If you prefer, instead of mailing your ballot, you may take it to one of the ballot drop site locations listed on page 87 of this pamphlet. Drop boxes will be available at these locations beginning April 30 and extending until 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday, May 17, 2005.

If a ballot was delivered to your residence for someone who should no longer be receiving ballots at your address, please write "RETURN" on the envelope and place it back in your mailbox. If a ballot was sent to someone who is deceased, please write "DECEASED" on the envelope and place it back in your mailbox.

Return your Official Ballot

Measure No. 3-173

BALLOT TITLE

FIVE-YEAR LOCAL OPTION LEVY FOR INSTRUCTION, EQUIPMENT, TEXTBOOKS AND SUPPLIES

QUESTION: Shall Colton School District impose \$1.25 per \$1000 of assessed value for operating purposes for five years beginning in 2006-07? This measure may cause property taxes to increase more than three percent.

SUMMARY: This measure may be passed only at an election with at least a 50 percent voter turn out. The school district will use the revenue from this measure to hire teachers to help to maintain current class sizes and to continue to offer elective programs such as art and music. If the estimated revenue is collected, it could pay for three or more teachers. Any funds left over that are not enough to hire a teacher will be used to purchase classroom equipment, textbooks and supplies. It is estimated that this levy will generate \$152,541 in 2006-07; \$156,355 in 2007-08; \$160,264 in 2008-09; \$164,271 in 2009-10; and \$168,378 in 2010-11. The Colton School District bond levy at \$1.63 per \$1000 will be retired before this levy goes into effect.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

Primarily as a result of Measure 5 Constitutional tax limitations, Colton School District cut two music teachers and one art teacher between 1992 and 1995. This had the effect of eliminating music and art opportunities for Colton students from 1996-2000. In the fall of 1999 Governor John Kitzhaber signed the local option tax law.

In early 2000, the School Board decided to submit a local option levy tax measure to fund teachers to restore art and music programs, to help maintain class size and to purchase equipment, textbooks and supplies with the local option revenue. That five-year levy will expire in November 2005.

The district did reinstate programs in art and music and there is a high student enrollment. In the music and band program 26 high school students and 100 middle school students receive daily instruction with an average class size of 25 students. In addition, 312 elementary students receive music instruction once every six days. 99 high school students and 55 middle school students are currently enrolled in art, with an average class size of 26 students.

Now the School Board is asking the voters to consider a follow-on 5-year local option levy for November 2006 through 2010. Its purpose is largely the same – to maintain class size and elective programs such as art and music and to purchase classroom equipment, textbooks and supplies with revenue left that is not enough to hire an additional teacher.

Another tax levy will also be finished in November 2005. In 1995 voters passed a bond measure to build a new middle school following a fire that burnt down the old school. The last levy for that Bond will be made in November 2005.

For the last five years taxpayers have contributed \$1.63 per thousand for the middle school bond and \$0.88 for the local option levy for a combined collection of \$2.51 per

thousand. Both of these collections will terminate in November 2005. If voters support this local option levy from 2006-2010 the collection rate for this local option levy will be \$1.25 per thousand, slightly less than one-half the rate of the expiring local option levy and the middle school hand.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR

5 years without / 5 years with. What a difference Art and Music have brought to your Colton Schools. Since we passed the 2000 levy to re-fund Art and Music we have built a program that this year has provided formal music and art classes for 312 elementary, 155 middle school, 125 high school students and have 44 choir and 82 band members. These students have lowered class size by not filling seats in other classes.

We've all seen the studies that show that the arts benefit our children. The painter Roy Lichtenstein said it simply. "Art doesn't transform. It just plain forms." (Art News, 1963) Music enhances math achievement. Drawing skills enhance project work. The arts affect attitude positively and provide for self-expression. Art and music are what get some students out of bed in the morning and keep them coming to school. The absence of art and music is what convinces some families to choose another school when their children reach the higher grades.

The district is asking the voters to approve a local option levy to maintain funding which gave us Art and Music programs. This levy allows voters to maintain programs and further reduce class size. It's important for voters to realize that these dollars will be a reduction in taxes of 50%. We currently pay \$2.51 per \$1000 and the new rate will be \$1.25 per \$1000. This is due to the expiration of the current local option and middle school bond.

This election requires a 50% turn out. Today we look around the world and see people standing in line for hours to exercise their right to vote. Whether or not we agree with the districts request for this levy I think it's our obligation to vote. Let's see if we can have the pride in knowing Colton voters appreciate the sanctity of the vote.

Please vote and thanks for your support which gave back Art and Music.

IF I FORGET TO PLACE MY OFFICIAL BALLOT INTO THE SECRECY ENVELOPE, WILL MY VOTE STILL BE COUNTED?

Yes, your ballot will be counted.

WHAT IF I CHANGE MY MIND AFTER I HAVE RETURNED MY BALLOT?

As soon as you deposit your ballot in a mailbox or at a drop site location, your ballot is considered cast. A new ballot cannot be issued.

DOES MY BALLOT HAVE TO BE RETURNED BY MAIL?

You may return your ballot by mail or drop it off at any designated drop site location in the state. The hours of operation for Clackamas County are listed on page 87 of this pamphlet.

