur \$7.5 million in debt. What was "incomplete" planning a year ago is merely "reckless" today.

Let's not allow the City to get ahead of itself. Let's vote "NO" on 3-413.

### **ARGUMENT IN OPPOSITION**

Our grass-roots effort to earn the right to vote on the library were successful. Now is our opportunity to educate ourselves and neighbors as to what is the best decision for all of Gladstone.

The library, as currently proposed, is a representation of misguided priorities and exorbitant government spending.

The cost to build this library is \$10,000,000, plus land, plus interest on resulting debt. At \$506 per SF, the current proposal is completely out of line with comparable projects. Library supporters argue that this figure is not correct.

\$10 million, less \$380,000 for furnishings and moving expense, divided by 19,000 SF equals \$506 per SF. It's not complicated.

Furthermore, their current repayment plan includes repaying a portion of the debt with savings from the operating funds. How they can propose this when at this time they have not produced an operating budget is beyond me.

What about other priorities? The City has serious issues with water and sewer systems, roads, and the City Hall building. Estimated City expenditures on these and other concerns total more than \$63 million.

The funding formula for the library project still involves the use of urban renewal and general fund dollars. Every dollar of money redirected to the new library is one less spent on \$63 million in repairs.

What we need is a master plan--a plan that accounts for all anticipated expenditures. The City shouldn't be playing "dominos" with taxpayers and their money-if we approve the new library expect to see significant water and sewer rate increases. That's dominos, not planning.

Require the City to go back to the drawing board. Make the City come up with a plan that builds a new library while maintaining other essential services. Make the City develop a plan that matches our needs with our pocket.

### **CAPTION:**

LAKE OSWEGO PUBLIC LIBRARY BOND

QUESTION: Shall the City of Lake Oswego issue general obligation bonds not to exceed \$14 million for a new public library? If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of sections 11 and 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

**SUMMARY:** This measure authorizes the City to issue general obligation bonds not to exceed \$14 million to pay a portion of the cost of the design and construction of a new library of approximately 60,000 square feet in the vicinity of First and B Avenue, replacing the existing library at Fourth and D. The new library would include more space for library collections, study and computer areas, and areas for adult, teen, and children's programming. The library would also include community meeting and program space. The City plans to augment bond proceeds with other resources such as urban renewal funds and existing library capital. funds to pay for the balance of the library costs and associated parking and site improvements. If the maximum bond amount is issued, the estimated property tax rate would be 17 cents per \$1,000 of Assessed Value (not Real Market Value). The bonds would mature in not more than 25 years.

### **EXPLANATORY STATEMENT**

### **Growth in Library Use**

The existing 27,100 square foot Lake Oswego Public Library, located at Fourth and D in the First Addition Neighborhood, opened in 1983. Five years later, the City Council-appointed Library Growth Task Force concluded that the building had reached maximum capacity. According to the 2011 Oregon Public Library Statistical Report, since the current facility opened the number of library cardholders has increased from 17,000 to 29,778; reference questions have increased from 19,651 to 62,494; circulation has risen from approximately 444,000 to 1,350,000; and the library's collection has grown from 104,276 to 237,180 items. From 1987 to 2012, library materials circulation per capita has risen from 10.2 to 35.3. The Library has an average of approximately 1,000 visitors per day.

# **Description of the Proposed Library**

The proposed 60,000 square foot library will be located at First Street and B Avenue in downtown Lake Oswego on a site owned by the Lake Oswego Redevelopment Agency. The new library would provide additional space for library collections and multimedia library materials; areas for adult, teen, and children's programming; study and computer areas; multi-purpose community meeting rooms; and work space for staff and volunteers. A citizen task force will participate in the design of the new library.

# **Project Financing**

Voter approval of this measure would allow the City of Lake Oswego to issue up to \$14 million in general obligation bonds to fund a portion of the cost of a new public library. The preliminary estimated cost of the library and associated parking is \$35 million, excluding site acquisition costs. Bond proceeds would be added to other funding sources including up to \$18 million of urban renewal funds, approximately \$2 million of Clackamas County Library District and City library capital funds, and other sources such as donations and proceeds from the sale of the existing library property. The new library would be a component of a First Street North Anchor project that could include other uses, such as residential and retail space, and public parking to serve general downtown parking needs. Bond proceeds will be used only to fund the new library.

If the measure is approved, bonds would be issued and repaid over 25 years or less. Property owners would pay an estimated 17 cents for every \$1,000 of Assessed Value (not Real Market Value). Bond proceeds would be used solely for capital improvements and not used to pay for library staff or the operation of the library.

For decades Lake Oswego has needed a larger library, one with adequate adjacent parking.

Placing the library downtown in our East End Urban Renewal Area gives us flexible funding that cannot be matched anywhere else in town. The parking garage and some development costs can be covered by Urban Renewal money. This allows us to fund the new library building from this general obligation bond, the City's library capital reserve, the Library District Capital Fund, donated library endowment funds, and the sale of the old library property. The library director has provided the City Council with an operating budget for a larger library that will not cost any more than our current older building. New technology offers more efficient lighting, heating, and cooling. Using effective design, staffing can be maintained at current levels. Most of the space being added is for small meeting rooms, rooms for adult and children's programs, and to provide adequate space for our book & media collections; things we now lack.

**Now** is the time to build a new library for Lake Oswego. **Now** is the time to support our town's most beloved and well-used public facility. **Now** is the time to ensure the library is large enough, efficient enough, convenient enough to serve all our citizens. **NOW** is our best opportunity. # some common Vote-by-mail mistakes

Avoid these mistakes when signing and returning your ballot, and make sure your vote gets counted!

Letting your spouse (or child or parent) sign your ballot envelope: Some families like make voting a communal event, but make sure the envelope you sign is your own, and doesn't belong to some other family member. If the signature on the envelope doesn't match the pre-printed name, the ballot will be challenged.

**Signing by Power of Attorney:** Don't do it. If a voter is unable to sign, a Signature Attestation form may be obtained so that the voter is able to use a rubber stamp of their signature.

Saving a stamp by putting two ballots in one envelope: Don't do it. Both ballots might be rejected.

# Forgetting to use the secrecy envelope:

First of all, don't panic! And don't bother mangling the return envelope to re-open it just because you forgot the secrecy envelope. Your vote will still be confidential and it will be counted.

