

Candidate statements and measure arguments are printed as filed; no corrections to spelling or grammar are made, and the information is not verified for accuracy. Our county cover design is the last in the civic art series, "Voting is a right, responsibility, and a celebration!"

The Voter Registration Deadline is Oct. 15, 2024. Visit <u>oregonvotes.gov</u> to register to vote or update your information. Clackamas County Elections will be open until 7 p.m. on Oct. 15. Ballots are mailed to all eligible Clackamas County voters beginning Oct. 16. Please contact us if you do not have a ballot by Oct. 24.

Sign up for Track Your Ballot! Visit <u>clackamas.us/elections/track-your-ballot</u>. Know exactly when your ballot is in the mail heading your way. This is an opt-in service that will alert you via text, phone, or email. After you vote and return your ballot, you'll be alerted when it has been accepted for counting.

Two voter locations to serve you! Clackamas County Elections will open a pop-up vote center inside the Happy Valley Library starting Oct. 21. The **Happy Valley Vote Center** (13793 SE Sieben Park Way in Happy Valley) provides a closer choice for voters in Happy Valley, Sandy, Damascus and other north-east communities. Hours at the **Happy Valley Vote Center** and the **Clackamas County Elections Office** (1710 Red Soils Ct., Suite 100 in Oregon City) will be Monday – Friday 8:30 a.m. – 5 p.m., Saturday, Nov. 2 10 a.m. – 2 p.m. and Election Day, Tuesday, Nov. 5. 7 a.m. – 8 p.m.

Each voter service location is staffed by sworn election officials. Citizens can replace a lost or damaged ballot, update voter registration information, get voting assistance if they have a disability, get voting assistance in a preferred language, return their voted ballot, or vote in person.

Official Ballot Drop Site Update: 24-Hour Official Ballot Drop Sites are located throughout the county. You may deposit your ballot at any official ballot drop site in the state until 8 p.m. on Election Day, Nov. 5, 2024. *Milwaukie City Hall drop site has moved to 10501 SE Main (new city hall). *Happy Valley Library drop site is once again available outside the library. 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Voters' Pamphlet Translation Access

In 2021, the Oregon Legislature passed the Voter Language Access Bill (HB 3021) requiring the Secretary of State to translate portions of state and county voters' pamphlets into Oregon's and the county's most spoken languages. The law seeks to remove barriers to voting for those who are not fully proficient in English.

To help in this effort, the Translation Advisory Council was created. The Council is made up of volunteer community members who represent the ethnic, linguistic, and cultural diversity of Oregon voters. Council members make sure state and county translations are accurate and retain the original tone and meaning in a culturally appropriate manner.

Selected portions of this county voters' pamphlet are available in Simplified Chinese, Korean, Russian, Spanish, Ukrainian, and Vietnamese. These translations can be found online at oregonvotes.gov/ClackamasVP







Facts to Know about Voting and Elections

Who can register to vote in Oregon?

- · You must be a United States citizen,
- · A resident of Oregon,
- And at least 16 years old. You will get your first ballot in the mail once you are at least 18 years old.

You must register to vote at least 21 days before Election Day.

How can I register to vote?

- · Online at OregonVotes.gov/register or
- On a paper Oregon Voter Registration Card that can be picked up at an elections office, DMV, public library, or post office.


How does vote by mail work?

All elections in Oregon are conducted by the county elections office. The elections office mails ballots directly to voters. Voters complete their ballots, and then return them to the county elections office in the mail or by putting them into an Official Ballot Drop Box.

Vote by mail in a few simple steps:


- 1. Register to Vote
- 2. Receive a Voter Notification Card
- 3. Receive a Voters' Pamphlet
- 4. Receive Your Ballot
- 5. Vote Your Ballot
- 6. Return Your Ballot

How do I vote my ballot?



Find the candidate or measure response (YES or NO) of your choice. Completely darken the oval to the left of your choice with blue or black ink. Do not use felt tip markers.

Write-in Votes




To vote for a write-in candidate who does not appear on the ballot, completely darken the oval to the left of the line provided for the office and write the full name of the candidate on that line.

- Make sure you have correctly marked your choice for each contest.
- Your official ballot may have contests printed on both sides.
- Place the ballot in the return identification envelope.
- Read the Voter's Statement on the return envelope and sign in the signature box.
- Your ballot cannot be counted if you do not sign the return envelope.
- Every signature is checked against the registration signature on file. The signatures must match for the ballot to be counted.

If you vote for more candidates than allowed for an office or if you vote **both Yes** and **No** on a measure, it is called an overvote and your vote **will not count** for that contest.

If you make a mistake or change your mind while marking your ballot, you may correct it yourself. See example below.

 Make your choice obvious so that your intent is understood and your vote is counted correctly.




 If you are unable to correct your ballot, you may request a replacement ballot from the elections office.

Facts to Know about Ranked Choice Voting (RCV)

How do I vote my ranked choice ballot?

Fill in no more than **one oval per column** and no more than **one oval per row**.




- Fill in one oval in the Rank 1 column for the candidate you like the most.
- If you have a candidate that you like second best, fill in one oval in the Rank 2 column for that candidate, and so on.
- To write in a candidate, write the candidate's name on the line provided and fill in the oval for the rank of your choice.
- You are allowed to rank up to six candidates, but you can rank only one candidate if you prefer. Ranking other candidates does not harm your Rank 1 choice.

Whether you are voting in a contest for a single winner (such as Mayor of Portland) or multiple winners (such as for Portland City Councilors), the ballot layout and steps to vote will be the same.


Common Mistakes

Skipped Rankings




When filling out your ballot, if you skip over a rank column, your next highest ranking will be elevated to take its place in the counting process.

Overvotes



If you choose multiple candidates in the same rank—for example, if you rank two candidates as your first choice—that is called an overvote. Your overvoted ranking will not be counted and your next highest ranking will be automatically elevated to take the place of the overvote.


Repeat Rankings



If you rank a single candidate multiple times, only the highest ranking is accepted and each lower ranking for the same candidate is ignored as if you had skipped that ranking.

If you make a mistake or change your mind while marking your ballot, you may correct it yourself.

- Make your choice obvious so that your intent is understood and your vote is counted correctly.
- See the example below for how to correct your ballot if you fill in more than one oval in a column or a row.