DO I NEED TO ATTACH FIRST-CLASS POSTAGE TO MY BALLOT ENVELOPE IF I RETURN IT TO A DROP SITE LOCATION?

No, first-class postage is only required if you mail your ballot back to the Elections Division.

WHEN MUST MY BALLOT BE RETURNED?

Your voted ballot must be received in any county election office or drop site location by 8:00 p.m. on election night, Tuesday, May 17. Remember: The postmark does not count.

BALLOT TITLE

GLADSTONE SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 115, GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND AUTHORIZATION

QUESTION: Shall the District be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not exceeding \$29,850,000? If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of sections 11 and 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

SUMMARY: This measure may be passed only at an election with at least a 50 percent voter turnout. If approved, this measure finances capital construction and improvement costs, including, but not limited to, providing funds to:

- Renovate, upgrade, and improve Gladstone High School, including roof replacement, HVAC, plumbing, electrical, safety and security systems, auditorium and library renovation, music, drama, other classroom and cafeteria/kitchen expansion, bleachers, lockers, blacktop, other upgrades and improvements, Garrett Field improvements;
- Construct Applied Vocational, Technology, Science Center to teach skills now required for college or employment;
- Renovate, upgrade, improve John Wetten Elementary School, including roofs, HVAC, plumbing, electrical, safety and security systems, replacement of 1958 wing and addition of new classrooms, flooring, blacktop, kitchen, restroom, gym ceiling and other replacements or upgrades;
- Upgrade and improve Kraxberger Middle School, including roofs, HVAC, plumbing, electrical, safety and security systems, parking lot improvements, music and other classrooms, kitchens, grounds improvements, bleachers, lockers, flooring, gym ceiling replacement and upgrades;
- Acquire land and make site improvements for District facilities;
- Pay bond issuance costs.

Bonds to mature in twenty-one (21) years or less.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

If approved, proceeds from this measure would enable Gladstone Schools to:

- · Renovate, upgrade and expand existing school buildings;
- Provide new facilities to update educational programs

Renovate, upgrade, expand existing school buildings

If approved, this measure would:

- Replace inefficient heating and ventilation equipment, rusted plumbing and electrical systems of inadequate capacity.
- Replace more than 300,000 square feet of roofs that engineers say are beyond their expected useful life.
- Provide an Applied Vocational, Technology, Science Center to teach skills now required for college or employment.
- Ensure all buildings and parking lots are accessible to individuals with disabilities.
- Provide additional classroom space at John Wetten Elementary School to accommodate changes in enrollment since the 1994 bond levy.

- Make other classroom, library, cafeteria/kitchen, and athletic improvements at Gladstone High School.
- Expand facilities for Fine Arts programs and band and choir classrooms at Kraxberger Middle School and Gladstone High School.
- Acquire land, if necessary, and make other building and site improvements for District facilities as listed in the ballot summary.

Provide the facilities to update educational programs

The Citizens Facility Review Committee, community-wide telephone survey and community meetings and forums gave District residents the opportunity to study options for Gladstone schools. Parents, patrons and staff who served on the Facility Review Committee, responded to the survey or participated in community meetings said that bringing existing school facilities up-to-date is a high priority.

The existing facility and equipment for the high school vocational programs have not been updated since the 1970's. This measure would provide an Applied Vocational, Technology, Science Center with integrated vocational, science and computer technology programs to prepare students for current and future careers.

Elementary grade levels are currently over capacity, and more classroom space would accommodate changes in enrollment since the 1994 bond. Funds from this measure would expand classroom space at John Wetten Elementary School by adding new classrooms and replacing the oldest (1958) wing of the building.

Roofs, heating, ventilation, plumbing and electrical systems would be replaced, along with site improvements for District facilities and the possible acquisition of land.

Cost of Proposed Bond

Estimated cost to property owners is approximately \$1.98 per \$1,000 of assessed value over the life of the 21-year bond. An average property with an assessed value of \$175,000 would pay an additional \$347 per year. Rates could vary depending on interest rates and growth in the District's total assessed value.

The School Board has selected a level levy rate rather than a variable rate to assure that the rate stays as constant as possible over the life of the bond.

BALLOT TITLE

MEASURE APPROVING ANNEXATION OF APPROXIMATELY 30 ACRES INTO CITY OF CANBY

QUESTION: Shall approximately 30 acres located South of Hope Village between South Ivy Street and South Fir Street be annexed into Canby?

SUMMARY: Annexation is the legal process to bring property into the City limits. Ken Diener of KJD Architecture has filed an application on behalf of the owner, McMartin Farm, LLC, asking the City to bring approximately 30 acres of property into the City limits. The legal description of the property is Tax Lots 1700, 1800 and 2000 of Tax Map 4-1E-4D. Only those portions of the tax lots that are within the City's Urban Growth Boundary will be annexed. The tax lots are located south of Hope Village at SW 13th Street, between S Ivy Street and S Fir Street just north of the Molalla River. This application has previously been approved by the Planning Commission and the City Council following public hearings in January and March, 2005. The property contains two single family residences. The City's Zoning Map calls for a portion of the property to be zoned Low Density Residential (R-1), a portion to be zoned Medium Density Residential (R-1.5) and a portion to be zoned High Density Residential (R-2) upon annexation into the City. The applicant has proposed building 55 single family homes, 41 townhouses and 118 apartments for on the site. Any future development requires City review and must comply with land use

