
CLACKAMAS COUNTY PUBLIC HEALTH DIVISION WEEKLY REPORT ON COVID-19 FOR 4/7/2022

Omicron update

Clackamas County saw case counts increase 78%, the first increase in weekly cases since early January 2022. This slight increase in cases is likely tied to the impacts of BA.2 and reduced COVID-19 restrictions. In Oregon, weekly COVID-19 cases also climbed for the first time in more than two months. The Oregon Health Authority reported 1,988 coronavirus cases during the week ending Sunday, April 3 — marking a 42% rise in cases since the week prior. Previously, cases had dropped for nine consecutive weeks, declining from a high of about 56,000 cases in a single week mid-January.



In good news, hospitalizations fell to their lowest point since July. However, <u>Oregon Health & Science University's forecast</u> predicts that there will be a slight increase in hospitalized patients as the impacts of BA.2 and reduced COVID-19 restrictions are experienced. Under OHSU projections, 293 people would be hospitalized May 9, marking the peak of the new wave.

Coronavirus cases in the United States are still falling, though the pace of decline has slowed significantly as a result of BA.2. BA.2 is now the dominant variant in the U.S., making up 55% of new cases, marking a 39% increase in variant prevalence from the week before. Prevalence ranges from 37% in the Midwest to 73% in the Northeast. Now, 15 states have seen cases increase over the past two weeks, including the majority of the Northeast. New York (+55%), Massachusetts (+48%) and New Jersey (+37%) have seen their case counts rise by more than 30 percent. Still, many states continue to see sustained declines, and cases remain at their lowest levels nationally since last July, before the Delta surge. Coronavirus hospitalizations also continue to fall. In the past two weeks, hospitalizations have decreased by 33 percent. Around 700 deaths are currently being reported each day, breaking the threshold of 1000 deaths per day and marking the lowest daily average since last August.

COVID-19 hospitalizations

Hospitalizations are holding steady at 117, with 19 ICU patients and 5 ventilator patients, equaling the low of 5 on March 16, 2021. In Region 1, out of 340 staffed adult ICU beds, there are 45 beds available.

Disease Response

All regularly scheduled vaccine clinics remain open to walk-ins as well as scheduled appointments. There has been an uptick in vaccinations numbers since the approval of a second booster dose for people aged 50+. Staff is working in partnership with the Access to Preventative Care Immunization program to provide a childhood vaccination clinic addressing the school exclusion requirement, scheduled for April 11 at the Canby Ackerman School.

Last week, the COVID Investigation & Outreach unit opened 207 cases and managed 17 active outbreaks. Last week, leadership participated in a retreat focused on centering equity in public health as we plan for the next steps and stages of COVID-19 response. Leadership also continues to foster partnerships with others in the region to leverage joint efforts in COVID-19 and other infectious disease prevention and response.

Vaccination remains our best and safest prevention of spread of COVID-19 variant.

Testing Response

At-Home Tests Available at No Cost to Medicare Part B Recipients

Medicare Part B recipients, including those enrolled in a Medicare Advantage plan, can receive up to eight at-home tests per calendar month at no cost. Recipients can request tests at any participating pharmacy or healthcare provider. For more information visit cms.gov/newsroom.

COVID-19 Test to Treat Locator Available Online

Test to Treat, a federal initiative launched in March, offers a new opportunity for testing and treating COVID-19. At select locations across the country, individuals can get tested and, if they are positive and treatments are appropriate for them, can get a prescription and have their medication filled all at one location. A tool to find Test to Treat locations as well as more information on the program is available at aspr.hhs.gov/TestToTreat. Prescriptions are currently being offered to those that are at high risk of becoming very sick. New Test to Treat locations will be added as the program expands.

K-12 Schools in Clackamas County Eligible to Request At-Home COVID-19 Test Kits

Clackamas County Public Health (CCPH) is making test kits available for request via the <u>online portal</u>. The available tests are iHealth rapid antigen tests are appropriate for use in those ages 2+. Schools are welcome to keep a supply of tests on hand to distribute to students and families as needed. Distribution should focus on those that have been disproportionately affected by COVID-19 and/or have had difficulty accessing testing.

No-Cost COVID-19 Testing


<u>Curative</u> testing site at Harmony Campus in Milwaukie operates 7 days a week with expanded afternoon hours on weekdays. The site also offers **free** rapid molecular testing with results available in about an hour. Appointments are not required.





COVID-19 Positive Patients in Oregon Hospitals






Oregon's SARS-CoV-2 Wastewater Monitoring



Second Booster Dose

- FDA authorized a second booster dose of the either the Moderna or Pfizer
 COVID-19 vaccine for people aged 50+ and immunocompromised individuals
- Administered at least 4 months after the first booster dose
- Immunocompromised people must be at least 12 to receive the 2nd Pfizer booster, and at least 18 to receive the Moderna booster
- Available at all CCPH vaccine clinics

Omicron Updates

- Worldwide case count dropped 17.1%
- U.S. averaging 27,573 new cases a day
- U.S. case counts dropped 0.2%
- Oregon averaging 289 cases a day
- Oregon case counts increased 42%