The mayor retains too much power: they draft the budget; appoint all members of future commissions on city districting and salary; appoint the city manager and police chief; they can propose policy directly to Council and break its tie votes. No one person should have that much influence over our city. While budgets, appointments, and policy require Council approval, these decisions should start and end with our full representation in City Council. Public commissions should represent Portland and be filled by sortition, not personal choice.

City Council is to elect a council president. This office should be equally shared or rotated among all members of City Council to ensure no one person, seat or district gains unfair power, resources or advantage.

All elected city offices will be voted on this November, but future elections will be staggered. Councilors in districts 3 and 4, and the city auditor, will serve an initial two-year term. Afterward they will run for regular four-year terms in non-US presidential election years. Voter turnout is consistently highest in US presidential election years. We don't need staggered elections. It's fairest for all our representatives, regardless of office or district, to be elected at the same time with the highest potential for voter turnout

To end homelessness we must build systems of permanent supportive housing. Permanent supportive housing provides a stable home with services like mental health counseling for those who need them. Permanent supportive housing requires steady revenue streams for long-term investment and planning. Permanent supportive housing saves lives, saves money and time, and improves the health of our community.

Managed by a public utility district, rates have long been affordable. Community gardens have proliferated throughout the city, beautifying our streets and providing an emergency food supply for all in need.

We've decomissioned the CEI Hub, which will no longer threaten to pollute our water supply with a deluge of petroleum. City Council's finances are no longer beholden to Wall Street, because our resources are reinvested in the community instead.

A Green Public Bank will invest in worker cooperatives and prevailing wage jobs to rebuild our infrastructure for the dangers posed by the megaquake and climate change alike. A \$25/hour minimum wage will be paired with a cost-of-living adjustment, rent control, and financial support for small businesses to empower workers and revitalize Portland's economy.



What if I did not receive a ballot?

If you do not receive a ballot by Oct. 24, 2024 call Clackamas County Elections at 503-655-8510.

What if I need assistance voting?

Voters with disabilities, or those needing assistance voting in a language other than English, may contact Clackamas County Elections for voter assistance or interpretation services.

What if I make a mistake on my ballot?

You may simply cross out your mistake, write "not this," and circle the intended choice.

What if I change my mind after I have returned my ballot?

As soon as you deposit your ballot in a mailbox or at an official ballot drop site, your ballot has been cast. A new ballot cannot be issued.

Does my ballot have to be returned by mail?No. You may return your ballot by mail or drop it off at any official ballot drop site in the state.

Do I need a stamp on the envelope to return my ballot?

No, stamps are **NOT** required to mail your ballot back to Clackamas County Elections.

When must my ballot be returned?

If you send your ballot through the U.S. Mail, it must be postmarked by Election Day, Tuesday Nov. 5. or, you can drop off your ballot at any official ballot drop box in Oregon by 8 p.m. on Election Day, Tuesday Nov. 5.

Where is my secrecy sleeve?

The ballot packet no longer contains an optional secrecy sleeve. That is because you do not need one. Ballot packets have been redesigned to protect privacy, save costs, and improve efficiency. New larger 6-by-9-inch official ballot return envelopes include your signature line along with information on ways to return your ballot. A privacy secrecy weave has been embedded directly into your ballot return envelope. When your ballot is placed into the envelope, the privacy weave prevents anyone from seeing how you voted. This change has been approved by the Secretary of State and the United States Postal Service. It reflects best practices of Vote-by-Mail and financial institutions to protect your information.

Renew Five-Year Local Option Tax for Vector (Mosquito-Fly) Control

Question: Shall Vector District renew levy \$0.025 per \$1,000.00 assessed value for preventing mosquito-borne diseases, mosquito-fly control, general operations, capital projects?

Summary: This measure authorizes the District to renew it's levy of \$0.025 per \$1,000.00 assessed value outside its existing permanent rate each year for five years beginning 2025-2026.

This levy will provide funding for finding and controlling the mosquitoes that cause mosquito-borne diseases, maintenance, general operations, and capital projects including:

- Funding for potential outbreak of mosquito-borne diseases
- Continued mosquito and fly control services throughout the County

Estimated tax would cost the owner of a home with an assessed value of \$400,000.00 about \$10.00 per year. Tax is subject to the local government rate limit of Section 11b, Article X1 of the Oregon Constitution.

The proposed rate will raise approximately \$1,686,358.00 in 2025-2026, \$1,736,949.00 in 2026-2027, \$1,789,057.00 in 2027-2028, \$1,842,729.00 in 2028-2029, and \$1,898,011.00 in 2029-2030 for a total of \$8,953,104.00.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

Clackamas County Vector Control District is responsible for the control of mosquitoes and flies in Clackamas County. District's programs help protect the health of people and animals by limiting the spread of mosquito-borne diseases such as Encephalitis, West Nile Virus and other mosquito-borne diseases

Renew Five year local option Levy for Vector (Mosquito-Fly) Control.

Shall Vector District levy \$0.025 per \$1,000.00 assessed value for preventing mosquito-borne diseases, mosquito control, general operations, and capital projects?

This measure authorizes the District to levy \$0.025 per \$1,000.00 assessed value outside its existing permanent rate each year for five years beginning 2025-2026. This is the same rate requested in 2004, 2009, 2014, and 2019.

This levy will provide funding for finding and controlling the mosquitoes that cause mosquito-borne diseases, maintenance, general operations, and capital projects including:

Funding for potential outbreak of mosquito-borne diseases
Continued mosquito control services throughout the County

Estimated tax would cost the owner of a home with an assessed value of \$400,000.00 about \$10.00 per year. Tax is subject to the local government rate limit of Section 11b, Article X1 of the Oregon Constitution.

This is not a permanent rate. This is only for five years and will expire in 2030.

Clackamas County Measure 3-614

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR:

I support Measure 3-614 which will continue the work of the Clackamas County Vector Control District for 5 more years. The District controls mosquitoes and flies in all areas of Clackamas County. These insects are nuisances at best and, at worst, spread dangerous diseases to us and the animals around us. By focusing on stagnant water areas where mosquitoes breed the District keeps mosquito numbers low enough that it is difficult for mosquito-borne disease to become established here. For instance, West Nile Virus is found in central Oregon, central Washington and the Tacoma area but has not been able to establish itself here.

- 1. The Vector Control District does its work very economically. It costs the average homeowner about \$10.00 per year.
- 2. This is not a new tax. It was established 20 years ago by a vote of the people and has been reestablished every 5 years since then.
- 3. Since it was first established the rate has not changed.
- 4. Measure 3-614 will extend the current rate for 5 more years.
- 5. If the measure is not passed, services would need to be reduced and eventually discontinued.

