Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, the major fund, and the budgetary comparison of the Clackamas County Extension and 4-H Service District (the District), a component unit of Clackamas County, Oregon, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2021, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the District's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinions

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities and the major fund of the District as of June 30, 2021, and the respective changes in financial position and the respective budgetary comparisons for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis on pages 4 through 7 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information provide any assurance.

Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements that collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements. The schedule of property tax transactions and outstanding balances (the Schedule), as listed in the table of contents, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The Schedule is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the schedule is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements that collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements. The introductory section is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The introductory section has not been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements, and accordingly, we do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on it.

Reports on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated October 7, 2021 on our consideration of the District's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

Management's discussion and analysis of the Clackamas County Extension Service and 4-H District (the District) offers readers a narrative overview of financial activities for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2021. Please read it in conjunction with the accompanying basic financial statements and the notes to the basic financial statements.

Oregon Revised Statutes Chapter 451 provides for the establishment of county service districts, including extension services. The Clackamas County Board of Commissioners adopted its Order No. 2008-190 on November 26, 2008, which established the District as a County service district to provide a dedicated, stable funding source for the support of agricultural extension services in Clackamas County, Oregon (the "County"). The District's boundaries are contiguous with those of the County, excepting portions lying within the city limits of Johnson City.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

- Assets of the District exceeded liabilities at the close of the fiscal year by \$8,787,963. The total amount may be used to meet ongoing or future obligations, but has been accumulated for the purpose of building a new facility.
- Net Position district-wide increased by \$971,886. Property taxes levied for operations and other revenues exceeded education expenses by this amount.
- The governmental fund reported an ending fund balance of \$8,726,137, an increase of 12.49% from the prior year. Please see page 13 of the basic financial statements which reconciles the net change in fund balance to the change in net position.
- The District is planning for the future and has designed a new facility to be sited on Clackamas County's Red Soils Campus. After a review of the bids, current cost estimates have come in higher than anticipated due to rising construction costs. The project has been on hold indefinitely.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

This discussion and analysis is intended to serve as an introduction to the District's basic financial statements. The District's basic financial statements are made up of two components; 1) financial statements and 2) notes to basic financial statements. This report also contains supplementary information in addition to the basic financial statements themselves.

The Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities provide government-wide information for the District. These statements include all assets and liabilities of the District using the accrual basis of accounting, which is similar to the accounting methodology used by private sector entities. Current year revenues and expenses are taken into account regardless of when cash is received or paid.

The Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities report the District-wide net position and change in net position from the prior year. Net position is the difference between assets and liabilities and represents a measurement of financial health. Over time, increases or decreases in net position indicate whether financial health is improving or deteriorating.

The notes to the basic financial statements provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the basic financial statements.

Following the government-wide financial statements are governmental fund financial statements. These statements are prepared using the current financial resources measurement focus and modified accrual basis of accounting. A reconciliation of the fund financial statements to the District-wide statements explains the differences in the two methods of reporting.

GOVERNMENT-WIDE FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

Net Position of the District increased from prior year. The increase is due to an intentional effort to save funds to construct a new facility, which is on hold indefinitely, to be built on the Red Soils Campus of Clackamas County.

The Statement of Net Position for fiscal years ended June 30, 2021 and 2020 follows.

Current assets increased \$999,850 from the prior year due to continued growth in assessed values during fiscal year 2020-21, resulting in increased property tax collections. Current liabilities increased \$27,964, as accrued payables for services is more than the prior year. The change in net position is discussed in the financial highlights section.

Education expenditures decreased \$213,046 compared to the prior year, which is approximately 11.11%. This reduction is attributed to the impact of COVID-19 on educational programs, as many programs could not be held in person.

The Balance Sheet and the Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balance are presented for the governmental fund. The fund balance in the governmental fund increased \$968,779 during the year.

Compared to budget, a positive variance of \$8,371 is reported for total revenues, as actual collections of property taxes were more than budgeted. Total expenditures were under budget by \$8,108,026. This is largely attributed to planned payments to the County for the construction of a new building that were not incurred in fiscal year 2020-21.

ECONOMIC FACTORS

Property taxes are the chief revenue source for the District; approximately 97.6 percent of total revenues for the year ended June 30, 2021 were property tax revenues. The 1997 property tax limitation established permanent tax rates and limited assessed value growth for individual properties to 3 percent per year. The limitation is on existing properties so growth beyond the 3 percent can occur due to new construction. Certain taxes, such as those to pay bonded debt, were exempted from Measure 50 reductions.