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This measure would approve the annexation of three adjoining tax lots in the city limits of the City of Canby. The properties which would be included with the City boundaries are known as Tax Lots 1700, 1800 and 2000 of Tax Map 4-1E-4D. Portions of these tax lots contain property that is outside the City's Urban Growth Boundary (UGB). Only those portions that are within the Urban Growth Boundary will be annexed. The tax lots are located south of Hope Village at SW 13th Street, between S Ivy Street and S Fir Street and north of the Molalla River. The tax lots are currently zoned EFU (Exclusive Farm Use). If annexation into the City is approved by the voters, portions of the property would be rezoned to Low Density Residential (R-1), Medium Density Residential (R-1.5) and High Density Residential (R-2) as required under the City's Comprehensive Land Use Plan.

Tax Lots 1700, 1800 and 2000 are owned by McMartin Farm, LLC. KJD Architecture, on behalf of the owner, has filed the application to the City of Canby for approval of annexation as allowed by Oregon law. The City, following its Charter, has put this matter before the voters for approval.

Adjacent properties to the north, west and east are all outside the city limits, but within the City's UGB. The property to the south is outside the UGB. The parcels are not currently contiguous to the City of Canby; however the applicant proposes to annex that portion of S. Fir Street currently outside the City limits in order to provide a contiguous connection to the property within the City. The parcel presently contains two single family residences. The applicant proposes to build 118 apartments for seniors, 41 townhouses and 55 single family homes in a master planned development. Any development proposed would have to comply with an approved master plan

for the area, state and local land use laws and would be subject to public review.

The Canby Comp Plan also designates properties for annexation as Priority "A", "B" or "C". Priority "A" shall generally be annexed prior to those areas shown as Priority "B" which, in turn, shall generally be annexed prior to those areas shown as Priority "C". Portions of the subject property are designated under all three phasing priorities. The Planning Commission approved this annexation application by a 6-1 vote and the City Council approved the application by a 5-1 vote.

BALLOT TITLE

ANNEXATION TO CFD1 AND REDUCTION OF CITY TAX CERTIFICATION

QUESTION: Shall Milwaukie annex to CFD1 for fire and emergency medical services and reduce City tax certification to prevent tax increase?

SUMMARY: If approved this measure will annex the territory within the City to Clackamas Fire District No. 1 (CFD1). City residents will continue to receive fire and emergency medical services from CFD1. CFD1 is a service district governed by an elected Board of CFD1 residents; it provides fire and emergency medical services. The City will continue to provide all other services it currently provides. The measure also requires that the City reduce its property tax rate certification so that the total rate levied by the City and CFD1 is no more than the total rate they currently levy. Voter approval at a future election would be required to increase the City's tax rate.

If the annexation is approved, CFD1's permanent tax rate (2.4012 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation) is assessed on real property within the City effective July 1, 2005, and the City will reduce its tax rate certification by the same amount. Taxes cannot be increased without voter approval.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This measure, if approved, will annex the territory within the City of Milwaukie to Clackamas Fire District No. 1 (CFD1) effective July 1, 2005.

Upon annexation, property within the City will be subject to CFD1's property tax, which is 2.4012 per \$1,000 of assessed value. The measure, if approved, will require the City to reduce its tax rate in the same amount when it certifies its taxes to the County Assessor. The result is that total property tax rates of the City and CFD1 within the City will not change.

Voters must approve any increase in the City's taxing authority.

Annexation of the territory of the City to CFD1 will allow City residents to fully participate in CFD1 elections for Board members and money measures such as serial levies and bond measures. If the annexation is approved, City residents are eligible to run for and serve on the CFD1 Board.

CFD1 has provided fire suppression and emergency medical services to the City since 1998 pursuant to a contract. Approval of the annexation will make provision of fire suppression and emergency medical services by CFD1 permanent so that continued service is provided to the City. It fixes the cost of fire protection and emergency medical services at no more than the CFD1 permanent rate of 2.4012 per \$1,000 of assessed value and enables CFD1 to better plan for long-range capital expenses and service requirements. Any increase in CFD1's taxing authority requires voter approval.

The measure, if approved, will incorporate the following provisions into the Milwaukie Municipal Code.

- 1. All territory within the City of Milwaukie is annexed to Clackamas County Fire District No. 1 effective July 1, 2005.
- 2. Except as provided in Section 3 below, in order to avoid an overall

property tax increase on property within the City, the City shall adjust the property tax rate it certifies annually to the County by reducing the City tax rate by 2.4012 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation for any year in which property within the City is required to pay property tax to CFD1.

3. The City may certify a property tax rate higher than the rate resulting from application of Section 2 only if the voters of the City approve the higher tax rate.

CFD1 provides first response to Milwaukie residents from twice as many stations, with 15 firefighters on duty between these station at any time. In addition, CFD1's station locations provide more complete and more uniform coverage to all areas of Milwaukie. Approval of Measure 3-166 means that this higher level of service and security will continue into the future, and approval of Measure 3-166 will NOT result in an increase in taxes.