Clackamas County Measure 3-621

REFERRED TO THE PEOPLE BY THE DISTRICT BOARD

Permanently Bans Certain Psilocybin-Related Businesses within Unincorporated Clackamas County.

Question: Shall psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service centers be permanently banned in the unincorporated areas of Clackamas County?

Summary: State law allows the manufacture of psilocybin products and the operation of psilocybin service centers in Oregon. Psilocybin service centers are defined as establishments where a client purchases, consumes, and experiences the effects of a psilocybin product under the supervision of a psilocybin service facilitator. State law allows the governing body of a county to adopt an ordinance banning psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service centers within the unincorporated areas of the county. If the governing body adopts such an ordinance, it must be referred to the voters in the next statewide general election. The Clackamas County Board of Commissioners adopted such an ordinance on June 27, 2024. As a result, this measure is being referred to the voters. Approval of this measure would permanently ban psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service centers within the unincorporated areas of Clackamas County.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

Psilocybin is a naturally occurring, hallucinogenic, mind-altering, psychotropic chemical that is produced in certain forms of fungi. State law allows the manufacture of psilocybin products and the operation of psilocybin service centers in Oregon.

Psilocybin product manufacturing is defined as the manufacture, planting, cultivation, growing, harvesting, production, preparation, propagation, compounding, conversion or processing of a psilocybin product, either directly or indirectly by extraction from substances of natural origin, or independently by means of chemical synthesis, or by a combination of extraction and chemical synthesis, and includes any packaging or repackaging of the psilocybin product or labeling or relabeling of its container. Psilocybin service centers are defined as establishments where a client purchases, consumes, and experiences the effects of a psilocybin product under the supervision of a psilocybin service facilitator.

State law allows the governing body of a county to adopt an ordinance banning psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service centers within the unincorporated areas of the county. If the governing body adopts such an ordinance, it must be referred to voters in the next statewide general election. In 2022, the Clackamas County Board of Commissioners adopted an ordinance temporarily banning such businesses. That ordinance was referred to and approved by the voters. On June 27, 2024, the Board adopted an ordinance permanently banning such businesses. As a result, this measure is being referred to the voters.

Approval of this measure would permanently ban psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service centers within the unincorporated areas of Clackamas County. Such businesses would still be allowed within jurisdictions (e.g., cities within Clackamas County, cities within other counties, and the unincorporated areas of other counties) whose governing bodies have not adopted ordinances banning such businesses.

City of Estacada Measure 3-617

REFERRED TO THE PEOPLE BY THE CITY COUNCIL

Prohibition of Psilocybin-related businesses within the City of Estacada.

Question: Shall the City of Estacada prohibit psilocybin service centers and the manufacture of psilocybin products in the City of Estacada?

Summary: State law allows for operation, manufacturing, distribution and possession of psilocybin and psilocin. State law provides that a city council may adopt an ordinance to be referred to the voters to prohibit the establishment of any of those registered or licensed activities. Approval of this measure would prohibit the establishment of psilocybin manufacturers and psilocybin service center operators within the area subject to the jurisdiction of the city.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

State law allows for operation, manufacturing, and distribution of Psilocybin related businesses. The State began issuing permits for these businesses in 2023, unless City voters approved a referendum approving permanent or temporary prohibition. Estacada voters approved a two-year prohibition. That prohibition is set to expire on January 1, 2025.

The Oregon Health Authority, who was the agency that was responsible for drafting regulations released proposed rules in July of 2023. There is disagreement about what type of time, place, and manner restrictions cities can place on the Psilocybin businesses.

The Estacada City Council believed that regulations would be clarified during the two-year period. However, the statutes have not been clarified, and there still is not agreement on what reasonable time place and manner restrictions a City can use to regulate the businesses.

This would prohibit the establishment of any of those registered or licensed activities. This measure would prohibit the operation, manufacturing, and distribution of Psilocybin related businesses, unless the prohibition is revoked.

If this measure does not pass then the establishment of Psilocybin manufacturers and other Psilocybin related businesses would be permitted after December 31, 2024.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

Currently, the Mayor and City Councilors serve four-year terms on a rotating basis. There is not a limit on the number of terms the Mayor or a City Councilor can serve. This measure is being referred to the voters by the current Mayor and City Council members. If approved, it would limit the total number of terms to any elected position at the City of Happy Valley to five terms. Of those five terms, a person could only serve as Mayor for a total of two terms. An elected or appointed partial term does not count towards those limits. If approved, the term limits in this measure will apply to all existing and future Mayors and City Council members.

REFERRED TO THE PEOPLE BY THE CITY COUNCIL

Approval of Happy Valley Police Services Levy for Five

Question: Shall Happy Valley maintain a five year \$1.38/\$1,000 assessed value levy for dedicated police services beginning Fiscal Year 2025/26?

This measure renews current local option taxes

Summary: The measure would renew a local option levy that City voters approved in 2002, 2006, 2010, 2015, and 2019 to provide funding for dedicated police services.

The rate for all previous levies was the same: \$1.38/\$1,000 of assessed value.

The current levy (2019) expires June 30, 2025. That levy has funded police services dedicated to the City of Happy Valley, which are provided through an agreement with Clackamas County Sheriff's Office. These services include emergency response, 911, dedicated police patrols, major crime investigations, crime prevention, drug enforcement, school safety, community policing and traffic enforcement in the City.

This proposed levy maintains the \$1.38/\$1,000 rate and provides funding for dedicated police services in the City for five additional years. These dedicated services have been provided since 2002 through this local option levy.

The amount of money to be raised by this proposed levy for each of the five fiscal years is estimated to be as follows: FY 2025/26 \$6,348,340; FY 2026/27 \$6,729,240; FY 2027/28 \$7,132,995; FY 2028/29 \$7,560,975; FY 2029/30 \$8,014,633.

Should this levy fail, the City will not have dedicated police services beyond June 2025.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

City voters approved local option levies in 2002, 2006, 2010, 2015, and 2019 for dedicated police services. The rate for all four levies remained \$1.38 per thousand of assessed value. The current levy (2019) expires June 30, 2025.

If approved, this measure provides funding for five (5) more years of dedicated police services in Happy Valley beginning July 1, 2025 and ending June 30, 2030.

This is a renewal of an existing levy that has been in place since 2002 and not a tax increase. The rate being proposed remains at \$1.38 per thousand of assessed value. If the renewal is approved, a home with a market value of \$660,000 and assessed value of \$370,000 would continue to pay approximately \$510 annually for dedicated police services.

