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	Veteran-Directed Care	
	What is Veteran-Directed Care?	
	Veteran-Directed Care gives Veterans of all ages the opportunity to receive the	
	Home and Community Services they need in a consumer-directed way.	
	Veteran-Directed Care is for Veterans who need assistance with activities of daily	
	living (e.g., bathing and getting dressed) or instrumental activities of daily living	
	(e.g., fixing meals); are isolated, or their caregiver is experiencing burden.	
	Veterans in this program are given a flexible budget for services that can be	
	managed by the Veteran or the family caregiver. Veteran-Directed Care can be	
	used to help Veterans continue to live at home or in their community.

Member Updates	Paul spoke of veterans in Clackamas County who are in need of assistance, and the importance of a	
	gentle nudge to connect veterans to services in an effort to meet needs.	
	Larry shared of volunteering with a program called AMEN. AMEN consist of an all-volunteer	
	workforce, there are no paid employees. This ensures all donations go entirely towards purchasing	
	food and supplies for veteran and military families. AMEN currently provide monthly food boxes to	
	military families and veterans of all branches. Some of our partner programs receive weekly food	
	boxes for homeless veterans. One of the partners is the Vet Center at Clackamas Community College.	
	Adam shared of three individuals in service or veterans who either committed suicide or attempted	
	suicide. The veteran support system is a strong community, and there is a need to break the stigma	
	around struggling. It is necessary for each of us to drop our walls and find the strength to ask for help.	
	Let us find ways to bring veterans together.	

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Public Comment	Americo spoke of communication styles between different eras of service. Americo shared about Team RWB and opportunities provided for veterans to come together and be in service to the community. If the VAC can get creative on ways to bring vets together in service that would be great.	
	Ken shared communication is important, even if it is one sided, communication can and will make the difference.	
	Commissioner Savas spoke on communication and asked VAC for suggestions on ways to connect with veteran that will lead to positive outcomes.