Annexation to CFD1 ensures that Milwaukie residents will receive continued, professional delivery of fire suppression and emergency medical services into the future. By its own terms, Measure 3-166 requires that we reduce our tax levy in order to ensure no tax increase from this measure. The City Council urges your "YES" vote on Measure 3-166.



QUESTION: Shall Oregon City annex into Clackamas County Fire District #1?

SUMMARY: Annexes the entire city limits of Oregon City into Clackamas County Fire District #1 ('District') as of May 17, 2005, except properties in the City already within the District.

The District currently provides fire and emergency services to Oregon City under contract. Annexation would transfer responsibility for these services from Oregon City to the District.

The District is a service district governed by an elected Board. Property within Oregon City would be subject to the District's property tax rate of \$2.40 per thousand dollars of assessed value. The City Commission has resolved that, if the annexation is approved, the City will reduce its tax levy to \$4.15 per thousand dollars of assessed value for five years, so long as the current budget assumptions are maintained.

The annexation would allow the District to maintain fire and emergency services in Oregon City and staff the South End Fire Station

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

Measure 3-168 proposes annexing all property within the Oregon City limits into Clackamas County Fire District #1 (CCFD #1) effective July 1, 2005. The voters of both the City of Oregon City and CCFD #1 must approve the annexation. The purpose of annexation is to provide long term maintenance of fire and emergency medical services, staff the South End Fire Station, and improve fire and emergency medical service response times while providing the City with the ability to maintain and grow its essential police, parks, recreation, library, and community planning services.

The City currently provides fire and emergency services to its residents through a contract with CCFD #1. Annexation would formalize the regional nature of these services by transferring responsibility for fire and emergency medical services to CCFD#1. Annexation would relieve the City of the responsibility of providing fire and emergency medical services. In so doing, this will provide for the long-term stability of funding for these services.

Annexation would also allow the city the freedom to use a portion of the monies previously used to provide contract payments for fire and emergency services to provide police, parks, recreation, library, and community services. Current funds are insufficient to provide those services at planned service levels.

With annexation, property within Oregon City will be subject to the Clackamas County Fire District #1 property tax rate, which is \$2.40 per thousand of assessed value. The City of Oregon City's permanent rate is \$5.0571 per thousand of assessed value. If annexation is approved the District will impose its permanent rate. The Oregon City Commission has adopted Resolution No. 05-04, in which the City Commission resolved not to levy the City's entire permanent rate and, instead, reduce its levy by 90 cents and, in fiscal year 2005/06, levy only \$4.1571 per thousand of assessed value. The annexation and reduced city levy will result in a \$1.50 per thousand tax increase. Resolution No. 05-04 states that this reduced levy will be maintained through the City Commission's 5 year financial plan-

ning period, and beyond if the current budget assumptions are maintained.

Chapter 1, Section 3 of the Oregon City Charter of 1982, as amended, requires voter approval of all annexations. A map showing the annexation accompanies this explanatory statement.

A \$300,000 property pays \$450 initially; rockets to \$720 annually when the rate tops out!

Renters beware. Property taxes up, rent up.

ARE THERE ALTERNATIVES TO EASE THE BUDGET CRUNCH?

YES. But the Commission has not made the hard choices. \$1,250,000+ is awaiting next year's budget, if the Hilltop Urban Renewal is closed, saving \$1,000,000, and by downsizing the library, saving \$250,000 using the original Carnegie library site. Why pay rent? We own the Carnegie.

Saving continues at \$500,000+ per year for future budgets.

And here's a bonus. Closing Hilltop UR returns \$700,000 to education, plus nearly \$300,000 each year is saved for schools! School funds are being used by UR to pave streets.

ELECTION SHELL GAME? LET'S FACE FACTS

- FACT: This is an annexation request disguised as a safety issue. If passed, you will eventually pay an increase of \$240 per \$100,000 (taxable value) in property taxes.
- FACT: This is a <u>permanent</u> tax raise, not a five-year levy, not a temporary increase.
- FACT: A \$150,000 home, now pays approximately \$760 in city taxes. (This is not your total tax bill.) If approved, annexation could eventually raise taxes \$360 to about \$1,120 on this property. That's a \$360 per year permanent tax raise added to what you now pay.

- FACT: If 12,000 people come to view the artwork or drink coffee, it costs about \$16 for each and every visitor (budget divided by attendance) to the Carnegie Art Center. Is that a good use of tax money?

MONEY IS AVAILABLE BY CLOSING UR PLANS

- FACT: To date, no new property tax paying business developments in the downtown urban renewal area have received financial aid from "urban renewal". (The AMTRAC station was built as a public building, paying no taxes, with urban renewal funds).
- FACT: It's questionable the city can legally use urban renewal funds to build a new City Hall (as the Mayor has stated). A small contribution, perhaps, but not \$10 million, or \$15 million, or however much a new complex would cost.

MEASURE APPROVING ANNEXATION OF CITY OF OREGON CITY PROPERTY TO DISTRICT

QUESTION: Shall Clackamas County Fire District #1 annex all of the territory of the City of Oregon City?