This local option levy provides the only source of funding for dedicated police services in Happy Valley. Those services include:

- **Emergency Response**
- 911 Dispatch Services Dedicated Police Patrols
- Major Crimes Investigation
- Crime Prevention
- **Drug Enforcement**
- School Safety Community Policing
- Traffic Enforcement

Should this levy renewal fail, the City will not have dedicated police services beyond June 2025.

City of Lake Oswego Measure 3-618

REFERRED TO THE PEOPLE BY THE CITY COUNCIL

Allows Road Safety Project, Driveway Realignment on Specific Park Property.

Question: Shall Lake Oswego amend the Charter to allow Clackamas County to improve road safety using 0.4 acres of Stevens Meadows?

Summary: The City owns Stevens Meadows, a park of about 28 acres outside City limits in Clackamas County. The County is responsible for Stafford and Childs Roads adjacent to the park.

The County has determined improvements to the Stafford/ Childs intersection are necessary to ease congestion and reduce injuries from accidents. The road improvements, which will be paid for and constructed by the County, will reduce crashes, ease traffic congestion, and create bike lanes and safe pedestrian paths. The County estimates the road improvements will decrease the crashes by 88% at the intersection. The County needs to use about 0.2 acres for these road improvements. The project will also realign an existing gravel driveway used for park maintenance, affecting an area of about 0.2 acres.

The City Charter prohibits the City from allowing roads on Stevens Meadows. If adopted, this measure would amend the Charter, allowing the City to enable County use of up to 0.4 acres of Stevens Meadows for the limited purposes of public safety road improvements and driveway realignment.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

The City of Lake Oswego owns Stevens Meadows, a park of about 28 acres outside city limits in Clackamas County. The County is responsible for maintaining and improving Stafford and Childs Roads adjacent to the park.

In 2018 Clackamas County conducted a Federal Highway Administration road safety audit that revealed problems with the Stafford/Childs intersection, including limited intersection visibility, rear-end crashes involving injuries, high speed turning, and heavy traffic without many gaps.

Between 2020 and 2024, Clackamas County designed different alternatives for the intersection and involved the public and other stakeholders. After this public engagement process the County finalized and funded a design requiring the construction of a roundabout at the Stafford/Childs intersection.

The County designed the project to reduce crashes, ease traffic congestion, and create bike lanes and safer pedestrian paths. The County estimates that road improvements could decrease fatal and injury crashes by 88%. The project also includes plans to mitigate potential environmental impacts of the project through work on the land around Pecan Creek, a fish bearing stream directly adjacent to Stevens Meadows.

The County needs to use about 0.2 acres of Stevens Meadows for the road improvements. The project will also realign an existing gravel driveway on the Meadows used to maintain the park, affecting another area of about 0.2 acres.

In 2021, Lake Oswego voters passed an amendment to the City Charter limiting the types of development allowed on 15 Cityowned parks, including Stevens Meadows. The Charter directs the City to prohibit anyone, including Clackamas County, from building a road or redeveloping the gravel driveway on Stevens Meadows.

Measure 3-618 would amend the Charter, allowing the City to authorize the County to use up to 0.4 acres of Stevens Meadows for the limited purposes of public safety road improvements and driveway realignment.

If the measure is adopted:

- The Charter would be amended, allowing the City to authorize the County to use up to 0.4 acres of Stevens Meadows for the limited purposes of public safety road improvements and driveway realignment.
- The City Charter will continue prohibiting development on the rest of Stevens Meadows.
- The City will continue to manage the park in accordance with the City Charter.
- The County would be responsible for funding and constructing the Stafford/Childs Road project with County funds.
- · Measure 3-618 would not increase City taxes.

If the measure is not adopted:

- The Charter will continue to prohibit road construction and driveway realignment on all of Stevens Meadows.
- The City would not authorize the County to use 0.4 acres at the corner of Stafford Road/ Childs Road for the road improvement project or driveway realignment.
- The City will continue to manage the park in accordance with the City Charter.

REFERRED TO THE PEOPLE BY THE CITY COUNCIL

Prohibits Psilocybin Businesses Within the City of Lake Oswego.

Question: Shall the City of Lake Oswego prohibit psilocybin service centers and the manufacture of psilocybin products within the City?

Summary: State law authorizes the manufacturing, transportation, delivery, sale, and purchase of psilocybin, the psychedelic drug found in certain mushrooms, in Oregon. A city may "opt-out" by adopting an ordinance prohibiting the establishment of licensed psilocybin product manufacturers and/or psilocybin service centers within their boundaries. A city that "opts-in" may also adopt local time, place, and manner restrictions on psilocybin product manufacturers and/or psilocybin service centers that are in addition to those already imposed by state law.

The City adopted an ordinance prohibiting the establishment of psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service center operators (collectively, "psilocybin facilities") within the City. State law requires that this ordinance must be approved by the voters before it may take effect. The City Council also adopted an ordinance imposing local time, place, and manner restrictions on psilocybin facilities in addition to those already imposed by state law.

Approval of this measure would prohibit psilocybin facilities within the City. Rejection of the measure would allow psilocybin facilities within the City subject to state and local restrictions.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This measure asks whether or not to allow businesses related to psilocybin, a substance found in certain mushrooms, to operate in Lake Oswego.

In 2020, Oregon passed a law (Measure 109) allowing psilocybin to be made, delivered, and used in licensed facilities across the state. These businesses are called "psilocybin-related businesses." However, the state also lets local governments, like the one in Lake Oswego, decide if they want to ban these businesses within their city limits. A ban must be approved by the city's voters. The Lake Oswego City Council has adopted an ordinance prohibiting the establishment of psilocybin-related businesses within the city and, as a result, has referred this measure to the voters.

The Lake Oswego City Council has also adopted local rules for psilocybin-related businesses on top of what state law requires. The local rules are aimed at protecting children in childcare facilities close to psilocybin businesses, distancing marijuana and psilocybin businesses, and clarifying zoning between mixed-use and residential. If you vote "Yes" on this measure, psilocybin-related businesses will continue to be banned in Lake Oswego. If you vote "No," these businesses will be allowed, but they will need to follow state and local Lake Oswego rules.

Prohibits Psilocybin-Related Businesses Within Oregon City

Question: Shall Oregon City prohibit psilocybin-related service centers and manufacturing in Oregon City?

