**EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**: On 2/28/23 the Board of County Commissioners approved the Public and Government Affairs (PGA) recommended list of projects, which included a request for funds to be used for Clackamas School Based Behavioral Health and Substance Abuse Juvenile Justice Prevention Program, to submit for the FY2024 Congressionally Directed Spending. The Juvenile Department received notification on 4/24/24 to apply for \$500,000 appropriated to the Juvenile Department through the Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP) FY24 Byrne Discretionary Community Project Grants. The funding will be used for the Clackamas School Based Behavioral Health and Substance Abuse Juvenile Justice Prevention Program that helps prevent juvenile justice system involvement and lessen demands on law enforcement by improving family connections and increasing community resources by working with identified youth, and their families to receive appropriate supports and referrals to services with assistance from contracted provider.

The Juvenile Department is requesting approval to apply for the Congressionally Directed Spending appropriation through the OJJDP FY24 Byrne Discretionary Community Project Grant.

**RECOMMENDATION:** Staff recommends the Board of County Commissioners approve the request for the Juvenile Department to apply the Congressionally Recommended Award.