Waiting until Election Day to mail your ballot: Mail your ballot back as soon as you can. The Postal Service simply cannot get a ballot from the mailbox to our office in the space of one day, and (it can't be said often enough) the postmark does not count. Waiting until Election Day to return the ballot practically ensures that your vote will not be counted, but if you do wait that long, please make use of one of our official drop sites (see the list on page 3-95).

QUESTION: Shall the City of Lake Oswego issue general obligation bonds not to exceed \$5 million for Boones Ferry Road Improvements? If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of sections 11 and 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

**SUMMARY:** This measure authorizes the City of Lake Oswego to issue general obligation bonds not exceeding \$5 million to pay for a portion of the cost of design, right of way acquisition and construction for Boones Ferry Road Improvements from Madrona to Oakridge/Reese, consistent with the 2008 Lake Grove Village Center Plan, including:

- Four vehicular travel lanes
- Landscaped medians with turn lane improvements
- New sidewalks with street trees, lighting, street furniture, and landscaping
- Additional and improved pedestrian crosswalks
- Bike lanes
- Improved storm drainage systems
- Undergrounding of utilities

The Improvements also include a signalized pedestrian crossing at Lanewood near Lake Grove Elementary School.

The total project cost is estimated at \$25.4 million. Funding includes bond proceeds, urban renewal funds and other funding sources. If the maximum bond amount is issued, it is anticipated that property taxes would increase by 6 cents per \$1,000 of Assessed Value (not Real Market Value). The bonds would be payable in not more than 25 years.

### EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This measure has been referred to the voters by the Lake Oswego City Council. Voter approval of this measure would authorize the City of Lake Oswego to issue up to \$5 million in general obligation bonds for improvements to Boones Ferry Road within the Lake Grove Village Center, one of Lake Oswego's two designated town centers.

# Project Defined in 2008 Lake Grove Village Center Plan

The 2008 Lake Grove Village Center Plan was developed over a six-year period with public input from a Council-appointed citizen advisory committee, public meetings, and hearings. The Plan identifies a number of deficiencies with existing conditions and calls for Boones Ferry Road improvements relating to traffic movement and safety, vehicle access to businesses, stormwater management, sidewalks and pedestrian crosswalks, bicycle lanes, vehicular turn lanes, and adjustment of driveway spacing to reduce conflicts between turning vehicles and through traffic, pedestrians and bicycles.

# **Project Description**

The Boones Ferry Road Improvements bond project includes design, right of way acquisition and construction for Boones Ferry Road Improvements from Madrona to Oakridge/Reese, consistent with the 2008 Lake Grove Village Center Plan. Improvements include:

- · Four vehicular travel lanes
- Landscaped medians with vehicular turn lane improvements
- New sidewalks with street trees, lighting, street furniture, and landscaping
- Two new signalized intersections and two new pedestrian crosswalks
- · Bike lanes in each direction
- · Improved storm drainage systems
- Undergrounding of utilities

The Improvements also include a signalized pedestrian crossing at Lanewood near Lake Grove Elementary School.

### **Project Financing**

Based on engineering studies, the total cost for the Improvements is estimated at \$25.4 million. Project funding includes the \$5 million in bond proceeds, with the balance to be financed from other sources, including future urban renewal funds.

### **Property Tax Rate**

If the maximum bond amount is issued, it is anticipated that property taxes would increase by 6 cents for every \$1,000 of Assessed Value. The bonds would be payable in not more than 25 years.

AUTHORIZATION TO APPROVE ANNEXATION OF 4.640 ACRES INTO CITY

**QUESTION:** Should the City Council approve annexing 4.640 acres on the southern City boundary into the City of Molalla?

SUMMARY: The city charter requires voter approval of annexations initiated by property owners. Approval of this ballot measure will authorize the Molalla City Council to approve annexation of 4.640 acres into the city if the application for annexation complies with state law. The property to be annexed consists of two separate tax lots. tax lots 1100 and 1200 on Tax Map 52E08C. The tax lots are located at 13322 S. Highway 211 and 13288 S Highway 211. The area to be annexed lies generally on the south side of Highway 211 (W. Main Street) located east of Ona Way and west of Hezzie Lane. The properties currently are each zoned Rural Residential Farm/Forest 5 (RRFF-5). Molalla's Comprehensive Plan Map designates the properties as Multi-family Residential (MFR) upon annexation into the city. Any future development of the properties must comply with state land use laws and receive approval of the City Council.

### **EXPLANATORY STATEMENT**

The city charter requires voter approval of annexations initiated by property owners. This measure would provide such approval and authorize the Moialla City Council to annex 4.640 acres into the City of Molalla if the Council determines, after a public hearing, that the application for annexation complies with state law.


The properties that would be annexed are known as Tax Lots 1100 and 1200 of Tax Map 52E08C and are located generally in the southern western part of the City. Tax Lots 1100 and 1200 are currently zoned RRFF-5 (Rural Residential Farm/Forest 5-5 Acre District) under County zoning. If annexation into the City is approved by the voters and by City Council, the parcels would become multi-family residential under the City's Comprehensive Plan. A zone change would be required to align the City's Zoning Map with the Comprehensive Plan Map.

Tax Lot 1100 is owned by the Mary E Tiffin Trustee and tax lot 1200 is owned jointly by Brian C and Amy J Collins, all of whom have given their permission to Karl Ivonov to file the application for annexation into the City of Molalla. The City, following its Charter, is placing this matter before the voters for approval. If approved by the voters, the Council will then consider the annexation application.

The parcels front the south side of Highway 211 (W. Main Street). Tax lot 1100, located at 13322 S. Highway 211, currently has a single family home on it. Tax lot 1200, located at 13288 S Highway 211, also currently has a single family home on it. The property adjacent to Tax lot 1100 to the east is inside the current city limits and is zoned General Commercial (C-2). The property is occupied by Stone Place Apartments. The adjacent property to the west of Tax lot 1200 is outside the city limits and zoned RRFF-5. It is occupied by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. The subject properties would be recognized by the City's Comprehensive Plan Map as Multi-family Residential upon annexation. The applicant will have to apply for a zone change to align the City's Zone Map with the City's Comprehensive Plan if annexation is approved by voters. Annexation alone does not set the future uses to be built on the property. Any further development will have to comply with state and local land use laws and will be subject to public review.