Summary: In November 2020, Oregon voters passed Ballot Measure 109, which allows the manufacture, delivery and administration of psilocybin at licensed facilities within the state. However, state law also provides that a city government may adopt an ordinance to be referred to the voters to prohibit the establishment of any of those registered or licensed activities in that city. Approval of this measure would prohibit the establishment of psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service center operators within the area subject to the jurisdiction of the city.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

Approval of this measure would prohibit the establishment and operation of psilocybin-related businesses within Oregon City.

Ballot Measure 109, passed in 2020, allows the manufacture, delivery, and administration of psilocybin at licensed facilities within the state. State law allows local governments to adopt an ordinance prohibiting the establishment of psilocybin related businesses within the city, but the council must refer the ordinance to the voters at a statewide general election. The Oregon City Commission has adopted an ordinance prohibiting the establishment of psilocybin-related businesses within the city and, as a result, has referred this measure to the voters. If approved, this measure would prohibit psilocybin-related businesses within the city.

Amends Charter: Deletes Outdated, Redundant Requirements to Approve Utility Franchises.

Question: Shall Charter be amended to streamline Council approval of utility franchise agreements and remove outdated, burdensome and redundant requirements?

Summary: The Charter Commission proposed a measure to streamline the approval of franchise agreements, which authorize a utility to use City streets to provide residents with utility services.

Currently, City Council must approve franchises using a lengthy and outdated process described in Chapter 10, Article 2 of the Charter.

If the measure is approved, the following requirements would be deleted:

- · Redundant filing with Auditor
- · Objection process
- · Publication of lengthy franchise in newspaper
- Extended time between reading of ordinance to approve franchise
- · Extended effective date
- · Written acceptance by franchisee

Instead, Council would grant franchises by ordinance, in accordance with standard ordinance publication, public testimony, adoption and effective date provisions in Charter and code. Other provisions.

The City Budget Office determined the measure has no direct financial impact.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

The volunteer Charter Commission recommended amending the City Charter to streamline Council approval of utility franchise agreements by removing outdated, burdensome and redundant requirements. A utility franchise agreement authorizes a utility to use City streets to provide residents with utility services.

Currently, Chapter 10, Article 2 of the Charter requires City Council to use a lengthy and outdated process that can take over six months to complete. For example, the entire franchise - which can run 25 pages or longer - must be published in the newspaper.

Under the Commission's recommendation, outdated and redundant requirements specific to franchise agreements would be deleted. Instead, Council would grant franchises using its standard ordinance process. The standard process includes ordinance publication, public testimony, and adoption and effective date provisions located in Charter and code.

The Elections Commission will continue to be responsible for implementing the City's public financing of elections as provided by ordinance and, if the measure passes, any other election or campaign finance-related law or program delegated by the Council or Auditor.

The Elections Commission will continue to consist of nine City residents appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by Council. Under the measure, the Elections Commission will notify the Mayor and Council of funds required for the public financing of elections program and other duties. The Council continues to determine the Elections Commission's budget. Other provisions.

The City Budget Office determined the measure has no direct financial impact.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

The volunteer Charter Commission recommended amending the City Charter to add the Independent Portland Elections Commission

Currently, the Independent Portland Elections Commission is established by code, which can be amended by City Council.

Under the Commission's recommendation, the Independent Portland Elections Commission would be added to the Charter, which can only be amended by an affirmative vote of a majority of voters. Currently, the Elections Commission only implements the City's public financing of elections program. Under the Commission's recommendation, the Elections Commission would also be able to implement any other election or campaign finance-related law or program delegated to the Commission by the Council or Auditor. The Elections Commission will continue to consist of nine City residents appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by Council. City Council will continue to determine and provide the Election Commission's budget.

Amends Charter: Updates Authority to Manage Parks, Sewers and Stormwaters.

Question: Shall Charter be amended to update City authority regarding recreational and natural areas (defined), sewers and stormwaters?

Summary: Charter Commission proposed measure to update City authority, last amended in 1966, to manage recreational and natural areas, sewers and stormwaters.

If measure passes:

- Charter Section 12-101, describing parks management, would add "recreational and natural areas" as defined term to mean parks, playgrounds, forests, wetlands and human-built, natural facilities. Remaining language would be streamlined
- A section would be added to City's specific powers in Charter Section 2-105(a) clarifying that City may perform sewer, stormwater management - including protecting, restoring, remediating, altering, improving, expanding, filling, grading, or managing flow —in channels, riparian areas, floodplains, waterfronts, lakes, ponds, wetlands, other waters, natural systems, constructed equivalents.
- Charter Section 11-301 would be amended to clarify that storm drainage may use natural systems, constructed equivalents.
- Charter Section 11-302 would be amended to streamline language, last updated in 1970, related to service charges deposited into Sewage Disposal Fund. Charter will continue to require Council to spend Fund only on uses "reasonably related" to sewage, stormwater conveyance, disposal and purification.

Other provisions.

City Budget Office determined measure has no direct financial impact.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

The volunteer Charter Commission recommended amending the City Charter to update the City's authority to protect and manage parks and to manage sewers and stormwaters. Descriptions of the City's roles were last updated in 1966.

Currently, the City's role to protect and manage parks is described in Charter Section 12-101.

Under the Commission's recommendation, Charter Section 12-101 would be amended to define "recreational and natural areas" as parks, playgrounds, forests, wetlands and human-built or natural facilities. The remaining language would be streamlined to increase readability.

Currently, the City's sewer and stormwater management role is described in Charter Section 11-301 and Section 11-302 describes the City's process, last amended in 1970, to fix, collect and deposit service charges into the Sewage Disposal Fund.

Under the Commission's recommendation, a new section would be added to the City's specific powers in Charter Section 2-105(a) to clarify that the City may perform sewer and stormwater management - including protecting, restoring, remediating, altering, improving, expanding, filling, grading, or managing flow - in channels, riparian areas, floodplains, waterfronts, lakes, ponds, wetlands and other waters, natural systems or constructed equivalents. Existing Charter Section 11-301 would be amended to clarify that storm drainage may include the use of natural systems or constructed equivalents. Existing Charter Section 11-302 would be amended to

streamline language related to service charges. The Charter will continue to require City Council to spend all charges deposited into the Sewage Disposal Fund on uses "reasonably related" to sewage and stormwater conveyance, disposal and purification.