The District has been accumulating resources for future capital construction of a new Clackamas County Extension Education Center, since formation of the District in 2008. As of fiscal year 2015-16, the District received approval from the Board of County Commissioners to site the new facility on existing County owned land. In spring of 2017, the Board of County Commissioners approved a preliminary design plan and estimated construction cost of approximately \$10 million dollars. Design was completed and an RFP was issued in 2019; however, bids came back higher than anticipated. This, combined with COVID-19, resulted in the District and the County placing the project on hold. The District plans on funding the building from District resources, in addition to donations and the issuance of bonded debt.

In early 2020, cases of novel coronavirus (COVID-19) began surfacing in the United States and on the West Coast. In response to local cases emerging here in the State of Oregon, the Governor issued an Executive Order declaring a state of emergency on March 8, 2020, and issued an Executive Order to stay home on March 23, 2020. To date, the County has experienced various levels of shut downs and re-openings and is now combatting Delta, the 4th wave of the virus. It is unknown at this time what the exact economic impact will be to the District in the coming fiscal year. Given the end of Federal unemployment benefits and rent moratoriums, it is possible that the delinquent rate for property taxes could rise, which would result in reduction in property taxes receivable.

FINANCIAL CONTACT

NOTES TO BASIC FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The District

The Clackamas County Extension and 4-H Service District (the District), a component unit of Clackamas County, Oregon (the County), was formed under the provisions of Oregon Revised Statutes (ORS) Chapter 451, "County Service Facilities". The District has no potential component units. As provided by ORS 451.485, the Clackamas County Board of Commissioners (the Board) is the governing body of the District. Since the County is financially accountable for and significantly influences the operations of the District, the District is included in the financial statements of the County. The District's purpose is to provide financing for Oregon State University (OSU) educational and agricultural extension programs in Clackamas County. The District has entered into an intergovernmental agreement with OSU Extension Service in which OSU maintains, operates, and provides extension services to County residents.

Basis of Presentation and Basis of Accounting

Government-wide Financial Statements

The Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities display information about the District, including all of its financial activities. Governmental activities are financed primarily through property taxes.

The Statement of Activities presents direct expenses for the District's program. The District has no program revenues. Direct expenses are those that are specifically associated with the program and, therefore, are clearly identifiable to that program.

Fund Financial Statements

The fund financial statements provide information about the District's only fund.

Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting

Government-wide financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded at the time liabilities are incurred, regardless of when the related cash flows take place. On the accrual basis of accounting, revenue from property taxes is recognized in the fiscal year for which the taxes are levied.

Governmental fund financial statements are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and modified accrual basis of accounting. Under this method, revenues are recognized when measurable and available. The District considers all revenues reported in the governmental fund to be available if they are collected within sixty days after year-end. Interest and property taxes are considered to be susceptible to accrual.

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Basis of Presentation and Basis of Accounting (Continued)

Expenditures are recorded when the related fund liability is incurred, except for principal and interest on the bonds payable and claims and judgments, which are recognized as expenditures to the extent they have matured. Capital asset acquisitions are reported as expenditures and proceeds from long-term debt and acquisitions under capital leases are reported as other financing sources.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of basic financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the basic financial statements and reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results may differ from those estimates.

Cash and Investments

The District considers investments with maturities of three months or less when purchased to be cash equivalents.

The District's cash and investments comprise funds held and invested by the State of Oregon Treasurer's Local Government Investment Pool and the County Treasurer. Financial information required by Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statements No. 3, No. 31, No. 40 and No. 72 regarding the accounting and financial reporting for the District's pooled cash and investments, held by the County Treasurer, has been disclosed in the County's Annual Comprehensive Financial Report for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2021.

Receivables

Property taxes are assessed and become a lien against the property as of July 1 each year, and are payable in three installments on November 15, February 15, and May 15. All property taxes receivable are due from property owners within the District.

Prepaid Items

Payments to vendors that reflect costs applicable to future accounting periods are recorded as prepaid items and accounted for with the consumption method.

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Deferred Outflows/Inflows of Resources

In addition to assets, the balance sheet reports a separate section for *deferred outflows of resources*, which represents a consumption of net position that applies to future periods and so will not be recognized as an outflow of resources (expense/expenditure) until that time.

