The City Charter requires voter approval for the change in status of a city park to allow for a public street dedication and stormwater easement (other than for recreation) that will serve the city park and an adjacent small single family development. A property owner who owns the property adjacent to the northwest of an undeveloped portion of Wesley Lynn Park wishes to construct a public street within an existing roadway easement and install utilities at no cost to the City using a portion of the park. The existing roadway easement, which benefits the adjacent property owner, was created for roadway purposes before the park was established. The public street would serve both a small single family subdivision and would also serve as park access. In addition, the property owner would be granted a fifteen foot wide easement to allow the installation of an underground stormwater drainage facility to convey storm water from the proposed public street and the adjacent property.

Measure Explanatory Statement for County Voters' Pamphlet

This measure would allow a property owner adjacent to the northwest end of Wesley Lynn Park to build a new public road over an existing easement owned by the property owner on park property and use a portion of the park to drain stormwater via an underground pipe. These improvements require voter approval because Chapter X of the Oregon City Charter prohibits improvements on park property, other than for recreational purposes, without a vote of the people. The public road will also serve park purposes in the future, but because no improvements are currently planned, the improvements require a vote.

Wesley Lynn Park was created through two purchases of property, the first in 1998 and the second in 2010. The easement existed when the city acquired the park. The city used funds from park system development charges and other park specific funds. Since the park was purchased, the southeast side of the park was improved with ball fields, but no improvements have taken place on the northwest end of the park.

At the request of the adjacent property owner, the Oregon City Commission approved sending this measure to the voters and the City's Park and Recreation Advisory Committee has reviewed the proposed road improvements and stormwater improvements and has no objections. The City is likely to improve the northwest side of the park in the future and the improvements authorized by this measure will be used to serve the park uses at that time. All improvements related to this measure would be made at the sole cost of the neighboring property owner.