# Measure 3-407

### **CAPTION:**

REQUIRES VOTER APPROVAL FOR URBAN RENEWAL BONDS

**QUESTION:** Shall City Charter be amended so that future urban renewal plans require voter approval for bond issuance?

SUMMARY: This measure would amend the Oregon City Charter to prohibit the City Commission from approving urban renewal plans or amendments to such plans that do not require voter approval for the issuance of bonded indebtedness issued after the effective date of this measure. Such indebtedness must either be approved by the voters of Oregon City or related to indebtedness created or committed to prior to the effective date of the measure. The measure would not affect any lines of credit, bonds or other borrowings issued prior to the effective date of the measure. Finally, the measure would define "bonded indebtedness" to be synonymous with the definition in ORS 310.140(3) and would not apply to borrowings of less than one year.

### **TEXT OF MEASURE**

Proposed charter provision requiring voter approval of urban renewal bonds

Section \_\_\_\_. The urban renewal agency of the city (the "Agency") shall not issue bonded indebtedness after the effective date of this section unless the bonded indebtedness complies with the restrictions of this section. The commission shall not approve any amendment to an urban renewal plan after the effective date of this section unless the plan requires that bonded indebtedness issued to carry out the plan be issued in compliance with the restrictions of this section.

- A. Bonded indebtedness issued by the Agency after the effective date of this section shall either:
  - (i) Be approved by the voters of the city;
  - (ii) Be issued to refund lines of credit, bonds or other borrowings that were executed before the effective date of this section; or,
  - (iii) Be issued to finance written commitments of the Agency that were entered into before the effective date of this section.
- B. Each urban renewal plan of the Agency that exists on the effective date of this section is hereby amended to add the following provision:

- "No bonded indebtedness shall be issued under this plan except in compliance with the requirements of the Charter of the City of Oregon City. Any amendment of the preceding sentence must be approved by a non-emergency ordinance of the city."
- C. For purposes of this section "bonded indebtedness" has the meaning defined for that term in ORS 310.140(3), as that section of the statutes exists on the date this section of the charter is approved by the voters of the city. That statute defines "bonded indebtedness" to mean "any formally executed written agreement representing a promise by a unit of government to pay to another a specified sum of money, at a specified date or dates at least one year in the future."
- D. This section shall not limit the Agency's rights or obligations under any lines of credit, bonds or other borrowings that were executed prior to the effective date of this section.

(Per OAR 165-022-0040 (2) there is no explanatory statement for this measure. At the request of the City of Oregon City the full measure text is furnished.)

Why did California shut down all renewal agencies this year and why is New York doing the same? Besides billions being siphoned away yearly, especially from schools, California Controller said, "The lack of accountability and transparency is a breeding ground for waste, abuse, and impropriety."

In Oregon City:

- The City Commission in 2007 increased the urban renewal debt limit from \$29 million to \$130 million, without a vote of the people.
- The City Commission used urban renewal money to buy City Hall to avoid a taxpayer vote on general obligation bonds.

- As part of the negotiations for more than \$17 million in urban renewal subsidy the owner of the Rossman landfill was asking \$14 million dollars for property that the county assessor had valued at approximately \$2 million dollars.
- The urban renewal agency used taxpayer money to pay approximately \$1.2 million dollars for the unpaid legal and consulting fees for the developers of the Cove project, with no conditions on the developers to obtain financing.
- Taxpayers lost \$200,000 plus \$21,000 in legal fees on the Black Point Inn deal.

Government corruption and favoritism are bad for businesses and communities. Measure 3-407 supports more urban renewal transparency and oversight through a vote of the people. This simple change will reduce waste, improve urban renewal projects and create more honest and open government.

Many in Oregon City were disappointed when the proposed Rivers Project on the landfill did not materialize, first because of opposition by a majority of the Urban Renewal Commission members and later by failure of the land owner and the developer to come to an agreement under the conditions imposed URC. This Commission is comprised of officials elected by the public and other members chosen by those elected officials. It incumbent upon the electorate to vote for people they can trust, give them input through the public process, and then allow the Commission to make decisions after they have thoroughly evaluated the project's plan and the information supplied during the public process. The existing process works.





The City Commission has concluded that the proposal meets all state, regional and City requirements for annexation into the City and services can be adequately provided to the property.

#### ARGUMENT IN FAVOR

This is an annexation which, if approved, will be zoned industrial. It is located across Beavercreek Road from the Clackamas Community College. It was brought into the Urban Growth Boundary several years ago at the request of Oregon City because the City recognized the benefit of having industrial lands adjacent to the College. Not only would there be job opportunities for students graduating from the College's manufacturing training programs, there would also be the potential for student internships and joint training programs between the College and future businesses located in this industrial area.

When sufficient industrially zoned land is available adjacent to the College, it may be possible to develop needed roads, utilities, and other infrastructure through programs developed under what is called the "Community Development Initiative" that is being put forward by a leadership group comprised of members from the region's business, community, and public sectors, the President of Clackamas Community College being a member of this group. The proximity of this land to the College and to a highway system that provides easy access to the Portland International Airport would make it a good candidate for such infrastructural support.

#### ARGUMENT IN FAVOR

This 11.93 acre property is annexing to the City of Oregon City to provide additional opportunities for campus style industrial development in the Beavercreek Road area. Because of its location near Clackamas Community College, the opportunities for private-public partnerships are significant. Such partnerships will be good for students and faculty at CCC. Any development on this property will result in both short term jobs during site development and construction, and long term jobs within buildings that will be built there. Future zoning as projected by the city will be CI (Campus Industrial) that will allow a variety of primarily white collar jobs. There will be no residential development on this property as a result of the annexation. The future employment that will result from the annexation of this property will provide jobs, taxes, and other economic development opportunities without putting pressure on school enrollment or siting additional homes in the immediate vicinity.

Because there is a major power line easement traversing the property that cannot be built on, there will be a significant portion of the site that will remain as open space. There is no habitat area or wetlands on the property.

This proposed annexation was supported unanimously by the Oregon City Planning Commission and the City Commission. It also has the support of the Caufield Neighborhood Association and the Oregon City Business Alliance.