If the measure passes, the following language in the Charter would be amended:

- Delete Charter Section 2-105(a)(50) to remove vague, archaic language to "prohibit persons from roaming the streets at unseasonable hours". Deleting this section of the City's specific powers would not impair the City's general powers and authority to protect and support public health and safety.
- Delete vague, archaic language to regulate "offensive" businesses in Charter Section 2-105(a)(36). City would retain authority to regulate businesses that create or constitute a nuisance
- Use consistent language to define "protected classes" as those classes protected "under local ordinance, or state or federal law" in Charter Chapters 2, 4 and 12.
- Replace "disability" with "incapacity" in Charter Chapter 2 to reflect the fact that disabled residents may serve as City officials

The City Budget Office determined the measure has no direct financial impact.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

The volunteer Charter Commission recommended amending the City Charter to delete vague, archaic and inconsistent language.

Currently, Charter Section 2-105(a)(50) lists as one of the City's specific powers the right to "prohibit persons from roaming the streets at unseasonable hours". Under the Commission's recommendation, this vague and archaic language would be deleted. Deleting this section of the City's specific powers would not impair the City's general powers and authority to protect and support public health and safety.

Currently, Charter Section 2-105(a)(36) authorizes the City to regulate "businesses which are offensive or may create or constitute a nuisance..." Under the Commission's recommendation, the vague term "offensive" would be deleted and the City would retain authority to regulate businesses that create or constitute a nuisance.

Currently, Charter Chapters 2, 4 and 12 define "protected classes", but the definitions have small inconsistencies. Under the Commission's recommendation, a consistent definition of "protected classes" - those classes protected "under local ordinance, or state or federal law" - would be used throughout the Charter.

Currently, the term "disability" is used in Charter Chapter 2 to describe when a City official may be unable to perform official duties. Under the Commission's recommendation, the term "disability" would be replaced with "incapacity" to reflect the fact that disabled residents may serve as City officials.

Summary: The Charter Commission proposed a measure to delete Charter Section 1-108 and allow the City to mandate weatherization of pre-1979 structures without a citywide vote.

Currently, the City cannot mandate weatherization for any structure built before September 1, 1979, unless Council refers the weatherization mandate to voters. This limit was added to the Charter in 1980 through a vote on an initiative petition.

If the measure is approved, the City would be able to mandate building weatherization without referring the mandate to voters.

The City Budget Office determined the measure has no direct financial impact.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

The volunteer Charter Commission recommended amending the City Charter to remove the citywide vote requirement for mandatory building weatherization.

Currently, the City cannot mandate weatherization for any structure built before September 1, 1979, unless the City Council refers the weatherization mandate to the voters. This limit was added to the Charter in 1980 through an initiative petition.

Under the Commission's recommendation, Charter Section 1-108 would be deleted in its entirety. Deletion of the citywide vote requirement would allow the City to more efficiently require energy-efficient weatherization of buildings within the City.

City of Rivergrove Measure 3-612

REFERRED TO THE PEOPLE BY CITY COUNCIL

Charter Amendment: Enhances Park and Natural Area Protection

Question: Shall City Charter be amended to add additional protections for parks and other green spaces and natural areas?

Summary: This measure would amend the charter by the adoption of a number of protections for parks, natural areas, and green spaces owned or controlled by the City without a vote of citizens of Rivergrove.

Those protections include:

- · Prohibiting the sale, lease or transfer of such properties;
- Prohibiting development of change in use of such properties;
- · Prohibiting the installation of communication or cell towers;
- Designating the boat ramp as a park and natural area and setting hours of use for the facility;
- Requiring the maintenance of parks, natural areas, and green spaces;
- · Allowing for the change in use of such areas in emergencies;
- Allowing the installation of public sewer facilities in such areas:
- · Setting forth enforcement requirements and penalties; and
- · defining certain terms as used by the measure.

This measure would add these protections to the Rivergrove City Charter and any change to the measures would also have to be made through a charter change.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

The proposed Charter Amendment would change the Rivergrove City Charter by adding protections for parks, natural areas, and green spaces. These protections would apply to properties owned or controlled by the City by requiring a vote from Rivergrove citizens before the City could take certain actions regarding City owned parks, natural areas, and green spaces.

The proposed protections cover properties owned or controlled by the City of Rivergrove and include:

- Property Transactions: The amendment would prohibit the sale, lease, or transfer of these areas without a vote from the citizens of Rivergrove.
- Development Restrictions: It would prevent any development or change in use of these areas without a vote of the citizens of Rivergrove.
- Communication Towers: Installation of communication or cell towers would be prohibited.
- Boat Ramp Designation: The boat ramp would be designated as a park and natural area, with specific usage hours would be set in the Charter.
- Maintenance Requirement: The City would be required to maintain these parks, natural areas, and green spaces.
- Emergency Use: In emergencies, there could be temporary changes in use for up to 48 hours and possibly up to 45 days if a super majority of the City Council approved.
- Public Sewer Facilities: allows the installation of public sewer facilities.
- Enforcement and Penalties: The amendment outlines enforcement rules and penalties for violations of the Charter amendment.
- Definition of Terms: Certain terms used in the measure would be defined. These amendments would remain in force, unless a modification was approved through the same charter change procedure, ensuring transparency and citizen involvement.

In summary, the purpose of this charter amendment is to protect Rivergrove's parks, natural spaces, and green spaces and ensure responsibile management by the city.

What if I make a mistake on my ballot?

You may simply cross out your mistake, write "not this," and circle the intended choice.

What if I change my mind after I have returned my ballot?

As soon as you deposit your ballot in a mailbox or at an official ballot drop site, your ballot has been cast. A new ballot cannot be issued.

Does my ballot have to be returned by mail?No. You may return your ballot by mail or drop it off at any official ballot drop site in the state.

Do I need a stamp on the envelope to return my ballot?

No, stamps are **NOT** required to mail your ballot back to Clackamas County Elections.

When must my ballot be returned?

If you send your ballot through the U.S. Mail, it must be postmarked by Election Day, Tuesday Nov. 5. or, you can drop off your ballot at any official ballot drop box in Oregon by 8 p.m. on Election Day, Tuesday Nov. 5.

Where is my secrecy sleeve?

The ballot packet no longer contains an optional secrecy sleeve. That is because you do not need one. Ballot packets have been redesigned to protect privacy, save costs, and improve efficiency. New larger 6-by-9-inch official ballot return envelopes include your signature line along with information on ways to return your ballot. A privacy secrecy weave has been embedded directly into your ballot return envelope. When your ballot is placed into the envelope, the privacy weave prevents anyone from seeing how you voted. This change has been approved by the Secretary of State and the United States Postal Service. It reflects best practices of Vote-by-Mail and financial institutions to protect your information.