In addition to liabilities, the balance sheet reports a separate section for *deferred inflows of resources*, which represents an acquisition of net position that applies to future periods and so will not be recognized as an inflow of resources (revenue) until that time. Unavailable revenue – property taxes, are a portion of the District's property taxes that are collected after year-end and meet the recognition in future periods requirement of deferred inflows of resources.

<u>Budget</u>

A budget is prepared and legally adopted for the fund on the modified accrual basis of accounting, except for property taxes which are recognized on the cash basis. The budget is adopted, appropriations made, and the tax levy is declared no later than June 30th for the next fiscal year. The resolution authorizing appropriations sets the level by which expenditures cannot legally exceed appropriations. Appropriations, which are set at the principal object level, consisting of special payments and contingency are the levels of control established by the resolution. The detail budget document, however, is required to contain more specific, detailed information for the above mentioned expenditure categories. Management may make transfers of appropriations within object levels. However, transfers of appropriations between object levels require the approval of the governing body. Unexpected additional resources may be added to the budget through the use of a supplemental budget. The Board at a regular Board meeting may adopt supplemental budgets less than 10% of the fund's original budget. A supplemental budget greater than 10% of the fund's original budget requires hearings before the public, publication in newspapers and approval by the Board. Original and supplemental budgets may be modified by the use of appropriation transfers between the levels of control with approval by the Board. Appropriations lapse as of year-end.

Fund Balance and Net Position

On the government-wide *Statement of Net Position*, net position is segregated into restricted and unrestricted balances. Restrictions are limitations on how the net position may be used. Restrictions may be placed on net position by an external party that provided the resources, by enabling legislation or by the nature of the asset. This amount is reported on the *Statement of Net Position*.

Certain revenues derived from specific taxes or other earmarked revenue sources are considered restricted assets. Such revenues include dedicated property taxes, state gas tax, intergovernmental grants, and charges for services which are legally restricted to finance particular functions or activities. Net position in these resources is reported as restricted on the *Statement of Net Position* and is recorded in the general fund supporting the specific function or operation.

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Fund Balance and Net Position (Continued)

In the financial statements, assets in excess of liabilities are presented as either fund balances or net position, depending on the measurement focus used for financial reporting in the fund.

Governmental funds report assets in excess of liabilities and deferred inflows of resources as fund balances and will be reported in the classifications that comprise a hierarchy based on the extent that the District is bound to honor those constraints on the specific purposes for which amounts in those funds can be spent.

Fund balance is reported as *Non-spendable* when the resources cannot ever be spent, whether due to legal restrictions (such as corpus), or items not spendable in form such as inventory balances, prepaid items, or interfund loans/receivables.

Fund balance is reported as *Restricted* when the resources have legal externally enforceable restrictions, representing a spending constraint such as grants or contracts, fines and forfeitures, lender requirements, or laws and regulations of other governments.

Fund balance is reported as *Committed* when the Board of County Commissioners passes a resolution to establish a specific spending constraint on how the resources may be used. The Board can also modify or rescind the resolution through the passage of the same type of formal action employed to previously commit those amounts.

Fund balance is reported as *Assigned* when the County Administrator and Finance Director or designee assign portions of revenue sources or ending fund balance which are not determined to be non-spendable, restricted or committed by formal written notice. Authority is granted to the individuals by the Board of County Commissioners and such authority may only be established, modified or rescinded by the Board.

Fund balance is reported as *Unassigned* when resources are not otherwise reported as non-spendable, restricted, committed, or assigned.

When both restricted and unrestricted fund balance is available for use, the purpose for which that is restricted, it is the District's policy to use restricted fund balance first, then unrestricted fund balance as needed. When unrestricted fund balance is spent, the District will consider that committed amounts will be reduced first, followed by assigned amounts, and then unassigned amounts last.

The property taxes collected by the fund are legally restricted by special tax levy Measure 3-311, passed by the voters in November 2008, for the purpose of providing financing to the Oregon State University educational and agricultural extension programs in Clackamas County. Therefore, all accumulated fund balance is restricted.

2. RISK MANAGEMENT

The District is exposed to various risks of loss related to errors and omissions; automobile; damage to and destruction of assets; and bodily injury for which the District and/or County carries commercial insurance. The District participates in the County's self-insurance program where not commercially insured. The District makes payments to the County's self-insurance internal service funds based on historical cost information estimates of the amounts needed to pay prior year and current year claims, claim reserves, premiums, and administrative costs of the program. During the past three fiscal years, no settled claims have exceeded insurance coverage levels, and there has been no significant reduction in coverage.