SUMMARY: If annexation is approved by both District and City of Oregon City electors, territory within the City would become part of the fire district. Clackamas County Fire District #1 has provided fire and emergency medical services to the City under a contract between the City and the District. All former City fire personnel are now District employees. The City Commission of Oregon City has proposed that the District annex all of the property within the City for the purpose of providing fire and emergency services to the City. Territory within the City would be subject to District property taxes at District tax rates to pay for fire and emergency medical services. City property would be subject to tax to pay any District bonds and other liabilities on the same basis as other property in the District. City electors would be eligible to vote in District elections. The City would no longer provide fire and emergency medical services. The District Board has approved the annexation, subject to approval of the electors of the City of Oregon City and the approval of the electors of Clackamas County Fire District #1.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This measure would expand the boundaries of Clackamas County Fire District #1 to include all of the territory within the City of Oregon City, Oregon. The annexation would also require the approval by the electors of the City of Oregon City of a similar measure. The City Commission of Oregon City initiated the proposed annexation, and the proposal has also been approved by the Board of Directors of the District. If the measure is approved by the electors of both the District and the City, the Board of County Commissioners would formally approve the annexation effective July 1, 2005.

For many years, the City of Oregon City maintained its own fire department. On October 2, 2002, the City and the District entered into an agreement under which the District agreed to provide fire protection and emergency medical services throughout the City. The City pays the District a fee for those services in an amount agreed upon each year. The City fire protection and emergency medical personnel have been transferred to the District. The City has made its fire protection and emergency medical facilities and equipment available for District use, and the District has been replacing that equipment under agreements with the City as replacement is necessary.

At present, the City pays an agreed amount for fire protection and emergency medical services. Although the agreement is for a period of ten years, either the City or the District may terminate the agreement on June 30 of any year. City residents have no direct obligation to pay taxes to the District, or to pay for bonds for purchase and construction of District facilities and equipment. City residents may not vote for District directors or on District measures. Approval of the measure by the voters would mean that the territory in the City of Oregon City would be permanently annexed to the District.

District annexation of the Oregon City territory would mean that all of the territory within the City would be subject to ad valorem property tax at the same rate as that paid by taxpayers within the District. Property within the City would be subject to taxation for payment of any bonds of the District on the same basis as other property in the District. District property owners would have no liability for any City bonds. The annexation of the City territory would increase the District's bonding capacity and provide for participation by City property owners in payment of the cost of District bonds. The annexation would make electors within Oregon City electors of the District.

Clackamas Fire District #1 currently provides fire and paramedic 911 service to the citizens of Oregon City through a 10 year contract signed in 2003. The Fire District Board of Directors and the City of Oregon City have put Measure 3-169 on the ballot to finish the job of truly regionalizing fire and paramedic service.

Measure 3-169 has no tax implications for current residents of Clackamas Fire District #1. The benefits of allowing this annexation to take place are as follows:

Open the South End Fire Station in Oregon City. This fire station will serve the residents in both the City of Oregon City and those residents in Fire District #1 just outside city limits currently serviced from Beavercreek Station 10 or from Oregon City Main Station by the College. Response times will immediately decrease to those areas by at least 2 minutes with the opening of this station.

Clackamas Fire District #1 is recognized as a model for regional fire and paramedic service and can continue to bring you the service in a cost effective and professional manner with this annexation.

Measure 3-169 will add much needed resources to the south half of your fire district. Currently 14 fire fighters and one chief officer per day staff 5 fire stations, by opening the empty South End Station it will increase to 17 fire fighters per day.

This measure is about allowing the citizens of the city of Oregon City to join your fire district. Clackamas Fire District #1 has proven regionalized fire and paramedic services work for you.



MEASURE APPROVING ANNEXATION OF 5.35 ACRES INTO CITY OF SANDY

QUESTION: Shall 5.35 acres West of 370th Ave. (Sandy Height) South of the intersection of 370th Ave. and Dubarko Drive be annexed into the Sandy city limits?

SUMMARY: Annexation is the legal process to bring property into the city limits. Vincent and Sandra McMahon as applicants and property owners have asked the city to bring five parcels of land west of 370th Ave. (Sandy Heights) and south of the intersection of 370th Ave. and Dubarko Drive into the city limits. The legal description of the properties is: T2S R4E Section 14 Tax Lots 400, 401, 402, 500, and 501.

The annexation area is located within Sandy's Urban Growth Boundary and is contiguous to the city limits on its western and northern borders. Future development requires City review and must comply with land use laws.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This measure would approve annexation of 5.35 acres into the city limits of the City of Sandy. The property is known as T2S R4E Section 14 Tax Lots 400, 401, 402, 500, and 501. The annexation area is located west of 370th Ave. (Sandy Heights) and south of the intersection of 370th Ave. and Dubarko Drive. The property is contiguous to the city limits on its western and northern borders. The requested parcels are currently zoned by Clackamas County as RRFF-5. If annexation of these parcels is approved by voters, they will be zoned SFR (Single Family Residential) as required under the City's Comprehensive Land Use Plan. The SFR zoning district allows a density between 2 and 6 units per gross acre.

Vincent and Sandra McMahon as applicants and property owners have applied to the City of Sandy for approval of this annexation request as allowed by Oregon law. The city, following its Charter, has put this matter before the voters for approval.