# **Measure 26-145**

#### **CAPTION:**

AMENDS CHARTER: CHANGES PROVISIONS OF FIRE POLICE DISABILITY RETIREMENT 'SYSTEM'

QUESTION: Shall limited provisions of the retirement and disability system for police and fire be changed?

**SUMMARY:** This measure would amend the City Charter for the Fire Police Disability Retirement System (FPDR) by:

- Clarifying the calculation of retirement benefits to include only pay a member received in the year preceding retirement.
- Changing eligibility for disability benefits for new members after completion of six consecutive months of employment as a sworn employee.
- Changing the calculation of service credit to not include post-employment service by another employer.
- Giving the Administrator, with the approval of the Board of Trustees, authority to settle claims.
- Defining service requirements for occupational disability due to heart disease and nonserviceconnected disability and death benefits.
- Changing retirement benefits for part-time employees.
- Providing disability benefits on a monthly or bi-weekly basis.
- Providing interim disability benefits during the period between the application and approval of benefits.
- Clarifying language regarding occupational disability benefits.
- Changing from 10 years to 5 years the vesting period for nonservice-connected death benefits

This amendment is expected to decrease FPDR taxpayer liabilities by \$46 Million over a 25 year period.

#### **EXPLANATORY STATEMENT**

This measure would make changes to certain provisions of the Fire and Police Disability, Retirement and Death Benefit (FPDR) system in the Portland City Charter. The FPDR system is funded by a property tax levy. This amendment is expected to decrease taxpayer funded liabilities by \$46.6 million over a 25 year period.

This measure clarifies how retirement benefits are calculated to ensure a member receives a pension that is based on the Final Pay a member received or was entitled to receive during the year preceding their retirement. Currently, the Charter is written to

allow a member to receive a larger retirement benefit depending on when the member retires by including more than a typical year's worth of salary and including lump sum payments attributable to service from years prior to the year preceding retirement. This measure corrects that by clearly defining the pay that is included in the member's Final Pay at retirement.

This measure changes the eligibility period for new members by requiring six consecutive months of service as a sworn police officer or firefighter with the City of Portland prior to entering the FPDR system. Members would be covered by the state Workers' Compensation system during this six month waiting period.

For members in the FPDR retirement system, this measure removes from retirement calculations credit for employment by another entity in the Oregon Public Employees Retirement Systein (PERS). This ensures that retirement benefits will be calculated only based on service a member provides in the City of Portland and will not increase a member's FPDR pension based on service with another PERS employer.

This measure would give the FPDR Administrator the ability to settle claims with either the approval of the FPDR Board of Trustees or under guidelines established by the Board of Trustees.

This measure clarifies service requirements for nonservice connected disability and death benefits and occupational disability benefits due to heart disease.

This measure changes the retirement benefit calculation for part-time employees so that a member receives adequate credit and pay for part-time work when calculating their pension.

This measure allows members receiving disability payments to receive payments on either a bi-weekly or monthly basis depending on the duration of their disability.

This measure allows members to receive disability payments during the period their disability application is being processed and allows the FPDR to recoup the benefits paid should the claim be denied or withdrawn.

This measure clarifies language regarding occupational disability benefits.

This measure changes the vesting period for nonservice connected death benefits from 10 to 5 years.

#### CAPTION:

RESTORE SCHOOL ARTS, MUSIC EDUCATION; FUND ARTS THROUGH LIMITED TAX

QUESTION: Shall Portland restore arts, music for schools and fund arts through income tax of 35 dollars per year?

SUMMARY: This measure creates a limited income tax of \$35 for each adult income-earning Portland resident. Individuals in households below federal poverty level pay no tax.

Tax can only be used for:

- Arts and Music Teachers: Funds to hire arts and music teachers for kindergarten through 5th grade students at local public schools attended by Portland students. Distribution of funds based on school enrollment.
- Arts Access: Remaining funds for grants to nonprofit arts organizations, other nonprofits and schools. Will fund grants to provide high-quality arts access for kindergarten through 12th grade students and to make arts, culture experiences available to underserved communities. Funds administered by Regional Arts and Culture Council (RACC).

Accountability measures include:

- Administrative costs are capped.
- Expenditures subject to oversight by citizen committee.
- Independent financial audits of RACC and School District expenditures.

Estimated funds raised will be \$12 million annually. The tax is effective beginning with 2012 tax year, with payment due when state taxes are due.

#### EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

#### **BACKGROUND.**

Research shows that art and music are an essential part of a basic curriculum for students, especially in the elementary school years. Studies link access to arts education to improved attendance, increased participation in math and science, higher test scores, increased graduation rates and college admittance,

The impact is even greater among low-income students and students of color.

Access to arts education for public school students in the City of Portland has declined steeply. For example, over the last five years Parkrose and Centennial School Districts have cut their art and music teaching staff by half. Portland Public Schools has dropped all arts instruction in 22 schools in just two years.

 In 2011, 18% of Portland elementary schools provide art instruction compared to 83% nationally.

- 58% of Portland elementary schools provide music instruction compared to 94% nationally.
- 28% of all Portland schools provide no arts instruction of any kind including music, drama, dance or visual arts. This is compared to just 3% of schools nationally.
- There are 11,596 Portland children attending schools that do not have any art, dance, drama, or music instruction.

#### **HOW MEASURE 26-146 WORKS**

The Arts Education and Access Fund will first go to all schools that serve Portland students within the six Portland school districts (Centennial, David Douglas, Parkrose, Portland Public, Reynolds, and Riverdale) to pay for certified arts education teachers for Kindergarten through 5th grade (K-5). Districts will receive the funds required to hire and maintain one certified arts teacher per every 500 students so that every K-5 student within the City of Portland will have access to arts education.

Remaining funds will be awarded as grants to non-profit organizations and schools to provide high-quality arts access for Kindergarten through 12th grade students and to make arts and culture experiences available to underserved communities. Administered by the Regional Arts & Culture Council, grants will be made to qualifying Portland-based non-profit arts organizations that demonstrate artistic excellence, provide service to the community, show administrative and fiscal competence and provide a wide range of high quality arts programs to the public. Grants will also be awarded to schools and non-profits that provide arts programs specifically for schoolchildren and underserved communities.

