Omicron update

Reports of new coronavirus cases in the United States are still declining, though the pace of improvement has recently slowed. Several states in the Northeast and the South have seen cases increase over the past two weeks as the BA.2 subvariant has emerged. In New York, Connecticut and Arkansas, cases are up by more than 20 percent. Still, most states continue to see sustained declines, and cases remain at their lowest levels nationally since last July. Coronavirus hospitalizations and deaths also continue to fall. In the past two weeks, hospitalizations have decreased by 39 percent and fewer than 1,000 deaths are currently being reported each day.

On Monday, Oregon officials reported a <u>21 percent drop in weekly COVID-19 cases</u>, marking the ninthstraight week of declining case numbers. Oregon is now averaging about 200 cases a day over the past week, the lowest daily average since July. The rapid decline in cases and hospitalizations in Oregon likely reflects that the Omicron variant quickly infected much of the population, leaving an ever-shrinking pool of people susceptible to severe illness.

Some experts continue to warn of a potential rise in cases and hospitalizations due to the Omicron subvariant BA.2. The subvariant has already become dominant in multiple countries, though not yet the United States. In Oregon, the subvariant's high transmissibility could combine with the state's lifting of public indoor mask requirements to create a small increase in hospitalizations, according to an <u>Oregon Health & Science University forecast</u>. The increase would peak in early May at around 300 occupied beds, the university predicts. For now, hospitalizations remain on the decline, with a 39 percent drop in occupied beds since March 21.

Is COVID-19 an endemic yet?

COVID-19 is not yet endemic in Oregon or the United States. The word "endemic" refers to a fairly predictable disease that is usually present in a community and doesn't cause large-scale disruption to society. For example, the seasonal flu is endemic because public health experts can generally predict its behavior and the illness doesn't usually overwhelm our lives, society and health care system.

While the Omicron surge has largely dissipated, low vaccination rates and higher case counts in certain geographic pockets as well as the unpredictability of COVID-19's patterns stand in the way of endemicity. Still, once endemicity is attained, it doesn't necessarily mean that new COVID-19 variants would be more mild. COVID-19, even as an endemic disease, could still cause severe illness in some people. The flu, for example, kills between 12,000 and 52,000 people every year.

Our actions drive COVID-19 towards endemicity: get vaccinated and boosted and wear a mask when surges occur. As society's immunity level increases (from vaccinations, infections or both), so does society's protection from large surges.

FDA approves second booster shot for people 50+

The Food and Drug Administration has authorized a second booster dose of the either the Moderna or Pfizer-BioNtech COVID-19 vaccine for people aged 50 and older and certain immunocompromised individuals. The second booster may be administered at least four months after an eligible individual has received their first booster dose of any authorized or approved COVID vaccine. Immunocompromised people must be at least 12 to receive the 2nd Pfizer booster, and at least 18 to get the Moderna.

Data came from a <u>newly released Israeli study</u> found that the mortality rate was significantly lower among those who had received an additional booster. Second booster doses are now available at all CCPH vaccine clinics.

COVID-19 hospitalizations

The number of hospitalized patients with COVID-19 across Oregon is 118, which is 15 fewer than yesterday. There are 19 COVID-19 patients in intensive care unit (ICU) beds, which is three more than yesterday. There are 140 available adult ICU beds out of 672 total (21% availability) and 444 available adult non-ICU beds out of 4,251 (10% availability).

Testing Response

K-12 Schools in Clackamas County Now Eligible to Request At-Home COVID-19 Test Kits

Clackamas County Public Health (CCPH) is making test kits available for request via the <u>online portal</u>. The available tests are iHealth rapid antigen tests are appropriate for use in those ages 2+. Schools are welcome to keep a supply of tests on hand to distribute to students and families as needed. Distribution should focus on those that have been disproportionately affected by COVID-19 and/or have had difficulty accessing testing.

<u>Curative</u> testing site at Harmony Campus in Milwaukie operates 7 days a week with expanded afternoon hours on weekdays. The site also now offers no-cost rapid molecular testing with results available in about an hour. Appointments are not required.

Disease Response

All regularly scheduled vaccine clinics remain open. Staff are seeing early requests for administering of the 4th dose booster based on the announcements of FDA recommendations in the media, but we will hold off on administering 4th dose boosters until our Standing Orders are updated in the coming days. The mobile vaccine team conducted an onsite business vaccine clinic at Imperfect Foods with 38 employees receiving boosters. The mobile vaccine team will conduct a culturally-specific clinic at St. James Church for their Hispanic population and community members on April 1.

Last week, the COVID Investigation & Outreach unit opened 116 cases and managed 18 active outbreaks. The Education and Referral team within the unit connected with 36 individuals and/or families to offer the Social Services Rent Assistance Program (SSRA). This program is for individuals who lost income due to COVID-19 and may be at risk of missing a rent payment, being late on a rent payment, or being evicted. Of the 36 applications, 19 are pending final approval. Once approved, they will receive 2 months of rent assistance. During this stage of our response, we are focused on recovery and connection to support. The leadership team continues to align our operational strategy with that of the Region so that we can continue to support individuals in our community in reducing the spread of COVID-19.






Statewide Numbers from March 28, 2022




Arrows indicate an increase or decrease from the previous day. *Hospitalization data from Oregon's Hospital Capacity Web System (HOSCAP)*.




