Voters approved the formation of NCPRD in 1990


**36 square mile Clackamas County service district** 


**Guided by volunteer District Advisory Board**

## Happy Valley in NCPRD


- Annexed in 2006 by a vote of Happy Valley residents

Total \$123,041,138


Total \$33,294,828





## Property Tax Assessment


NCPRD Property Taxes Assessed\* Fiscal Years 1991/1992 to 2018/2019

## Total Property Tax Assessed by Area








## Property Tax Assessment & SDC Revenue

## **Current Status**

- Happy Valley City Council voted to withdraw from NCPRD (June 2017)
- Question of whether Happy Valley has withdrawn properly remains before the court
- Happy Valley residents are now paying a 5-year tax levy to the City for parks and recreation services and are no longer paying a permanent tax rate to NCPRD
- NCPRD continues to provide services and programs to Happy Valley residents



# Potential Impacts of Withdrawal for Happy Valley Residents

#### Residents would:

- Have no or reduced access to District programs and services
- Have to pay higher, out of District rates for NCPRD programs and services



# Examples of Potential Impacts to Happy Valley Residents

Higher costs and reduced or eliminated access to District programs and services such as:

- Swim lessons
- Nutrition services
- Transportation and homebound services
- Youth and adult sports
- Recreation programming and RecMobile



# Potential Impacts of Withdrawal for Remaining Residents

- Residents continue to receive high-quality services and have access to programs.
- Potential options for addressing the impact of a Happy Valley withdrawal from NCPRD could include:
  - Evaluating programs and services for reduction and/or elimination
  - Increased costs to participants
  - Scaling down of services, staff and/or infrastructure
  - Exploring settlement agreement with Happy Valley to minimize impacts to District residents