A single-family residence and associated outbuildings are constructed on the parcels and the property contains a mix of forested land and pasture. Access to the subject property would be from 370th Ave. subject to approval by the City of Sandy and Clackamas County. Following annexation, development of this property will require a separate land use application process demonstrating compliance with applicable sections of the Sandy Development Code.

The property is currently served by onsite septic and an individual well. Future development would require connection to city water and sewer service. All future development on this site will also be required to conform to applicable stormwater management policies and regulations.

The Sandy City Council conducted a public hearing on February 7, 2005 and approved this application for inclusion on the May 2005 ballot by adopting Resolution 2005-02 by a 6-0 vote.

ANNEXATION OF PROPERTY ON PARKER ROAD REQUIRING VOTER APPROVAL

QUESTION: Shall the City annex an eight-acre property located on Parker Road and apply R-7 city zoning?

SUMMARY: West Linn Charter Section 3 requires that annexation of any territory be approved by the voters of the City. This measure, if approved, would annex an eight-acre parcel of real property located on the south and west sides of Parker Road where the road curves from north-south to east-west. To the south is a residence at 4340 Parker Road. To the west is a residence at 3560 Parker Road. The West Linn City Council has determined that the proposed annexation complies with all relevant land use criteria for annexations.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

The West Linn City Charter requires voter approval of all annexations of property into city boundaries. Mr. Ken Olson, representing property owners Gary and Millie Eder, has submitted an annexation application for an eight-acre property located on Parker Road. The property is located on the south and west sides of Parker Road as the road makes a ninety-degree turn. The site is opposite the points where Coho Lane and Lancaster Road intersect with Parker Road. The site is currently vacant, and consists of low shrubs and grasses. A drainage ditch bisects the site, which is identified as a major drainageway on the City's Storm Drainage Master Plan.

The property is within the Portland Metropolitan Area Urban Growth Boundary. It is contiguous to property within the city to the north, east and west. To the south is another parcel outside of the city limits. West Linn's Comprehensive Plan Map designates the property for Low-Density Residential Development. The applicant proposes to have the property zoned R-7, which is a singlefamily residential zoning district consistent with the Comprehensive Plan Map designation. The R-7 zoning district allows single-family residences on lots averaging at least 7,000 square feet in size or, as a Planned Unit Development, an overall density of residential development of one dwelling per 7,000 square feet of site area. Conditional uses that are possible on an R-7 zoned site if specially approved by the City Planning Commission include religious institutions, schools, and major utilities. If voters approve this annexation, the applicant would be required to submit a subdivision application meeting all relevant city development code criteria prior to building more than one new residence on the site.

On March 3, 2004, the West Linn City Council approved "Step One" of the annexation process for this site, finding that the proposed annexation met all relevant city code provisions governing annexations, including a finding that all relevant public services are available to serve the site. On March 14, 2005, the West Linn City Council considered the fiscal and community impacts to the city of the proposed annexation. All information regarding this annexation, along with the fiscal and community impact analysis is available at the Planning Department offices of the city of West Linn and also at the City's website: www.ci.west-linn.or.us. The City Council has determined that annexation of this property to the city would cost the city between \$5,500 and \$14,000 per new


dwelling unit on the site. The site could contain up to 41 new dwelling units if zoned R-7. After considering the fiscal and community impact analysis, the City Council authorized placement of this proposed annexation before the voters.

QUESTION: Shall new city hall be constructed from urban renewal funds without imposing new tax for guaranteed maximum price of \$9.998.872?

SUMMARY: A "yes" vote authorizes construction of a 30,000 square foot building in Town Center across from the existing city hall to meet city space needs.

- New tax not required. Construction costs would be paid from urban renewal funds.
- City employees currently located at the Annex must be relocated because the owner, TVF&R, will not renew the city's lease.
 They need the space for their own employees.
- The new city hall would include public meeting space, seismic upgrades and emergency operations center.
- Specht Development optioned the proposed city hall site and subject to measure passing intends to sell it to the city at the commercially zoned price of \$9.51 per square foot.
- Specht is guaranteeing a maximum construction price of \$9,998.872. This price includes 4.5 acres of land at \$1,886,002; site development: \$895,568; building construction: \$5,608,847; other infrastructure: \$394,069; contingency funds: \$300,000; and developer fee: \$914,386. Interest financing costs over a 10-year period are estimated at 5% for a maximum cost of \$2,979,425. Interest may vary at time of financing.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This city hall proposal would:

- · Solve city office space problems
- · Keep city-owned park property for park and recreation use only
- · Be built for guaranteed maximum price
- Not require new tax

Solve city office space problems

City employees located in leased office space (the Annex in north Wilsonville) must be relocated because Tualatin Valley Fire and Rescue (TVFR) who owns the building, now needs the space for its own employees.

A citizen task force conducted an in-depth search to find replacement office space and determined that suitable space in an existing building is not available. They unanimously recommended the city build a new city hall.

This proposed city hall would be located on a 4.5-acre site adjacent to Town Center Park, near the Korean War Memorial. The property is on Town Center Loop East, across from the existing city hall and within walking distance of the library and Civic Center Park. The building contains public meeting space and will be constructed to high seismic standards and would house Wilsonville's only emergency operations center in case of disaster.

