Approval to apply for a Grant for Overdose Prevention Project. Anticipated grant value is up to \$766,000 for 24 months. Funding is through CareOregon. No County General Funds are involved.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: The Clackamas County Public Health Division (CCPHD) of the Health, Housing & Human Services Department requests approval to apply for CareOregon Overdose Prevention Project Funding.

Clackamas County is continuing to see rising rates of drug overdose- vital statistics data indicates a 109% increase in drug-induced fatalities from 2019 to 2022. The majority of these overdose deaths involve multiple drugs, including fentanyl and methamphetamine.

In Clackamas County, nearly 1 in 5 adults report having experienced four or more adverse childhood events (ACEs), and about 16,000 offenders are annually booked into the Clackamas County Jail. The connection between high levels of ACEs, justice involvement, and substance use is compelling; a 2021 study found that 57% of Medicaid recipients involved in the justice system had a substance use disorder. Additionally, the point-in-time homeless count conducted across Clackamas, Multnomah, and Washington counties in January 2022 found 6,633 people experiencing homelessness in the region, including 597 in Clackamas County. The stresses and dangers of living on the streets lead to an increased risk for substance use disorder (SUD) and co-occurring mental health disorders.

A comprehensive response to the addiction and overdose crisis involves addressing the root causes of substance use, including lack of community connectedness/isolation, trauma, homelessness, overlapping mental health issues, adverse childhood experiences (ACEs), and the absence of basic needs. These factors must be addressed to help individuals on their journey to recovery. The purpose of this project is to strengthen partnerships between the Clackamas County Public Health Division, local public safety agencies, and other community partners to jointly address the growing overdose crisis we are experiencing in the highest-burden areas of Clackamas County. These strategies will bring together partners and leverage resources across multiple sectors to achieve common goals and further our reach in the community.



The overall goal is to reduce substance use and overdoses in Clackamas County with a focus on vulnerable populations, including the justice-involved and homeless communities. We plan to do this through increased outreach, linkages to peer-mentor recovery services, case management, and medications for opioid use disorder (MOUD).

This funding will work to reduce the number of people who have a first-time or repeat overdose, decrease 911 calls and hospital admissions, improve the quality of life for individuals with substance use disorders, and bridge gaps in care by connecting vulnerable individuals to treatment and other critical resources, such as housing, employment, healthcare, etc.

Specifically, funding will support the following projects:

- Project Hope
 - Case Management and Care Coordination
 - o 2 Peer Recovery Mentors
- EMS Buprenorphine Pilot Project with Canby and Molalla Fire Districts
 - Medical oversight, consultant and training of EMS medics, buprenorphine medication
- Program Development, Coordination, Tracking and Evaluation
- Administrative Services

RECOMMENDATION: Staff recommend that the Board of County Commissioners approve to apply for the CareOregon Overdose Prevention Project funding.

1. How does the grant/funding opportunity support the Department and/or Division's Mission/Purpose/Goals?

The proposed investments align with the Performance Clackamas goal to Ensure Safe, Healthy and Secure Communities, by addressing the social determinants of health (addiction, homelessness, crime, employment, mental and physical health) in our approach to decreasing substance use, overdose, hospitalizations, and death.

This funding opportunity also supports the H3S department's mission to provide access, coordination, healthcare, housing, and prevention services to individuals, families, and communities so they can experience inclusion, prosperity, and an improved quality of life. The project works to improve health care access and integrates linkages to care and equitable access to services by meeting people where they're at. The project is rooted in partnerships with an effort to improve system coordination and leveraging of resources.

2. Who, if any, are the community partners who might be better suited to perform this work?

3. What are the objectives of this funding opportunity? How will we meet these objectives?

The objectives include working with community partners to develop a coordinated system of care that supports overdose prevention and the treatment and recovery of individuals affected by substance use to:

- Reduce the number of people who have a first time or repeat overdose on opioids and other drugs, thereby decreasing future 911 calls and hospital readmissions.
- · Improve the quality of life for patients with substance use disorders.
- Bridge gaps in care by connecting vulnerable patients to treatment and other critical resources.
- 4. Does the grant/financial assistance fund an existing program? If yes, which program? If no, what is the purpose of the program?

Yes, it will fund the substance use and overdose prevention program

Organizational Capacity:

Yes, this funding will sustain the work of two internal staff (Public Health's Sr. Program Planner and a Program Planner).

2. Are there partnership efforts required? If yes, who are we partnering with and what are their roles and responsibilities?

Yes, there are a variety of partners included in this funding proposal. Clackamas Fire District will provide Community Paramedic support and follow up to overdose survivors, Kaiser Sunnyside Emergency Department and Clackamas County Health Centers provide clinical referrals and Case Management support for those who are experiencing substance-related issues, Clackamas County Jail provide referrals to Project Hope for those with an identified opioid use distorder, Clackamas County Transition Center provides the physical space for Peer Recovery Mentors to provide services to justice-involved clients; the Mental Health and Addiction Association of Oregon (MHAA) provides to full time Peer Recovery Mentors; and Molalla and Canby Fire Districts will engage in an EMS project to provide medications for opioid use disorder to patients with an opioid use disorder.

This will fund an existing program. The program plans to continue the programming as needed by leveraging state and federal funding in future years.