Measure 26-146 will generate the revenue to support the Arts Education and Access Fund through an income tax of \$35 per adult, income-earning resident of Portland. Residents living in households at or below the federal poverty limit will be exempt: they will not pay this tax.

#### **ACCOUNTABILITY**

An Independent Citizen Oversight committee that is representative of the City's diverse communities will be formed to annually review Fund expenditures and report the impact of the Arts Education and Access Fund to the public. Audits will be made available to the public annually.

After the expenditure of capped start-up costs, administrative costs of this Fund are limited to 5 percent or less of Gross Revenues over a five year period.



MEASURE APPROVING ANNEXATION OF 19.90 ACRES INTO CITY OF SANDY

QUESTION: Shall 19.90 acres south of Kelso Road, north of Olson Street, and west of 377th Avenue be annexed into the Sandy city limits?

SUMMARY: Annexation is the legal process to bring property into the city limits. 4-J Land Company and Kampa Lane LLC as applicants and property owners have asked the city to bring three parcels of land and a portion of the right-of-way of Jewelberry Avenue into the city limits. The legal description of the properties is: T2S R4E Section 11AB Tax Lot 300, T2S R4E Section 11AC Tax Lots 700 and 900, and the adjacent right-of-way of Jewelberry Avenue.

The annexation area is located within Sandy's Urban Growth Boundary and is contiguous to property already located in the city limits. Future development requires City review and must comply with land use laws.

#### **EXPLANATORY STATEMENT**

This measure would approve annexation of approximately 19.90 acres into the city limits of the City of Sandy. The property is known as T2S R4E Section 11AB Tax Lot 300, T2S R4E Section 11AC Tax Lots 700 and 900, and a portion of the Jewelberry Avenue right-of-way. The annexation area is located south of Kelso Road and north of Olson Street Avenue. The property is contiguous to the city limits in several locations. The requested parcels are currently zoned by Clackamas County as RRFF-5. If annexation of these parcels is approved by voters, Tax Lots 700 and 900 will be zoned SFR (Single Family Residential) and Tax Lot 300, R-1 (Low Density Residential) as required under the City's Comprehensive Land Use Plan. The SFR zoning district allows for a density between 3 and 5.8 units per net acre and the R-1 zoning district allows between 5 and 8 units per net acre.

4-J Land Company and Kampa Lane LLC as applicants and property owners have applied to the City of Sandy for approval of this annexation request as allowed by Oregon law. The city, following its Charter, has put this matter before the voters for approval.

Single-family residences and associated outbuildings are constructed on each of the parcels. Access to the subject properties would be from Jewelberry Avenue subject to approval by the City of Sandy. Following annexation, development of these properties will require submittal of a separate land use application process demonstrating compliance with applicable sections of the Sandy Development Code.

The properties are currently served by onsite septic systems and wells. Future development will require connection to city water and sewer service. All future development on this site will also be required to conform to applicable stormwater management policies and regulations.

The Sandy City Council conducted a public hearing on August 6, 2012 to review the request and approved this application for inclusion on the November 2012 ballot by adopting Resolution 2012-13 by a 4-2 vote.

## Measure 3-410

#### **ARGUMENT IN FAVOR**

The City of Sandy has long planned for growth on the site that is the subject of this annexation proposal. The site lies within the city's Urban Growth Boundary and Urban Reserve Boundary, abuts the current city limits, and is within a few hundred yards of the new high school and the new Sandy Bluff Park. The network of trails, sidewalks and bike paths in the area facilitates walking and biking to the new high school and into downtown Sandy, creating an area that is uniquely friendly to pedestrians and bikers and enhances livability. The site is an ideal place for growth and will allow residents to take advantage of significant public investments that have been made in the area.

In anticipation of growth in the area, 13 years ago the city's Capital Improvement Plan called out the need for Jewelberry St., which runs through the middle of the subject site. The city began setting aside considerable funds to contribute to its construction, and the city installed public utilities (water and sewer lines, etc.) when the street was built in 2007. These utilities run the length of Jewelberry all the way to Kelso Rd. Accordingly, the area is basically already developed and ready for housing.

Some other positives of annexation include:

- The \$114,900,000 bond for the new high school is in place until the year 2041. New homes within the school district spread out the cost and bring down the tax burden for those that are already in the district.
- Approving this measure does not result in any costs for the residents of Sandy.
   In fact, the city will charge hookup fees on any new development, thereby returning money to city coffers to cover previous and future expenditures.
- The annexation of this property into the city does not mean it will be developed any time soon. The owner has no intention of pursuing development until the housing market is fully recovered.



#### **CAPTION:**

PORTLAND PUBLIC SCHOOL DISTRICT BONDS TO IMPROVE SCHOOLS

QUESTION: Is the Portland Public School District authorized to issue up to \$482 million of general obligation bonds to improve schools? If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of sections 11 and 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

**SUMMARY:** If approved this measure would finance capital costs, including projects that:

Replace leaking, worn or deteriorating school roofs,

Renovate or replace schools.

Strengthen schools against earthquakes,

Repay loans for capital costs, including 9 roof replacements, 47 boiler conversions, and the Rosa Parks School.

Increase access to schools for students, teachers and visitors with disabilities, and

Upgrade science classrooms at middle grade schools.

Citizen accountability and oversight and annual audits of bond projects and expenditures will be required.

The bonds may be issued in multiple series and each series may mature over no more than 21 years.

Most bonds will mature in eight years or less. Bond cost for eight years is estimated at about \$1.10 per \$1,000 of taxable assessed property value, then reducing to about thirty cents per \$1,000. For this measure, the cost for a house assessed at \$150,000 for property tax purposes would be about \$165 a year for eight years, then reducing to about \$45 per year.

#### **EXPLANATORY STATEMENT**

Portland Public Schools is the largest school district in Oregon, with 78 schools and over 47 thousand students.

On average, Portland Public Schools' buildings are older than 65 years. Some were built over 100 years ago; more than half were built before 1940. Only two schools have been built in the last 30 years.

Years of budget reductions have deferred upgrades to school building operational and safety systems in order to direct funds to teachers and learning materials. Portland voters have not approved capital bond funds to upgrade school facilities since 1995. Portland Public School buildings are some of the most heavily used public buildings in Portland with thousands of school and non-school events each year.

