WHAT ACTION ARE YOU REQUESTING FROM THE BOARD?

Direct staff to move forward with the proposed transportation road projects to be funded by the Community Road Fund, as recommended by the Community Road Fund Advisory Committee and Transportation & Development staff.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

INTRODUCTION

In February 2019, the Board of County Commissioners took the step – after many decades of public outreach on transportation needs – of approving the first-ever county-wide vehicle registration fee. The \$30/vehicle/year fee becomes effective January 2020, and Clackamas County residents with vehicles to be registered in January are receiving notices this month.

The \$11.3 million/year of expected revenue will be tracked through the Community Road Fund. As promised to the public, the revenue will be divided between the county and cities, as follows:

- 50% for the county to use on its roads for local road paving, safety and congestion relief projects (~\$5.6 million)
- 40% for cities to use on their roads, distributed based on population (~\$4.6 million)
- 10% for a Strategic Investment Fund to be used jointly by the county and cities on road transfers and transportation projects of mutual interest (~\$1.1 million)

Each city will determine how best to use its portion of the revenue. The county and cities, working through the Clackamas County Coordinating Committee (C4), will identify projects for the Strategic Investment Fund. Our focus today is on the approximately \$5.6 million per year available to use on county-maintained roads.

COMMUNITY ROAD FUND

The county's revenue from the vehicle registration fee is going into a newly created Community Road Fund (CRF) program. The revenue and expenditures will be tracked through this fund, and the information will be shared with the public on the county's CRF website online at www.clackamas.us/transportation/crf.

As promised during the public outreach about the vehicle registration fee, the revenue will be used to meet three types of county road needs: congestion relief, local road paving and safety improvements. The amount of money, process used to identify top priority projects and projects are reviewed below.

Congestion Relief (~ \$3.5 - \$4 million/year)

The county's Transportation System Plan, adopted in 2013, involved two years of extensive technical study and public outreach, including regional work groups and a community advisory committee, to identify hundreds of transportation projects needed throughout unincorporated Clackamas County in the next 20 years. That in-depth process provided a list of high-priority congestion relief projects that the county's newest advisory committee – the Community Road Fund Advisory Committee (CRFAC) -- could prioritize to consider for funding.

The 15-member CRFAC met six times from July to October to, as charged:

- Develop criteria to analyze potential capital congestion relief projects to be funded with countywide VRF revenue.
- Apply that criteria to the high priority congestion relief projects in the Transportation System Plan and to any additional top priority congestion relief projects that might result from community input.
- Recommend the order in which capital congestion relief projects should be constructed.

After reviewing the top TSP congestion relief projects, the CRFAC developed its own evaluation criteria (Attachment A) to apply to the projects, along with criteria that had been used during the TSP process. Staff applied the criteria to the congestion relief projects for the committee members to discuss and analyze. The CRFAC asked for additional information from staff and further discussed the projects.

The final recommendation from the committee, taking into consideration all the evaluation criteria and how the congestion relief projects relate to the safety and local road paving projects (Attachment B), is that the county proceed on the following projects, with the understanding that the CRFAC will meet regularly in upcoming years to review progress and recommend if adjustments are needed. The congestion relief projects the CRFAC recommends, in order based on ranking by the committee, are:

- 1. *Johnson Creek Blvd*, 55th Ave to Bell Ave widen to 3 lanes, add bike lanes and sidewalk
- Canby-Marguam Highway/Lone Elder Road intersection reconstruct; add turn lanes
- 3. Redland Road intersections at Ferguson Road and Bradley Road -- add turn lanes
- 4. Stafford Road/Childs Road intersection remove skew, add turn lanes and signals; and Stafford Road, Childs Road to Tualatin River add paved shoulders
- 5. Welches Road, US 26 to Birdie Lane add sidewalks and paved shoulders
- 6. Barlow Road/OR 99E intersection initial project scoping
- 7. Amisigger Road/OR 224 intersection install traffic signal; add turn lanes

^{*}There are 13 active members at this point; one had to resign and one was absent.

Local Road Paving (~\$1 million/year)

Approximately one-half of the county's 1,400 miles of roadways are local roads. Because local roads, by definition, have much less traffic than collector and arterial roads, over the years Transportation Maintenance has focused its limited paving funds on the busier roads. Now, with a source of local revenue, we can include local roads in our paving packages.

The local roads recommended to be paved (Attachment C) were selected by staff based upon date from the pavement management system, which uses roadway condition inputs to recommend paving priorities. Paving costs include bringing roads up to current Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) standards, which can add significantly to the cost of a project, as well as design, preparation work, etc. To make the best use of funds, the recommendations reflect opportunities to combine local road paving projects with other paving projects as well as with congestion relief and safety projects.

Safety Improvements (~\$500,000/year)

Safety improvement projects have been identified in several adopted plans in the past few years, including the TSP, Transportation Safety Action Plan (TSAP), the five-year capital improvements list and from annual safety ranking calculations. The 12 projects recommended for implementation with CRF funds (Attachment D) were analyzed by staff based on the state safety index number, benefit to cost ratio (crashes prevented) and health index, and then reviewed and approved by the Traffic Safety Commission.

The Big Picture

The projects recommended to be funded through the Community Road Fund are at many different stages of readiness. Some, such as local road paving and less complex safety improvement projects, will be able to be completed during 2020. Many others require various levels of scoping, design and other preparatory work before they can begin. Some of the larger projects will require expenditures for several years in a row, while a few will be able to be completed in just one or two years.

Staff has taken into consideration the total costs and time required for all the projects so that funds will be available each year to keep the recommended projects on track. In addition, these projects will be combined with other projects that will be funded from other sources, such as state funding through House Bill 2017, local development fees, urban renewal and other sources.

The map of all transportation projects being developed, planned and programmed over the next 5-6 years (Attachment E) shows that residents and businesses throughout unincorporated Clackamas County will benefit from road maintenance and improvement projects.

What's Next

With direction from the Board of Commissioners, staff will immediately proceed to prepare the recommended projects to be implemented. The Community Road Fund Advisory Committee will meet next this winter to discuss their ongoing meeting schedule to review and evaluate the progress on the congestion relief projects and, as needed, recommend adjustments in the future.

Staff respectfully recommends the Board approve option 1) direct staff to move forward with the congestion relief, local road paving and safety improvement projects listed in this report and attachments.