City of West Linn Measure 3-620

REFERRED TO THE PEOPLE BY THE CITY COUNCIL

Amends City Charter Regarding Limit on Mayor and Councilor Compensation

Question: Shall the City Charter be amended to increase the upper limit on compensation for the Mayor and City Councilors?

Summary: The West Linn Budget Committee met on May 20, 2024, reviewed the compensation for Councilors and the Mayor for eight nearby cities prepared by City staff, examined job duties and responsibilities, and recommended that this measure be placed on the ballot by the City Council for voter decision.

The measure adopts an amendment to the City Charter related to Mayor and City Councilor compensation which, if adopted, would provide:

- The upper limit of compensation for the Mayor shall increase from an annual amount not to exceed \$6,400 to an annual amount not to exceed \$30,000.
- The upper limit on compensation for a Councilor shall increase from an annual amount not to exceed \$4,000 to an annual amount not to exceed \$15,000.
- The maximum amount shall be adjusted for inflation annually based upon the Bureau of Labor Statistics CPI-W for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers for Western Cities.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

ABOUT THIS MEASURE

Amendments to the West Linn City Charter require voter approval. Current Mayor and Council compensation levels are set in and limited by Section 11 of the City Charter. Section 11 currently provides that the annual compensation for the Mayor shall not exceed \$6,400 and that the annual compensation for each Councilor shall not exceed \$4,000, subject to an annual inflation adjustment.

On May 20, 2024, the West Linn Budget Committee met without City Council Members present, reviewed the compensation for Councilors and the Mayor for eight nearby cities prepared by staff and recommended that the City amend the Charter to increase upper limit on the Mayors compensation to an amount not to exceed \$30,000 per year and the Councilor's compensation to an amount not to exceed \$15,000. On July 15, 2024, the West Linn City Council adopted a resolution to place this proposed Charter amendment to the West Linn City Charter on the ballot for voter decision. The proposed amendment would increase the upper limit in the amount of compensation received by the Mayor and City Councilors.

The proposed changes to the Charter are underlined below:

Section 11. Salaries, will have the following language amended to this section:

The compensation for the services of each City officer, employee, Council member and Mayor shall be the amount fixed by the Council. As of January 1, 2009 2025, this amount shall not exceed \$4,000 \$15,000 annually for each Councilor and \$6,400 \$30,000 annually for the Mayor. This maximum amount shall be adjusted for inflation annually, commencing July 1, 2025, based upon the Bureau of Labor Statistics CP|-W for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers for Western Cities Consumer Price Index for the Portland Metropolitan Area.

Why this Measure is Proposed

The West Linn Budget Committee recommended that this measure be placed on the ballot following an analysis of West Linn elected officials' job duties and other cities' elected official compensation levels. Council's interest in this ballot measure is

connected with the desire to make it easier for any member of our community to serve, not only those with the economic ability to do so.

If this Measure is Approved

If voters approved the charter amendment, Mayor and Council salaries shall be capped at the maximum amounts allowed. If voters reject the charter amendment, the amount of Mayor and Councilor salaries will remain at the upper limits currently established by Charter.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR:

I served on the West Linn City Council from 2015- 2018 and received just over \$1000 per quarter for what was often 30 - 40 hours of work per week. At that time, arguments against raising the stipend ranged from affordability to attracting the wrong sort of applicant. Now it's time for West Linn to appropriately address the question of what we expect of our Mayor and Council and how much we value their service.

So, what are the duties involved? As a member of the City Council, I attended Council meetings, work sessions and executive meetings several times a month. In addition, I was assigned to represent the council at various Metro, Clackamas County and West Linn City committee meetings. These often required travel, plus preparation prior to the session and follow-up afterwards. In between times and frequently seven days a week there were emails, phone calls, queries and communications with the citizens. This was just as City Councilor, so imagine the responsibilities required of the Mayor.

With this sort, of commitment, who has the time to serve? We want enthusiastic candidates who are willing to put in the time and effort and they should be compensated appropriately. My vote is an unequivocal yes on Measure 3-620.

This measure does not change our governance structure and DOES NOT raise taxes as the pay increases would be covered with existing funds. This is a FAIR and the RIGHT thing to do for West Linn.

Bonds Updating Facilities, Improving Workforce Training; Safety, Security and Technology

Question: Shall college construct, update facilities, workforce training, improve safety; issue \$120 million in bonds; estimated to maintain current tax rate?

If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of sections 11 and 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

Summary: Clackamas Community College seeks approval of bonds to improve college facilities; estimated to maintain current tax rate, regular audits required.

Bonds would finance capital costs, including:

- Constructing center of excellence providing workforce training for horticulture, farming, welding, wildland fire prevention.
- Enhancing student and staff safety with increased cameras, door access controls, seismic upgrades.
- Improving STEM opportunities with hands-on learning experiences for middle and high school students.
- Modernizing learning spaces for distance, hybrid learning needs
- \circ Upgrading athletic fields, facilities, completing community walking trail
- Building community partnerships with expansion of Wilsonville workforce partnership building.
- Updating aging facilities including for safety, energy efficiency, emerging technology and accessibility improvements.

Additional capital costs including loan repayment that financed property acquisition.

The State may provide up to \$16 million in matching funds.

Bonds may be issued in multiple series; each maturing within 21 years from issuance; \$120 million maximum principal. Because of expiration of outstanding debt, total bond levy rate estimated to continue at \$0.25 per \$1000 of assessed value; subject to change based on interest rates and assessed value fluctuations.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

Established in 1966, Clackamas County Community College serves approximately 26,000 students at 3 campuses (Oregon City, Milwaukie - Harmony, and Wilsonville) across Clackamas County.

THE COLLEGE SEEKS COMMUNITY SUPPORT TO CONTINUE BOND PROGRAM WHILE MAINTAINING CURRENT TAX RATE

The Clackamas Community College Board of Directors seeks voter approval of a \$120 million general obligation bond. This measure will maintain the current tax rate and would not increase taxes.

COMMUNITY IDENTIFIED PRIORITIES

In 2023, the college formed a bond committee comprised of community volunteers that analyzed the needs of all of the college's facilities. After 6 months of work, the committee recommended a plan to improve, update and construct workforce, educational and recreational facilities.