3. CASH AND INVESTMENTS

Cash and investments at June 30, 2021 are comprised of the following:

Cash and cash equivalents represent the District's equity in pooled accounts maintained by the County Treasurer. State statutes authorize the District to invest in general obligations of the U.S. Government and in its agencies, certain bonded obligations of Oregon municipalities, certain corporate indebtedness, bank repurchase agreements, bankers' acceptances, certain commercial paper and the State of Oregon Treasurer's Local Government Investment Pool (LGIP), among others. As of June 30, 2021, and for the year then ended, the District and the County were in compliance with the aforementioned State of Oregon statutes.

Oregon Revised Statutes (ORS) require the public funds depository institution to be a participant in a multiple financial institution collateral pool administered by the Oregon State Treasurer or otherwise adequately collateralized as outlined in ORS 295. Reference should be made to the June 30, 2021, Clackamas County Annual Comprehensive Report for compliance with these statutes.

3. CASH AND INVESTMENTS (Continued)

Investments in the LGIP are stated at fair value, which approximates cost. Fair value in the LGIP is the same as the value of its pool shares. The District's LGIP funds are in the District's name and reference should be made to the June 30, 2021, Clackamas County Annual Comprehensive Financial Report for disclosures of the risk inherent in the County's portfolio.

4. TAX ABATEMENTS

The District has entered into no tax abatement programs. There are two tax abatement programs entered into by another government reducing the District's property tax revenues for the year ended June 30, 2021:

Oregon Enterprise Zone:

The Oregon Enterprise Zone program (E-Zone) is a State of Oregon economic development program established under ORS section 285C.175, that allows for property tax exemptions for up to five years. In exchange for receiving property tax exemption, participating firms are required to meet the program requirements set by state statute and the local sponsor. The County is the local sponsor for the E-Zone.

The E-Zone allows industrial firms that will be making a substantial new capital investment a waiver of 100% of the amount of real property taxes attributable to the new investment for a 5-year period after completion. Land or existing machinery or equipment is not tax exempt; therefore, there is no loss of current property tax levies to the local taxing jurisdiction.

Not-for-Profit Low Income Rental Housing:

In 1985, Oregon legislature authorized a property tax exemption for low-income housing held by charitable, nonprofit organizations (Not-for-Profit Low Income Rental Housing (NPLTE)). The legislature has renewed and extended this program to 2027. The tax exemption is intended to benefit low-income renters by alleviating property tax burden on those agencies that provide this housing opportunity. The qualifying property must be located within the District.

Charitable, nonprofit organizations that provide housing to low-income persons are eligible. Organizations must be certified by the Internal Revenue Service as 501(c)(3) or (4). Organizations must own or have a leasehold interest in the property or participate in a partnership as long as the non-profit organization is responsible for the day-to-day management of the property. Applicants who are leaseholders must have a signed leasehold agreement by the application deadline.

4. TAX ABATEMENTS (Continued)

Housing units which are unoccupied at the time of application may be included in the total eligible units if the application meets the following conditions:

- (1) The units will be available exclusively to eligible, very low-income persons;
- (2) The units are intended to be occupied within the year;
- (3) The application must be filled out giving information to the best of your ability regarding how the applicant plans to provide housing to eligible tenants; and
- (4) Vacant land must be held for future development of affordable housing for the very low-income, and must include a development plan in the application.

Vacant land intended to be developed as low-income housing is also eligible for the exemption.

5. RELATED-PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The District expended \$180,781 in reimbursements to the County for rents, audit services, and other administrative costs.

COVID-19

In early 2020, cases of novel coronavirus (COVID-19) began surfacing in the United States and on the West Coast. In response to local cases emerging here in the State of Oregon, the Governor issued an Executive Order declaring a state of emergency on March 8, 2020, and issued an Executive Order to stay home on March 23, 2020. To date, the County has experienced various levels of shut downs and re-openings and is now combatting Delta, the 4th wave of the virus. It is unknown at this time what the exact economic impact will be to the District in the coming fiscal year. Given the end of Federal unemployment benefits and rent moratoriums, it is possible that the delinquent rate for property taxes could rise, which would result in reduction in property taxes receivable.