In the past 10 years, Wilsonville's population doubled and another 50% increase is expected in the next 10 years. Business and industry also grew substantially and continued growth is expected. A 30,000 square foot building is proposed to accommodate this growth and the loss of leased office space at the Annex. To increase

efficiency and convenience to the public, city services would be located in one building, with the Wilsonville Police Department and SMART Transit operations relocated to the existing city hall.

Keep city-owned park property for park and recreation use only The proposed new city hall site allows the continuing development

of the city-owned park property (south of Wilsonville road and immediately east of the Library) for park and recreation use only. Park development is on-track for summer 2005.

Built for guaranteed maximum price

Specht Development has optioned the proposed building site. If this measure passes, Specht will construct the building for a guaranteed maximum price of \$9,998,872, including the cost of the property.

New tax not required

Funding for a new city hall would come from existing urban renewal funds. Urban renewal is supported through increased property values in designated city areas and can be used for public infrastructure construction. Urban renewal funds cannot be used for on-going operations. By using urban renewal funds for this purpose, city hall can be constructed without imposing a new tax.

What happens if this measure fails?

If this measure fails, the city most likely would lease space in buildings throughout the city. City Council and the citizen task force believes this option is less desirable because leased space cannot be paid for from urban renewal funds and must instead come out of the General Fund, which pays for city services like parks, the library, police, senior and youth services. Use of the General Fund to lease office space would require reduction of other city services or an increase in revenues.

It will jumpstart development there and Town Center Loop will finally be completed to three lanes with sidewalks and bike paths, a welcomed improvement for that area.

BALLOT TITLE

ANNEXATION OF TERRITORY TO BORING WATER DISTRICT

QUESTION: Shall the territory shown on the enclosed map be annexed to the Boring Water District?

SUMMARY: In January, 2005, the Clackamas County Board of County Commissioners approved the annexation of territory to the Boring Water District. State law provides that an annexation approval must be placed on the ballot if more than 100 electors in the area of the proposed annexation file written requests. That is what happened in this case. The territory that would be annexed if this measure is approved surrounds the existing district, and would approximately triple the area within the district. The annexation would result in no additional property tax, as the district is funded by connection and user fees. In order to be effective, this annexation must also be approved by a separate vote of the electors in the existing district, which is also occurring at this election.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

The Clackamas County Board of Commissioners in January, 2005, approved an annexation of territory to the Boring Water District. State law provides that such an approval by the Board of Commissioners takes effect unless the Board subsequently receives written requests for an election on the annexation proposal from at least 100 electors residing in the annexation territory. The Board received more than 100 requests, and therefore has put this measure on the ballot. At this same election, the Board of Commissioners of the Boring Water District has also placed the annexation question before the voters within the current boundary of the District. In order for the annexation to take effect, both measures must be approved by the voters. If either or both are defeated, there will be no annexation.

The proposed annexation territory extends west to the boundary of the new City of Damascus and east to Bluff Road. It excludes territory within the Eastmont Water Company, the Kelso Water Association and the Skyview Acres Water Co-op. The annexation would approximately triple the area of the Boring Water District. Approval of this measure would result in no new property taxes in the annexed territory, as the District is currently financed through water revenues and system development charges paid by those who use the system.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR

On October 4, 1991, the Oregon Water Resource Division (OWRD) classified the shallow Troutdale aquifer in the Boring area as a critical use area. It also classified the deep Troutdale aquifer as a limited use area. OWRD did this classification because of the serious decline of the water levels in these areas. Boring Water District's proposed annexation is a solution to these declining water issues. The District is drilling wells outside the limited use area and is proposing to pipe water into the critical and limited use areas. The District's intentions are to help people in the Boring area who are outside the current district boundaries with an alternative source of water. The District has received numerous requests from area residents about the possibility of getting water from the District. The intention of this annexation is to help serve those areas experiencing shortages. The Clackamas County Planning Commission and not the Water District handle the growth issue. Measure 37 is another issue which Clackamas County has to address. The county may be forced to allow people to subdivide their property. When this happens, new residents will be looking for a water source. These people will be drilling wells in an area that is already over used, resulting in more well failures. People will be forced to drill deeper wells and increase the competition between the agricultural and residential users. There isn't a tax issue involved because the district doesn't use taxed base revenues. The only people who will pay for this service are those who actually hookup to the Water District. Boring Water has a historic commitment of funding district operations from water sales revenues. There is no requirement to connect to the system if your property is annexed. We are asking for your support in passing this measure so people may have an alternate water source. Thank you for your support!



SUMMARY: In January, 2005, the Clackamas County Board of County Commissioners approved the annexation of territory to the Boring Water District. State law provides that annexation approval must be placed on the ballot if more than 100 electors in the area of the proposed annexation file written requests. The required number of requests was received. In order to be effective, this annexation must be approved by a separate vote of the electors in the area to be annexed, which is also occurring at this election, and the electors in the current boundaries of Boring Water District. The territory that would be annexed if this measure is approved surrounds the existing District. The annexation would result in no property tax. The District is funded by user rates, charges and fees paid by those who use the water system. Extension of the water system to the annexed areas would occur as requested by those seeking service and paid for by those seeking service.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

The Boring Water District Board of Commissioners initiated an annexation process before the Clackamas County Board of Commissioners to annex territory to the Boring Water District. The County Commissioners approved the annexation in January, 2005. State law provides that such an approval by the Board of County Commissioners takes effect unless the County Commissioners subsequently receive written requests for an election on the annexation proposal from at least 100 electors residing in the annexation territory. The County Commissioners received more than 100 requests and therefore put a measure on the Ballot for voters in the territory to be annexed. At the same election, the Board of Commissioners of the Boring Water District has also placed this annexation issue question before the voters within the current boundary of the District. In order for the annexation to take effect, both measures must be approved by the voters. If either or both are defeated, there will be no annexation.