Bonds would finance capital costs including:

Modernizing learning spaces

 Renovating and modernizing learning spaces in older buildings to meet today's hybrid and distant learning needs to serve users across Clackamas County both urban and rural.

Constructing a Natural Resources Center of Excellence

 Constructing a center of excellence for horticulture, farming, and wildland fire prevention as well as an expansion of the welding center.

Securing the safety of students and staff

• Safety and security improvements to our three campuses through increased cameras and interior door access controls.

Improving access to STEM opportunities

• Create a hands-on learning experience that would allow kids in middle school through high school to learn about science, technology, engineering, and math through an immersive space simulator that would be the first of its kind in Oregon.

Improving athletic fields and walking trail

 Improving CCC's athletic fields including track and field renovations with covered grandstands for sporting events and outdoor graduation, a synthetic soccer field with lighting and completing the Douglas Loop walking trail on the Oregon City campus.

Building community partnerships

 Expansion of workforce partnership space on the Wilsonville campus that will enhance current career and technical education programs and strengthen connections between education and industry.

Updating and fixing aging infrastructure

 Updating, repairing and maintaining aging facilities, including energy efficiency upgrades, replacing outdated and inefficient central heating and cooling plan, technology upgrades and increase accessibility for people with disabilities.

The Clackamas Community College Board of Directors would appoint a long-term citizen oversight committee to ensure that all bond funds are used for the purposes approved by voters. Their role would include communicating project implementation to the public and overseeing spending.

BOND FUNDS CAN ONLY BE USED FOR VOTER-APPROVED PROJECTS

<u>Law requires bond funds be used for expenses described in the ballot.</u>

FINANCIALS

Bonds expected to mature within 20 years from issuance. Principal amount of bonds limited to \$120 million. Estimated to maintain current tax rate of .25 per \$1,000 of assessed property value. Actual tax rate may differ due to changes in interest rates and assessed value.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

The Oregon City School District serves over 700 students at schools across Oregon City, Beavercreek, Redland, and Jennings Lodge.

STEP THREE OF A THREE-PHASE PLAN

In 2003 Oregon City School District began a three phase bond approach to update and modernize its schools; making buildings safe and accessible.

- o The 2003 school bond created a new high school for our community
- o The 2018 bond renovated and modernized two middle schools and funded critical security updates in every school in the district.

- All 2018 bond projects were completed on time and on budget.
- o The third phase of this capital improvement plan is this proposed bond measure which makes improvements to the district's elementary schools for the district's youngest learners.

WHAT IS THE CURRENT CONDITION OF THE OREGON CITY ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS?

- The average age of the six elementary schools is 62 years and the two oldest schools are 76 years old. <u>These schools have</u> not been updated since they were originally built.
- A facilities condition report was conducted on these schools and three areas of concern were identified:
 - Failing Building Systems: While well maintained, all buildings deteriorate over time and Oregon City Elementary Schools are no different. These 60 plus year old schools have basic building systems like plumbing and heating that are original to the school. Levy Renewal to Retain TTSD Teachers and Preserve Classroom Programs

Question: Shall District retain teachers/programs by renewing current levy taxes (\$1 per \$1,000 of assessed value) for five years, beginning 2025?

Summary: This measure is not a new or added tax.

It simply continues the current local option levy, which voters passed in 2000 and then renewed in 2004, 2008, 2014, and 2018. Renewing the levy again would keep the existing levy rate for another five years, beginning in 2025-26 when the current levy expires.

Renewal of the local option levy would continue funding for a level of program offerings, staffing, and class sizes that wouldn't be possible without it. The levy renewal would:

- continue funding for approximately 100 teachers and the classroom programs they provide
- · support class sizes funded by the current levy
- · help local schools by supplementing insufficient state funding

The local option levy rate would not exceed \$1 per \$1,000 of assessed value. The levy is estimated to raise \$12,600,000 in 2025-26, \$13,000,000 in 2026-27, \$13,400,000 in 2027-28, \$13,800,000 in 2028-29, and \$14,200,000 in 2029-30, for a total of \$67,000,000 over five years.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

These questions and answers summarize this measure.

1. What is the local option levy renewal?

Tigard-Tualatin School District (TTSD) administers a local option levy to supplement dollars allocated through the state school fund. The current levy pays for 100 teaching positions and supports educational programs and class sizes. Voters approved the local option levy in 2000 and renewed it in 2004, 2008, 2014, and 2018. Renewing again would keep the existing levy rate for another five years, beginning in 2025-26.

2. How would the funds be used?

It is not a new or additional tax.

Every local option levy dollar stays in the District. None goes to Salem.

Renewing the local option levy would:

- fund approximately 100 current teachers who work in every school in the District;
- preserve classroom programs that support a well-rounded education for every TTSD student;
- · support class sizes;
- supplement state funding to maintain school services and operations.

3. What would happen if this levy is not renewed?

The levy funds a level of programs, staffing, and class sizes that wouldn't be possible without it.

If the renewal were to fail to pass, TTSD would no longer receive levy funds. That would reduce the budget by approximately \$12,600,000 in 2025-26, which could increase class sizes and reduce funding for staff and classroom programs.

4. Is this measure within the limits established by Ballot Measure 5?

Yes. The local option levy rate is calculated individually for each piece of property, so the rate stays within Measure 5 limits.

5. How much would this cost?

If the renewal measure passes, it will continue the existing levy rate for another five years. It is not a new or additional tax. The exact amount varies from property to property. For a home assessed at \$300,000 and taxed at the maximum levy rate (\$1 per \$1,000 of assessed value), the cost would continue to be

\$300 per year, or about \$25 per month.

6. What accountability measures are in place?

Each year, an outside accounting firm audits TTSD finances and expenditures. All audit reports are public.

The school district's budget is reviewed and approved by an 11-member committee that includes the five elected school board members and six appointed community members.

Another three community members serve with two school board members on the District's Financial Oversight Committee, which meets with auditors to review TTSD's audit plan and results, and with the District's investment advisors to review the policy and strategy for investments.

7. What about budget savings and efficiencies?

Evidence of the District's commitment to fiscally responsible stewardship includes:

successful financial audits every year monthly financial reports to the Board transparency in reporting

ongoing commitment to sustaining budget reserves and a "rainy-day fund"

In the 2023-24 school year, TTSD redirected savings to preserve teaching positions wherever possible. Long-term dedication to savings enabled TTSD to avoid cutting school days and mitigate reductions to programs. The District kept all its programs - none were eliminated.