During the past year, Portland Public Schools convened a Long Range Facility Plan Advisory Committee led by citizen volunteers. The Committee reviewed enrollment forecasts and assessments of facilities conditions including seismic safety and accessibility for schools. The facilities assessments were used to rate the school buildings most in need of major repair, complete upgrade or replacement.

The Long Range Facility Plan states that Portland Public Schools should create effective, accessible and inclusive learning environments that help all students achieve. The entire committee agreed that capital bonds would be required in order to renovate/replace facilities and meet enrollment requirements in the next 10 years.

Guided by the Advisory Committee's findings, the Board of Education proposes that bonds fund capital projects for school and classroom renovation, construction, and upgrades, including projects that:

- Replace leaking, worn or deteriorating school roofs,
- Renovate or replace schools.
- Strengthen schools against earthquakes,
- Repay loans for capital costs, including 9 roof replacements, 47 boiler conversions, and the Rosa Parks School.
- Increase access to schools for students, teachers and visitors with disabilities, and
- Upgrade science classrooms at middle grade schools.

This bond would renovate Franklin High School, Grant High School and Roosevelt High School, and would replace Faubion PreK-8 school. It would also begin planning for upgrade of all high schools in coming years.

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# **REGISTERING TO VOTE**

WHO MAY REGISTER TO VOTE?

Anyone who is:

- ★ A resident of Oregon;
- ★ A United States citizen; and
- ★ 17 years of age or older. [Note: Registered Voters must be 18 years of age to receive a ballot.]

#### **HOW CAN I REGISTER?**

By mail-in registration form or in person at any county elections office or at a designated state agency, including the Department of Motor Vehicles and some public assistance agencies. Also, voters can access secure online voter registration at http://www.oregonvotes.org.

## WHEN MAY I REGISTER AND WHAT IS THE REGISTRATION DEADLINE?

You may register at any time. However, your voter registration form must be received or postmarked no later than the 21st day before the election at which you intend to vote.

## WHERE CAN I FIND VOTER REGISTRATION FORMS?

Post offices, public libraries, city halls, DMV offices and Clackamas County Elections, 1710 Red Soils Ct., Ste. 100, in Oregon City. You can register online, or download and print a PDF form from the Secretary of State's web site at the Oregon Voter Registration link, which can be found at http://www.oregonvotes.org.

#### WHAT INFORMATION IS REQUIRED?

In October 2002, the "Help America Vote Act" was signed into law. The Act changed voter registration requirements nationwide for voting in federal elections. When registering to vote in Oregon for the first time, you must provide an Oregon Driver's License / ID. If you do not have a valid ODL / ID, the last four digits of your Social Security number must be provided. If you do not have a valid Oregon Driver's License / ID or a Social Security number, you must affirm this by marking the appropriate box on the registration form. If you are registering by mail, you must provide a copy of one of the following: a valid photo identification, a copy of a paycheck stub, utility bill, bank statement or other government document showing your name and address.

If sufficient documentation is not provided at the time of registration, it will be requested by elections officials in order for you to vote at the next federal election. When filling out the registration card, you must furnish your full name, residence address (and mailing address, if different), ODL or Oregon ID, date of birth, political party preference, and signature. Your residence address must be the physical address where you reside - not a post office box.

## WHAT IF I TURN 18 AFTER THE REGISTRATION DEADLINE?

If you will be 18 years of age by election day, you must register no later than the 21st day prior to the election to be eligible to vote in that election.

#### CAPTION:

ESTACADA RURAL FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND AUTHORIZATION

QUESTION: Shall Estacada Rural Fire Protection District No. 69 be authorized to issue general obligation bonds not exceeding \$4,445,000? If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of sections 11 and 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution

SUMMARY: If approved, this measure would provide funds for capital costs and bond issuance costs. Specifically, this measure would help finance:

- Constructing, furnishing and equipping of a new fire station;
- · Site improvements and costs of issuance.

Bonds would mature in twenty years and six months (20.5) years or less from issuance and be issued in one or more series.

The estimated property tax levy, in the first year to repay the bond, is estimated at \$0.3222 per \$1,000 of assessed value. The owner of a home, with a taxable assessed value of \$175,000, is estimated to pay \$56.39 in the first year.

#### **EXPLANATORY STATEMENT**

Estacada Fire District covers approximately 85 square miles and includes the City of Estacada and the surrounding area. The District provides fire protection, emergency medical services, and fire and life safety education and prevention services. It is staffed by 10 paid career and 40 volunteer firefighters and emergency medical personnel. Estacada Fire District is a special service district, governed by a Board of Directors elected by District residents.

By unanimous vote, the Board of Directors approved placement of a bond measure on the November 6, 2012 General Election ballot. If approved, this measure would provide funding for constructing, furnishing and equipping of a new fire station.

The Board is asking District residents to consider a \$4.445 million bond measure to be paid over approximately 20 years. The estimated property tax levy, in the first year to repay the bond, is estimated at \$0.3222 per \$1,000 of assessed value. The owner of a home, with a taxable assessed value of \$175.000, is estimated to pay \$56.39 in the first year.

The Board of Directors placed the measure on the ballot for these reasons:

- Constructed in 1964, the Main Station located downtown is no longer able to meet the needs of the fire district. Personnel and equipment are currently dispersed between the main station, a modular office building, a storage container, and a small house. Back-up power is limited in cases of power outages. In an extended emergency this facility is designated as "Emergency Operations Center" for the District which includes the City of Estacada.
- 2. Volunteer firefighters allow the District to maintain current service levels. Indoor facilities for education and training for volunteers and the public, consists of a single classroom. Outdoor training often requires traffic control or closure of streets. Although the District was successful in obtaining a federal grant to purchase a new training tower, we have not been successful in obtaining grant funds for a new fire station. Current facilities make it difficult to meet increased Federal and State mandated training requirements for multiple disciplines and thus simultaneous classes.
- 3. When the Main Station was built 48 years ago the District responded to 100 calls annually with 2 paid and 20 volunteer personnel. In 2011 the District responded to 1,200 calls with 10 career and 40 volunteers. With a total staff of 50, the Main Station has one public restroom, and one restroom with a shower and a toilet. There are no separate facilities, including sleeping accommodations, for female members. The District volunteers now include: career firefighters, volunteer firefighters (half living outside the District's boundary) and fire corps members.