The proposed annexation territory extends west to the boundary of the new City of Damascus and east to Bluff Road. It excludes the territory within the Eastmont Water Company, the Kelso Water Association, and the Skyview Acres Water Coop. Approval of this measure would result in no new property taxes in the annexed territory or within the current boundaries of the Boring Water District. Any property tax would require a vote of the people. The District is currently financed through water system revenues, such as user fees, rates, and system development charges paid by those who connect to and use the system. There is no charge if a person does not use the system. Extension of the system would occur as requested by property owners and paid for by those people seeking service.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR

The people of the Boring Water District are being asked to vote on this measure to approve annexation of areas outside our current District boundaries. The reasons for this annexation are to allow residents who are currently being served, but are outside the District boundaries, to be included in the District. Secondly many residents in the Boring area who are not inside our current boundaries are experiencing serious well problems. These people are calling the District wanting to be annexed so they can receive water. The District has adequate water supply to support the proposed area of annexation. The addition of the new infrastructure to serve this new area will be paid for by the people who are requesting the service. With Metro's changing the urban growth boundaries, our District must expand especially to the west. By annexing the area that we have proposed, this allows the District the opportunity to do long-range planning for these properties. This will not happen overnight; it will take many years to be able to serve all the proposed annexation area. Much of the shallow aquifer in the proposed area was classified by the Oregon Water Resource Division as a critical use area in October of 1991. The deep Troutdale aquifer in these areas is classified as limited use. The Boring Water District wells are located in a region classified as unlimited use. The solution we are proposing is to pipe water to these areas that are having serious well problems. The District has the ability and the water rights to make this solution happen. Thank you for your support of this measure.



School closures should be fair. They should include neighborhood impact and early citizen input.

I will continue to work to make Oak Lodge Sanitary become more in touch with the community and to ensure they are fully informed of major issues that will affect their District and it's assets.



If you are concerned about this massive proposal and/or are against this consolidation of sanitary treatment plants, I welcome your vote and support.



Why vote for me?


- If I am not elected, all five members of the District will live inside the city limits of Canby.

Registering to Vote

(SOME FREQUENTLY-ASKED QUESTIONS)

WHO MAY REGISTER TO VOTE?

Anyone who is:

- * A resident of Oregon;
- * A United States citizen; and
- * 18 years of age or older.

HOW MAY I REGISTER?

By mail-in registration form or in person at any county elections office or at a designated state agency, including the Department of Motor Vehicles and some public assistance agencies.

WHEN MAY I REGISTER & WHAT IS THE REGISTRATION DEADLINE?

You may register at any time. However, your voter registration form must be received or postmarked no later than the 21st day before the election at which you intend to vote.

WHERE CAN I FIND VOTER REGISTRATION FORMS?

Post offices, public libraries, city halls, schools, banks, the DMV, and Clackamas County Elections, 825 Portland Avenue in Gladstone. There is a copy of the form in the Qwest Telephone Directory, Blue Government Pages. You can download and print a form in PDF format from the Secretary of State's web site at the Oregon Voter Registration link http://www.sos.state.or.us/elections/elechp.htm.

WHAT INFORMATION IS REQUIRED WHEN REGISTERING?

In October 2002, the "Help America Vote Act" was signed into law. The Act changes voter registration requirements nationwide for voting in federal elections. A person registering to vote is asked to provide identification **only** if they are a new registrant in the county in which they are registering, and they are mailing the registration card via the U.S. Postal Service. Identification is **not** required for updates within the same county, or for any new registrations delivered in person or by means other than mail via the U.S. Postal Service.

Sufficient identification is: a copy of a current, valid photo identification (such as driver's license), or a copy of a paycheck stub, utility bill, bank statement or other government document showing the registrant's name and address.

If identification is not provided at the time of registration, it will be requested by elections officials in order for the person to vote at the next federal election. When filling out the registration card, you must furnish your full name, residence address (and mailing address, if different), date of birth, political party preference, and signature. Your residence address must be the physical address where you reside - not a post office box.

DO I HAVE TO RE-REGISTER FOR EACH ELECTION?

No. You only need to update your registration when your residence (even moving to a different apartment within a complex) or mailing address changes; your name changes; or you wish to change your political party affiliation.

WHAT IF I TURN 18 AFTER THE REGISTRATION DEADLINE?


If you will turn 18 years of age during the 20-day period immediately before an election, you must register by the 21st day prior to the election.

DO I HAVE TO REGISTER BY PARTY?

No. If you do not wish to be affiliated with a political party, you may check the box that states "not a member of a party." You may not designate or change a party affiliation after the 21st day before a primary election.
