WHAT ACTION ARE YOU REQUESTING FROM THE BOARD? Community Corrections is seeking a signed letter approving Community Corrections' first year of the 2013-2015 Biennial Plan which defines the funding source(s) and costs of each program.

**EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:** The attached Biennial Plan details Community Corrections' priorities, goals, and budget for the upcoming fiscal year and is required by the State of Oregon for approval of the Intergovernmental Agreement between Oregon Department of Corrections and Clackamas County. The Local Public Safety Coordinating Council (LPSCC) approved the Plan for submission to the State on October 10, 2013. The Plan represents a continuation of the current Community Corrections programs.

**Funding is as follows:** 56% from Community Corrections Act, State Grant in Aid, 31% from the general fund, 4% HOPE (Honest Opportunity Probation with Enforcement) grant and 9% client fees and Community Service contracts.

The Board has previously approved the Biennial Plan annually or biennially as required.

This Biennial Plan was delayed due to the State not having final funding figures at the time of Clackamas County's budget approval process. The final funding amount increased \$888,358 over the Governor's recommended budget. The State has once again requested two one year terms (fiscal years 13-14 and 14-15) for the 2013-2015 Biennial Plan.

**FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS (current year and ongoing):** Approval of the Plan is required by the State for execution of the Intergovernmental Agreement between Oregon Department of Corrections and Clackamas County. This is the first of two Intergovernmental Agreements for this Biennial Plan.

LEGAL/POLICY REQUIREMENTS: N/A

PUBLIC/GOVERNMENTAL PARTICIPATION: Once this Plan, along with the subsequent Intergovernmental Agreement, is approved, Community Corrections will then submit the Plan to the State for execution of the Intergovernmental Agreement between Oregon Department of Corrections and Clackamas County.

**OPTIONS:** Approve as submitted retaining our current level of service, approve with amendments subscribed by the Board, or not approve.

**RECOMMENDATION:** Community Corrections respectfully requests that the Board approve this Plan for the fiscal year 2013-2014 of the 2013-2015 Biennial Plan with subsequent approval of the Intergovernmental Agreement at a future Business Meeting.





Program Description:	This program provides contracted sex offender treatment services and polygraphs for indigent offenders. All sex offender treatment groups are cognitive-based programs designed to address thinking errors and thereby change behavior. Offenders may be required to pay a portion of the treatment services based on the sliding fee scale. Sex offender treatment services include individual assessment and evaluation, a long-term sex offender treatment group, a shorter-term treatment, an intervention group for non-paraphilic offenders, individual counseling, biofeedback, arousal reconditioning therapy and an aftercare group. In conjunction with regular sex offender treatment, all sex offender treatment providers provide educational sessions that all safety plan supervisors must attend. This is called a chaperone program and it follows a set curriculm that is approved by the sex offender supervision team. Sex offenders attend weekly, bi-weekly and monthly meetings. The length of time in treatment can range from 6 months to 5 years depending on the offender's risk to the community, and their compliance with treatment and other conditions of supervision. All contracted treatment providers must be certified as sex offender treatment providers by the Oregon Association for the Treatment of Sexual Abusers. (OATSA)

Program Name:	Mental Health Services

Program Description:	This program provides supervision to parole, post-prison, and probation clients who suffer from a mental illness and have an Axis I Diagnosis or who have a Dual Diagnosis. A Parole and Probation Officer (PO) with specialized training is assigned to supervise mentally ill offenders who are in transition or who need help to become stabalized in the community. The PO is also assigned to supervise the participants in the Clackamas County Mental Health Court whose goal is to mitigate the risk to community safety by enhancing mental health treatment. The PO works closely with mental health professionals and medical staff to ensure that clients are receiving mental health treatment and mental health medications. The PO also works with clients to help them access benefits such as Social Security and Medicare and Medicaid. The PO also works with the client and their family to make a plan for continued stability. This PO also oversees the Haven House, a 15 bed transitional housing unit for male offenders with a mental illness. Bridges to Change provides a mentor and a house manager to work specifically with these clients.

WCSAP targets felony convicted high and medium-high risk to reoffend women on supervision. Participants may be on parole, post-prison supervision or probation with Clackamas County. WCSAP is approximately one year in length with a minimum of six months in residence at the Women's Center. Treatment is provided by a licensed Mental Health Therapist and an Addictions Counselor who specialize in addictions and the female offender population. Focus is placed on treatment for substance abuse as well as criminal conduct. Treatment curriculum is evidenced based and addresses each participants assessed risk and needs.