If approved, funding of these projects would provide the District with updated facilities from which to operate and would also provide updated training and living space for volunteers.

The current station is over 47 years old and doesn't meet present building codes for a fire station. With a total staff of 50, the Main Station has 1 public restroom and 1 restroom with a shower and toilet. There are no separate facilities, including sleeping accommodations, for female members. The apparatus bays were designed for the fire engines of the 60's, limiting the options available when replacing equipment. Firefighers don't have the appropriate storage area for personal safety equipment, forcing them to store their gear in multiple bags.

The design of the new fire station will meet the current and future needs of the Fire District allowing for modern training classrooms, respectful living quarters and individual sleeping areas for firefighters and emergency medical tehnicians.

The fire station is a focal point of the community. A new station will fulfill the needs of our citizens for many generations to come. This bond will cost .3222 cents per thousand dollars of property valuation, or \$56.39 a year for a home valued at \$175,000—that's \$.470 per month for a \$175,000 valued property.

FIVE-YEAR LOCAL OPTION TAX FOR OPERATIONS AND EQUIPMENT

QUESTION: Shall Molalla Fire District impose \$.65 per \$1,000 assessed value for five years beginning in 2013/2014 for operations and equipment? This measure may cause property taxes to increase more than three percent

SUMMARY: The Molalla Rural Fire Protection
District is seeking a five-year local option tax to
provide funding to maintain the current level of
emergency services, including hiring 5 Paramedic/
Firefighters. It will also provide equipment to those
personnel and our volunteers and will restore programs eliminated from the previous District budget
and will cover increasing costs of operating the
Fire District, including increased call volume.

The first year this five-year tax will be levied is fiscal year 2013-2014. The proposed rate will raise approximately \$756,340 in 2013-2014; \$767,685 in 2014-2015; \$779,200 in 2015-2016; \$790,888 in 2016-2017; and \$802,751 in 2017-2018. The estimated tax cost for this measure is an ESTI-MATE ONLY, based on the best information available from the county assessor at the time of the estimate.

The estimated cost on a home assessed at \$200,000 would be \$130.00 per year.

#### **EXPLANATORY STATEMENT**

The Molalla Rural Fire Protection District is not a part of the city or county but is a "special service district" providing fire protection for 101 square miles and ambulance service to 350 square miles of Clackamas County including the City of Molalla. District personnel respond to fire and medical emergencies from fire stations in the City of Molalla and in the Mulino and Sawtell areas.

The Fire District's Board of Directors is requesting that the taxpayers of the district consider a 5 year local option levy for the specific purpose of, restoring programs cut from previous budgets, and establishing and hiring five paramedic/firefighters emergency responders. The District currently is overly reliant on volunteers to respond on emergency calls during the weekday. This low level staffing is not an effective or safe service level for the community and its residents.

Factors prompting the District's Board to submit this measure:

User fee revenue reduction due to past Medicare reform.

An unusually low permanent tax rate (\$0.7833) which is less than half of other Clackamas County Fire Districts, which even with district growth will not sustain the cost of the increases in emergency response due to continuing population growth and new building construction.

Inadequate reserves for the purchase of fire apparatus & ambulance replacements as needed or to routinely set aside funding for that purpose.

The shortage of available volunteer responders during specific times of the day which would allow for a predictable and appropriate response.

The inability to fund any additional career staffing through our annual operations budget.

The population within a 5 mile radius of Molalla has risen from 10,332 in 1990 to 12,568 in 2011 for an increase of 22%. In that same time period, emergency responses increased from 1082 to 2075 annually (+92%). The current growth rate is predicted to continue through 2013. Career staffing has increased by one person (15%) while, with some periodic fluctuation in volunteer numbers have remained at the same level since the 1980's.

The district's increased population has not interpreted into a larger volunteer pool as might be expected despite varied recruitment methods.

The District's Board is presently unable to assure quality service to its citizens due to the unpredictability of staffing and that the issue be decided by the voters of the District.

The estimated cost on a home assessed at \$200,000 would be \$130.00 (\$0.36 cents per day).

With the Molalla Fire Districts board of directors decision to pursue a five year local option levy to add five additional Firefighter / Paramedics, the Molalla Volunteer Firefighters Association wishes to lend their full support of this decision, in hopes the better the safety of our community and those we help protect.

Did you know that Molalla Fire District is 96% volunteer? And that during the night and on weekends there is only one paramedic on duty to cover a 350 square mile area? Molalla Fire District is trending to respond to over 2,100 calls this year, making it the 2nd busiest department in Clackamas County, and doing so at well under half of the average tax rate in the County at 78 cents per \$1,000 assessed value. (County average is \$2.20 per \$1,000 assessed)

We as volunteers contributed over 25,000 hours of service to Molalla Fire District last year. However, the growing call volume, high training demands for volunteers and overall time commitment make it hard to recruit and retain our members. Most of us have jobs outside of the Molalla area and are gone during the working day, which is the busiest time for the District. This leaves our paid staff with a lack of manpower during the day, as well as at night. We do our very best to supplement where we can but with all of these growing demands it is becoming harder and harder.

Molalia Rural Fire District #73 has a highly dedicated group of volunteer and career responders.

We are a "combination" department with approximately 90% volunteer, 10% career (paid) workforce. Our Firefighter/Medics have a good reputation as highly trained and respected by regional Trauma Centers and other State Agencies.

#### Molalla Fire District staffing stretched to its limits.

The District provides 100 square miles of fire protection and operates an Advanced Life Support Ambulance that covers 300 square miles. Our call volume is increasing: in 2011 the district responded to 2,075 calls; in 2012 the call volume is projected to increase 8-10 percent.

Volunteers provided 25,000 hours of service to the district in 2011. Increasing training requirements has made it more difficult to recruit volunteers. Volunteers are not available during "work hours" (daytime response).

Molalla Fire District only has one full time (paid) Firefighter/Paramedic on duty in the evening and on weekends. During weekdays, when call levels are at the highest, there are two additional paid Firefighter/Medics.

#### Lowest Funded Fire District in the Region.

Currently, Molalla Fire District is unable to increase staffing due to extremely low fire protection tax rate of \$0.78 per thousand assessed value. Average base tax rate charged by other Fire Districts in Clackamas County is \$2.20 per thousand assessed value. As an example, Canby Fire District rate is \$1.89 per thousand and Clackamas Fire District is \$2.40 per thousand.

#### Will You Support Us?

Proposal is a 5 year local option tax increase of \$0.65 per thousand assessed value. Property valued at \$200,000 would see an increase of \$130 per year (or \$10.83 per month, .36 cents a day). This would allow the District to hire 5 additional Firefighter/Medics to improve staffing for far less that what most people spend on a cup of coffee each day. Molalla Fire District would still have the lowest tax base in the county. Please vote YES for measure 3-412.

We, the Board of Directors for Molalla Rural Fire Protection District (RFPD) #73, are unanimous in our support for Measure 3-412 for several reasons.

- 1. Molalla RFPD #73 has been operating on its current assessed tax rate since prior to 1990. During this time, the population of our community has increased substantially, as well as the demand for fire and medical services. Furthermore, the cost to operate and maintain the needed equipment for providing exceptional fire and medical service has dramatically increased.
- 2. The average age of Molalla RFPD #73's emergency vehicles is over 25 years. This has required a large portion of our budget to be allocated for repairs and maintenance, just to keep the vehicles running and somewhat dependable.
- 3. Molalla RFPD has one Firefighter/Paramedic on duty 24 hours a day. With the passage of this Levy we would be able to provide 3 Firefighter/Paramedics per 24 hour shift. With each medical emergency that is transported to the hospital, it takes one Firefighter/Paramedic out of town for two hours. With 3 Firefighter/Paramedics on shift there would be more consistency in staffing a second ambulance when two calls occur at the same time.
- 4. Molalla RFPD #73 is the second busiest Fire Station in Clackamas County and has the lowest assessed tax rate. With the requested Levy amount we will continue to have the lowest assessed tax rate in Clackamas County.

For decades, Molalla RFPD #73 has provided exceptional fire and medical services to the residents living in the Molalla area for an extremely low cost. Now, we are asking for your help. With the increase in costs that we have all experienced over the last 20+ years, we can not continue to provide the level of service that the public has come to expect with the current tax rate. Please, help us help our community.

#### **ARGUMENT IN FAVOR**

As a former Fire Chief with the Molalla Fire District, I would like to offer a few words of support for the upcoming operational levy the voters of the District will be asked to approve or deny. During my time as Fire Chief, 1992-1997, I can honestly say that these individuals were the most dedicated and resilient people I ever had the opportunity to work with, and I am proud to say that that same dedication and determination to do the best job possible, remains today.

In the last twenty years, emergency call volumes have increased to the point where the Molalla Fire District is the second busiest department in Clackamas County. This creates an enormous staffing issue for the District where volunteers account for 96% of the staffing. On the average, you can expect only 305 to 40 % of your volunteers will be available to respond at any given time. This levy will allow the District to fill some of those gaps by hiring 5 additional Firefighter/Paramedics.

When I became the Fire Chief in 1992, the tax payers were paying \$0.73 per thousand of assessed valuation. At the time it was by far the lowest tax rate for fire districts in Clackamas County. Today, 20-years later, that tax rate remains the lowest, by even a greater margin, in Clackamas County at \$0.78 per thousand of assessed valuation.

However, the ability of the District to provide the same level of service the community has learned to expect is dwindling and will continue to decline over the coming years unless the financial support is provided through this levy. If you support Molalla Fire District financially, you are supporting the emergency response delivery system in a way that is just as important as that of the volunteer responding to the emergency. Without your financial support, the system suffers.

ESTABLISHING A SPECIAL ROAD DISTRICT IN GOVERNMENT CAMP

QUESTION: Shall the Government Camp Special Road District be formed to provide services at \$0.400371 per \$1000 assessed value beginning FY2013-14?

SUMMARY: If approved, the "Government Camp Special Road District" ("Road District") would be formed. The Road District is a special purpose district that would be governed by independently elected directors from within the District's geographic boundaries. It would only be allowed to expend funds on road-related activities. Creation of the Road District would do the following:

- Provide permanent and dedicated road maintenance funding;
- Allow for basic repairs, operation, and improvements to street lights;
- Provide funding for snow removal on targeted frontage roads and sidewalks;
- Furnish, upkeep, and enhance street drainage; and
- Provide, maintain, and improve street signage.

The Road District is a proposal from local Government Camp residents that the Board of County Commissioners has referred out for a vote of all affected citizens. It is intended to ensure a long-term funding source for road services in the Government Camp area. The County and property owners have sought a permanent funding source to meet the extreme needs of the area. An annual audit of the Road District would be available to the public.

#### **EXPLANATORY STATEMENT**

On June 10th, 2012 the County received a petition from certain landowners in the Government Camp Village to form a Special Road District ("District"), which could levy and collect taxes to be used for the sole purpose of supporting road infrastructure within its boundaries. The Board of County Commissioners acted on this petition by ordering that the question of whether the District should be formed shall be put to a vote by the electors of Government Camp.

Since 1989 Government Camp has received several million dollars in infrastructure improvements such as paved local streets, sidewalks, street lighting, pedestrian area improvements, a village information kiosk, and related signage. Approval of the District

would establish a long-term funding mechanism to provide maintenance for these improvements, which is especially important due to the stresses created by the climate on the mountain and the year-round demand for the safe use of its facilities. If approved, the District would provide:

- Provide permanent and dedicated road maintenance funding;
- Allow for basic repairs, operation, and improvements to street lights;
- Provide funding for snow removal on targeted frontage roads and sidewalks;
- Furnish, upkeep, and enhance street drainage; and
- Provide, maintain, and improve street signage.


These services and functions would be funded by a local tax, at the rate of \$0.400371 per \$1000 of assessed value. The tax would be charged beginning in the 2013-14 assessment year. Decisions as to how the money raised by the tax is spent will be made by an independently elected board consisting of three members. In order to be eligible for election to the board, a candidate must reside within the District. The District would have status as a municipal body and have to meet all the requirements for open and transparent functions, including complying with public meeting and records laws, public contracting laws, and an annual audit.
